

RENO, Nev., Oct. 14 (U. P.)—President of the National Reclamation Association said today that the organization will be in there pushing instead of fighting the government's reclamation policies.

One primary objective of the association is a water policy for the 17 western reclamation states under which local interest would lead in initiating, planning, financing, constructing and operating water resources developments.

ROK Promises to Behave as Red 'Explainers' Start Work

PANNUJONG, Korea, Oct. 14 (U. P.)—South Korea promised to behave as Red "Explainers" start work.

Dr. H. K. Karl, official government spokesman, said no attempt would be made to prevent Indian guards from escorting the anti-communist North Koreans and Chinese to lecture booths built by American engineers.

Lieut. Gen. R. K. Thompson, India, chairman of the neutral nations repatriation commission, assured the U. N. it will do "everything in its power" to prevent any break by the anti-communist prisoners.

He said the anti-communist need have no fears about the counter-brainwashing interview.

The communists notified the neutral nations repatriation commission they wanted to interview 1,000 men Thursday, beginning at 8 a.m.

At the same time, the communists reserved the right to have private "explanations" talks later.

The communists at a meeting of the joint military armistice commission, also demanded "complete freedom" for 400 Red "explainers" in the demilitarized zone.

Major Gen. Blackbaker M. Ryan, senior U. N. delegate on the armistice commission, refused the demand on the ground that the true agreement limits complete freedom to the "free designated" zone.

The seasons are expected to last up to eight hours daily and will continue until Dec. 24, deadline set in the Korean armistice agreement.

Although South Korea promised not to interfere, all observers expected trouble. The captives have been told they are required to appear either singly or in groups before the communist "explainers" and hundreds have vowed to kill the persuaders.



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
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Individual Income Grows

American in Russia Feels 'in Another World,' Tourist Says

Editor's note—Six months ago three young student editors asked Moscow for visas to visit the Soviet Union. To their amazement, they were granted. In September, Mark Edmund, University of Colorado; Daniel Burger, University of Michigan; and 22-year-old Zander Hollander, University of Michigan, flew off for two weeks in Russia. Here is Hollander's story, of how it was.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—An American in Russia feels like he's in another world.

In the two weeks I spent there, I never was allowed to forget the Iron curtain.

We toured Moscow's busy, wide streets frequently. Leaving the hotel, I noticed the flaming MVD militiamen stationed around the clock at the door. We were not followed in our rubber-necking tours but, curiously, MVD men showed up often. They wore long, heavy blue overcoats with red epaulettes, and pistols were visible on their hips.

Once, at a state-owned market off Gorki street, I took a picture of a crowd of Muscovites elbowing their way to the entrance of a store. The MVD men showed up often. They wore long, heavy blue overcoats with red epaulettes, and pistols were visible on their hips.

From what I could see, Muscovites spend many non-working hours waiting in line. Just for the experience, I queued up with them for bread — shaped like buns — cheese, which was tasty and candy, which was very rubbery. For each

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Man Free on Bond After Over 3 Years in Jail Without Trial

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 14 (AP)—John M. Higgins, 43, was free on bond after spending three and a half years behind prison bars without facing trial on a charge of having a maximum penalty of only one year. Higgins, a civil engineer before his strange prison life began, posted \$250 bond. He was calm after his long battle, but told newsmen "sometimes it appeared hopeless."

On March 8, 1960, Higgins was indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of sending "defamatory and scurrilous" messages through the mails to U. S. Judge Peterson M. Hall. Higgins also was accused of sending postcards to lawyers in-

volving in the case. He was arrested in Kansas City, Mo., and returned here for the trial that never came. U. S. Judge David Ling found him insane and committed him to a mental hospital in Kentucky. Higgins then filed for a writ of habeas corpus and was adjudged sane by a federal judge in Kansas City and returned here again in 1961.

But, once again, Higgins was ruled insane, this time by U. S. Judge Harry C. Westover, who committed him to county jail temporarily. Higgins appealed to the ninth circuit court of appeals. He remained in jail while the court took his case under advisement. Three months ago, the court reversed Westover's ruling and said

the government had no right to hold a person indefinitely on an insanity charge. It appointed Attorney Morris Lavine to represent Higgins and Lavine immediately challenged the government's right to hold his client. It was Westover who ordered Hig-

gins freed on bond. Westover also notified the attorney's office that Higgins was free to go. Higgins is now in the original charge. The judge said if Higgins is tried and convicted, he probably would serve the maximum term to time served.



Small Trieste Looms Large as Focal Point for European Row

Geographically, 300-square-mile Trieste may be small, but in the world scheme of things it looms large. Since World War II it has been the principal source of difficulty between Yugoslavia and Italy—difficulties which often seem more emotional than real, but which are a real block to Mediterranean unity. Trieste is back in the news with all the old conflicts magnified out of all proportion. The situation exploded last Thursday when the United States and Britain announced they were turning the administration of allied-occupied "zone A," which includes the port city of Trieste, over to the Italians. They proposed that Yugoslavia should continue to hold the territory's "zone B," but Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito reacted quickly and angrily. A part of his violent reaction seemed due to the fact he was caught by surprise, and thus without a plan. Hence, the bewildering assortment of ultimatums, threats and proposals coming out of Belgrade, and the mob attacks against the United States and British information services which resulted in the serious injury to an American information service employee. Note too that ordinarily roving unchecked in communist countries without government sanction. Monday, Russia entered the picture. It said the United States and Britain plan violated the Italian peace treaty because it "obstructed" the setting up of a free territory of Trieste, and accused the western allies of transforming Trieste into an illegal Anglo-American military base. The Anglo-American proposal was an obvious attempt to break by positive action a Yugoslav and Italian stalemate. Surprisingly, it has been accepted calmly by the Italians who apparently had some warning it was coming, but angrily by the Yugoslavs who in the past have indicated they would settle for permanent possession of "zone B." Now apparently they have raised their price.

Report Notes Big Tax Bite

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—The department of commerce reports about eight and one-half per cent of total family income in 1950 was absorbed by federal income taxes.

The department said some 48½ million "consumer units" of families and persons living alone in 1950 had 217 billion dollars income before taxes and that federal income tax liability on this income was some what over 18 billion.

The national average before-tax income of families and unattached individuals was \$4,460, but one third of the consumer units received more than the average.
