KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 16 (AP)—Former President Truman is expected to tell the nation tonight he kept the late Senator Whelan in the government job to give the FBI a change to catch him—and perhaps others—in the act of spying for Russia.

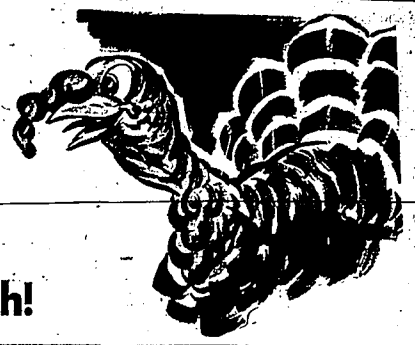
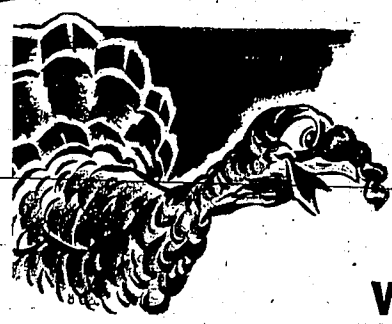

Little Change Expected for West's Lambs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (Special)—Lamb, Oregon and Idaho are expected to show about the same or slightly more lambs on feed as last year, the department of agriculture said today.

Releasing the overall picture, the agency reported:

"Each feeding of sheep and lambs to be for the winter and spring market is expected to be smaller than a year earlier. In the corn belt all states with one or two exceptions are expected to feed fewer lambs. Lambs in the west are expected to show some decrease.

"Several western states, including California, have prospects for increasing production but feeding in northern Colorado will be sharply curtailed. Lambs in the west are expected to show some decrease.

"Great Plains feeding in the north falls of eastern Wyoming and western Nebraska will probably be smaller than a year earlier.

"Feed supplies are adequate to maintain most of the western feeding sections. Lambs from most of the western supply states were generally in good flesh and above average weight.

"In many areas, summer range feed conditions were favorable for feed conditions and a high proportion were ripe for immediate slaughter. The price of feeder lambs in the western market for the week ending Oct. 15 was \$18.82 per hundred pounds compared with \$22.79 a year earlier. Feeder lamb prices have strengthened from the low point of \$12.50 reaching in the week ending Sept. 5, 1953.

"Strengthening prices reflect the smaller available supply of feeder lambs, the main factor in the reduced supply is the relatively high slaughter of lambs from the last crop.

2 Missing Children Are Found Victims of Drowning in Pond

FRAMINGHAM, Mass., Nov. 16 (AP)—The bodies of a missing Framingham brother and sister have been discovered in water of a pond but the circumstances of their drowning remain a mystery.

Mrs. Doris Gilmore, 43, collapsed in hysteria yesterday as the remains of her son, Thomas, 8, and daughter, Carol Ann, 7, were dragged from the muddy waters of a pond where they had been missing since Nov. 1.

"That's my baby! That's my baby!" she cried as the body of her younger son was brought to shore, glasses still on his face.

A policeman tried to comfort her, then led her home as she sobbed.

"Carol, where's Carol? Where's Carol?"

An hour later, Carol's red hat came to the surface on a spike of a grappling hook. Minutes afterward searchers retrieved the little girl's body, still fully clothed and wearing gloves.

She was identified by an uncle, Charles Gilmore, as hundreds of neighbors and volunteers lined the shore of the pond.

Authorities said it was "virtually certain" no foul play was involved in the drownings.

Political "Who-Done-It" Thriller Near Part Where Clues Fit, Culprit Shown

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—A thrilling political "who-done-it" is coming to the chapter where the clues begin to fit and the accusing finger taps somebody's shoulder. Enter the great attorney-general or a former President of the United States.

It has been an exciting, confusing and, perhaps, misleading 10 days since Nov. 4 on that day Herbert Brownell Jr. accused Harry S. Truman of knowingly promoting a communist spy by another federal job where he could serve the masters even better. By what and precise implication, that was word Brownell swung at Truman's chin.

