Spud Harvest Is Started for Jerome Areas

Jerome, Oct. 10.—Potato harvesting has begun in Jerome county, County Agent Virgil A. Cross reports. Although the weather is still even though the price is low. Other growers have started to put their potatoes in storage. Cross said the harvest will be in full swing by Monday. However, harvest vacation will not begin until the close of school Wednesday. Killing frosts have been reported in most areas and have ripened the potatoes so the storable ones are being sorted. Dealers and growers report an unusual amount of frost damage to the potatoes, approximately 20 per cent higher than last year, Cross said. A large number of No. 2s are not being sorted but are being run in as culls and sold to waste factories and for stock feed. Almost all potatoes being marketed are No. 1s, he said. Cross said the bean harvest will be almost complete by the end of the week and the yields are better than anticipated. The best harvest is progressing and though an exact figure is not available, the yield is believed comparable with last year which set an all-time high, he said.

Benson Plans Are Given to House Group

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson today gave the house agriculture committee his plans for reorganizing the department.

After the closed meeting, Benson told reporters that "the reception by the congressmen was all that we could ask for. It was a very satisfactory conference."

Details Withheld

Benson declined to explain the proposed plan in full. He said it will be made public at a new conference next Tuesday.

"There was practically no opposition to the plan," he said.

Benson said he wanted to scotch a rumor that under the plan the extension service would absorb the soil conservation service.

"There's no truth in it," he said. Present plans, he said, call for elimination of regional offices of the soil conservation service and the extension service offices. This will save money, require less personnel and be more efficient, he said.

Year Roll Shift

Benson asked that the congressmen asked more questions about the soil conservation service plan than any of the other proposed changes.

Representative Cooley, D., N. C., told reporters later that some objections were made concerning conservation service changes, but he thought the secretary had explained his plans to the satisfaction of the congressmen.

Representative Lovely, R. S. D., said he "believes" the plan will strengthen both the soil conservation and extension services.

Benson said the plan will be discussed Monday with the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts. While elimination of the regional offices is new planned, he said, this change could be dropped before the reorganization plan is announced Tuesday.

Representative Hagen, R. Minn., arrived in "Bridge Saturday" after a visit to Yugoslavia during which he interviewed Tito. He stated the American-British decision to withdraw "unavailable" and said the original proposal to turn the city of Trieste into an international port and hand the surrounding territory to Yugoslavia was the "best solution by far."

Red Disturbance Planned at Talks

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 10 (AP)—Yugoslav sources in Mexico said today communists are expected to create a disturbance at the Oct. 19 Pulson meeting of Petrosko Escobedo and Rula Corlino.

Officials were reported concerned because with between 75,000 and 100,000 people expected on the Mexican side of the river alone, even a small riot might spread dangerously.

Security measures were reported intensified by the Mexican government. Within recent days orders have gone out for additional troops to move to the Pulson dam area. Steps may be taken to cut down attendance at the dam ceremony.

Both the U. S. state department and the Mexican foreign ministry, these sources said, have been warned of the communist plan.

USAF Goal of 137 Wings by 1956 Planned

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The air force wants to reach a 137 wing strength by 1956, weighted with long-range bombers and carriers of carrying atomic bombs.

In disclosing this second phase target at its news conference, top officials explained today that the original and ultimate goal of 143 wings still stands.

Strength Yards

A wing carries in strength from 30 bombers to 75 fighters.

The 137-wing midway level, which has not been submitted for approval to the defense department—up to now, would be a 10-wing increase over the goal reportedly recommended by the joint chiefs of staff for the year ending in June, 1955. It would be 17 units more than the 120-wing goal which Secretary of Defense Wilson says "can be attained" by next June 30.

Units Reduced

The original 143-wing plan provided for 17 units of non-combat aircraft transport and utility planes; but this would be reduced proportionately in the 137-wing level. The resulting increase in the number of combat units would in turn provide increased numbers of strategic bombers.

The air force believes that something over seven wings—of heavy bombers now can be provided as a result of increased production facilities for the new B-52 long-range, high-speed jet bomber. That long-range bomber force will include both the new B-52 bombers and the B-36 Convair piston-jet engine planes of which several hundred have been produced.

