 Your goal then no longer should be to step up the tempo of living to achieve the unfulfilled ambitions of your youth, but to discard and throw away those you no longer want to make you happy.  
 The ambition that may be a helpful spur to you at 20 may at 40 just be an unnecessary hotfoot.  
 Why mean because you have been able to climb only half way up the ladder of success? A goal half gained is generally more real pleasure than a goal won. You have some progress behind you, and some to look forward to.  
 But the guy who has reached the top of the ladder in middle age can't pause to admire the view, as you can. Too many people are clawing at his legs, trying to pull him from his perch. If you have a comfortable niche on the ladder, the sensible ambition to have is to keep your hold and not be hit and knocked loose by the guy at the top when

most people change of their own accord as they grow older. When young, they fret about things they want to get and don't have, such as fame, fortune and a more glamorous address.  3. To comb my hair and catch the comb in a stubborn tangle. I have not had this feeling for 15 years, and I suppose I never will unless I buy a toupee.

**Mexico, U.S. Leaders Will Meet Monday**

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 15 (AP)—Two crusading presidents, Adolfo Ruiz Cortines of Mexico and Dwight D. Eisenhower of the United States, will meet Monday for the first time, but probably will avoid talking about anything more serious than the weather.

They will shake hands and pose for press photographers at the great Palace dam.

A first order of business is an operation between their countries, the great Palom dam.

But it appears likely they will keep conversations on a friendly, social level, and leave the diplomatic headaches to the diplomats.

The light official schedule allows scant time for discussions of any of the delicate mutual problems affecting the two nations—and that suits the Mexican government.

Mr. Eisenhower and Ruiz Cortines have a lot in common in that they took office within 30 days of each other, both on government "clean-up" campaigns.

The meeting at Palom, Tex., and Nueva Ciudad Guerrero, Mexico, 70 miles south of Laredo, Tex., is their first and the fourth in history between an American and a Mexican chief executive.

VATICAN CITY, Oct. 15 (AP)—Pope Pius XII issued a "most scorching and firm protest" today against actions taken by Poland's communist government against the Roman Catholic church.

In a message to the Catholic clergy, marking mission Sunday, Oct. 12, the Pope also especially deplored the persecution of Christians in the far east and most particularly in communist China.

He said these victims of communism had been "entered" in the golden book of the church's roll of honor.

**Britain Explodes Its Second A-Device in Australia Desert**

WOOMERA, Australia, Oct. 15 (AP)—Britain wrenched off today its second atomic explosion, sending a whirling brown cloud two to three miles above the Australian desert.

The atomic "utility" weapon, believed to be an atom bomb, exploded in the Woomera desert, a steel tower at the desolate Woomera rocket range.

It was the first British atomic explosion on a land site and was less powerful than the atomic blast in a British warship off the Monte Bello Islands last year which vaporized the vessel.

American observers were excluded from the test. It was witnessed only by British and Australian newsmen in addition to authorized scientific and military experts. However, two American B-29 flying laboratories were used as weather planes.

The successful atomic blast was expected to reinforce British demands for Anglo-American sharing of atomic knowledge. British and Australian officials were prepared to relate their feelings against the United States ban on sharing atomic knowledge to Vice-President Richard M. Nixon.

Nixon arrived at Sydney from New Zealand only six and one-half hours after today's explosion amid public excitement over the test. He will remain in Australia until Tuesday in the business world.

The "utility" label was applied to the atomic weapon exploded today because it is believed capable of being used in a torpedo, rocket or shell as well as a bomb.

Another atomic weapon "will be exploded nearby" soon, probably in a week or 10 days followed by several more, each designed to provide information on a different strategic problem.

### Export Emphasis Slated Under USDA Revision, Aide Declares

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP)—New emphasis on marketing problems under agriculture department reorganization plans will include efforts to expand export outlets for west coast specialty crops as well as for major crops like cotton and wheat, a spokesman said today.

Assistant Secretary J. Earl Coke said the department already is studying ways to regain net fruit crop foreign markets lost during World War II.