Truman will be in the air tonight at 9 p.m. (MST) with his version of the Harry Dexter White story.

Brownell will appear tomorrow with his before the internal security subcommittee headed by Sen. William E. Jenner, R., Ind.

The chips are down for both. Headline readers will be surprised to know that in all the uproar of charge and countercharge since Nov. 8 mightily little that is new in the White case has been reported to the public. For the few individuals who have been kept in the dark, developments, the White case is an old story. It was written in time and again most recently a few weeks ago when Jenner's subcommittee published a reliable report on "staggering sub-

version in government departments."

White figured largely in that report. About the only difference between Brownell's speech and the report was this: The attorney-general used the hard-knuckled word "spy" and he charged that Truman personally was the man responsible for an "uncredible" action.

Veterans of Truman's White House news conference (listed on page 4) got a shock from the former President's reaction. As he so often had done before when accused by a barbed tongue, the former President shot from the hip. He said he had fired White as soon as he caught up with him.

That will be one of the matters Truman will have to discuss in more detail tonight because the record so far produced does not support it. But the President's crack did break out some truly new information on the White case.

From Gov. James P. Byrnes, South Carolina, came an accusing statement which established:

1. That a derogatory FBI report on White actually had been sent to the White House before White was shifted from the treasury to the international monetary fund.

2. That Byrnes also had received a copy and personally had appealed to Truman to withdraw White's nomination from the senate.

Truman probably would have done so, but White already had been confirmed shortly before Byrnes

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 16 (AP)—The Canadian transport department has established "the world's first flying disc sighting station" and officials predicted today it would put an end to the "whiting" of the flying saucer.

The new station was expected to be in round-the-clock operation within a few weeks at Shirley Bay, 11 miles west of here.

Scientists who will operate the station will try to find out if there really are flying saucers. Equipment at the station includes an electronic reactor to determine the height, pattern and conduct of the limited layer of gases in the atmosphere and changes in the density of gamma and X-rays.

There are also electronic devices to measure known and unknown radio waves and disturbances, a gamma ray detector and a device known as a gravimeter to measure gravitation pull.

Observers at the station have been placed in the nearby ionospheric station where tele-communication experts are on 24-hour duty.

Report was expected from the observers at the station within the next year.

Reds Not Popular, but Their Lure Gaining Western Notice

By PHIL NEWSON, UP Feature News Editor

While Russia and red China have prospered extremely unpleasant neighbors, the belief is growing among western businessmen that their money is as good as anyone's else who's at work.

A scramble for trade with the communist nations already is in western Europe, and certainly could extend to the United States, whose manufacturers would be reluctant to lose market by default.

Two stumbling blocks to really extensive trade are the west's ban on sale of war-making supplies to the communists, and the communists' own tendency to price their products out of the market.

Nonetheless, many businessmen regard Russia and her satellites as the new frontier in today's highly competitive world market.

Pointing up this feeling have been three recent events:

1. The British board of trade's lifting of the ban on sale of small passenger cars to red China.
2. Disclosure that Russia has ordered 100,000 tons of steel pilings and heavy shafts from France. Deliveries already are under way.
3. The controversy that developed between the United States commerce and state departments when a Chrysler corporation official said there was a "good possibility" that American cars may be sold to red China in the foreseeable future. The state department said there was no plan to relax the embargo on trade with the reds.

The test case at the moment is western Europe.

Free Europe, worried by the sudden return of German and Japanese competition, offers machinery, ships, steel and many other products to western Europe.

Russia offers grain, oil, critical ores, timber, cars and caviar to the west.

The catch is that Russia asks too much machinery for her wheat, and, as result, trade actually is declining with some countries— notably Sweden—despite efforts to the contrary.

In no case is the trading large-scale.

The steel deal between France and Russia, for example, totals around 11 million dollars—small change in terms of big business.

It has, however, developed some interesting interpretations of what is and is not strategic in the sense of the ability to make war.

