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## Opinions on Farm Plans Varied At Pendleton Hearing by Solons

## Russ Rebuff Hikes Peace Hope Gloom

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Russia's newest note blocking a big four foreign ministers meeting on Germany was released today, pointing up why President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles apparently are despairing of negotiating major world problems with the Soviets any time soon on an acceptable basis.

For Moscow not only set up "impossible conditions" for the President but it. The Soviets also reverted to some of the language, such as talk of "the threat of a new world war," which was favored in the later years of the Stalinist period.

U. S. officials studying the 4,000-word document said Wednesday morning privately suggested that it marks the end of a brief but hopeful era in Russian relations with the west beginning with Joseph Stalin's death last April.

Despite various Moscow "peace" gestures, these officials said the document clearly shows that the Malenkov government presently has no intention of negotiating on any basis other than that of complete Soviet acquiescence to American wishes.

One conclusion of U. S. officials is that obviously the world is not to be found with the exception of continuing efforts for a general conference for an earnest negotiation with the Russians.

As President Eisenhower indicated in his news conference, the Russian note demands abandonment of the projected European defense community and West German rearmament, virtual expulsion of the North Atlantic treaty of the great powers. "These were the 'impossible conditions' the President demanded.

Authorities here said there was no doubt among the U. S. State, British, French and Soviet governments concerning the Russian note.

TAIPEI, Nov. 5 (AP)—Nationalist government leaders were hopeful today the visit of Vice President Richard M. Nixon Sunday will be a clarifying number of touchy problems.

State sources indicated that officials were anxious to feel out Nixon on the future of the Republic and economic aid to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's inland government.

### Widespread Drug Operation Broken

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 5 (AP)—A nationwide narcotics ring operating as far away as California was reported broken today with the arrest of 10 persons following an investigation.

The roundup was being made after two federal narcotics agents traced their way into the ring, they said today.

"I, U. S. District Attorney Simon B. Cohen said, "the ring made sales amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars a year. He reported it had broken here and in other Connecticut cities as well as throughout New England and other parts of the nation."

"They sell some of the stuff to dealers on the west coast through the mails," Cohen added. "The ring was such a large operation it even had an assignment to keep the narcotics moving."

### Withdrawals of U. S. Troops in Asia Urged by Ex-General

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., (AP)—Retired Lieut.-Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer said here last night American forces should be withdrawn from Korea and the "islands of Asia" be left up to the natives.

Wedemeyer, commander of United States forces in China from 1944 to 1946, also held out little hope for success in the current peace talks in Korea.

The retired general was here to talk to Gen. George Krause, president of the United Hotel company, and Gen. Benjamin Childs, commander of the air defense command. He held reporters.

"When we're dealing with the communists we must realize our position has been one breach of faith after another by them, and don't understand why Americans would feel that communists have some ethical and sincere."

He said the United States should stand fast "the essential production needs to defend itself" accomplished by supervisors to see that American dollars were spent wisely.

"The defense of all Asia should be left to the Asians," he said. "Not only should American forces be withdrawn from Korea as soon as possible, but the United States could create out there military bases among the free Asiatic nations adequate to cope with the aggression, Russian and supported by the Kremlin."

"No American soldiers would be needed in that force," he said. "Let those people of Asia who want their liberties fight and sacrifice for them as did our own soldiers in this country. The American taxpayers can't be expected to continue carrying the burden of subsidizing the economy and military security of nations in the far east or in Europe that do not themselves make proper sacrifices."

He said American military forces should be withdrawn from Korea as soon as the South Koreans have 25 trained divisions," a suggestion he pointed out, already made by Gen. James Van Fleet. He said the South Koreans have 17 trained divisions.

### Gambling on Football Results Through Syndicate Unveiled

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 5 (AP)—Football gamblers, backed by St. Louis and Minneapolis syndicates handling bets estimated as high as \$100,000 a week in Oklahoma City, the Daily Oklahoman said today.

The newspaper said the St. Louis syndicate keeps credit ratings on Oklahoma City gambling establishments and can tell instantly how far it can back a betting joint.

