FARM SURPLUS PROBLEM

The long drop in American farm prices evidently assures that the "farm problem" will loom large in the political news between now and the elections of 1938.

That the Democrats are trying to blame the Republicans for this decline is as natural as spring following winter. But neither the farmers themselves nor U. S. citizens generally ought to be satisfied with this kind of opportunist interpretation of the farmers' situation.

To begin with, the drop in agricultural prices went on for 18 months under the Truman administration. The Democrats did not arrest this down-slope any more than President Eisenhower has done since. They manage to neglect this background when pointing with alarm to recent price trends.

The fact is, neither party is really responsible for the market level of farm prices. That level is governed by economic factors largely outside the sphere of government control. You might as well say that the Democrats or the Republicans were responsible for the heavy spring rain.

The basic farm dilemma is that production and consumption are out of the wane. That the way it was going, the "cure" then was to create surplus and restrict future output.

Farmers still wanted safeguards, however, against unexpected shifts in demand and unpredictably large crops that could flood the market. This was born the system of farm price supports, to assure farmers a steady balance of income no matter what the day-to-day market conditions.

After the war, a devastated western Europe still called heavily upon America to help meet its food needs. There was a ready market for our greatly increased production. The government did not have to lay out vast sums to support farm incomes.

But gradually the picture changed. Europe recovered, and its buying of U. S. farm output fell off. Once more, giant surpluses began to pile up.

So now we seem to be back where we were 30 years ago, producing more farm products than we can use, except in times of extreme demand like war and its aftermath. The Democrats did not solve this problem. They merely encountered a world situation which sidetracked it for several years. The Republicans have not solved it, either. But it is they who have the current opportunity to try.

They should not be blamed for falling prices, but judged by what they do to deal with this basic, and now, chronic problem.

THE WISCONSIN ELECTION

Special congressional elections in Wisconsin create a lot of commotion. Inevitably they are looked to by politicians and public alike for indications of a trend that might carry into the next general election.

We have just had the first such test of real consequence. In Wisconsin's ninth congressional district, a farming area in the northwest portion of the state, the voters elected a Democrat for the first time in history. The race was to fill a vacancy caused by the death of a Republican representative.

Democrats naturally are hailing the result as a sign of things to come, and as proof the farmers are displeased with administration agricultural policies. Even the losing GOP candidate viewed the outcome as a slap at the present government.

It might be true. But one swallow does not make a summer. It would be foolish either for administration politicians to exhibit panic or for Democrats to count the 1934 race won as result of this decision.

Some observers point out that the winning Democrat pledged during his campaign to follow the voting pattern of the previous Republican incumbent, who was a maverick opposed to all of the policies dear to the Adlai Stevenson Democrats.

It could be that the election of a maverick Democrat to replace a maverick Republican is a meaningful shift of levels—or in any event hardly more than the farmers at administration farm policies.

Because of the storm, the Tri-Cities of Washington—Pasco, Kennewick and Richland—have had a growth of better than 1,000 per cent since 1900.

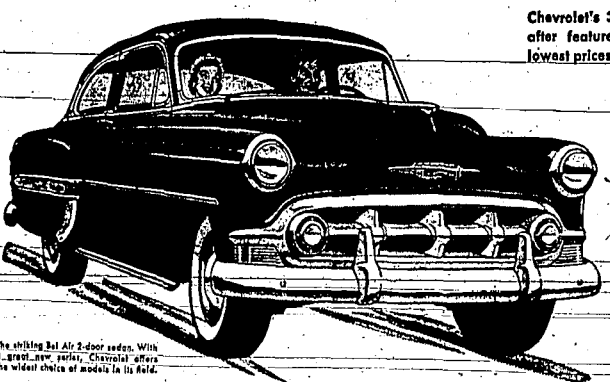

Flying Club, 12 Years Old This Month, Buys New Airplane; Group Owns Three

Observing its 12th anniversary this month is the Twin Falls Flyers, Inc., believed to be the oldest flying club in the state. An impromptu "press" in the form of a new four-passenger Piper Tri Pacer '135' was purchased by the club.

Richard Howard, club president, says club members get nearly as much fun out of tinkering and repairing the club's aircraft as they do out of flying. However, the planes are maintained by a civil aeronautics administration certified mechanic.

Club members have logged an estimated 2,000 hours flying time on club aircraft since the club was founded. There have been several minor crashes, none serious. No one has ever been injured.

