Big Boost Noted In Wheat Placed Under Price Aid

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9—The agriculture department reports farmers paid \$50,346,378 bushels of 1953-crop wheat under price support through Oct. 15, up about 32,500,000 bushels from last year.

Through mid-October, last year the amount of 1953-crop wheat put under price support was 312,544,143 bushels. Price support on wheat crops is available through Jan. 31.

The department said January farmers have put the most wheat under loan or purchase agreement, \$8,111,751 bushels. Next highest states are Oklahoma with 49,171,921 bushels now under support, and Washington, with 38,068,077 bushels.

Hall says this pledge yesterday at the Republican western conference after delegates decided against adopting a resolution expressing their feelings.

Patrons Hard Work

In this way, they hoped GOP members of Congress could change civil service regulations that have frozen thousands of Democrats into politics-making jobs.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's current exposure of Soviet espionage in President Eisenhower's own branch of the government—the army and navy—has been the most sensational since he has since White House criticism of the Wisconsin man's tactics and objectives.

"He" still may dilute and deplore "Ike's" managements and the necessity for a continued inquiry. But "Ike" also knows when the time has come to retreat from a dangerous military-political action.

The significance of this strange twist in the Eisenhower-McCarthy relationship, although not generally appreciated, accounts for the new respect for an investigation the president has criticized indirectly on several occasions at the banquet of so-called liberals and intellectuals in his train.

THEY AND NOW—For a full understanding and appreciation of the situation, the reader will find it necessary to review their relationship from the day "Ike" was nominated for the presidency.

McCarthy then was an extremely controversial figure, for he had not produced the proof of many of the new spy cases according to the nomination. He begged him to show no sympathy toward the senator or the Jenner-Dixson-Capahard faction which was in the majority.

In general, candidate Eisenhower agreed. He and others adhered to the night that McCarthy, in his city speech, according to the editorial E. Stevenson with the anti-American conspiracy.

In many of the eastern newspapers supporting "Ike," as well as on the lips of certain "Ike" binders, "McCarthyism" became a word of scorn.

THEY WANTED JOE LEFT TO HIM—In his inaugural address the new President stated the freedom of thought and speech. In his message to the state of the union, he appeared to condemn all congressional investigations of this problem as interference with his prerogatives.

He declared the responsibility for weeding and keeping subservient out of the government radical elements to be the responsibility of the Congress.

In many of the eastern newspapers supporting "Ike," as well as on the lips of certain "Ike" binders, "McCarthyism" became a word of scorn.

TO OFFSET PUBLIC INDIGNATION—The timing of this announcement was not accidental. It was in direct response to the indignation arising from the McCarthy revelations of extensive espionage and betrayal of radar secrets at the Los Alamos laboratory. The chief executive, the last of ordinary security safeguards there was criminal.

The new and congressional reaction has been, and the White House realizes it, that "Ike" cannot keep the rods out of the army's most secret laboratories and experimental centers, he should not object to what we used to be denounced as "McCarthyism."

As a result of this dramatic development, it is now certain that "Joe" will rank next to "Ike" as a Republican campaign hero in the 1944 elections.

—MCCARTHY'S CHANGED TACTICS—McCarthy's tactics also has changed since he was elected. He conducts his hearings with amazing restraint, and within legislative bounds.

He does not identify the identity of suspected witnesses and violators. He cooperates completely with the department of justice especially the FBI, and they reciprocate.

As suggested here months ago, "Joe" now believes that "McCarthyism" will assume a different and respected meaning in American political life.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

NEW YORK—Tom Dewey understood the situation in the state of New York and in the nation. But he would be full to try to do it in 1943.

What his luck will be next year when he is contending for the nomination to replace Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. from Albany, is not clear. In 1942 he might try for a third presidential nomination.

TIME TO CALL A HALT!

Those who happened to be downtown in Twin Falls around the noon-hour Sunday witnessed demonstrations of wild-eyed driving that no doubt chilled their blood.

There were some such demonstrations of daredevil driving along Main avenue within 10 minutes of each other, and all the cars were piloted by speed-crazy youngsters.

In the first instance, pedestrians on Main avenue were alerted by the roaring of motors and the screeching of rubber just as a traffic light turned green at the postoffice corner. Two cars, starting off abreast and driven by youngsters, made as wild a dash down Main avenue toward the bank corners as anyone could imagine taking place in such a short distance. During this mad getaway one of the cars even swung around a non-participating vehicle and changed lanes to the amazement of everyone witnessing the demonstration.

A few moments later, farther down Main avenue toward east Five Points, two more cars loaded with youngsters engaged in another death-defying race, driving almost abreast. If you please, as they passed a third car going in the same direction.

We're not sure what game these youngsters were playing with their anti-people's lives—"tag" . . . "chicken" . . . or the hell with everything but we are sure that any city the size of Twin Falls, which will permit any such crazy driving right down the heart of its business district, is perille in its concern about the traffic problem generally.

We have contended all along that we have one of the best police departments in the country and generally speaking we have not changed our opinion, but the sort of thing we witnessed in downtown Twin Falls, Sunday, should be stopped, and fast.