Many bookies denied connections with any syndicate but others openly admitted to a newspaper reporter they were "setting off" bets in St. Louis or Minneapolis.

"Sure we set them off," one gambler said. "Someone hits us with a big bet that we can't carry to lose, we balance our books by setting it off. Everybody makes money, including the syndicate."

"You'll never stop football or baseball betting," one gambler told the Oklahoman. "I can make a bet

### Meanwhile, Oklahoma City police contended there is not much they can do about football gambling.

"We're just busting our heads against a stone wall," said Sgt. Frank Thurston, vice squad head. Thurston said it is almost impossible to get evidence. He also blamed "weak state gambling laws" for handicapping investigations.

Under city ordinances, the most a gambler can be fined is \$20. The state law carries a maximum penalty of a fine and jail sentence but seldom is invoked.

### Damages Case Rule Changed By Top Court

BOULDER, Nov. 5 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court reversed Wednesday a \$2,500 damage award to a Focello businessman who charged that a plumbing firm sold him a faulty heating system which sputtered, blew up and blackened the interior of his warehouse.

The court upheld a claim by the statewide Plumbing and Heating company that Judge Henry P. McCaulee gave unfair instructions to a Focello jury in a complaint filed by J. O. Ring, Focello, against the company.

Ring charged that a \$5,000 oil heating system installed by the company had exploded repeatedly, sparking his warehouse with soot. The jury awarded him \$2,500 after instructions by McCaulee that Ring was entitled to "such damages necessarily and reasonably suffered by him."

But Supreme Court Justice James W. Porter said the jury's wording was too loose. Porter said McCaulee should have told the jury that Ring was entitled to no more than what he paid for the faulty system plus any special damages. The four other justices agreed.

The case was sent back to McCaulee for a rehearing.

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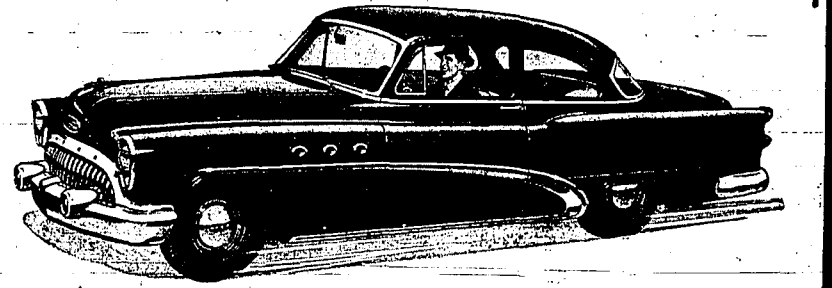

### Hoof-to-Platter Gain for Meat Cost Traced by USDA Experts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—What happens to the price of beef from the time a steer leaves a ranch until you buy a choice cut at your neighborhood store? Why should it go up for example, from 15¢ cents a pound to an average 85¢ cents—a top price of \$1.09 a pound?

Senator Hunt, D. Wyo., took the question to the agriculture department for an answer. He asked that, for illustration, a steer be followed from a ranch in Wyoming to a retail market here in Washington, with a breakdown of costs and prices along the way.

The department's bureau of agricultural economics responded with a detailed analysis of the cost of marketing a 700-pound feeder steer of good grade from a ranch in western Wyoming, using mid-October prices. The study, dated Oct. 25, was made available to a reporter Wednesday.

The study said the estimated distribution of the retail price, on a percentage basis, is: retailer (including some wholesaling), 20 per cent; transportation, 8 per cent; slaughterhouse, commission charges and other marketing costs, 8 per cent; cattle feeder, 41 per cent; and rancher, 25 per cent. (For the feeder and rancher, these were gross returns less marketing costs.)

Shatten said the moving job will be finished in two weeks, but preparing the site and building for the transfer will run the time of completion to five or six months.

Shatten said he expects to spend about \$1,200,000 on the entire operation.

### First Quadruple Amputee for Korean War Happy Over Son

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Robert L. Smith, first quadruple amputee of the Korean war, was "still speechless" today over his new infant son.