The United States bans sale of tankers to the communist countries. France, Holland, Denmark and Belgium, Finland and six building Russian tankers.

The people of Argentina, New Zealand, Australia, Uruguay, Denmark and Canada all set more beef per capita than do the people of the United States.

The boa did not die readily.

"The snake started crawling away right after I shot it," Rosenhild said. "A neighbor ran to his home nearby, got a 10-gauge shotgun and I took two blasts from that before the snake was subdued."

"News of Bill's discovery spread rapidly. There was a traffic jam in the area and considerable angry rattling and hissing, asked where the boa might have come from, said only:

"There's just one place it could have come from."

Nixon Lauds Japan Corps On Its Gains

TOKYO, Nov. 16 (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon praised Japan's new army today as a "great defense force."

In a brief visit to the national assembly in Tokyo, Nixon said he was impressed with the "quality of leadership" shown by the Japanese officials. He noted the Japanese defense forces "have the very essential elements of a modern army which characterizes the armed forces of the United States."

Second Day

In his second day in Japan, Nixon conferred with Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida, and then visited Emperor Hirohito and then braved a cold rain to inspect safety corps units in the nucleus army's first regional headquarters in Tokyo.

The safety corps unit is a 110,000-man force but some quarters suggested it should be built up to a total of 200,000 fully armed troops capable of defending Japan.

Iran Added

Politically troubled, but strategically located Iran was added to the list of countries to be visited by Nixon in his round-the-world tour.

Nixon announced he would visit the vital middle eastern country at the specific request of President Eisenhower. Although the Iranian visit came as something of a surprise because of the Iranian military situation there, Nixon did not discuss the reasons for the move.

President Returns From Canada Visit

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower returned to the White House last night after a two-day visit to Ottawa where he stressed the mutual defense problems of the United States and Canada.

The President and Mrs. Eisenhower arrived here on the chief executive's special train at 4:31 p.m. EST.

While Mr. Eisenhower's schedule today was relatively light, he faced many problems ranging from the "Dexter White case" to preparations for the forthcoming big three meeting in Bermuda.

End for Federal Gas Levy Urged

FBI Holding Meetings for Idaho Police

An FBI sponsored conference held at Moscow Friday and one scheduled at Pocatello Dec. 9 stress additional coordination among law enforcement agencies and improved efficiency in state assignments.

A special agent in charge of the FBI's Butte, Mont. office, planned the conference.

He said since the fiscal year 1964 there has been a steady rise in a national scale in the volume of the FBI's work in this category, he said, coupled with the fact that major crime in the nation exceeded the two million mark in 1963 for the first time in the history of recorded crime since 1925.

The conference is a part of a national FBI program which started in April and will continue through December.

He said the Moscow conference is the one slated for Pocatello Dec. 9. He said the FBI's Butte office is designed to meet special problems encountered in these local areas. They include discussions on laws which can be taken to minimize this type of offense, he concluded.

Hamilton Hints at Run for Governor

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 14 (AP)—Idaho state Sen. Clark Hamilton, D., Washington, hinted in Idaho Falls Friday he may run for governor, but he said he would make no definite announcement until after Jan. 1.

Hamilton was here to address a meeting of the Idaho Soil Conservation District association.

"I haven't announced for any office and I won't announce until after Jan. 1," Hamilton said. "If we have a continuing economic situation that is adverse to the interest of the majority of the people of Idaho, I may be a candidate for governor, but I won't announce that until after the first of the year."

Hamilton has been a severe critic of the state administration.

Navy Vessel For Missiles Is Discussed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—The navy is considering construction this year of the world's first guided missile ship, a high speed vessel.

The navy is converting two conventional heavy cruisers, the *Wheeler* and the *Cabell*, into guided missile ships at a cost of more than \$6 million dollars. These two vessels will have missile launching platforms in place of gun turrets. They are scheduled for completion in 1955.

