

Jury Awards Damages for Hunt Injury

A district court jury awarded William Miller \$3,700 instead of the \$27,483.33 he sought for injuries sustained by him on Nov. 10, 1935, when he was shot while hunting on the property of Mrs. Miller.

Defense Attorney John Daily presented only one and one-half hours testimony Thursday afternoon after E. M. Rayburn and John Heworth, attorneys for Miller, had rested their case. In his argument Daily said that Thomas admitted he made a mistake and should have observed that he was shooting a man and not an elk. But the attorney pointed out that Thomas was expecting game in the place where Miller appeared.

Daily credited Thomas with admitting he did the shooting and with saying that the bullet which hit Miller had come from the gun of Mrs. Miller. He said proof of damages was not complete, and that the jury should award Mrs. Miller the amount of \$3,700, which was the value of her husband, said and did in treatment of her husband and child from the time of the shooting until the death of her husband.

George Thomas, son of the defendant who was being hunted with Miller when he was shot, told the hunting trip, he said he helped with the shooting. He said he provided transportation to Miller so Miller could be treated at the hospital. Thomas said he was Miller's son-in-law, holding a pistol in his right hand in 1935.

The witness said he told Miller he heard the Miller was going to kill the older Thomas as long as possible, then fire his shot. Therefore, the younger Thomas told Miller, the best person to shoot was the older Thomas, and he would have a release of further claims.

Dr. William Johnson said he examined Miller Aug. 23 at the home of his attorney and found a 2 1/2 cent bullet in the injured arm. He described limited ability to do various farm work, but said the function of the injured arm is likely to increase with use.

Heworth said he could not see why Thomas could be held liable for the death of his father. A declaration of homestead was filed with the county recorder at 4:30 p. m. Thursday. Miller and his 80-acre farm and residence about a mile southeast of Piler. The homestead value of \$10,000 was placed on the property.

Idaho's homestead statutes permit the head of a family a maximum exemption of \$10,000 from an attachment where a declaration of homestead is filed. Miller's homestead filing was designed to protect Mr. and Mrs. Thomas from loss of all his real property in the event of a large judgment against them.

Progress for Soil Work Is Tallied Here

Progress reports on soil conservation projects by Clarence Hedrick, Twin Falls work unit soil conservation agent, featured the regular monthly meeting of district supervisors at the old county hospital building.

Hedrick reported soil surveys have been completed on 125,000 acres of land in the Twin Falls district. He noted the surveys actually covered all irrigated land and survey maps are available to district farmers.

In addition, engineering survey maps with a total of 180 acres and another survey started on a 200-acre farm.

Other projects undertaken include irrigation design for five farms and investigations for two and three. Hedrick said conservation crews worked on 12 land leveling projects since Sept. 1953 and distributed nine conservation guides for 2,000 acres of land to district farmers.

Crews also worked on 60 production and marketing administration, the planning, land leveling, pipe laying and ditching operations.

Ten grass increase planting projects are planned for next spring, Hedrick stated.

Howard Larsen, Hansen, and Lee Richardson, Berger, reported on the divisional soil conservation tour.

W. A. Laughton, Twin Falls, board chairman, discussed the recent conservation day program, noting it was a complete success.

Lou Miller was appointed to arrange an election to fill the vacancy on the superior board. The term of Yvan Clark, Castleford, expires in January.