"I guess Tom, the proudest father in the world," said the 23-year-old ex-GI who now lives in Takoma Park, Md., in Washington suburb. "I've prayed a lot for this moment."

On Nov. 27, 1950, Smith, an army private, was wounded on a frozen Korean battlefield. By the time he was rescued three days later he was frostbitten so badly that both hands had to be amputated above the wrists and both legs above the ankles.

When followed long blank months in Walter Reed army hospital here, where nine more operations were performed before he was well enough to be fitted with artificial hands and legs.

Sometimes during those lonely months a young high school girl, Barbara Born, who recently had come to the United States from Germany, came to the hospital to bring books and magazines to the soldier patient.

One of the patients was Smith and soon her visits were just to see him. They were married one month after his discharge from the hospital in July, 1952.

Their son, Don Eugene, a husky eight-pound, six-ounce youngster, was born in Washington sanitarium Wednesday, four days before his dad's 32nd birthday.

"It's just what we wanted," Smith reported but added with a grin, "I guess a girl would have been all right, too."

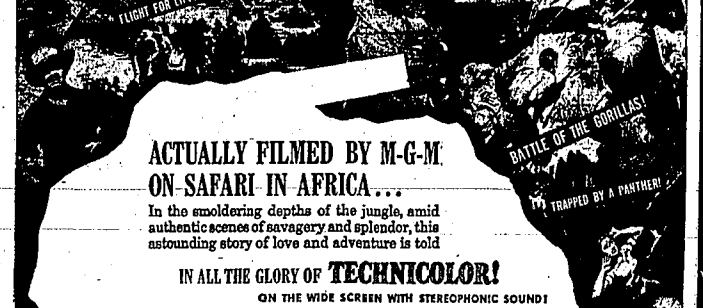

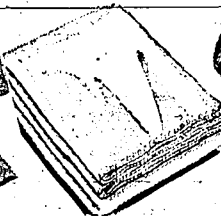

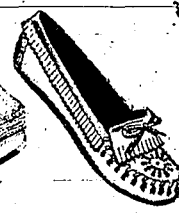

### Court Ruling For Rail Pay Pleas Sought

CHICAGO, Nov. 5 (U. S. district court) was asked today to rule on whether insurance, health and welfare demands made by 15 unions representing more than a million railroad workers are legitimate subjects for collective bargaining.

The railroad workers filed a suit saying the demands were not valid and asking the court to dismiss the union demands.

The 15 unions represent non-operating workers such as clerks and telegraphers. They already have called for a strike vote to back their demands and have indicated they will not withdraw them.

**Claim Noted**

The carriers' objection in their suit that the railway labor act does not require the roads to listen to or bargain over such matters does not come under the heading of "disputes concerning rates of pay, rules and working conditions" mentioned in the act.

The suit was filed after the unions and representatives of the country's railroads met here to discuss the union demands.

**Several Demands**

The unions have asked for free insurance policies, such as dental and equal to one year's pay, free medical expense for workers and all their dependents, liberal railroad passes for workers and their families and other fringe benefits.

They will make wage demands later.

Spokesmen for the carriers' conference committee said the suit was filed because the roads did not want to discuss the union demands on an "arbitrary" basis.

### "Poor Man's" Atom-Smasher Is Announced

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 5 (U. S. "Poor Man's" atom-smasher was announced today by University of California scientists.

The new research tool is known in the scientific world as the van de Graaff exchange accelerator. Developed on a principle by Dr. L. W. Alvarez, professor of physics at the university, it is the only one of its kind in the world.

**Large Device**

The machine was constructed under the direction of Dr. R. W. Woodard, professor of electrical engineering. It is seven feet high and nine feet long.

University scientists have dubbed the new machine a "windstrolcher" because it seems to defy an elementary law of physics. It accelerates the same atomic particles twice with one voltage particle.

**More Efficient**

Woodard said the "windstrolcher" will be "more efficient, relatively smaller, safer and cheaper to build and operate" than cyclotrons now in use.

