## T-H Rule Action Is Dock Key

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—Striking longshoremen marked time today in major east coast ports pending an expected early end to the costly walkout via T-H-Hartley act machinery.

## 2 More Die Of Shots by India Guard

PANMUNJOM, Oct. 2 (AP)—Indian guards armed with guns and clubs killed two Chinese prisoners and wounded five others today in the second mass breakout attempt in two days by repressive anti-communist war prisoners.

Yesterday the Indians quelled with guns a riot of North Koreans who refuse to return home, killing one and wounding 10.

Casualties in two days of violence—the first time blood has been shed since the Indians took custody—total three dead and 10 wounded, the Indian command announced.

An Indian spokesman said order had been restored at the camp of five miles southwest of Panmunjom in the demilitarized zone. The outbreak lasted only a few minutes.

Other developments:

The U. N. command formally protested that the neutral nations' representation commission favored the communists in drawing up rules of procedure for explanations to prisoners by agents from their home countries.

The most important topic discussed was understood to be Russia's reply to the western proposal for a four-power conference on Germany and Austria at Lugano, Switzerland.

### Adlai Reports Soviet Treaty Interests 'Ike'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson reported today that President Eisenhower is "interested" in the idea of a non-aggression pact with Russia as a means of relieving tension in Europe.

The 1954 Democratic presidential candidate had lunch at the White House and sold President Eisenhower, however, was giving close study to the possibilities of an anti-war non-aggression agreement. Along with other methods of abating the cold war.

Stevenson proposed a non-aggression pact in his recent Chicago speech and brought the subject up again when he called on the President today to report on the world tour he took earlier this year. Secretary of State Dulles also was present at the White House conference.

"If Russia was unwilling to accept the proposal, Stevenson said, it would be rather surprising that her peaceful professions aren't as sincere as they might seem."

Stevenson said that the pact with respect to their intentions, he added. He then went on to say that the pact would be somewhat the same way about it.

Stevenson spent half an hour with the President and then went down to a lunch luncheon in his honor, attended by the President and 18 other high government officials.

Stevenson said that the "great restraint" which he called a very fine lunch, Stevenson conferred with the President for another 15 minutes.

He said Eisenhower, whom he found very friendly, was confronting our country around the world, "asked a number of questions regarding individual areas, Stevenson said."

Stevenson said that Russia is "not really hostile" but that it has an aggressive bias in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and that the pact would be a threat to peace.



### Lewis Sounds High Praise of U. S. Freedom

HAZLETON, Pa., Oct. 3 (AP)—The American system of free enterprise enabled this country to produce sufficient coal for her domestic use and fill the shortages of allied nations, John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, said last night.

Lewis, speaking at a banquet at Hazleton, Pa., marking the 50th anniversary of the founding of the anthracite coal industry, also commended his usual fiery attacks of anti-labor groups and made strong pleas for the preservation of free enterprise.

"You can call the roll of the countries and see communism, social and fascist or some other kind of law rolling toward a totalitarian government," he said. "Admittedly, these nations, the American free and free enterprise exemplifies joint relationship, collective bargaining and high standards of living unequalled elsewhere."

"Our task is to keep what we've got and retain what we have achieved," Lewis said.

He pointed to the decline in coal production in other countries throughout the world and said England, with her nationalization of the coal industry, has not stepped up coal production anywhere comparable to production in this country.

Lewis described the 40-year history of the anthracite coal industry as proof of what men can do when they work together and meet across the table to air problems. During its operation, it solved 7,000 disputes which could have produced strikes or work stoppages, he said.

### People Honor Berlin Mayor After Passing

BERLIN, Oct. 3 (AP)—Thousands of East and West Germans filed past the bier of West Berlin Mayor Ernst Reuter today to pay homage to the man they regarded as the symbol of German resistance against communism.

Reuter's body was brought to city hall last night from his modest home in suburban Schöneberg, where 10 miles jammed with a grieving crowd estimated at more than 600,000.

During the night, thousands of candles flickered in the windows of fashionable villas—and thousands of houses as a sign of mourning for the mayor who died unexpectedly after a heart attack Tuesday night. He was 64.

Soviet-made residents came from as far away as the Polish and Czech areas in West Berlin to attend the funeral and to pick up free American food packages before the relief program ends tomorrow.

### Respected Men Charged With Cleaning Out Bank's \$114,500

NEW MARKET, Va., Oct. 3 (AP)—A self-styled sheriff and a former mayor of this Shenandoah valley town faced charges today they cleaned out the vault of a bank where they were officers and fled across the Canadian border with \$114,500.

One of the men, returned later. The money has not been recovered.

News of FBI charges against the hitherto respected pair swept through town with teletype speed and caused folk to scratch their heads in amazement.

### Official "Invades" Apartment To Procure Woman's Remains

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 (AP)—Dr. Herman N. Budson, 41-year-old president of the board of health, drew his 38-caliber pistol today and invaded an apartment barricaded by a man who refused to surrender the body of his aged aunt.
