BOANWAS, Utah, Nov. 6 (AP)—Eight miners, including a bridegroom and a father of eight children, were given up for dead today in the smothering, flame-filled shaft of the Bonanza No. 2 granite mine.

Rescue workers labored feverishly to clear debris from the smothering mine shaft and reach the men believed to be trapped 300 to 500 feet underground. Crews cut their ways through the rubble, mostly by using pneumatic drills to blast their way through layers of rock and debris. The men were trapped in the shaft when a fire broke out in the morning.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

George belongs to that category of youngsters who, without a doubt, something, think it's important to do something. "I won't let his teacher believe he could do good work," "but he won't try, won't pay attention."

"Won't" is the wrong word to use in such a case. Most children are eager to please of their parents. If they don't receive this encouragement, they frequently act like George.

The teacher further reports that George "makes a nuisance of himself in class. He runs around the room instead of concentrating on his tasks and will do anything, no matter how silly, to attract the attention of his classmates and make them laugh. He won't try to learn."

In that case the teacher should endeavor to find out why the boy does not pay attention. For it often happens that such a youngster is his eager to be at the top of the class as any other of his. This type of pupil, boy or girl, is often sensitive and childishly ambitious, but unable to apply himself to his lesson.

Instead of sending him to the principal's office, the teacher should call at his home, not to complain, but as a friendly person who would like to see the child succeed. Nothing should be said to the boy about his shortcomings. The teacher would, however, do well to avoid understanding and sympathy and a desire to be of service. Perhaps the mother might suggest to his mother that he be taken to a clinic for a medical examination to ascertain if he is suffering from any mental difficulty.

It may not even be necessary to suggest a medical examination, but it is wonderful what a difference a home visit from a friendly teacher often makes in a class nuisance. The sight of her in his house, without hearing and bad news, usually has a magic effect on the youngster. Of course, it won't do much to raise his spelling average, but it will result in a change of attitude that will certainly help his behavior—and perhaps his spelling.

If on the other hand, a clinic visit is deemed necessary help from the children's specialist will accomplish a great deal. It may be that the youngster needs eyeglasses, special diet, or some particular treatment. Parents should be told "Won't" find out what can be done.