He added that the reorganization anticipates no change in relationships between the soil conservation service and the extension service. Some groups, chiefly the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts, have charged the reorganization will leave the door open for the extension service to take over conservation work.

Coke pointed out that the local county and state committees of the production and marketing administration—which will remain as is except for their names—will still determine practices and rates of agricultural conservation payments.

### Board Gives Nobel Honor To Churchill

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Oct. 13 (AP)—The coveted Nobel prize for literature was awarded today to British Prime Minister Winston Churchill who is credited with "mobilizing" the English language during World War II.

It was an open secret that Churchill, who has dedicated his remaining years to the cause of world peace, would have preferred the Nobel peace prize.

The designation was made a month earlier than usual to enable Churchill to come to Stockholm in person to receive the prize from King Gustav Adolf on Dec. 10.

Churchill, the first active statesman to be chosen for the award, received the prize for his war memoirs, "The Second World War" (volumes I, II, III, IV and V).

Churchill's fame in statescraft tended to obscure his remarkable writing talents but he was, ever since the turn of the century, the highest paid war correspondent of his time and author of several brilliant books on military campaigns.

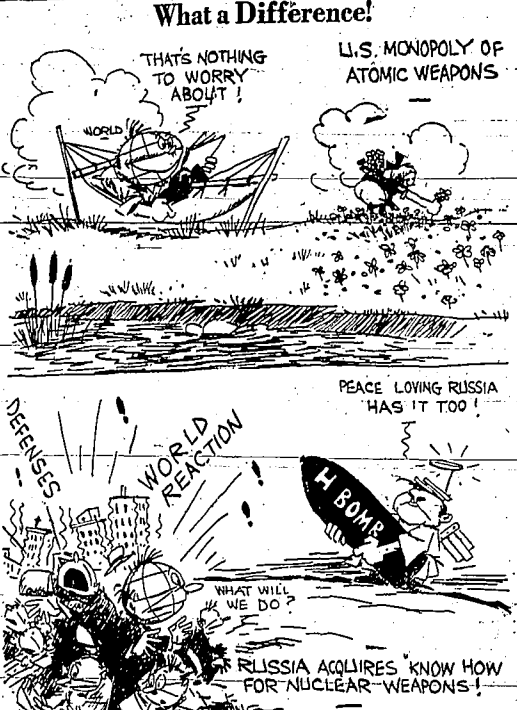

### Veterans Advised To Plan Carefully For GI Schooling

Veterans interested in applying for apprentice training under the Korean GI bill should carefully plan their program before applying for training, advised Arnold Helweg, Twin Falls veterans administrator.

The agreement should state that veterans should work out an agreement between themselves and the employer or a joint apprenticeship committee which sets forth the exact terms and conditions of the training to be received by the veteran.

Classroom instruction in subjects related to the work program should be included in the agreement along with the clause that a certificate of completion of apprenticeship will be awarded when the training is completed.

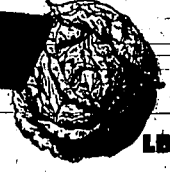

BERLIN, Oct. 15 (AP)—Nine leaders were fired from the central council of the East German metalworkers union today at the start of a purge of Soviet zone trade unions.

The official communist trade union newspaper Tribune said the nine leaders, including former union chairman Hans Schmidt, were dismissed for "opportunities following June 17."

The purge, scheduled to last one month, appeared designed to weed out workers who led the June 17 uprising, ringleaders of which have played in East Germany since then and workers who picked up "Bismarck flower parcels" in West Berlin.

Schmidt also was ousted from the union itself and was accused of "hostile activity to the workers and trade unions."

Altogether, five million members were being investigated in an attempt to cast any anti-communist rebels and leaders of the resistance movement.

### Refugee Scientist Is Credited With Ft. Monmouth Case Tip

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (AP)—The Chicago Tribune said in a copyrighted story today a scientist who escaped from the Russian zone of Germany has revealed United States radar secrets are being funneled to Russia, by an espionage pipeline.

