Seventh Straight Month for Living Cost Gains Noted

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—The cost of living, pushed mainly by higher rents, clothing costs and medical expenses, set another new record last month, the government said today.

The labor department's bureau of labor statistics announced its consumer price index reached 115.2 in mid-October, a rise of two-tenths of one percent over the record August level.

The index is a composite average of retail prices paid for American households for basic goods and services as compared with 1947-1949. The bureau said a decline in retail food prices between August and September was not enough to offset higher prices for all other types of consumer goods.

A month ago, the BLS index for mid-August was reported at 115.1, the lowest since the index was first published in 1947-48. Federal rent controls died at the end of July in some 1,400 communities throughout the nation.

The BLS index through the period from mid-July to mid-October did not reflect the full impact of rent increases which followed. There have also been new rises in gasoline and the cost of public transportation.

FOODS DECLINE
NEW YORK (AP)—Wholesale food prices continued their downward trend, dropping five cents on Oct. 27 to the lowest level in six months, Dun and Bradstreet, Inc. reported today.

The Dun and Bradstreet wholesale food price index fell to 65.6, the lowest since \$6.47 was recorded on May 26.

The index compared with 85.4 in the previous week, and 85.3 a year ago, and was 8.9 percent over the pre-Korea figure of 65.6.

Burglary Try Made On Shoshone Bank

SHOSHONE, Oct. 28 (AP)—An attempt to burglarize the First Security Bank at Shoshone today morning. Although entrance to the bank was made and a partial hole drilled in the side of the money vault, nothing was taken from the building, Sheriff Thomas said today.

W. Hanson, president of the bank, discovered the attempted burglary when he opened the bank Wednesday morning. He notified Sheriff Conner who investigated and then asked Twin Falls to send detectives to Shoshone to aid him. Chief Detective R. A. Frazier and Detective Lee Talkington are assisting him.

Entrance to the bank was gained through the cement market in the same building. The person or persons who attempted to "crack" the money vault had been digging for him to take part in a meeting with Soviet Premier Malenkov unless he agreed to some individual arrangement with a key or picked the lock to open the door, he added.

The money vault is 12 by 14 feet with walls 19 inches thick. A hole 10 inches deep had been dug in the brick and concrete wall. The sheriff explained. The building is built of brick and lava rock.

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Denver to Be Main Office In Reclamation Revisions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—The interior department announced today a reorganization of the reclamation program designed to shift responsibility for basic field work to Denver and make it the bureau's main working center.

Revising district officers will be abolished, each by Assistant Secretary Fred G. Aandahl and Reclamation Commissioner W. A. Doolittle, in a major reorganization to handle policy, administration and contact with congress.

About 60 employees will be transferred to Denver, Doolittle said. Doolittle named Harvey McPhail as assistant commissioner for operations here. The assistant commissioner will remain in Washington to handle policy, administration and contact with congress.

Aandahl also reported the bureau has cut its staff by 2,175 persons in the last six months, to a level of 10,097 employees. He said no further drastic reductions are anticipated.

Aandahl said the sprawling bureau was set up on its present lines under Democratic administrations with the idea it would handle a 600 to 750 million dollar annual construction program. But it never handled more than 200 million dollars a year, and its work is now about half that high mark, he said.

L. M. McClellan, assistant commissioner and chief engineer, will be in charge of the Denver office. Doolittle and two assistant commissioners will remain in Washington to handle policy, administration and contact with congress.

The reorganization is based on studies by a survey team named by Interior Secretary McKay to recommend the best possible streamlining, coordination and efficiency of the bureau.

The bureau is responsible for the 17 western states. It also is now engaged in construction of a hydroelectric plant in Alaska.

U.S. Faces Choice of Freedom Or Controls, Dworshak Asserts

JEROME, Oct. 28—The big decision facing this nation is whether it will develop a fully-managed economy—one in which business and industry as well as agriculture are controlled by a grant bureaucracy with headquarters in Washington—or will return to a basic system of free enterprise. This was Sen. Henry C. Dworshak's reply here Tuesday night to the question of whether he thought the program of price supports was working.

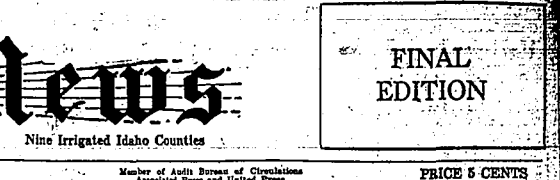
Dworshak was the featured speaker at a conference of representatives of national affairs committees of chambers of commerce about the valley, held here today.

Government economic management Monday night was a hot issue, either all the price supports must be kept, or they must all get out from under it, the senator declared. He said the government has no guarantee that it can phase out the economy can only prove detrimental to the whole economy, he indicated.

Dworshak's answers to questions from his audience were the highlight of the evening session, moderated by H. J. Dollinger, district manager of the Denver division of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

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Extra Session Call On Farm Declines Is Rejected by Ike

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28—President Eisenhower said today he will not call a special session of congress to consider the general farm situation. He said the only possibility of such a session would result to drought and disaster.

In ruling out a special congressional meeting on general farm problems, Mr. Eisenhower told his news conference the administration's farm program will be ready for the lawmakers when they reconvene in January.

Mr. Eisenhower said he wants the administration's farm program to meet the needs of all areas and of all various commodity groups. And that, he said, is difficult. He called it a tough problem to balance needs against grain and still look after the consumer's interest.