"Our machine will not compete with the cyclotron," Woodard said, "but it will provide a poor man's way of getting high energy atomic reactions more safely and easily than with similar machines."

### Tax Officers of 4 States Slate Talk

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 5 (U. S. tax officials from Idaho, Montana and Wyoming will meet with the Utah tax commission Friday to discuss motor vehicle reciprocity laws.

Patrick Healy, Jr., commission chairman, said the four states have been negotiating for several years on a standard method of treating each other's motor vehicle registrations—particularly trucks in interstate traffic.

### Idaho Artists Slowly Breaking Mold of Tradition in Paintings

By DALE NELSON

BOISE, Nov. 5 (U. S.)—The 18th annual Idaho artists show demonstrates that Cam slant painters are slowly breaking the mold of tradition and trying out new ideas.

"More of the abstract is creeping in year by year," Dr. Conon Mathews, head of the art department at Boise Junior college, declared.

"Completely non-objective art is just making its appearance," he added, pointing to the work titled "Indecision" by Peacelife artist Stanley D. Johnson.

"There has been practically no surrealism until now," Mathews said, citing a painting called "The Fall" by Postelle high school teacher Paul Roch.

Many artists in the show have mingled the old with the new. Boise Junior high school teacher Louis Peck, for instance, contributed a painting of "Magie Dam" in which Idaho's rolling hills are depicted as angular. In another work, the same artist shows them as the eyes sees them.

Early Idaho art shows were 100 per cent naturalistic, Mathews recalled, and they are still about 90 per cent so. Other western states are far ahead of Idaho in responding to new art.

He added, "There has not been much change in subject matter. Maybe a few more portraits and a few more paintings involving figures. I think that latter trend is likely to continue."

Subjects represented in this year's show often reflect Idaho interests—a group of women gathered about a row of rural mailboxes, painted by Florence Sotliner, Weiser; a shepherd and his sheep, by Bernice Burn, Emmett; and Sun Valley, by R. A. Melander, Boise.

Historic Idaho City, a favorite area of Boise painters, is represented by three pictures.

Rosa E. Walker, St. Maries, now attending school in Chicago, won second place in the portrait division with an oil painting of Idaho Supreme Court Justice William D. Keeton.

Others went farther afield for their subjects. Lyle Stanford, Caldwell, painted a scene in Mexico and Deane Ingraham, Boise, one in Alaska.

Of 121 paintings submitted this year, 70 were accepted.

"I believe they had more to pick

from than ever before," Mathews commented. He noted an increase in recent years in the number of water colors.

### Union Leader Urges Aid for Metals Miners

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—An official of a CIO labor union has urged the tariff commission to take steps to keep employment in the iron and steel industry from falling below the minimum level.

He testified before the commission Wednesday after speaking for several days to producers and several labor leaders.

The tariff commission is expected to lower prices for iron and steel and to close mines in some areas.

Producers generally support the national lead and zinc commission's request that the tariff be increased to President Eisenhower's maximum legal increase in lead and zinc tariff rates.

The commission is expected to make a "escape clause" of the reciprocal trade agreements act.

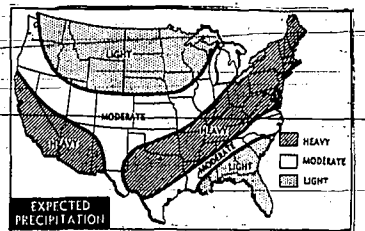
The commission has asked that it provide "anti-dumping tax" on imports.

John Marshall, president of the local No. 410 and an employee of the Zinc Company plant, Bartlesville, Okla., testified that workers feel relief should be given in this industry.

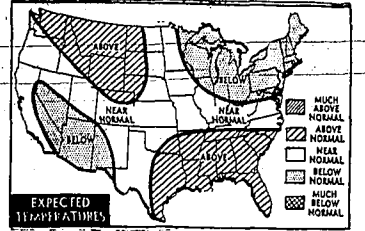
He added that he was informed that about 100 men in Bartlesville, Okla., may be closed down throwing several hundred men out of work.