The Tribune did not reveal the scientist's name, but said he slipped from behind the Iron Curtain in June, 1952, and revealed the spy network to an air force technical intelligence officer.

The Tribune story, signed by Willard Edwards, said the officer's secret report had been given to the senate subcommittee headed by Sen. Joseph McCarthy, R., Wis., by the Tribune for investigation.

The report is the basis of McCarthy's current investigation into security leaks at Ft. Monmouth, N. J., the Tribune said.

The scientist, who had been forced to work in an East German electronics laboratory, escaped by night, to the American zone.

While being interrogated, he remarked casually: "Of course, we had many micro-filmed copies of documents from the Evans Laboratory."

The interrogating officer was startled because the Evans laboratory is the top secret research center of the army signal corps at Ft. Monmouth.

The scientist went on to describe microfilmed copies of documents he said he saw in Russian hands. He gave identifying numbers and descriptions, containing officers that

American defense secrets were being funneled to the Russians.

The Tribune said the report on the scientist's revelations was labeled "secret" and sent to Washington in July, 1952.

However, the Tribune said, the vital information about the espionage leaks was buried in the report.

The Tribune said Maj.-Gen. Kirk E. Lawton, commander of Ft. Monmouth, did not hear of the report until McCarthy told him of it yesterday.

### U. S. Warned Over Hike of Duty on Wool

NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 15 (AP)—Dr. Jose A. Mora, ambassador of Uruguay, warned today that any hike in the U. S. wool tariff "may have serious consequences" in relations between his country and the United States.

Mora said very few nations depend upon the marketing of a single product as Uruguay does on wool. He pointed out that wool makes up about 45 per cent of the country's sales abroad and 82 per cent of its exports to the United States.

"These figures . . . clearly show that any measure restricting the entry of Uruguayan wool into the United States may have serious consequences . . . for trade relations," he said, "with the resulting grave repercussions."

In an address before the New Orleans Chamber of Commerce, Mora said restricted purchases of Uruguayan wool by the United States in 1952 reduced his country's sales to the United States 33 per cent.

The ambassador urged the United States to adopt a long-range policy "that will serve the interests of all the Americas."

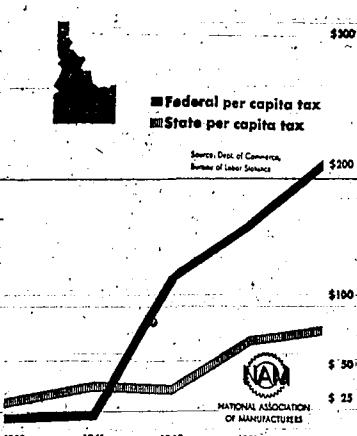

Study Shows 20-Fold Increase For Federal Levies Since 1939

While Idaho state taxes have increased about three times since 1939, national taxes have soared 20-fold, according to a tax study of the Northwest Research Council of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Today, Idahoans pay \$100.45 in federal taxes compared to \$8.58 in 1939. State tax for every man, woman and child in the state is \$72.96 today compared to \$23.70 in 1939.

What means that taxpayers in this state are paying about three times as much to support the national government as they are to support their own state government?

The NAM study shows that Idaho's share of the national tax burden was \$4,202,112 in 1939 and was \$117,671,165 last year. Thirteen years ago—this state paid 58 per cent of all direct federal taxes; today the figure is 18 per cent.

Greatest jump in the federal tax bill came from 1941 to 1945 when individual payments in this state rose from \$1261 to \$112,250. State

20-Month Victim of Amnesia Home After Partial Recovery

BREKELLEY, Calif., Oct. 15 (AP)—Banker Harry L. Morton, who left his job for home 20 months ago and arrived home partially recovered from an amnesia attack, is picking together his long period of darkness.

Morton, 54, paid his car and train fares from San Francisco out of a tiny allowance given indigent patients to reach his home Sunday after a "flash" restored his memory in a charity ward.