Subs Also Revised
Three submarines also are being modified to fire guided missiles. But some navy officials believe that conversion of present ships to handle guided missiles is a risky and unsatisfactory, and it would be better to start building special missile ships from the keel up.

The big rub is the cost, which probably would run into hundreds of millions of dollars for a big vessel.

Debate On
The high speed missile ship is now going on within the navy and defense department whether to try to squeeze the project into the economy-limited defense budget which will go to congress next January.

The guided missile ship could revolutionize naval warfare in the same way the aircraft carrier did the supremacy of the battleship. When guided missiles with atomic warheads are available, such a ship could hurl a devastating atomic bombardment of miles inland enemy territory. Or it could throw up a screen of anti-aircraft missiles to ward off an enemy air attack on a naval task force or on shore installations.

Savants Blast Spying Probe

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 16 (AP)—A committee of scientists expressed concern Saturday over the "atmosphere of suspicion and distrust" which it said has resulted from the investigation of the Army signal corps laboratories at Fort Monmouth, N. J.

The scientists committee on loyalty and security of the Federation of American Scientists said in a formal statement that it is "concerned since it is in the atmosphere of suspicion and distrust which exists throughout the laboratories."

Lower Production Costs; Free Market Held Key for Farmers

CHICAGO, Nov. 16 (AP)—Lower production costs and free markets, not permanent and artificial price supports, are the answer to farmers' problems, two bankers said today.

Home J. Livingston, vice president of the American Bankers Association, and Jesse W. Trapp, chairman of the ABA's agricultural committee, made their statements in a speech prepared for delivery at a national agricultural credit conference sponsored by ABA.

Liveston criticized recent farm policy as "a constant effort to wean farmers away from a belief in free markets and lure them into a state of increasing dependence on government planning and price support."

He pointed out that modern machinery, better seeds, more fertilizer and better pest control have reduced farm production costs.

"Perhaps this is the direction in which we may find the solution to the farmer's problem, a solution which means more in the way of living principles of our country."

The Cooperative League also charged that the task force is "biased" against the consumer and warned of "grave danger" it will be used as "device to turn the natural water resources of the country over to the power interests."

The two groups made the charges on the eve of a meeting of the government reorganization committee headed by former President Herbert Hoover.

The power association said it concerned largely with "appealing means of implementing Mr. Hoover's own recommendation that the government get completely out of the power business."

Jefferson Only President to Get Subpoena During Term

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Thomas Jefferson, regarded as the founder of the Democratic party, was the only American President who was subpoenaed while in office. Some 150 years later, former President Harry S. Truman became the only former chief executive to be subpoenaed by a congressional committee.

Jefferson's troubles were with the federal courts, notably Chief Justice John Marshall who was hostile to the administration. In fact, Jefferson's entire cabinet received court subpoenas at one point.

Jefferson turned down two subpoenas on the grounds a president has more important duties. He said he was "unwilling by any notion of the subpoena to set a precedent which might sanction a proceeding so preposterous."

Marshall issued subpoenas for Jefferson during the two treason trials of Aaron Burr in 1807. The cabinet members were summoned to testify at a New York trial involving two American citizens who took part in a military expedition against a Spanish colony. The U. S. marshal at the trial and the defense lawyers were also administered.

Purpose of the cabinet subpoena, wrote Special Prosecutor Pierpont Edwards to a cabinet officer, was "to disgrace the President and you and the entire administration."

The cabinet members rejected their subpoenas saying the President had told them their services were so necessary they could not be spared to appear at the trial.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 18 (AP)—Indiana Gov. Claire Craig indicated today he would take no action to prevent Hoosier children from reading about Robin Hood.

Mrs. Thomas J. White, a member of the state textbook commission charged last week that the Robin Hood legend promotes communism because the English outlaw believed in robbing the rich to aid the poor.

Craig didn't go so far as to give Robin Hood a clean bill of health, merely remarking, "It's been a long time since anybody read Robin Hood to me."

But he indicated the would take no action to ban accounts of the bowman's activities from libraries and schools in the state.

