Retorting he now has heard everything but the truth, Benson was being attacked for advocating that everyone should do all they can to help themselves.

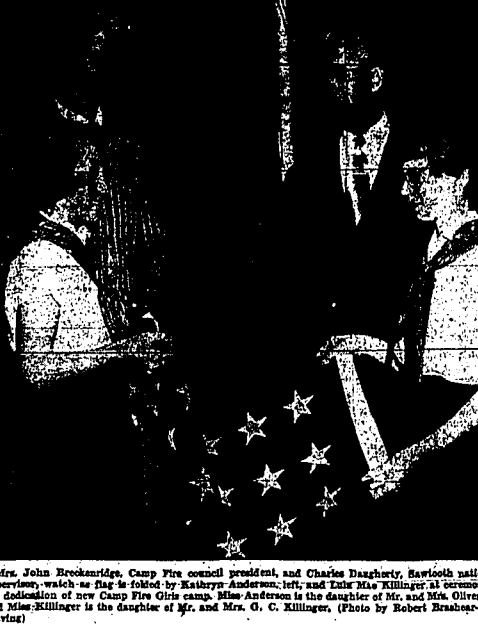
Miller countered that Benson has a long record of public service, a symbol of political integrity and of public confidence in connection with the administration's farm program.

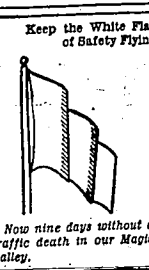

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

A deceptively familiar aspect of the democratic support that falls away from any political abstraction when it moves from the stage of abstract principle to that of concrete proposition. The support that comes back to you, in a general way. But when a particular application of them is proposed, opposition crops up on one quarter and another until presently the most hopeful cause is lost.

What we mean can be shown in the fact that theoretically just about everyone who is in favor of any management who is not But embody the city manager principle in a proposed charter, and clamor is straightway stirred up. From the favored contractor who wants the old name kept in power down to the little schoolmarm who has been told that something dire may happen to her pension rights, the resistance to change is typically infuriated or openly breached. And the crusade blows to smithereens.

LONG OVERDUE REVISION.—How obvious it is that constitutional revision is far overdue in most of the American States. Of course we would be better off with streamlined, possibly unbecomingly legislatures with belated reorganization and an end to rotten machinery and with actual and fewer legislators. Instead of a swarm of underpaid, low-caliber officeholders.

Who would withhold his signature from petitions to the U. N. of such a nature that may state government? But when the reform constitution is brought in, the affected officeholders aren't the only ones in opposition. Members of this or that class are also, and some minor revisions on the new dispensation, this or that classification of state employees and their uncles and their cousins and their aunts.

LEVEL OF NEWS SUPPRESSION.—Take the efforts by the newspapers of our country to establish, both in the United States and in other countries, a level of news suppression at all levels of government is revealed as a great and growing one. Editors are being sought to seek legislation where legislation is sought to suppress news, and free access to minutes.

Weekly newspapers have initiated on the right of access to minutes and on the right to inspect public records. At one session of the Connecticut general assembly the failure of the proposed bill to allow public records was so completely defeated that it was taken to be dead in committee. At the other session a concerted movement by all the newspapers in Connecticut ran straight into the succession of the legislature.

All those who rose at a committee hearing to oppose the bill were really in favor of the general aim. They were only opposed to the specific bill. The head of the state police wanted to be sure of the sanctity of statements by complaining witnesses. A spokesman for the juvenile and public correction departments was fearful of publicity being given to their files.

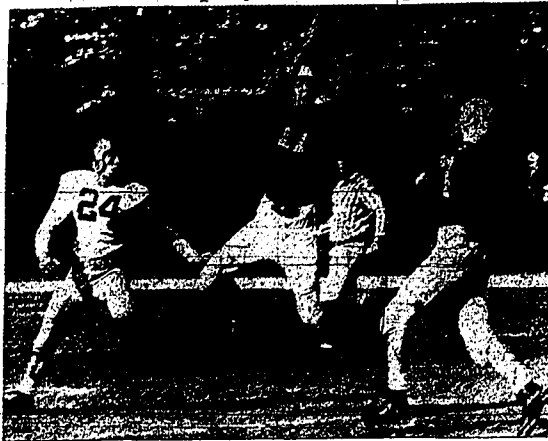

### Special Votes Can Cut GOP Control Thin

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 — Two special elections next month will give Democrats a chance to cut the republican control of the house down to a razor-thin margin of one vote.

The elections will be held Nov. 3 in New Jersey and Nov. 10 in California to replace Republican members who have resigned.

Present lineup in the house is 218 Republicans, 214 Democrats, one Independent and the two vacancies. The Democrats wouldn't win control even if they won both the New Jersey and California elections. But they could reduce the GOP margin to the lowest possible point.

GOP control of the senate already has been reduced to an absolute margin. In fact, there are more Democrats (48) in the senate than there are Republicans (47). The Republicans retain control of senate chairmanships and other organizational machinery only with the support of Wayne L. Morse, the independent, who is the potential tie-breaking vote of Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

The surprise Democratic victory in Wisconsin's ninth congressional district last week put new emphasis and importance on the New Jersey and California races.

PANMUNJON, Korea, Oct. 19 (AP) — Red correspondent Alan Wilmington returned today from a honeymoon in communist China and denied all knowledge of two imprisoned American aviators, Wilmington, who left this former truce village three months ago to marry a Chinese woman in Peking, spoke stoutly of "married bliss."

Allied newsmen thought he might sniff out the fate of Richard Applegate, who had lauded Wilmington during early stages of the truce talks.

### ROK Purge Hint Given by Confab

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 19 (AP) — Reports of a wide-scale political purge through government offices today as President Syngman Rhee met with 12 key South Korean political officers.

A South Korean source said the meeting was held at the presidential mansion to "establish firm and unqualified support of the government by President Rhee."

Observers believed the confidential meeting resulted from a political feud between Rhee and his longtime logical successor, former Premier Lee Bum Suk, who is scheduled to return soon from a trip abroad.

### Trouble Reported In Arabian Fields

BAHRAIN, Oct. 19 (AP) — Reports reaching the Persian Gulf island today said martial law has been declared in the rich American-controlled oil fields of Saudi Arabia following rioting by striking native workers.

The reports said workers demanded a 50 percent increase in pay from the Arabian American Oil company (Aramco).

According to the reports the strike originally was directed against the company but "turned" against the government of King Ibn Saud who has been reported seriously ill.
