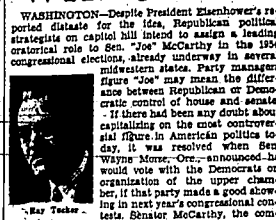

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG



## CHIEF JUSTICE WARREN

The new chief justice of the United States, Earl Warren, is not a veteran jurist. But President Eisenhower evidently was convinced he possesses a proper judicial temperament, an understanding of judicial problems, and a talent for managing the supreme court.

It is worth noting that two of the greatest chief justices in American history, John Marshall and Roger Taney, were not eminent jurists before they came to the high court. Proven superiority on the bench is more a requirement to be asked of the associate justices.

Governing California for 10 years, Warren showed himself always open-minded, receptive to new ideas, prepared to acknowledge achievement in any quarter.

Warren will be one of two Republicans on a court with seven Democrats. Moreover, within the Democrat group, sharp divisions have occurred in the past. It is to be hoped that Warren's full talents to keep the justices in harmonious harmony.

As governor, Warren accomplished several judicial reforms in his state. Then, too, he has signed some 10,000 bills into law, and none has yet been upset by a judicial decision.

For Warren, a man who aspired honestly to the presidency without ever getting the "bug," there must be a special satisfaction in winning the second most important job in the United States. He gained it through years of fine public service, years in which he let ambition quit him and never master him.

## WIVES OF SERVICEMEN

A colonel in the Pentagon developed an interesting theme on the present alarming state of low morale in the armed services. He puts about 70 per cent of the blame on the wives of the men in service.

It's obvious why a colonel, brave enough to say such a thing, must be kept anonymous. But there's no anonymity connected with claims that morale is low.

In his first meeting with the press, Admiral Arthur Radford, new chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, appeared more concerned about low service morale than he did about the Russian hydrogen bomb. There are at least a half-dozen high-level reports being prepared on the subject for presentation to congress.

Secretary of Defense Charles Wilson has a study under way following a memorandum written by former JCS Chairman Gen. Omar Bradley. Bradley wrote that he was worried about "the growing lack of confidence in the military service as a worthwhile and respected career."

As far as the anonymous colonel goes, Wilson and the other morale experts can stop probing the problem right now. He claims that behind almost every case of low morale, you can find a female. Following is a paraphrasing of the colonel's idiom.

First, doff your hat to the service wives and widows who have suffered plenty. Congratulate the handful who cheerfully moved from post to post without complaining and who never say one word which dulls the husband's sense of duty in performing one of history's most important jobs, that of defending freedom in the world.

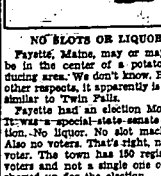
But then you come to the majority of service wives and the sweethearts of servicemen. They are the ones who gripe.

It's the most-married military organization in history with approximately 88 per cent of the officers and 28 per cent of the enlisted men with wives.

Take the loudest beef of all about military service, which is low pay. You don't hear the bachelors complain. The wives are the ones who needle their husbands about more money. Always pointing out how much more can be made in private industry. Forgive such things as free medical attention and low commissary food prices.

The average man in service is not distressed to be sent overseas or to some out-of-the-way base. It's his wife who sends him into trying to get some soft, steady civilian employment when she does, she fusses about the trouble of moving, even though the services take care of practically every detail of it for her. American women just seem afraid to leave the security of their familiar, warm, beauty parlor, hair, drier.

### Forest Fund Share for 34 Counties Set

BOISE, Oct. 1 (AP)—Thirty-four Idaho counties have split a record \$533,038 forest service fund, State Treasurer Margaret Gilbert announced Tuesday.

More than one-fourth—\$211,857—went to Idaho county which has part of six national forests in its boundaries.

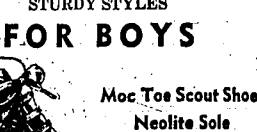

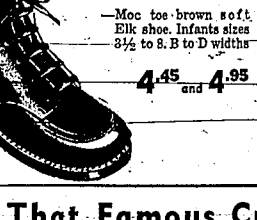

### Research Use Is Restored in U. S. Defense

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson, asserting that research is "fundamental" to strong national defense, has loosened the pure defense of military research and development.

In fact, the military services now are spending more money to invent and develop new weapons than at any time in their history.

Wilson, as part of his economy campaign, last summer ordered the services to plan on spending only 75 per cent of the money congress had appropriated for research.

This action, combined with Wilson's statement that he was "not interested in what makes fired potatoes brown"—or pure research—led to scientific criticism that he was crippling vital military research.

In an obvious answer to this criticism, Wilson yesterday issued a statement at a news conference saying the defense department "supports basic or fundamental research" and "we have taken no steps to de-emphasize it."

The statement also disclosed that Wilson has restored the full amount—\$1,300,000,000—voted by congress for military research and development in the present fiscal year.