Idaho Producers Ask Long Range Farm Price Plan

BOYDZELLO, Oct. 10 (AP)—Agricultural Producers Association concluded at a meeting today that it is a great urgency for enactment of a long range program to stabilize farm prices.

John Johnson, president of the organization, said that association members expressed regret at the meeting that most of 1953 had gone by without a stoppage of the decline in farm prices and the continuation of the decline in farm income.

Johnson said that the association has formulated a farm program which is ready for presentation at a meeting of the congressional agriculture committee when it meets either at Cheyenne or at Washington, Oct. 22 or 23.

The association will send representatives to one of the congressional meetings to present the program.

Experts Miss Boat on U.S. Benefit Need

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Representative Curtis R. Weller, said Friday the social security system has been seriously affected by growing unemployment.

He said when congress created the social security law in 1934 it relied on the word of government experts that the United States would have a population of 141 million in 1960, with 10,000,000 persons at or under age 16.

As it turned out, he said in a statement, there was a population of 151 million in 1950, with 12,500,000 citizens 65 or older.

Curtis is chairman of a house subcommittee studying possible changes in the social security system in the light of present economic conditions.

Actuaries for the social security administration now estimate that if the present law remains unchanged costs will run almost a billion dollars more a year than previously expected, starting in a few years and running beyond the year 2000.

His new figures indicate that higher tax rates may have to be adopted eventually to meet the death and retirement benefits promised to millions of American workers.

If the actuaries are right—and they admit they are dealing with many unknown variables, such as economic conditions, war, births and deaths—the huge social security reserve fund would not reach the anticipated peak of 100 billion dollars and might even be exhausted between 1955 and 2025 unless the tax rate is increased.

Polio Vaccine Test on Large Scale Planned

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 10 (AP)—The nation's first large-scale test of a polio vaccine was planned Friday, with the possibility it may take place early in 1939 and involve vaccination of "hundreds of thousands of children" throughout the country.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis announced this after one of its research grantees had disclosed that development of an experimental vaccine had reached the point where a nation-wide showdown test of its effectiveness is possible. The scientist said mass production problems "are being solved rapidly."

News Exchange foundation spokesman told a reporter that even with the inauguration of plans for the vaccine test—estimated to cost \$7,500,000—there has been no change in plans to purchase next year 18 million doses worth of gamma globulin. That's the blood derivative already in use as a preventive for paralytic polio, although the general medical view is that its value is limited.

Declaring that O. G. Hill is the only substance now available which proved to be of some possible value as a protective, he said the amount planned for purchase next year would mean a supply twice as great as was available this year, and allowing up to 3 million individual "shots."

Test Possible

As for the vaccine, Dr. Jonas E. Salk of the University of Pittsburgh reported that as a result of research under way he announced last spring "what now becomes possible to determine whether or not—and for what extent—the incidence of naturally-occurring paralytic may be influenced by the use of the material."

In a guardedly optimistic report to the closing session of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the scientist said research tests in many animals and a total of 877 humans had suggested the possibility of a protective effect by the "present imperfect" vaccine, and also demonstrated its safety for use.

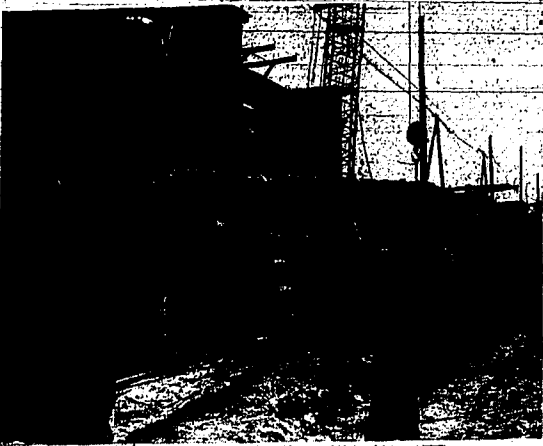
Conditions Differ

But he stressed that the tests to date have been held under conditions different from those occurring when polio strikes under natural conditions.

His report marked a medical milestone, however, in that it rated the experimental vaccine safe, potent and promising under the test appraisal under the acid test of extensive field trials.