SEOUL, Nov. 16 (AP)—An eight million dollar armed forces program to rebuild shattered South Korean communities and construct new projects was announced today by the eighth army commander, Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor.

The eighth army, Korean commitments "one-fifth air force, naval forces far east will administer the program, in which American servicemen in Korea are scheduled to take part.

The program, part of a half-billion-dollar effort to aid South Korea, calls for the use of military supplies in the construction of schools, churches, orphanages, libraries, highways and medical facilities.

The magazine Theater says the Soviet people want love on the Russian stage, passionate love and not any old milkop stuff that just makes love a subject for theoretical discussion.

There will be love in novels, too, and it will be the passionate, real thing. On this score Komsomol's Pravda, the young communist newspaper, has discussed a novel by Nikolai Toman called "Secret Agent," a theme popular with Russian adventure story writers.

This novelist has the hero and heroine meet in a railroad club. Obviously there are stirrings of the

grand passion in the offing. The two go for a walk. The heroine is peevish. She is looking soulful as she walks hand in hand with her hero. And what does her hero whisper lovingly in her shell-like ear here's the passage:

This, of course, is an obstacle to their fully exposing the social idea of the character. Soviet audiences expect from our actors and playwrights characters who personify great passionate love."

Rate of Population Increases In West Double U.S. Average

PORTLAND, Nov. 14—In two and one-fourth years, from April, 1950, to July 1, 1952, the population of the western states increased by 6.8 per cent—double the national average.

This was reported here today by the northwest research council of the National Association of Manufacturers.

The fact-finding council predicts a population for Idaho of approximately 1,117,000 by 1960—an increase of 128,363 over the 1950 count. The labor force of the state will be increased from 218,509 to 285,000 in the 10-year period, the council indicated.

Nationally, a population of over 177 million by 1960 and some 200

million by 1975 is foreseen. The above-average rise in population in Idaho does not allow for a prediction of this state's 1975 population, the council pointed out.

The research council pointed to this population projection as "most significant" and added that it "describes the potentialities for America's growth and paves the way for setting goals and charting the future."

By 1975, according to NAM's national economists, Americans can expect their country to have:

1. A population of approximately 200 million persons and a work force of some 90 million persons.
2. Enough physical plants, human resources, and other produc-

tion needs to provide a per capita income of \$9,200 a year, or one that is 50 per cent higher than 1952's average \$1,800 income.

"Such figures show," says the research council, "that there is no foreseeable ceiling on our capacity to produce, if we have the incentive and if we use our physical resources intelligently."

The NAM emphasized that the key to an expanding economy like that predicted for the northwest states during the coming years, is in strengthening the individual enterprise system — "the best way known to get men to work together toward desirable goals at the same time they are preserving their individual freedoms."

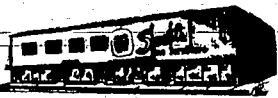

Upsets Show Independent Ballot Trend

By The Associated Press
Upsets in three special congressional elections across the country clearly point to a growing independence of the American voter.

The Republicans were favored to win two contests—in Wisconsin and New Jersey—last week. The Democrats generally were expected to win the third—in California. This time the Democrats lost.

Reasons Cited
Speculation on the reason has centered around President Eisenhower's record, the farm program, local issues, communism, political scandals and a host of other factors—all of which played a part in one election or another.

A survey of opinion by political writers in the three states shows why the confident predictions by leaders of the favored parties crumbled as the voters put on a show of independence to decide the elections.

The tradition that Wisconsin's ninth district, essentially a farming area, never had elected a Democratic congressman was upset last month.

Dissatisfaction there with the national administration as a result of falling farm prices is generally agreed to be the chief reason. But the politics and popularity of the late Rep. Merlin Hull, a Republican, figured largely in the contest.

Clauded With the ticket, a Democratic victory appeared logical.

Arthur Padruz, the Republican candidate, to succeed Hull, campaigned in straight support of the administration. Lester Johnson, the Democratic candidate, kept telling the farmers he would vote the way Hull had. The voters chose Johnson.

