Texas Bureau Backs Benson On Stock Aid

MINERAL WELLS, Tex., Nov. 12—The resolutions committee of the Texas Farm Bureau federation backs Agriculture Secretary Benson's stand against livestock price supports.

Instead of price supports, the committee urged a government beef purchase program and an advertising program to sell people on the idea of eating more beef. This would raise beef prices, the committee said.

"We feel that the purchase program is a more practical approach to livestock support than a non-recourse program with controls," the proposed resolution said.

However, for the basic farm commodities, the committee recommended continuation of 90 per cent parity supports with the addition of an acreage retirement program.

The basic crops are wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco, rice and peanuts.

Benson has opposed livestock price supports for a number of years. Those include lack of storage space for frozen beef, difficulty in controlling the number of calves born and difficulty in keeping an accurate count of cattle running the ranges.

Western Support COTOVADO

COTOVADO, Nov. 12—The Western Growers' association, representing more than 65 per cent of California and Arizona vegetable growers, has pledged its support to Agriculture Secretary Benson.

At its 23rd annual convention here yesterday, the association unanimously adopted a resolution endorsing Benson's stand.

"We wholeheartedly support Secretary of Agriculture Benson's decision to reduce farm price supports, controls and subsidies, and unequalized parity," the resolution declared.

The resolution also pledged the association's support to Benson's stand.

Present Plan Rapped

SAN JOSE, Calif., Nov. 12—Two national farm figures have struck out vigorously at the present farm price support program for agricultural products.

The two—George F. Wilson, California and Charles Shumaker, Illinois—addressed the California Farm Bureau federation's 33rd annual convention here today.

Both blamed the present farm surplus situation on the 90 per cent parity, price support program, and both favored a flexible support program.

And the two—both dirt farmers operating large farms in their respective states—urged great world trade as a solution to American farm surpluses.

U. S. Aid Sought For I. F. Schools

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 12—Clair Oale, superintendent of Idaho Falls public schools, said Wednesday the federal government is being asked to provide \$250,000 for school expansion here.

Oale said the request is based on a survey which shows that 1,014 of the approximately 8,000 students in the public school system come from families whose heads are employed by federal agencies.

Construction of two elementary schools is proposed, one of 14 rooms, in the South End Air addition, and the other, 10 rooms, as an addition to Hawthorne elementary school.

Senator Raps Farm Policies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12—Senator Clegg, R., S., charges a federal agency in following the "policy" of telling some cattlemen "to sell out and go broke, and then we can help you."

The South Dakota senator, here after a month spent talking with farmers and people in his state, said he would urge agriculture department officials to extend long-range aid to these cattlemen to avoid liquidating their stock before they can get a loan.

Clegg said the agency is the farm home administration (FHA), an agriculture department credit agency, which can grant special emergency or disaster loans to cattlemen or others unable to get credit elsewhere. But he contended restrictions on such loans are too stringent.

Many of the cattlemen who need emergency help, Clegg said, are World War I veterans who purchased their stock at high prices and they have been hurt badly recently.

He said many of them probably do not want it if they are returned and allowed to keep their present herds long enough to raise several crops of calves.

Dexheimer Avers Bureau Planning Hampered by Cut

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12—Reclamation Commissioner W. A. Dexheimer said Wednesday cuts imposed by Congress this year in funds for investigations and planning "mean we don't have the backing of projects which we feel we should have in the bureau of reclamation."

Dexheimer said in an interview that funds available for investigations and planning in the Missouri basin, total \$3,731,881 for the year ending June 30, compared with \$2,020,806 available last year.

"We haven't had the money we thought necessary for investigations for several years and this cut reduces our ability to carry on orderly planning and get the job done," Dexheimer said.

Soviet Army Chiefs Fired

NEW YORK, Nov. 12—Copies of Pravda reaching here Wednesday show three key generals in Moscow have been removed from their posts since last May.

The three are Col-Gen. P. A. Artemenko, commander of the armies of the Moscow military district; Lieut-Gen. K. E. Sinilov, commander of Moscow and Lieut-Gen. N. K. Spiridonov, commander of the Moscow Kremlin.

After the announcement of Deputy Premier Beria's arrest last July western diplomats in Moscow heard rumors that all three of these generals had been arrested. These rumors never received any confirmation and were discarded in part when one of the three, Sinilov, appeared at a diplomatic reception in mid-July.

But it becomes public now that three new men are in the post.

The new commander of the armies of the Moscow military district is Army General Mokolentsov.

The new commander of Moscow is Maj-Gen. I. S. Kolenikov and the new commander of the Moscow Kremlin is Lieut-Gen. A. Y. Vedekin.

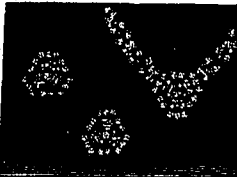

Solon Advises Radio and TV Talks by 'Ike'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—Sen. Cooper, R., Ky., has urged President Eisenhower to launch a series of radio and television reports to give the people "the straight facts" about the Republican administration's policies.

