Idaho Producing Enough Meat to Fill State Needs

NAMPA, Oct. 31 (AP)—Idaho packing plants are turning out enough steaks, roasts and hamburger that there need be nothing but Gem state cattle served in the state.

Figures of the American Meat Institute show there's enough left over to feed half the residents of Wyoming, too, Richard V. Keim, president of H. H. Keim company, Ltd., said today.

"With slightly more than 620,000 Idahoans to feed, this contribution toward state self-sufficiency is no small feat," Keim said.

Packing plants increased their beef production 50 per cent over the 1952 period, to 30,100,000 pounds in the first eight months of the year. Veal processing also was up, while pork processing declined.

Idaho now ranks 32nd in meat processing, slightly behind Virginia and North Dakota.

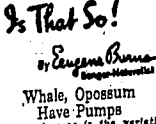

South's Hopes for Favorable Ruling on Segregation Fade

ATLANTA, Oct. 31 (AP)—Some southern leaders who once thought there was a good chance the supreme court would uphold segregation are changing their minds.

The court, after several postponements of a decision, has ordered further arguments in five cases involving segregation in schools. They are scheduled in December.

The change toward a more pessimistic attitude about the outcome began to show up in the deep south following the death of Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson and the choice of California Gov. Earl Warren to succeed him.

Top state officials privately acknowledge the south's hopes for a separate-but-equal school facilities ruling by the court's new chief justice Warren's appointment. This feeling was most noticeable in Georgia and Mississippi.

The Californian is known for his liberal views and he sponsored FEPC legislation in his state.

Mississippi Gov. Hugh White said Warren's appointment will "lessen the chance of a ruling in our favor."

A high official in that state who asked not to be identified said Warren's election to the court "gives us no comfort because he is an arch foe of segregation."

In Georgia, State Rep. Mugsy Smith said that in anticipation of a ruling against segregation, the November legislature likely will consider plans to convert Georgia schools from public to private operation.

One effect of the changing attitude in the south probably will be more intensified efforts on further improvement of school facilities for Negroes before the momentous decision is handed down.

The south is willing to pay dearly for the privilege of clinging to a custom that has been cherished and fought over—since 1819 when

Report Shows Hike in Idaho Payroll Share

Recent government figures indicate that Idaho's share in the cost of maintaining the federal payroll has increased from \$18,040 a month to \$40,000 of some \$47,000 in July, 1936.

"These figures were released Saturday as the result of a comparison of population and government costs made by the Northwest office of the National Association of Manufacturers."

"Purpose of the study," the N.A.M. stated, "was to show exactly how much it is costing the people of the Northwest to support the national government."

The government payroll of 2 1/2 million persons is being cut constantly, the N.A.M. added, "but more cutting is needed to eliminate surpluses who are not performing a useful job for their country."

Monthly cost for national government civilian workers was \$39,482,000 in July, the N.A.M. said.

Following are each of the four states which share in the monthly cost of the federal payroll: Idaho, \$18,040; Washington, \$18,560; Oregon, \$17,623, and Montana, \$2,872,221.

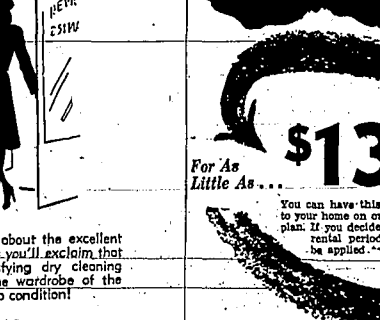

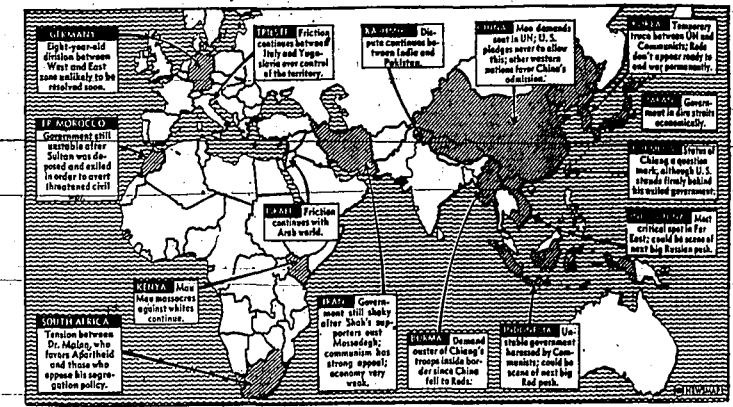

Japanese OK U.S. Plan for Defense Help

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—The United States and Japan have agreed on a new expansion of Japanese defense cooperation with American weapons and equipment. But there were signs of some dissatisfaction on both sides.

Japanese officials contend the building can only take place too slowly to please American officials. Apparently, the Japanese would have been willing to go for a larger loan. But the United States has promised substantial economic assistance. But the United States was unwilling to do this.

Under an official statement jointly issued late Friday said the United States would sell Japan 50 million dollars worth of surplus food—probably rice and wheat—for Japanese yen. The United States will use two yen to promote a defense industry in Japan by buying arms and military equipment there and by direct investment.