Similarly, the popularity of a former congressman figured in the New Jersey election amid other issues, many of them local.

In California, with two supposedly strong Republicans running in the same district and splitting the ticket, a Democratic victory appeared logical.

Educators Look to Businessmen to Save Colleges From Financial Ruin

LANCASTER, Pa., Nov. 16 (AP)—Colleges and universities face the worst financial crisis in their history.

Educators are deeply concerned. But so are a group of powerful, respected businessmen. They realize that in the survival of education may lie the survival of the American way, the preservation of the freedom to learn.

The businessmen think the answer to where the money is coming from may be themselves. Their motive is simple. They argue that the nation's 1,800 private institutions of higher learning, are perhaps America's greatest expression of freedom of thought and the democratic process. They are good for America. And what is good for America is good for American business.

True, business draws most of its executives from the colleges. But corporation leaders are not interested in higher learning simply as a pool from which to draw prospective employees. These men, whose business includes steel and oil and machinery, are concerned that young men and women continue to study the arts and sciences because of what their increased knowledge will mean to America's life.

The cause of higher education's financial crisis is inflation.

Although the cost of a college education to a student is up an average of 70 per cent over 10 years ago, it has not resolved the crisis. Colleges cannot raise tuition further without removing higher education from the grasp of millions of worthy youths.

Expert Suggests Letting Kuss See Test of H-Bombs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Atomic energy commissioner suggests that foreigners, presumably including Russia, should see a U. S. hydrogen bomb exploded as a sample of the destructive alternate to world peace.

The idea, expressed last Wednesday by Thomas E. Murray, came as America was readying another and probably more fierce hydrogen test blast and as Secretary of Defense Wilson talked of "many more discoveries in the atomic age."

Murray, the atomic energy commission member who recently announced the launching of the first program for harnessing nuclear power as industrial power, made his H-bomb suggestion in a speech at Pittsburgh.

He said first-hand observation of an H-bomb's thunder "is an essential qualification for future negotiators of the great survival issues in the years ahead." Such an American showing, he added, might persuade the Russians to match it with a demonstration of their own.

So where will the money come from? If the overwhelming majority of private educators can prevent it, the money will not come from the federal government. Federal funds, except for specific grants for specific purposes, mean federal control. And federal control, say educators everywhere, means the end of freedom of thought and expression.

The age of the big, or pre-tax, fortunes is as dead as Andrew Carnegie. Few people still have sizable fortunes and the colleges scramble for what they can. But it's often as uncertain a financing scheme as playing roulette in Reno.

Persons of means are pursued energetically these days by college presidents. Sometimes endowments contain hooks.

As an exaggerated example: Old Blawie college badly needs a chemistry lab. For years the president of Old Blawie has been emphasizing this need to old Mrs. Jones. When she dies at 88 she leaves a million to Old Blawie. But she specifies that the money go toward establishing a collection of medieval armor. It seems that her late husband was fond of medieval armor.

Then there are the alumni. Many a man who never received a single bid to a fraternity as an undergraduate finds himself the object of a friendly postal courtship by his college alumni office. Some colleges even have hired fund-raising agencies to show them clever ways to wring cash from alumni.

There are, too, numerous foundations which contribute to col-

All these fields the colleges are tilling thoroughly. Yet a New York Times survey last June disclosed that nearly half of the nation's independent colleges and universities are unable to balance their budgets.

It is obvious, say concerned corporation leaders, that the money must come from American business. It has begun—a mere trickle—it could grow into a healthy stream which would invigorate hundreds of colleges.

To develop this source, to explore feasible methods of channeling it, has begun a new initiative in New York. It's called the Council for Financial Aid to Education, Inc.

The vision focuses on two areas: the business community and the community of higher education.

U. S. Defense Agency Trims Europe Force

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—The army has quietly reduced its strength in Europe to about 20,000 men during the past nine months as part of the Eisenhower administration's "peace program."