Yet Salk cautioned both the public and the medical profession, as well as to look upon such a test only in the light of its inherent purpose. He affirmed to a reporter that there is no assurance that hoped-for protection would be achieved.

Canal Company Completes Erection of 138-Foot Radio Tower at Offices Here

Immediate radio contact with any point on the 100 miles of canal was assured the Twin Falls Canal company Saturday, as erection of a 138-foot radio tower at the rear of the company's office here was completed.

Installation of the new radio tower was delayed twice when portions of the tower buckled. It first buckled during preliminary tests and again Friday as canal company and Idaho Power company crews began to erect it.

Canal and power-company crews labored Saturday morning and through-the-afternoon to get the huge tower into place. A concrete fill was poured Saturday afternoon anchoring the tower in place.

About one month of actual work went into assembly of the tower, according to J. A. McEwen, Twin Falls Canal company engineer, who designed it.

He gives much of the credit for successful completion of the project to W. G. Waister, assistant division electrical superintendent, Idaho Power company, and Harold Lasker, power company engineer, who assisted him in designing and erecting the tower.

The tower was originally planned to be 148½ feet high, but was trimmed to 138 feet by the designers when they found it would be nearly impossible to stabilize the 148½-foot tower.

The new tower is braced by 24 steel cables.

The tower is designed to withstand winds up to 80 miles an hour.

The bottom portion of the tower consists of a timber pole about 70 feet high and is topped by a 6½-foot piece of steel pipe. Dimensions for the tower were determined from extensive tests conducted with the tower.

Dr. Hankin, a past president of the American Medical Association spoke at his inauguration as president of the college. Attending were 1,178 surgeons who were accepted into the college as fellows after colorful cap and gown ceremonies.

Also stated that consideration as measures to expand and accelerate the government's program for purchase of beef for foreign aid and school lunches as a means of providing for increased beef consumption.

PERVERT, Oct. 10—Midvale county, one of the largest potato growing counties in Magic Valley, is in an unusual position this year.

Pickers are needed to harvest the large crop but there is no housing space available for migrant workers. Currently there are 1,400 persons working in the potato fields in the area. This number includes all of the school children who were dismissed from school Monday to work in the fields.

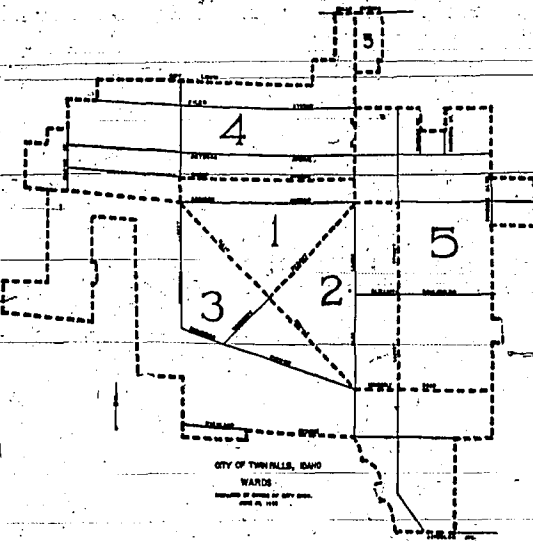

Senator Warns U. S. Against Pyramiding Atomic Expenses

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—Senator Hickenlooper, D., Ia., sounded a note of caution today against any "pyramiding" of atomic expenditures to meet the threat of Russian hydrogen bomb developments.

Hickenlooper, top Republican senator on the senate-house atomic energy committee, said in an interview with the American atomic program "is going along very vigorously and I am not prepared to say we should pyramid it."

The Iowa senator thus added his vote of confidence to President Eisenhower's statement Thursday that this nation's atomic strength has been distributed to the commission of cost Government of the east.

Hickenlooper said that a system of priorities is being worked out for military expenditures and in some quarters this was interpreted as likely to bring a stepup in requests for atomic funds.

But Senator Flinders, R., Vt., said in a separate interview he thinks it is possible this country has reached a point of diminishing returns in atomic preparations.

He said that if 500 bombs were built to meet any aggression, the accumulation of 8,000 bombs would not make this country "rip apart" as safe.