Asked to comment on the economic outlook for the next six months in view of lower farm and cattle prices, he said he wouldn't care to make any forecast. He said he would get from official advisers. But he did say a decline in farm and cattle prices has been going on for a long time and has engaged the attention of a great many persons for many months.

Experts said he believes cattle prices have reached bottom and now will rise for the time being. The president also said beef consumption is up and the number of the nation's cattle will be smaller next year.

In support of his belief that beef prices are on the upswing, Mr. Eisenhower said the federal beef purchase program is now about 20 million pounds a week. This compares with 15 million a week before the war. Agriculture Secretary Benson has said limiting heavy marketing will bolster cattle prices.

He denied he had refused to sign a bill to limit the number of cattle on the range. He said he had signed the bill to support live cattle at 90 percent of the market price.

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Crash Victim Kulp Reports Power Firm's Help on Plans

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—Mark Kulp, state reclamation engineer, said today he worked out with the president of the Idaho Power Co. to limit the company's water rights in the Snake river valley.

Kulp was questioned about the clause at a federal power commission hearing on the company's application for a license for three dams on the Snake river.

Used in Snake Permits. The clause was inserted in state reclamation laws to give priority in water use to upstream irrigation development.

L. A. Nikolnik, attorney for public power groups opposing the company's application, said the Kulp on studies he made of future upstream use of water in the river valley.

Kulp said the clause would limit the company's water rights in the Snake river valley.

At their windy session Tuesday, they greeted enthusiastically a suggestion that each man carry the campaign for a government floor under livestock prices to his own congressman and senators. The cattlemen appeared to have written off completely any idea of getting direct price supports from Agriculture Secretary Benson.

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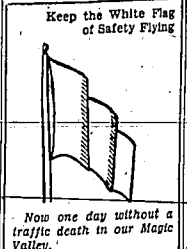

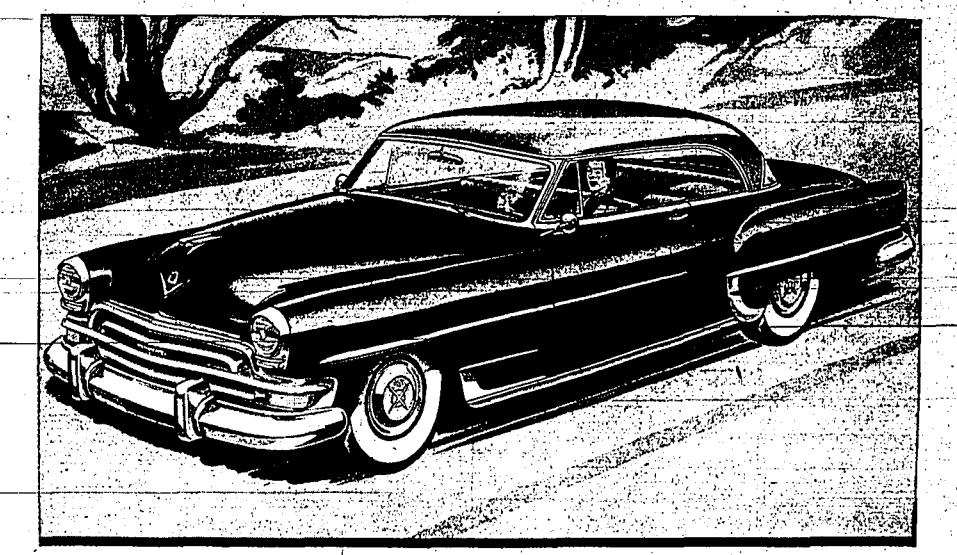

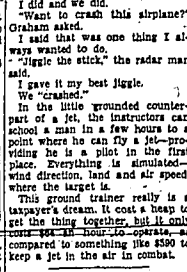

Banker Task Shows Change, Boyle Discovers in Interview

By JAL BOYLE
NEW YORK, Oct. 22 (AP)—Some years ago a mild, professor-looking man came into banker Gary Stolberg's office and said he wanted to borrow \$5,000.

Asked the purpose of the loan, the visitor leaned forward and said with candid modesty:

"I want to start a revolution and I need 40-10 for a penny less than \$5,000."

Although the banker's mind was turned to some where in middle Europe, he had to leave without getting the money. But he appeared completely satisfied with Stolberg's answer that a bank can't legally lend money even to start a revolution in this country, let alone one where, of course, it would be harder to check up on the loan.

"That's the oddest request I've had in 33 years of banking," Stolberg recalled. In that time Stolberg has checked on 300,000 loan applications involving 400 million dollars.

Personal loans to the working man and the small businessman have become high finance in the last quarter century. American banks in 1922 made 100 million such loans totaling 1.9 billion dollars. And this doesn't include the people still loyal to the pawn shop.

The mushrooming of the personal loan field has made the banker a student of human nature. Stolberg puts it, "Bankers no longer bleed when they have to smile. In fact, we don't smile even days now until after the doors close."

"Sometimes I don't know whether I'm a banker or a football referee. Many customers come to me with financial arguments and want me to settle them on the spot."

One such customer insisted that Stolberg have a loan chat alone with his fiancée in the bank office. Later the man anxiously inquired what he thought of her. Stolberg said he thought she was very nice, and the fellow replied:

"We've made arrangements to be married tomorrow. I just wanted to be sure you thought she was a good risk."

What factors influence a banker in considering personal loans?

"Character comes first," said Stolberg. "When a man doesn't know exactly how much he needs, what he wants it for, now he can pay it back—well, you have to be dubious."