The cutback—the numerical equivalent of an infantry division—was made in the face of official claims that the United States planned to reduce its strength in Europe.

No cut is set.

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson issued a statement—backed up by President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles—on Oct. 27 that the United States had no immediate plans for taking any troops out of Europe.

Top policy officials insisted, however, the cutback had been made in "support" elements and left actual "combat strength" committed by the United States to European defense untouched.

The United States now has five divisions and the equivalent of a sixth stationed in Europe—totaling about 100,000 men, but in addition the army has had about 100,000 other men, assigned to support units, such as communications and engineering details. It is this latter group which has been withdrawn, such as part of an army-wide economy program.

Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens admitted at a news conference Friday that some troops have been withdrawn from Europe to maintain, however, there has been "no change in the combat strength" of the seventh army in Germany.

Canadian Winter Threatens Wheat

EDMONTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Western farmers, caught by their third bumper wheat crop in a row and faced with plugged grain elevators, are taking every means possible to protect their grain from Canada's prairie winter.

A long, warm harvest season enabled some farmers to put up temporary storage bins. These were knocked together in short order. Others were not so fortunate and grain may be seen today—particularly in southern Alberta—piled in fields, awaiting the winter.

With an estimated 800,000,000 bushels of wheat still on the farms, grain has found its way into abandoned schools, churches and farm buildings and old gasoline storage tanks.

Vote on School Bond Issue Set

MCCAMMON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Residents of school district 21 will vote on a \$400,000 bond issue Dec. 1 for construction of a central high school building near Arco.

The district includes the consolidated Lavan Hot Springs, McCammon, Arco, Teton, Virginia, Swan, Lake and Hawkins Basin communities. High schools are now open for the term at Downey and McCammon.

Reporter Finds Fear-Ties Tongues of White's Friends in Gathering History

By CHARLES MERCEZ

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (AP)—Who was Harry Dexter White?

The moving spotlight catches a President and a former President of the United States. It lights on cabinet members past and present, on congressmen and businessmen.

But the central figure of today's great political drama is a ghost off the wings—the ghost of the man named White, dead five years.

When FBI reports that White was linked to communism, became a political issue the other day, few friends had a good word to say for him publicly. Fear is the dominant emotion. They dread guilt by association. So, in more than one respect, the story of White is a support drama.

When alive, White aroused many details of his early life. In the United States he was known as the former Soviet agent, Whiteaker Chambers and Elizabeth Bentley, listed their careers; member board of trustees, Export-Import Bank of Washington, since 1941; director of the International Monetary Fund, since 1945; member Executive Committee on Economic Foreign Policy; member liberated areas committee. Then his home and office address.

White always said he was born Oct. 29, 1892, in Boston. Boston city hall records show that the only Harry White born there from 1892 to 1900 was on Oct. 9, 1892. His parents were named as Isaac and Sarah, of 87 Lowell street, a tenement area. Their birthplace was listed as Russia.

School records show that Harry White attended elementary and high school in Everett, an industrial suburb of Boston. His middle name, Dexter, appears for the first time after he entered high school.

In September, 1910, he attended the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, then called Massachusetts Agricultural College. On a card there he listed under parent's name of N. J. White, 238 Hanover street, Boston. He spent one year at the university. His record was good but not brilliant—an 80A average.

Then no record can be found of him for five years.

In Washington years later, he reportedly having wide business experience. Perhaps he was in business during those years. Anyone who knows about that period of his life will not talk to a reporter.

The next public record of Harry Dexter White is April 12, 1917, when he enlisted in the U. S. army six days after the United States declared war on Germany. He was discharged in February, 1919, as a first lieutenant of infantry.

White was married before he entered the army. His wife was the former Ann Terry, a woman of a Washington spy network, she said he was her courier.

White resigned as assistant secretary of the treasury on April 30, 1946, taking the \$15,000-a-year job of U. S. director on the executive board of the international monetary fund. He left the fund in April 1947. Former President Harry F. Truman says that, when it was discovered White was "wrong," he was fired by being allowed to resign.