### Long-Range Weather Estimate

Maps below illustrate the U.S. weather bureau's long-range outlook for the period from now until November 15. This is not a forecast in the usual meteorological sense. It is just an estimate of the average rainfall and temperature for the period based on the best indications now available.



Good news for some drought sufferers comes in the estimate of above-normal rainfall in a broad belt extending from Texas northward through the Ohio valley to New England. These rains may not begin in quantity until the end of October. Somewhat more rain than usual is expected in the southwest, too. Less-than-normal amounts are indicated for the northern plains, northern Rocky mountain states and the southwest.



From now until mid-November, temperatures are expected to average below seasonal normals from the Great lakes region eastward to the Atlantic coast and also in the far southwest. Gulf and south Atlantic states and the northwest quarter of the nation can expect to enjoy warmer-than-usual temperatures.

### New Mayor of New York Born To Politics, and Is Proud of It

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—The new mayor of New York is a politician and proud of it. He grew up with politics just as some boys grow up with ships, or horses, or baseball.

Robert F. Wagner, Jr., 41, a new deal-fair deal Democrat, who had the backing of Tammany in the race to become New York's 102nd mayor, carried his first \$2 as a boy of 6 working as a state senate page.

His political ambition was to enter into politics and try to carve out a career like that of his father, the late Democratic stalwart from New York who served 22 years in the United States senate and sponsored such depression-era legislation as the national industrial recovery act, the Wagner-labor-law act and the Wagner housing program.

"Young Bob," as he inevitably was called, lost to his father's death, says he picked a New York state assemblyman when he was 27, fresh from Yale law school. From that time on, except for service in World War II, he has devoted himself to his public career.

He became a boy-figure-in-the-administration of Mayor William O'Dwyer after the war. O'Dwyer made him a tax commissioner, and then—during a cabinet shakeup as the mayor fought Tammany leadership—appointed him the commissioner of housing and buildings.

Later he became chairman of the city planning commission, a post he gave up in 1949 to run for borough president of Manhattan. Demonstrating "his" vote-getting ability, he won that race overwhelmingly.

In his race for the \$40,000-a-year mayoralty post—which many regard as second only to the United States presidency in importance as an elective office—he was supported staunchly by Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., Sen. Herbert H. Lehman and Averell Harriman. His election solidified the strength

of the new deal-fair deal section of the state Democratic party. Wagner was married in 1943 and has two sons. He established himself as a new dealer when he first entered the state assembly. He endorses his father's liberal views and wants an extension of the state and national welfare laws.

Ernest Goodman, counsel for three of the defendants, Mrs. Helen Winter, William Allan, and Philip at Ganley, Saul Weisman, and Thomas Dewitt Danahy, Jr., prominent Detroit communists, were killed Wednesday night in a head-on auto collision three miles south-east of here.

### Chemistry and Physics Nobel Awards Given

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Nov. 5 (AP)—German chemist who did space-age work for the plastics industry and English physicist who invented a microscope that opens new views in research on living matter were awarded the 1953 Nobel prizes in chemistry and physics Wednesday.

Dr. Hermann Staudinger, 72, of West Germany, whose research in giant molecules paved the way for industrial production of synthetic rubber commodities as nylon, plastic plates and artificial fibers, won the \$25,000 prize in chemistry.

Prof. Frits Zernike, 65, Groningen, in the Netherlands, won the \$25,000 prize for his development of a "phase contrast" microscope without the application of staining substances—gives scientists a closer view of minute particles of matter than they have ever had before. Both persisted in their revolutionary work over the criticism of skeptical fellow scientists.

In Groningen, Zernike said he was rather overwhelmed at the honor. In Freiburg, Staudinger said the chemistry award represented the ultimate recognition of a great and wonderful thing that he had lived to see.

The announcements, Wednesday, enable the year's list of awards for the will of Alfred Nobel, the Swedish inventor of dynamite. Nobel's will adds a nine million dollar fund in directions that the interest be used to reward those contributing most to the benefit of mankind.