His wife, Josephine, broke into a sob when she entered from the garage and found Morton standing in the living room, leaning shakily on a cane.

Police records showed it was Feb. 27, 1952. He later was transferred to Laguna Honda home, back to San Francisco hospital and once again to Laguna Honda.

Meanwhile police checks failed to learn Morton's true identity. He took, or was assigned the name "James Potter."

### French Open Big Drive on Rebel Forces

**HANOI, Indo-China, Oct. 15 (AP).**—Vietnam forces have launched their biggest ground offensive against the communist-led Vietminh in the past two years of fighting in Indo-China, officials announced today.

The massive force was kicked off yesterday against rebel forces in the regions of Ninh-Binh, Phu Non Quan and along the Tonkin coast, French spokesmen revealed.

Ninh Binh and Phu Non Quan are about 50 miles south of Hanoi, 515 kilometers.

An undisclosed number of French and Vietnam troops hit the 320th Vietminh division entrenched in the coastal area.

A French commando unit landed on the coast just south of Phu Non Quan under cover of fighter planes from the aircraft carrier La Fayette. They pushed inland to prevent two nearby rebel divisions from joining the ranks of the embattled 320th division.

The battle area is a vital center for rebel operations and is defended by a network of fortresses.

Dozen Battles

A dozen minor pitched battles and ambushes also were reported from the mountain kingdom of Laos, where French and loyal troops took the initiative in harassing the communist foe.

Red guerrillas ambushed a 21-tank Franco-Cambodian convoy in thick forest on the road from Kampong to Phnom Penh, but withdrew after a 30-minute battle, they left 24 dead behind.

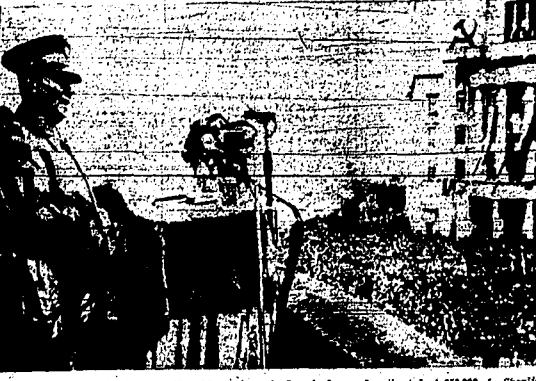

### True Picture of U. S. Indian Life Proves Shock to Scribe

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP).**—Well, sir, for a moment it looked as if the U. S. national museum had gone and done it. Given the country back to the Indians, that is.

For scattered over its walls is a new exhibit of pictures of Indians as they lived, played and hunted before the white man came.

Probably most of us got our ideas about Indians from the romantic stories of James Fenimore Cooper or from the redskin-bites-the-dust westerns.

A better way would be to do what the museum experts have tried to do: Turn to the man who lived to record them exactly as they were.

In 1899 an American artist, George Catlin, decided the Indian way of life was about done for. So he hurried west, and in the words of the museum people, "with great difficulty and some hazard to life," spent eight years among the alleged savages.

In all Catlin painted 607 pictures, with a descriptive text for each. In 1879 most of these were given to the museum, a branch of the Smithsonian Institution.

From this collection 27 paintings were chosen for the exhibit here. When it's over, on Oct. 29, the pictures will be sent abroad for display in the studios of the U. S. Information agency.

Possibly the main surprise in looking at Catlin's Indians is the realization that they had a lot of fun.

The female reekings, for example, had a game in which a couple of balls were attached to the ends of a string 18 inches long. The ladies had a stick in each hand and used the sticks to catch the string and throw the balls back.

Catlin's description: "Ball-play of the woman, Prairie du Chein-cois-cois and other presents are placed on a pole by the men—the women choose sides and play for them, to the great amusement of the men."

Some Indian braves had a game in which they tried to see who could keep the most arrows flying in the air. "I have seen some of them," Catlin said admiringly, "get eight arrows into the air at once."