During World War II White's plan for the international monetary fund and world bank was fought by the renowned British economist, the Lord Lord Keynes, who complained that it unduly favored the United States. After a lengthy series of conferences, the plan that emerged at Bretton Woods, N. H., largely was White's original project. Keynes objected that it left her too small a place in the monetary fund and too big a quota in the world bank. It never joined.

At Bretton Woods, as at every negotiating conference, White was "most desired." In his positions he naturally dealt with the financial community, but was not known to businessmen generally and they did not appear to like him.

Chambers and Miss Bentley each charged that White was not a card-carrying communist but rather a communist dupe who passed information to their agents. Chambers testified before the house un-American activities committee Aug. 3, 1948.

"I can't say positively that he was a registered member of the communist party, but he certainly was a fellow traveler so far within the fold that his not being a communist would be a mistake on both sides."

When White appeared before the committee he declared in part: "There is and can be no basis in fact whatever for such a charge. The principles in which I believe and by which I live make it impossible for me ever to do a disloyal act or anything against the interests of my country."

"I believe in the right and duty of every citizen to work for, to expect and to obtain an increasing measure of political, economic and emotional freedom for all. I am opposed to discrimination in any form, whether on grounds of race, color, religion, political belief or economic status."

When he finished, there was applause in the committee room.

Dr. George B. Emerson of Pittsfield, who pronounced White dead of a heart attack on Aug. 15, 1948, says he knows nothing about him.

U. S. Benefits Study Set by Agency Chief

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell announced a study to determine whether workers get the present scale of unemployment compensation benefits to them over jobs. Mitchell said his department's study of employment security was being a pilot study in several states and is intended to be expanded to a national survey.

Benefits presently range from 50 cents to \$2 per week to a high of about \$3 per week to a high of \$10 per week for different rates for varying lengths of unemployment. The program is financed by a 1 percent tax on employer payroll.

Experience rating allowances, which reduce the rate of unemployment benefits for employers who have a high unemployment rate, are being studied. The study will also cover the full cost of unemployment insurance and the effect of the unemployment security program on the state's general economy.

The program is utilizing the services of state personnel in developing the plans and methods to be used in the study. The results of the study will be reported to the federal government.

At heart Jones wants most to go on being a social pioneer of the 20th century, doing his part in making America more prosperous and enjoying a rich full life.

things done—and a greater kick out of living—than you do.

New Laws for Curbing Wild Horses Urged

BOISE, Nov. 16 (AP)—A radically new law is needed to solve the problem of shooting stray horses from federal grazing land in Idaho, a federal official told the Idaho state advisory board Saturday.

Chester P. Seely, Portland, chief regional range manager of the bureau of land management, said that horses are running wild on government land because present law makes it too expensive to round them up and get rid of them.

Seely said officials see a possible "ideal" solution in a recent Oregon law which makes it legal for federal range tenders to round up the animals and sell them on 48 hours notice. In Idaho the trespass horses, once caught, can be sold only after 30 days.

But the constitutionality of the Oregon roundup law has been challenged in the state courts, Seely pointed out.

"It just doesn't pay to feed them for 30 days," said Seely. "The way it is now, no attempt is being made to impound the horses."

The board voted to pass the problem to the national advisory council, which meets in Denver next January to recommend changes in the federal range code to the department of the interior.

In other business, the board appointed a committee to study the problem of keeping livestock off highways by means of fencing.

The board elected Fay Waddups, Moore, chairman; Leavitt Taylor, Adine, vice chairman; and Clifford J. Vaughn, Brunau, secretary-treasurer.

Waddups and Vaughn were elected sheep and cattle representatives, respectively, for Idaho to the national council of the bureau.

C. J. Russell, Mountain Home, was named alternate sheep representative and A. J. Zollinger, Mackay, alternate cattle representative.

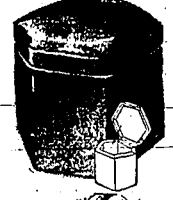