Cooper, who may be opposed for reelection next year by former Vice President Albert W. Hawley, said in a conference that "there is general failure on the part of the people to understand what is being done in Washington."

The people have confidence in the president's purposes and in what he says, Cooper said in an interview. "But in going about Kentucky I have found that the people are confused about what is going on. I urged the President to make a few short, simple reports on radio and television, giving the straight facts about conditions as they are."

Cooper said he suggested that Mr. Eisenhower talk particularly on farm, local and defense issues. He said that while no presidential comment was made, Cooper felt his suggestions were well received.

Upset of Gold Price Blamed On Russ Acts

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (U. P.)—The price of gold has been falling on the world market, and as with so many things, the Russians are suspected of being back of it.

The price of a gold bar in the so-called free markets has slipped nearly 50 per cent since March, 1932. Last week it brought only a fraction of a dollar more than the official price set by the U. S. treasury—\$35 an ounce.

Boarded After War

After World War II the price of gold on some black markets went as high as \$60 an ounce.

Reports here that Russia has been selling some of her large hoard of gold, thus weakening its price by increasing its supply in free or black markets.

Bankers believe that Russia has been selling gold for the currencies of other nations where she wants to buy consumer goods to keep her restless people quiet.

Largest Hoard

While Russia keeps mum about her gold production and stockpile, she is believed to have one of the largest hoards of any government.

What Russia wants from the west is shown in the report from Paris that the Soviets have ordered 100,000 tons of steel products, mostly sheet steel, from French mills. The French say the steel isn't considered strategic material, since they believe it to be used for civilian goods.

The U. S. treasury has been selling gold from time to time to friendly nations. Its gold hoard now stands at a little more than 72 billion dollars, down almost 14 billion dollars from a year ago.

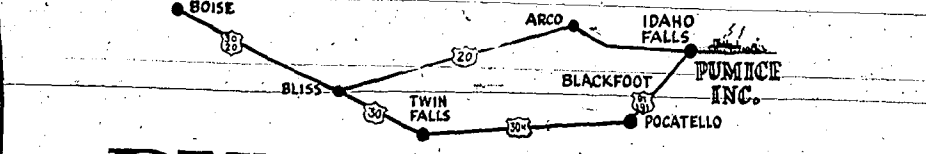

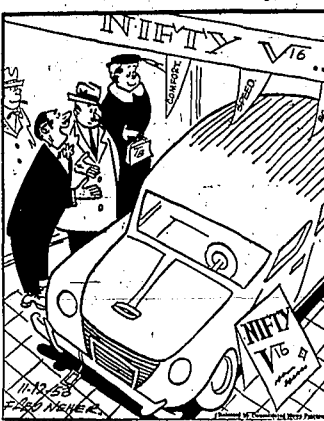

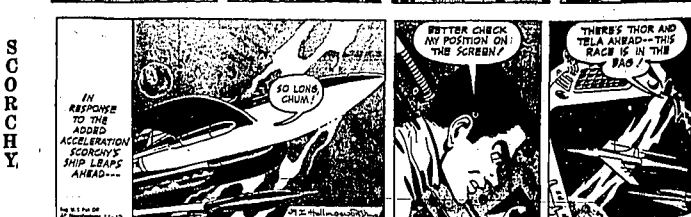

Baltimore Lawyer Fights City Hall for Rights of Taxpayers

BALTIMORE, Nov. 12 (AP)—Red-haired Hyman Pressman is a man who believes you can fight city hall.

The jaunty, 38-year-old Pressman is a lawyer by profession and "Mr. Taxpayer" by hobby.

Frustrating both his hobby and his profession, he has haled city and state officials into court in 16 "MONEY CASES" winning nine and

In some cases he has fought against trying new taxes. In others he has sought to have one public agency turn over tax money to another. In one case he sued a private business concern and a public agency together because the agency did not want to accept the money Pressman thought the business should pay.

One of Pressman's defeats was an unsuccessful attempt to block the Maryland sales tax in 1947. After the case was thrown out of court, he gave state officials a series of proposals he said would enable them to raise 18 million dollars a year without the sales tax.

At the end of the fiscal year he confronted officials with figures he said proved his right.

He also lost a suit against the city of Baltimore when he tried to prevent awarding a Memorial stadium construction contract \$164,000 higher than the low bid.

Another defeat came when he tried to force election officials to permit write-in voting in last year's primaries.

But for every taxpayer's suit Pressman has lost, he has won two. In one case he got a court order forcing the Maryland yacht club to pay Baltimore city \$28,500 for the use of facilities at a public riverside park.

Targets of other successful Pressman suits include the department of motor vehicles (forced to open its records to public inspection), the city employes retirement board (ordered to pay a widow who had been deprived of benefits because the board had failed to collect premiums), and the election supervisors (ordered to accept two political candidates they had rejected on technical grounds and to erase the names of improperly registered voters from election books).
