Former President Truman and Gov. James F. Byrnes, South Carolina, have been subpoenaed to appear before the House Un-American Activities committee this week to testify on the Harry Dexter Case, Rep. BOISE, Nov. 10 (AP)—Foreign imports have driven the price of lead and zinc so low that the Coeur d'Alene district has 1,000 fewer jobs than a year ago, the all-Idaho congress was told today.

Big 3 Conclave on Rabies Spreads to Mindoka as Third Dog Dies

BURLEY, Nov. 10—Rabies, first discovered in Burley several days ago, has spread to Mindoka county across the river and steps were taken Monday night by Mindoka county commissioners to stem further spread of the dread disease. Confirmation that the disease had spread from Crestline to Mindoka county was received Monday by Dr. L. D. Thornburg, Burley, deputy state veterinarian, who said an Emerson dog had died from the disease.

Dr. Thornburg said he had been informed by the state that the head of Emerson dog, examined by state officials, was positive proof the disease had spread across the river. The dog bit its master last week and was put under observation immediately. As soon as the dog died it was sent to Boise for examination.

The Emerson man, in turning the dog over to Dr. Thornburg, said the dog bit him on the hand but that his skin was not broken because he was wearing gloves at the time. The Mindoka county commissioners Monday night decided to enforce the state quarantine which crosses the river at Burley and extends five miles into Mindoka county—Emerson is within the quarantine zone.

Meanwhile, the commissioners also have asked residents of Mindoka county to keep their dogs and cats either confined or on leashes. No more drastic steps will be taken this time.

Sheriff LePage in Cassia county reports his deputies have killed seven stray dogs in the vicinity of the labor camp near Burley.

Three witnesses testified Tuesday morning in the \$67,465 civil action case, hunting license and fee against Raymond Thomas by William Miller.

Eleanor Cites Difference in View on Reds

SAULT LAKE CITY, Nov. 10 (AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt explained to Utah audiences Monday that peoples in foreign lands view communism in the theoretical light while Americans look upon it as the Stalinist brand, presided by the Soviet union.

"People in other nations cannot understand our fears of a theory, a theory advanced by Marx," the former first lady of the land said. "It takes talk, explanation and honest discussion to explain the difference to them."

The energetic world traveler spoke at five different meetings on behalf of the United Nations. In between she met with church, civic and labor leaders.

Mrs. Roosevelt also discounted talk of removing Russia from the United Nations.

"If we tried to kick Russia out of the world organization, she would veto it," the widow of former President Franklin D. Roosevelt said. Nor would it be a good idea to sever U. N. relations with the red regime, she added.

Discussions in the U. N. provide knowledge of what is going on in Russia," she declared. "When they charge that people in Los Angeles are starving in the streets, we know that people in Russia are actually hungry and the lies are merely told to make them think they are lucky in comparison."

Mrs. Roosevelt also said she, personally, does not fear destruction. When asked by a University of Utah student what this country does fear, she replied: "Just at the moment I think we are afraid of Senator McCarthy."

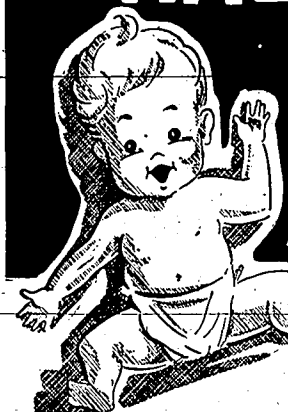