Members may use the club's planes any time they wish. No questions are asked. However, the planes may not be used for commercial purposes.

Members abide by CAA rules and regulations. The three planes are registered with the civil air patrol and are available for air search and rescue work.

Members of the organization's board of directors include G. E. McCarty, Kimberley; Lionel Hale, Harold Pilsner, Merrill Showell and Howard, all Twin Falls pilots.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Egg prices may set a record this year but should dip slightly in the agriculture department reports.

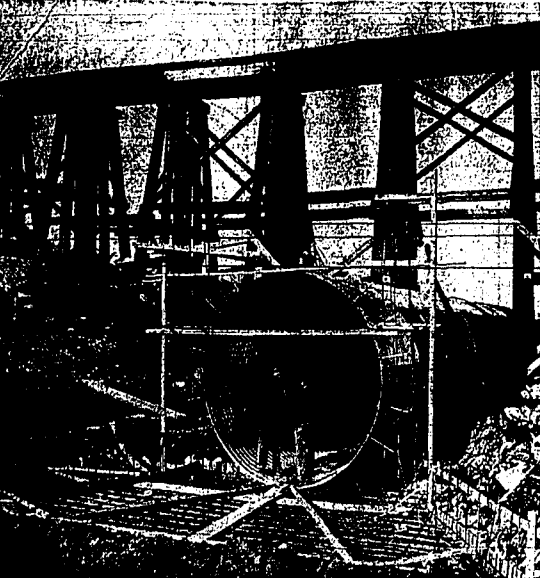

A Truly Multi-Purpose Project We too believe the Hells Canyon area of the Snake River should serve other public purposes than hydroelectric power. Our plans make use of its potentialities for other important uses:

FLOOD CONTROL: The 1,000,000 acre feet of storage planned would control the surplus waters of the upper Snake against such floods as occurred in 1948 at Yampout. In the opinion of Major General Robins, Retired, of the U. S. Any small difference in output which might for a relatively short period, and under certain temporary conditions, favor the single dam would be prohibitively expensive. 3 Make possible the production of over 40 billion kilowatt hours—the output of Bonnerilla Dam (of approximately 19 years—prior to the time a single high dam could be completed. 4 Provide 1,000,000 acre feet of storage, the maximum dependable amount afforded at the site after taking into account the future upstream irrigation development and resulting depletion of water available for power storage purposes. 5 Fully provide the release of water required by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers for navigation purposes. 6 Adequately meet the test of flood control needs. 7 Create a superior recreational area. 8 Fully protect irrigation water rights of present and future agricultural development upstream. (There is no irrigation to be served from a reservoir at this site under any plan.) 9 Provide large blocks of low-cost power rapidly, to serve the needs of Snake River Valley and of the Pacific Northwest through inter-connection with the Northwest Power Pool. 10 Be productive of \$10,000,000 annually in tax revenues for federal, state and local taxing units in addition to the tax revenues created by users of the power—all without cost to taxpayers.

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Life in MAGIC VALLEY

High in the mountains north and west of KETCHUM, well off the beaten path, there is a scene of wanton destruction—a place where nature turned upon herself and stripped the earth bare. Then, as its custom, she set about to heal the wounds.

Dollarside on Warm Springs creek is not unusual for the area. Glen Bradu, forest service official at Ketchum, said the destruction was caused by a avalanche of snow and ice. But to emerge suddenly from a forest into a bleak area blanketed by dead and dying trees, many of them giants, gives the impression of a supernatural force at work.

Avalanche—composed of dry, powdered snow do little damage, Bradu said. They swirl downhill and are gone in a cloud of white "snow dust" those in the spring when the snow is wet and heavy are a different matter. They seem to move more slowly but with more determination, grinding, smashing, splintering everything in their path.

The destruction that ripped through the canyon near Dollarside summit apparently started in two sections on the west side of the canyon. One tree, nearly a foot in diameter, was broken off and the splintered end jammed into the trunk of another tree.

The avalanche on the opposite side of the canyon, where two avalanches eventually came to rest, is littered with a tangled mass of tree branches and boulders. Few young and more supple trees bent before the onslaught and then grew upward again after the snow had melted. But they are maimed and distorted trees with branches only on one side. Half naked, they stand alone in the scene of desolation and seem to tremble before even the lightest breeze.