Even some of the hunting had a gay air about it. One picture shows Indians wearing wolf masks and skins creeping up on unsuspecting buffalo.

One painting is a buffalo dance, performed when they are like to starve for want of food.

Another shows a Sioux, with splints run through his flesh, he hangs from a pole and he looks at

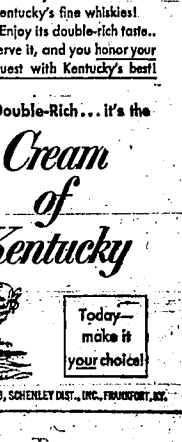

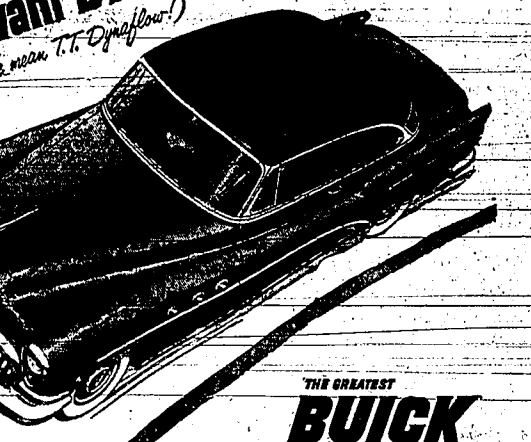

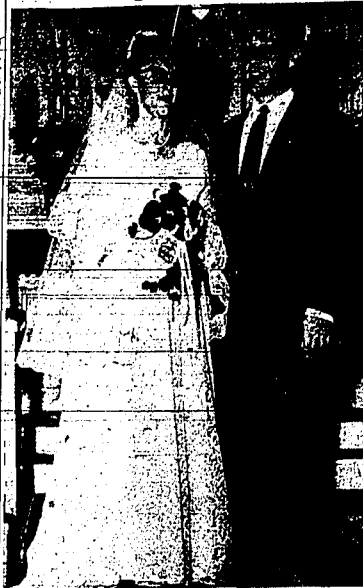

Walter O'Malley, president of the National League, told a press audience that Dressen was "free and independent."

"Independence Day" Set by Minors

**OCTOBER 15 (AP)—**Presidents and representatives of 27 minor leagues and representatives of the Chicago Sox, Milwaukee Braves, Cincinnati Reds, Brooklyn Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs will meet here Saturday and Sunday for a meeting in which "it is proposed that the minors declare themselves 'free and independent' of the majors."

Among the minors which will be represented is the Pioneer league, a class C circuit operating in Montana, Idaho and Utah. Its president, Charles Engerer, is expected to be on hand.

R. W. Burnett, owner of the Dallas club of the Texas league who has called the meeting at Dallas, expressed his opposition to the plan. He announced Wednesday the last of the minor leagues who will attend. He also distributed a booklet in which seven amendments to the major-league rules and the National Association (minor league) agreements are advocated.

These proposals would amend the national association "declaration of independence" from major league control adopted at Chicago in 1901, would subordinate the present major-league agreement and would make all minor leagues "open classification" so that players could be kept from the draft so long as they desired to play in the minors.

They also would call for a majority vote instead of three-fourths so that the major leagues could control all minor league affairs through their "farm clubs" and working agreements and would involve the existing major league clubs in minor league territory without the consent of the major leagues.

They also proposed an unrestricted draft instead of allowing only one player to be drafted from one league. The draft to be governed, however, by whether the players wanted to be drafted. They would raise the draft price so that the major leagues could get more for their players.

Burnett said he had uncovered a copy of the original agreement in 1901 although the national association does not have a copy. It is a document which he believes is in the files of his Sporting News.

This non-existent (so far as the national association is concerned) agreement has been entered into by the major league 10 years since the Chicago meeting. "But nobody understood it," he said.