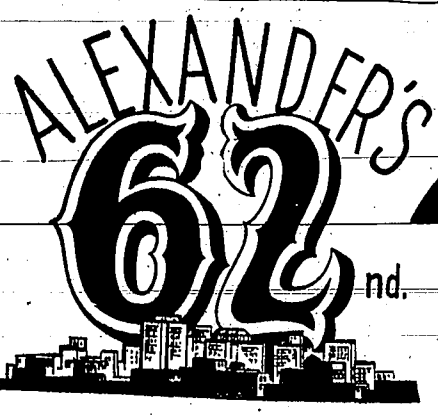

### Probe Begins On U. S. Ship Ruckus Claim

KUREKA, Calif., Nov. 5 (AP)—The coast guard opened an investigation today into reports of "misconduct on the high seas" by the crew of the freighter *SS Sealife*.

The *Sealife*, owned by the Orion Shipping and Trading company, New York, was boarded by coast guard officers yesterday when it docked here from Yokohama. The vessel is under charter to the military transport service.

"Paper Agreement"

Thomas R. Manning, San Francisco representative of the Seafarers International Union, AFL, said the Seaman crew sailed from Seattle June 25 with a "paper agreement" that certain kinds of food would be served aboard.

He said the trouble started when this food was not served, and the captain demanded that the crew return to the paper agreement to him. The crew refused.

Lives Threatened

Capt. William H. Metzger, New York, would not comment, but Second Mate John J. Tvedt, Moolbe, Ala., said the lives of himself, the captain, the third mate and the redman were threatened.

The *Sealife* was at sea for 37 years and this is the roughest crew it ever had, Tvedt said.

Cmdr. E. C. Haller, San Francisco coast guard headquarters, who traveled here to board the ship yesterday, refused to comment on the reported trouble except to say that an inquiry would be held today.

### U.S. Troops Not Adequately Trained For Hard Fighting, Reporter Learns

By FRED SPARIS

BEIJING, Korea, (AP)—We are not preparing our sons physically and mentally to meet the dangers of foreign battlefields.

Proof is found here in Korea in piles of statistics of physical breakdowns and mental cracks, studied during this time of the truce.

A careful examination of United Nations soldiers coming back from communist prison camps shows our GIs were less able to take the shock of barbaric treatment than their allies.

For example: On a percentage basis, it is positive that fewer British troops died during the weeks of forced marches and starvation diets.

A released British officer explained it this way:

"The Yanks went to pieces in the biting cold faster than we did. They were used to softer living and were not in as good physical shape, not as tough, as a result they suffered more and lost the will to live."

As long as the United States means to be the policeman of the free world, more and more of our young men will be sent to far off places and exposed to the same kind of hard conditions found here in Korea.

"As a correspondent I have seen troops in every one of their foreign assignments from World war II and on. Once again I've become terribly aware that while the GIs are well equipped mechanically, they are poorly prepared in body and mind."

Having visited Korea's "bullet boulevard" during the costly winter of 1950, the victorious spring of 1951 and the trench warfare of 1952, I am convinced thousands of young Americans died of sheer exhaustion and suffered mental collapse because they were improperly trained.

Our GIs learn fast, but if their outfit wears out before they get their first days on the line they paid with their lives—for the mistakes of easy-going generals and complaining mothers back home.

After we got pushed off Jeju Island in the last Chinese show before the truce, a British officer of the GI said: "We used to curse our platoon sergeant back at Ft. Bragg for making us spend a night in a rock hole foxhole."

"If I was back there now I would curse him for not making us live in a foxhole for a month with shells whizzing overhead. I wasn't prepared for what we just went through."

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# U.S. Plans New H-Bomb Test In Pacific Area Next Spring

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—The United States will conduct new hydrogen bomb tests in the Pacific area next spring, officials here today announced.

The tests will be carried out under the task force agreement, probably at Bikini, they sources said.

# AEC Drafts Important Revision Of Atomic Law, Paper Reports

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—The New York Times said today the atomic energy commission is drafting a series of important amendments to the atomic energy act.

A Washington dispatch to the Times by James Reston said the commission is drafting the amendments to increase the participation of private industry in the program at home and liberate the exchange of atomic information among the allies.