There was no indication the United States intended to yield its insistence on a maximum selling price within the limits of Japan's economic potential—or that the Japanese would develop a defense industry in Japan by buying arms and military equipment there and by direct investment.

The federal reserve board reports U. S. industrial production has not shown its normal September and October increases.

The commerce department says, however, that unemployment hit a post-war low this month and employment was as high as in 1937. It has ever been. Significant in the employment report is the fact that October was the first month in this year in which overtime work was lower than in the corresponding month last year.

Iran Hints Talks To End Oil Fight

TEHRAN, Iran, Oct. 31 (AP)—Iran extended the olive branch to Great Britain today in its 4-year-old quarrel following Iranian nationalization of Anglo-Iranian oil company holdings here.

An official government statement read by Foreign Minister Abdolbaki Entezam expressed "a sincere desire to resume diplomatic relations." The statement ended at the possibility of a settlement to settle the dispute over compensation for the British property and get oil flowing again.

Trucking Confab Urges Road Cash

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 31 (AP)—An additional federal appropriation of 40 million dollars for highway improvements is urged by directors of the American Trucking Association here.

A resolution adopted at the close of the group's 20th annual convention today calls for increased federal allocations for this purpose are about 500 million dollars.

The resolution says that Congress increase federal aid "at least to the level of federal revenue from tax on motor fuel and oil."

U. S. General Given Nobel Peace Award

OSLO, Oct. 31 (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall, symbol of American generosity to a war-torn world, has been awarded the 1953 Nobel peace prize. The 1952 prize—first given out last year—went at the same time to Albert Schweitzer, world-famous philosopher, musician and statesman.

The awards were announced Friday night by the Nobel Foundation institute. The five-member selection board, following tradition, assigned no reason for his choice.

Awards set up
The prizes were set up under the will of Alfred Nobel, Swedish inventor of dynamite. His specified that the peace award should go to the candidate "who has worked the best on the peace." Promoting brotherhood among people, and for the abolition or reduction of the standing armies, and for the establishment and spread of peace congresses.

Marshall, now 71, sprang into world fame as army chief of staff during World War II. As secretary of state he later was instrumental in the \$1 billion dollar aid campaign to restore the economies of Europe.

In a statement issued at his winter home in Pinehurst, N. C., where he is convalescing from a leg ailment, Marshall said, "This award is a great distinction and honor for which I am deeply grateful."

Marshall was described as delighted over the honor to Marshall, his war-time boss.

Dr. Ralph Bunche, who won the 1950 peace prize for his work as a United Nations mediator in the Palestine war, declared both Marshall and Schweitzer were "excellent choices" and a high merit award.

Bunche was the fifth and last previous American to win the prize.

Called in Crisis
General Marshall went into retirement after the war, but President Truman later called him to consider Marshall the greatest living American—called on him to try mediating the Chinese civil war. His year-long attempt to work out a peace failed, and the Chinese communists won.

During the two year period when Marshall directed U. S. foreign policy, the gigantic American aid program, the Marshall plan, was launched.

Los Angeles Bids For New Ranking

Sales Division Main Topic in Auto Industry

DETROIT, Oct. 31—Percentage of the market has become a consideration of top importance to all auto-makers.

Last year, governmental controls limited production achievements. Under these restrictions, the auto makers divided the market like this: General Motors 41 per cent; Chrysler 22 per cent; Ford 23 per cent; independent (includes Buick and Oldsmobile) 14 per cent.

GM gains

It is being widely predicted in automotive circles that GM will wind up this year with close to 48 per cent of the car market. These three sources forecast will be reflected in an almost five per cent gain by the independents and a slight drop in Chrysler's share.

Harlow H. Curtice, GM president, announced early this year after the lifting of governmental controls that the corporation was going after a substantially larger share of the car market. This already has been achieved.

Speculation Subject

How much farther GM might push its bid for a larger share of the car market is one of the subjects of speculation in trade quarters. Speculation also is high on which company or companies will lose volume in next year's intensely competitive market.

One point of almost general agreement in industry circles is that the smaller companies face the toughest battle of the 1953 season. Industry analysts go even further and say that unless some of the independents join forces they may fall by the wayside.

Snow May Be Bane to Householder, but It's Money in Bank for Famous Resort

SUN VALLEY, Oct. 31—Snow in the city may make the householder complain. But snow on the slopes of Idaho's mountainous west, particularly in the Sawtooth range, is a different reaction.

To the businessman in his sweltering summer office, discussion of the weather may bring only an unprintable reply.

Put that businessman, with a conquered trout in hand, in one of the many mountain streams near Sun Valley and he'll discourse at length on the perfection of the climate.

That contrast in human reactions, given different situations, has made this Alpine-styled village famed for vacation and sport.

Sun Valley has not only furnished vacationers and sportsmen with a scenic and luxurious winter and summer play place, it has brought prosperity to Ketchum, a community that was withering on the vine. Canyonized in the Wood river valley of the Sawtooth mountains, Ketchum has been at one time a mining center, later a sheep shipping point. Scenery and hot springs brought it back to life when the count had business, but it was no busy hive—18 years ago some dozen or so families—the town's winter population—were amazed to see an Australian count, sitting in a deck chair in the sunny, snow-covered meadowland a mile north of the village.