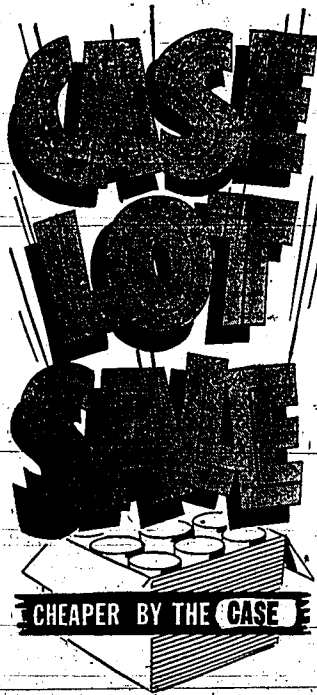

### GOP Leader Cites Party Fear After U. S. Pulse-Taking Trip

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—A high-ranking Republican strategist said today the GOP must push a "constructive legislative program" through congress next year if it hopes to win the 1954 congressional elections.

The GOP leader, who has just completed a cross-country "pulse-taking" tour that took him all the way to the west coast, discussed his findings with a reporter after stipulating that his name could not be used. He is now preparing a report to be submitted to President Eisenhower.

His recommendations will be weighed by GOP planners today at a meeting in Washington. A national election in Wisconsin. Democrat Lester Johnson defeated Republican Arthur Padgett in the race, it was disclosed in Wisconsin dispatches as a test of Eisenhower administration farm policies. It was the first time a Democrat ever was elected to congress from the district.

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### State Offices Of USDA See Small Effects

BOISE, Oct. 13 (AP)—Local offices of the agriculture department's production marketing administration and bureau of agricultural economics apparently feel that Secretary Benson's proposed reorganization will have little, if any, effect on them.

A PMA administrative officer, who asked that his name not be used, said his personal opinion was that Benson's plan to do away with the offices will have little effect because the job the office has been doing will have to be carried on.

"In general," he said, "we go right on like we have been, with only the name of the office changed."

Under Benson's plan, PMA duties would be placed in a new agency known as the commodity stabilization service, with such duties as market research and news going to a new marketing agency.

Refuse Comment

J. H. Teter, acting head of the state office of the bureau of agricultural economics, refused comment on the proposed changes for his office—because, he said, he "didn't know a thing about it."

He noted, however, that the bureau's name was changed once before but its duties went right on as before.

Benson proposes to abolish the economics bureau and distribute its duties among the new marketing service and a new agricultural research service.

### German "Guests" of U. S. Feel Happy Over Their Experience

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (AP)—A little girl just returned to Germany after spending a year as guest of America has written a letter to her sponsors.

"I think it is wonderful," said Editha Gregorius, "that in America, if you want to you can put your feet on the table if you feel like it. If your feet hurt you take your shoes off."

Editha was among the German teen-agers who spent the past year in the United States under a youth exchange program sponsored by the American Farm Bureau federation in cooperation with our government.

Glen Matz, assistant director of information for the federation, dropped each of the kids a line after they gathered here on their way home. He asked them for their reactions.

Editha's was among the 53 answers. She was amazed at what Americans can buy: like electric dryers, television sets and even parakeets.

Hans Grund of the United States occupied some in Germany didn't waste any time in putting his knowledge to work.

Right after he got back home from a year in the United States, he set up a souvenir table with all of the cute little things I brought back, including a model Herford cow.

Hans spent a year in the dairy-land country—Wisconsin. The young

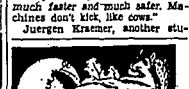
man learned how to milk a cow, by hand and machine.

"It was important to me," the young man wrote Glenn, "because now I can tell my people about the better methods they use in the United States."

Milking a cow in Germany, he said, is by hand.

"In America," he wrote, "you mostly do it by machine. And it is much faster and much safer. Machines don't kick like cows."

Jurgen Kramer, another student,



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dent from Westphalia, said he was having the sickness of a time getting used to German customs again.

The young man said he was happy to have learned how to type in America, "which is something I don't think I can learn here."

Also, he said, "I am using my American driver's license to try to get a German license, but there is some question about whether I will succeed—although in your country I learned how to drive."
