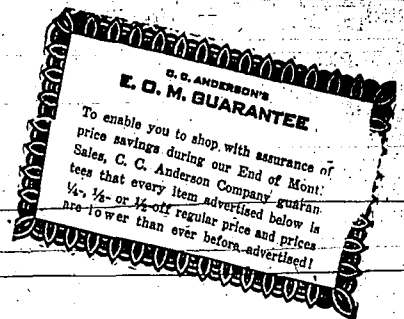

HAVANA—An unbelievably brutal suppression of the most elementary liberties, including the right to a secret vote, a free press and political opposition and the most fundamental safety, exists throughout Central and South America under totalitarian and military government which enjoy the approval of the United States.

Only a Moscow-like censorship of the press prevents the American people from learning of this iron curtain across the sub-continent from the Texas border to Patagonia. The United States has stationed its foreign correspondents in these countries here to write or publish the facts about these ruthless and undemocratic regimes.

Where bold and critical newspapers are not closed outright, as Dictator Juan Peron of Argentina shut down La Prensa in Buenos Aires, the editors and reporters are terrorized, exiled or imprisoned. The governments rail against criticism or exposure by withholding passport, denying visas or even forcing editors and operating expenses. Journalists offenders are beaten up by official gangsters. As a result, most newspapers become organs of public crosses, printing only what the current dictator says.

PROTESTERS OF NO AVAIL—Periodical protests against these dictators are organized by the conventions of the Inter-American Press Association, which was held in Mexico City two weeks ago, with John Knight, Detroit-Columbian publisher, as the main attraction. These protests have produced no change or improvement. Political freedom also has been crushed. Although the countries are nominally democratic and supposed to be western allies in the conflict with Russia, all democratic processes of government have vanished. Mexico City has become the haven of prominent political exiles. The United States has refused to accept immigrants or to grant visas to escape imprisonment or execution. Their number is reliably estimated at 100,000. Others hide out in Washington, New York and other cities.

KEEP AREA IN TURMOIL—Their incessant plotting and abortive uprisings keep Central America, as well as the Caribbean islands, in a constant turmoil. All anti-American interests, including red business and political agents, are not neglecting this opportunity to ferment continental unrest. In their range objectives is sabotage or destruction of the Panama canal, as the Suez canal is their target in the middle east. Without our aid of these areas would be a major advantage over a hostile coalition. Barring this region's mineral and food resources from it is another Soviet aim.

WORSE THAN PERON—Although Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower spokesmen frequently have denounced Peron's tactics, they have neglected the present situation in the Caribbean. Dictator Batista of Cuba. This key island, whose people were freed from Spanish subjugation with American blood and treasure in 1898, has been ruled by a despotic regime. There are no free elections, free press, free conversation, free unions or free enterprise. Batista remains in power only through military and police force.

Judge Proves Point in Denver Testing of Potency of 3.2 Beer

DENVER, Oct. 29 (AP)—After imbibing six bottles of 3.2 beer, Municipal Judge Duncan Cameron of the Denver traffic court declared: "If I'm not drunk, I'd like to know what you call it."

The judge's activities were part of a carefully controlled experiment, during which he had his blood-alcohol content checked at Denver general hospital.

The personal experiment was the latest incident in a controversy which has raged since August, when the state supreme court ruled 3.2 beer is not intoxicating in upholding the action of Judge Harold H. Davis of the Weld county district court. Colorado law permits the sale of 3.2 beer to persons 18 to 21 years of age.

Brownell Asks Expert Aid on Secrecy Fight

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—Attorney-General Brownell urged all groups concerned with freedom of information "to seek out and obtain any information to all which causes information to be withheld unnecessarily."

"By this kind of cooperative effort we can demonstrate to all the world the contrast between our system of government, which believes in and encourages freedom of the press and all media of information, and the communist system of tyrannical government to which the concept of freedom of information is anathema," Brownell said.

The attorney-general's prepared speech was part of a freedom of information program at the eighth annual convention of the Radio-Television News Directors association.

Brownell detailed the background of the forthcoming presidential executive order narrowing the authority of government agencies to withhold information on grounds of security.

He said that when the order is issued, "it will be recognized as having attained the required delicate balance between the need to protect certain kinds of information and the need for keeping the citizens of democracy as fully informed as possible concerning what their government is doing."

Planning Group Sees Sound Dollar Despite Defense Cost

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—The administration can keep defense spending at the current peak level through 1956, reduce taxes and still maintain a "sound dollar," according to a group of business, labor, financial and economic officials.

In fact, the group said, the economy can stand far more "substantial" boosts in spending for defense programs over the next few years without getting hurt.

The group, headed by Ralph J. Watkins, research director of Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., is a special committee of the National Planning association, a non-profit organization devoted to economic studies.

The committee said it was concerned with taxes only as a means of preventing inflation and maintaining economic "health" and not to balance the budget.

Present spending on all types of defense programs is about \$3 billion dollars a year, the committee estimated, and under present programs probably will go down to \$2 billion dollars by 1956.