The count was a skiing authority sent by Averil Harriman to find a suitable location for a ski resort. Harriman, avid skier and chairman of the board of the Union Pacific railroad, had long believed that somewhere in the mountainous west, particularly in the railroad's territory, was an ideal spot for a ski resort equalling or bettering anything in Europe.

At Ketchum, end of the Union Pacific's branch line from Shoshone, the count saw the sun-drenched slopes of the timber-free foothills that rolled up into the valley floor and wooded 9,250-foot Baldy mountain towering above them. He put his unqualified approval on the site. A year later, in Christmas week of 1938, a trainload of movie stars and ski fans arrived to open Sun Valley lodge.

The massive structure of concrete simulated to look like heavy timbers had been built where the count had pointed. It was on the exact spot in the valley where its windows and sun decks get the maximum amount of winter sunshine.

Also built were chairlifts to carry skiers easily and swiftly to the mountain top. They were the first of their kind, first ascending was the glass-enclosed swimming pool with water warmed to exactly the right temperature for winter-time plunges.

Two such pools are now in use and eight electrically driven chairlifts reach four miles and serve 40 carefully laid out ski runs on three mountains.

In 1937 Challenger Inn was built. Less luxurious than the lodge, it was designed to give family parties and young skiers a chance to enjoy pleasures of Sun Valley at lower cost.

Chalets have been built since to accommodate ski racers and college students who plan their skiing holidays on an even summer budget.

Built originally as a winter playground, Sun Valley soon found that the summer recreation advantages were too great to be overlooked.

Then 1938 saw the addition of a golf course, tennis courts, outdoor artificial ice rink and trap and skeet fields.

Although summer guests number as many or more than winter's, Sun Valley is synonymous with skiing.

The sport is enjoying growing popularity. In 1942 there were a half million skiers. This winter an estimated number six times that great will skin down slopes all over the nation.

The Idaho ski town has done much to foster this growth.

In planning and building the resort, Union Pacific provided an easy means of getting to the mountain tops, a staff of experts to teach the sport to newcomers and a variety of other recreational facilities to enhance a winter holiday.

All this was added to nature's endowment of great open slopes suitable to all grades of skiers, tall peaks that shut out bitter winds and a dry atmosphere that yields powder snow.

400 Per Cent Gain in West Steel Related

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 31—The far western steel industry, a war baby launched to supply steel for Pacific coast shipbuilding, has grown 400 per cent in a decade.

It fills about two-thirds of the demand for mill products in the seven states of the 12th district, reports the federal reserve bank of San Francisco in its monthly review.

Since 1947, the review says, the district's capacity to produce steel has expanded at a rate that usually exceeded the growth rate of the nation's steel industry as a whole.

The three large steel producers in the district are Bethlehem Pacific Coast Steel corporation, with mills at Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle; Columbia-Geneva division of U. S. Steel, with mills near Provo, Utah, and Turrence and Pittsburg, Calif.; and Kaiser Steel, Fontana, Calif.

In addition there are 10 independent steel mills which this year had about 15.5 per cent of the steel making capacity of the 12th district.

Life has no certainty. It comes
 leaves the body at birth. You
 may walk through the cemetery and
 and the tombstones of every age
 the infant, the
 child, the youth,
 the middle aged
 and the aged.
 Life is subject to
 depart from the
 body at any time
 of any age, under
 any circumstance,
 and without
 warning.

Job declared:
 "Man that is born
 of few days, and full
 of trouble; He cometh forth like a
 flower, and is cut down; He fleeth
 also as a shadow, and continueth
 not."

"The cometh forth like a flower."
 The flower comes forth and is ad-
 mired by all. It sends forth its fra-
 grance and beauty for a given period
 of time. The flower has its season,
 then it fades and its fragrance dis-
 appears. The flower is a wonderful
 illustration of life. Life in its youth
 and beauty, life during the days of
 activity, life that is full of use-
 fulness, life that is attractive, talked
 about and admired. Such life fades
 and disappears. Man has but a short
 season during which he lives. Many
 never live their allotted time. Man

The writer James compared life to a
 vapor: "Whereas ye know not

 Vapor is a condense substance
 floating in the air. It is something

 is impossible to seize and hold, some-
 thing that vanishes like smoke or
 mist. Life is truly like a vapor.

"It arises and appears for a little
 time and then vanishes away. No
 true comparison of life could be
 made. Man appears on earth, is
 seen and heard for a period of time,
 but one day he disappears like
 the mist; he is gone, the world sees
 no more.

Job compared life to a fleeting
 shadow. A shadow is made by an
 object coming between the sun and
 the earth. The shadow of a man or
 trees may be made of life at any
 time by the sun hiding itself behind
 a cloud. The longest life of the
 shadow is from sunrise to sunset. As
 the sun drops down behind the
 horizon, the shadow disappears.
 Life may live at any moment and is
 certain to fade away at the regular
 sun-setting time of life.

Life is the highest valued posses-
 sion of man, yet the most uncer-
 tain. He will give all that he has to