Not only will that require drastic action by the police with the aid of every private citizen who happens to witness such diabolic incidents, but it will call for more realistic action by the courts which have been too inclined to give these offending youngsters a mild slap on the wrist.

To our way of thinking, these young daredevils who defy life itself to satisfy their wild impulses to outdo each other, should be denied the privilege of driving an automobile—not for a month, but for at least a year, or until they are 21, if necessary.

To permit this sort of thing to continue is to no one's credit. It makes us all look like a bunch of hill-billies. Furthermore it defests to a large extent all the effort that has been put forth in this vicinity to cope with a great peril that continues to take a terrific toll in human lives, broken bodies and needless suffering.

We hope someone get the license numbers of these young rascals who were doing their stuff Sunday. From where the writer happened to be standing, he didn't have a chance.

RETURN TO FREEDOM

A quiet note in the news the other day recalled a great turning point in World War II. Former German Field Marshal Friedrich Paulus, who commanded Nazi forces in the battle of Stalingrad, came home free to Germany.

The first great German offensive in Russia broke on the outskirts of Moscow as winter came on. The next year, 1942, the Nazis by-passed Moscow and swung south in a broad arc toward the Volga river. Had they crossed the Volga and swept on, the Soviet Union almost surely would have gone down.

But the German armies battled in vain in the streets and buildings of the Volga stronghold of Stalingrad. Their attack began Aug. 23, 1942. Hitler two days later demanded that the city surrender. He was defied.

In the ensuing months, the fighting often was a struggle from room to room in shattered factories and residential quarters. Sometimes mere rubble, a highly useful fortification, was at stake.

Finally, in the bitter cold of Jan. 31, 1943, the exhausted, frozen German 6th army surrendered. The defeat was symbolized when von Paulus came out of his dugout and, in a tattered army greatcoat, trudged disconsolately across the snow into Russian captivity. There, until now, he has been ever since.

WHILE TO WHISTLE OR NOT

Snow White's tiny benefactors whistled while they worked. But such a practice is frowned on in most well-ordered shops and offices. There has been an unwritten law forbidding such diversion in newspaper composing rooms, and we suspect this holds for many other places in which a number of persons must work with a measure of concentration.

Now comes a suggestion from a Boston doctor that "whistling at work or play" is just the prescription to a chronic lung ailment that is prevalent in the nation.

We do not want to question professional advice; but the suggestion that the government will put down thought to an alternative. Somehow we feel that we could not face the bank teller or the retail clerk who greets us with the words, "How do you do, sir?" nor would we appreciate a continuous serenade from the fellow at the next desk. It might be good to have a "whistle" in the pocket of the epidemic of stomach ulcers.—Portland Oregonian.

CURE FOR SIGNS?

Traffic Commissioner Wiley of New York City thinks he may have found a cure for the disease, stoplightitis, which afflicts so many traffic control authorities. Stoplightitis causes the number of stop signs to be multiplied so that motorists pay little attention to them unless they fear a cop is watching.

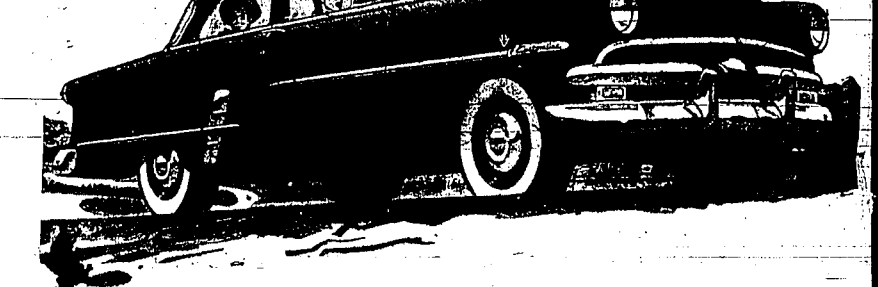
The complaint about stop signs is that they are in less-traveled localities with signs that say "Yield the Right of Way." The signs are keyhole-shaped instead of octagonal. The meaning is that the sign comes up to such an intersection at a time when there is no traffic on the street he wants to cross may proceed without penalty. He must stop only when there is traffic on the main artery.

On paper, this looks like a sensible scheme which might well be tried out elsewhere. Perhaps it will not work, but on the other hand it might.—Los Angeles Times.

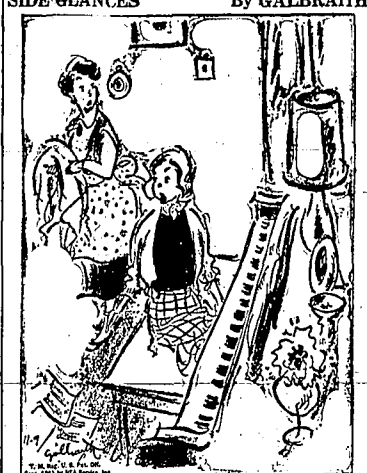

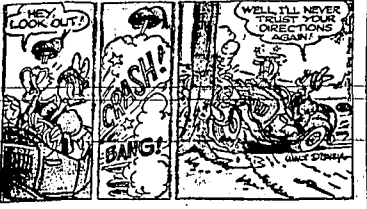