The amendments would do these things, the story said:

1. Enable private industry to own or rent fissionable material and to own and operate power reactors under proper controls. They cannot do either at present.
2. Give the AEC greater discretion in the exchange of atomic and thermionic information. This information is considered to be in the public interest.
3. Liberalize the rigid patent system now governing all developments in this field so private industry will be able to invest in the field in dollars, manpower and brains into these projects.
4. Improve the security system so it is not necessary to get or exchange for laborers on atomic energy projects.
5. Remove certain technicalities in the act in order to remove any doubt that violations of the act cover not only the atomic energy program but the thermonuclear (hydrogen bomb) program as well.
6. In Washington, the AEC had no comment on the report.

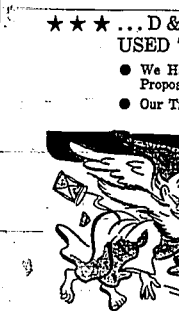

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### Tear Gas and Water Break Trieste Rows

TRIESTE, Nov. 3 (AP)—Police used tear gas and high pressure water hoses today to chase rioting Italian students through the streets of downtown Trieste.

The students rioted from square to square for five hours, starting at 8 a.m. (including Wednesday). About midnight they started throwing stones at police and the riot squad moved in.

#### Students Soaked

The squad soaked students with the jeep-borne water cannons in the Piazza San Giovanni, then pitched a dozen tear gas bombs into their midst when they started yelling in front of the headquarters of the independenceist (Free Trieste) movement.

The students rushed to the nearby Piazza Goldoni where they turned over a parked British army jeep. They rushed away again as police arrived.

The youths fled as the water-cannon were put to use for the first time in the current series of riots over the future of the Adriatic port area.

#### Shot-Fired

The trouble started in Piazza San Giovanni where a policeman fired a shot last night to disperse demonstrators in an earlier pro-Italian riot.

Yesterday's violence came on the anniversary of Italy's entry into Trieste in 1918. It resulted in injuries to eight policemen and dozens of Italian extremists. Twelve rioters were arrested.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 3 (AP)—Tightening American purse strings threaten curtailment of United Nations economic programs in many parts of the world.

The special political committee currently is debating the Palestine refugee problem. Richards told the committee "the United States is not prepared to bear indefinitely so large a share of the burden involved in this situation when Israel and the Arab states show as little initiative in helping to settle the matter among themselves."

"There is a very real danger that the longer the United States continues to supply relief money, the less desire there will be on the part of the states in the area to make real efforts on their own to liquidate the problem," he said.

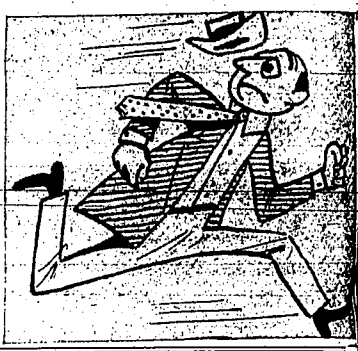

### Church Warning On 'Fanatic' Red Chase Endorsed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (U)—Leaders of some of the largest Protestant denominations endorse a Presbyterian warning against "fanatical" methods of combating communism. Protestant leaders reached in a United Front survey, wrote a figurative "amen" to a letter to the General Council of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. sent Monday to its 8,000 congregations. The letter started Presbyterians against leading individual rights and fighting communism in a purely "negative" way.

No comment was obtained from Roman Catholic leaders. However, it was recalled that Francis Cardinal Spellman, archbishop of the diocese of New York, said in a European speech Oct. 23 that critics of "McCarthyism" would not dissuade Americans from exposing and rooting out reds.

A prominent Jewish leader, Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, Cleveland, said he fully agrees that "communism should be fought, but there should not be so much frenzy about it that you destroy the very thing you want to save."

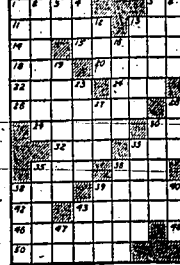