Although Eisenhower indicated that budget balancing may be delayed because of defense expenditures, Flinders said he is going to submit to the new Hoover commission a plan for reorganizing the defense department which he thinks would save a lot of money.

He said this plan would call for reassignment of missions among the service branches, but declined to discuss details.

"The budget can be cut billions, even in defense," he said. "I think it is possible to balance the budget within a year and still have a tax cut."

Senator Williams, R., Del., who contends that budget balancing is more important than any tax reduction, noted that any increase in atomic energy funds will run the gauntlet of the senate-house atomic committee.

"That committee has information which is not available to other members of congress," he said, adding: "I for one, would hesitate to vote for reductions in funds that the committee said were needed."

Sen. Giles-Johnston, D., S. C., said his big worry now is whether industrial production for defense isn't becoming too highly concentrated—and thus presenting a vulnerable target in case of war.

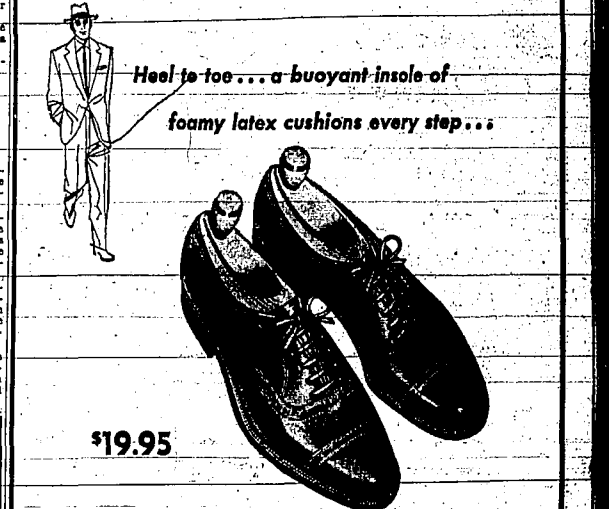

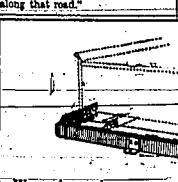
REYNOLDS, Oct. 10 (AP)—Five anti-Communist leaders were convicted by a federal court jury Saturday on charges against the government. The sixth defendant in the 23-week trial, Karyl Larsen, was acquitted. The jury of six men and six women returned its verdict just before 8 p.m. nearly 22 hours after hearing from the case. Actual deliberations occupied less than 11 hours.

Larsen's acquittal was the first in a jury since the justice department began its drive against first and second string Communist leaders in the past year. Two other defendants in trials elsewhere had been given directed verdicts of acquittal but no jury had heard any other trial. The East Stanwood, Wash., ex-labor leader concluded throughout the marathon trial that he left the Communist party in 1948 after 13 years' membership. The same reason, he said, had joined. Brownell said A and P had submitted a proposal for settlement which now is the subject of consultations. The attorney general noted that since he took office last January, he has filed 54 new anti-trust complaints. He said he remains confident he will be able to handle the complaints that were brought.

It is not the number of complaints filed, it is the significance of the cases that counts," he said. Brownell said he is a "hard-boiled man" in the anti-trust field, but commented: "We are now organized to drive a little faster along that road."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—A major business group struck out today against the guaranteed wage demand by major CIO unions, saying it would shake the American economy. The U. S. Chamber of Commerce said the CIO plan might aggravate a nationwide economic depression rather than prevent a slump, as the union claims. To the individual, his job is important," the chamber's report said, "but from the broad economic standpoint, it is production and growth that count.

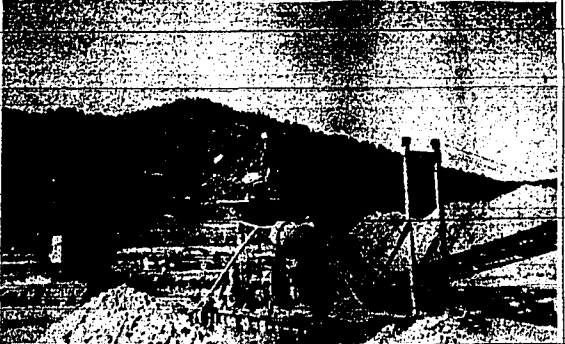
