High Expense Of Farm Fires Noted at Meet

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (U)—Fires on the nation's farms cause 3,000 deaths and 133 million dollars in property damage every year, an expert told the 41st national safety congress today.

Henry Giese, professor of agricultural engineering at Iowa State college, told of steps being taken by safety officials in his state to reduce the number of rural fires.

Records Kept
At one phase of the program, he said, the Iowa agricultural experiment station has kept records for 23 years on all country- and town fires. The project has been financed by farm insurance groups.

In that period, he said, 17,203 country fires have been tallied, with a financial loss of more than 41 million dollars.

However, the number of fires in the period 1930-34, he said, the number of fires in Iowa cities for the same periods dropped 30 per cent.

Nationally, the number of fires for the same periods doubled.

Giese said the reduction in Iowa apparently resulted from better fire-fighting methods, improved highways, and most important, a state inspection program under which buildings on 101,054 farms were examined for fire hazards from 1931 to 1932.

Idaho Power's Plan To Develop the Hells Canyon Stretch Of Snake River

In July the Idaho Power Company presented in formal hearings before the Federal Power Commission its plan for full development of the Hells Canyon area of the Snake River for electric power, flood control, navigation and recreation. The Federal Power Commission is required by law to determine the most comprehensive plan—the one

of greatest benefit to the people of the area and the nation. Because a good deal of misinformation has been circulated and confusion created about the Company's proposal, it is taking this means to inform the people of the area just how the Company will proceed, supported by the findings of its engineers and technicians in many fields.

WHAT?

3 Great Dams to Fully Develop the River

A series of three huge dams—Oxbow, Brownlee and Hells Canyon—will be built on the river at the locations described below. They will completely utilize the full head of water—602 feet—available at that 100-mile stretch of the river. Together they will constitute one of the largest of all western hydroelectric developments.

WHERE?

On Snake River Downstream From Weiser, Idaho

The three dams will be located in the river canyon north and west of Weiser, on the Idaho-Oregon boundary. The Hells Canyon site is 109 miles below Weiser, and its reservoir will be 22 miles in length, immediately below the Oxbow site. Even by Western standards, and compared to some of the world's largest river developments, the Idaho Power project is immense. Its dams will produce 900,800 kilowatts of power capacity—they will cost approximately \$133 million, and other facilities \$21 million more, a total investment of \$154 million.

WHY?

It Is the Most Comprehensive Plan and Will Quickly Meet the Needs of a Power-Hungry Region

Year after year the power needs of the Snake River Valley grow larger, as well as those of the entire Northwest. Nowhere in the Northwest is there a surplus, in many places shortages. Idaho Power's plan offers one of the quickest solutions of mounting needs for more power, with complete development of the resources assured. It would actually produce 40 billion kilowatt hours—the output of Bonneville for approximately ten years—before the federal dam could turn a wheel.

WHY?

Because It Also Provides Flood Control, Navigation and Recreation

It would control surplus waters of the upper Snake River against such floods as occurred in 1948 at Vanport. The minimum flow of 5,000 second feet designated by the Army Engineers for navigation needs would be met. It would make maximum use of recreation possibilities.

WHY?

Because It Is Carefully Integrated With Irrigation

It will fully protect the water rights of present irrigators—and it does not threaten the water needs for future irrigation development upstream, as the proposed federal project does.

WHY?

Because It Costs the Taxpayer Nothing—Creates \$10,000,000 Annually in New Tax Payments

The proposed federal dam at Hells Canyon is estimated to cost \$422 million—money to be asked of the taxpayers. Not only will the Company's project cost the taxpayers nothing—but it will pour approximately \$10 million per year into the treasuries of local, state and federal governments!

Conclusions of Three Expert Witnesses Before the Federal Power Commission:

MAJOR GENERAL THOMAS M. ROBINS, Retired, former Deputy Chief of Engineers and former Division Engineer at Portland, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, during the construction of Bonneville Dam—said, taking into account the various factors of navigation, flood control and power, the best plan for the development of this reach of the Snake River is the Idaho Power 3-dam plan rather than the proposed federal Hells Canyon Dam; that it would not prevent the federal government from building anything that should be built in the public interest, and that the 3-dam (Idaho Power) plan is the most economical.

Even if this section of the Snake River were to be developed by the Federal Government, the 3-dam plan would be by far the sounder choice.

ROBERT DE LUCCIA, former Chief of the Bureau of Power, Federal Power Commission, long experienced in both public and private developments of water and power projects, Vice President and Chief Engineer, Pacific Power & Light Co.—concluded his sworn testimony by saying: "As a result of my review and study in this matter, it is my carefully considered opinion that a three-dam scheme of development is much better adapted to a comprehensive development of the Hells Canyon section of the Snake River than would be a single high dam and should be adopted in preference thereto, irrespective of whether the works are constructed by the Federal Government or by non-Federal agencies, public or private."

Solon Reports Tax Dodge by U. S. Workers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Senator William R. Dill, said Monday an estimated 25,000 federal employees are evading payment of income taxes and the government is powerless to collect from them.

Some of the tax dodgers, Williams said, work in the treasury department itself.

"Turning it to a shocking and disgraceful situation," Williams said in a statement he will ask congress to enact corrective legislation when the lawmakers return in January.

Williams long has been conducting a one-man checkup of tax frauds. He said the 25,000 federal workers have found a "loophole" enabling them to comply with the law technically by filing false income tax returns, but then refusing to pay the taxes due.

Filing the returns makes them safe from prosecution, he said, and the government can't collect the tax because a federal law prohibits the salaries of government employees being attached.

Williams said the loss in taxes thus uncollected might run into millions of dollars.

Like other taxpayers, most federal employees are subject to the government withholding tax which keeps income taxes paid out of their monthly pay. But in some cases, Williams said, the withholding tax is not enough to cover all the tax due.

Board Finds No Sabotage In Ship Fire

BOSTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Sabotage was virtually ruled out today by a naval board of inquiry conducting hearings into the cause of an explosion and fire fatal for 28 persons aboard the aircraft carrier *Textan*.

The Atlantic fleet air commander described the tragedy as a "frank accident."

No Human Failure
"There was no human failure involved," Vice Adm. John J. Ballentine said yesterday. "I attribute this entirely to mechanical failure."

Asked if sabotage were possible, the admiral replied: "If it were sabotage—the saboteur—was killed last night."

Testimony Corroborated
Ballentine said inspection of the *Textan* corroborated the testimony by the skipper, Capt. Thomas A. Ahron, that fluid in the postado catapult mechanism leaked out and was ignited.

Still unknown, however, were the cause of the leak and the source of the spark setting off the explosion last Friday. Ahron said he knew of no flames or sparks in the area but added, "There are many sources of sparks on any ship."
