## Truman Ducked in 'Spy' Cases, Brownell Aways

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—Atty.-Gen. Brownell declared today former President Truman showed an "unwillingness" to face the facts about communist espionage in high places in government.

Brownell, in what amounted to a reply to Truman's blast at him last night, testified before the Senate Internal Security subcommittee with FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover also in attendance. Chairman Jenner, R., Ind., told reporters Hoover would testify, however himself told reporters "it will depend on development" then and if he testifies.

"I'll answer any questions the committee wants to ask me," he said.

Although interest centered on the Harry Dexter White case, Brownell charged that Truman denied White despite an FBI report naming White as a Soviet spy. Jenner rebuffed the broader scope of the committee's study.

In an opening statement, Jenner said he would call for evidence of White's espionage by high government officials in past years, and declared that the committee was not a question of one man, or even of one case.

## Woolgrowers Bestow Honor on T.C. Bacon

T. C. Bacon, 1347 Maple avenue, was named Monday night to the University of Idaho's Hickman hall of fame, a gallery of pictures of the outstanding men in Idaho's sheep industry. This recognition of one of Magie Valley's pioneer sheep ranchers was announced at the annual banquet at the Idaho Wool Growers association convention in Boise.

His picture will be hung in the agricultural building at the university alongside pictures of five other Idahoans who were singled out in years past for this honor. Among them are C. W. Hickman for whom the gallery is named. Dr. Hickman headed for years the university's animal husbandry department, and the gallery was created by his friends and former students.

Bacon, 60, served as the woolgrowers president from 1924 to 1927, and again in 1935 and 1936.

In announcing the honor, Highlighting the banquet, P. R. Gladhart, Spokane, president of the Hickman club, which sponsors the gallery, and manager of the Old Union Stockyards company, paid tribute to the Twin Falls resident as the man who revived Idaho's sheep industry during the industry's darkest years following World War I.

## Twin Falls to Go Under City Rabies Quarantine To Stem Disease Threat

The city of Twin Falls will go under virtual rabies quarantine Friday as a result of an ordinance passed by the city commission Monday night. No steps have been taken in Twin Falls county to curb the spread of the disease, but Dr. M. R. Kellogg, medical director of the Twin Falls county health department, said Tuesday he has recommended to the county commissioners that a control law be passed by that group when it meets on Friday. The state's quarantine area extends from Burley to the Caspia-Twin Falls county line and includes all of Minidoka county. While no official steps have been taken in Jerome and Lincoln county with reference to the disease, a campaign of vaccination of dogs and cats is being carried out in Jerome and Shoshone.

## Compromise Plan Offered For Talks

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Nov. 17 (AP)—The United Nations political committee today offered a compromise plan to permit neutral nations to take part in the long-drawn-out Korean peace conference if their help is needed later to reach agreement.

U. S. Ambassador Arthur H. Dean made the compromise proposal at a meeting with the communists in a subcommittee to arrange the place and composition of the peace conference. Under the compromise plan, the subcommittee would set the time of the conference met at the same time and proposed it be held sometime in December.

Dean said the U. S. was willing to "reconsider" the United Nations and South Korea that they recognize their opposition to neutral nation participation under these circumstances.

If the conference becomes "inconclusive" the withdrawal of foreign troops from Korea and unification of the peninsula, and it "appeared desirable" to have other nations take part.

### Reds Staging East-German Terror Wave

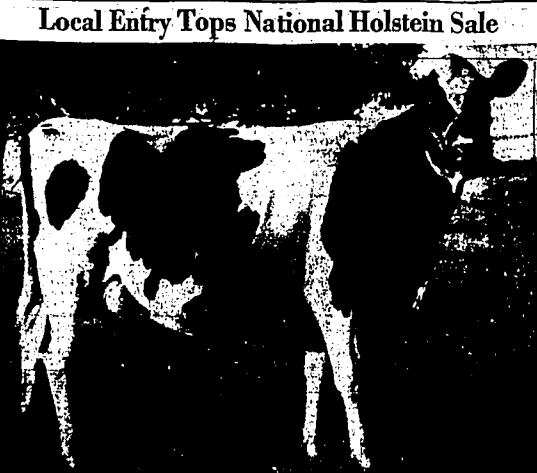
BERLIN, Nov. 17 (AP)—The communist government in Berlin today announced a "wave of terror" against the Soviet zone of Germany to mark the 17th anniversary of the Nazi-Soviet pact.

Thomas G. Timmerman, MAJ-Gen., in a statement released by his office today, said the communist government is determined to "uncover alleged spies, saboteurs and terrorists" and to "represent the most violent attack by the communists on the population since the formation of the Soviet zone government in 1949."

The statement said more persons than ever before have been arrested by the communist government since a campaign to wipe out anti-Reds was launched last June 17, as well as to use still in opposition.

The number of persons arrested, the severity of sentences and the frequency of conspiracy, terror and sabotage indicate recognition by the communist authorities that the active resistance of the population has not been broken and their present determination to try to break it with raw terror, Timmerman said.

He added that a study of the West zone since Sept. 18, 1949, showed that 74 persons were sentenced to death in at least 20 separate trials. Of these, 11 were sentenced to death and 11 to life imprisonment, Timmerman said.

### Ordinance to Restrict Use of House Trailers for City Area

An ordinance restricting parking of trailers in the city was read for the first time at Monday night city commission meeting. City Manager V. H. Lattimore said the practice was permitted during the housing emergency which followed World War II.

The ordinance will be read again next week, then voted on the following Monday night. Lattimore stressed that the ordinance does not affect trailer parks on trailer sale lots where unoccupied trailers are kept for sale.

In the first residential districts, trailers may be stored on residential property if they are not used for living quarters. They must not be connected to water, sewer or electric lines and must be owned by the resident and not stored for financial gain.

In second and third residential areas, trailers may be used for temporary quarters if the residence on the property provides toilet and water facilities. Only one trailer may be parked on a residential lot and parking on vacant lots is prohibited.

An inspection certificate costing \$2.50 yearly is required for all trailers. Maximum penalties for violation are a fine of \$300 and a jail sentence of 30 days.

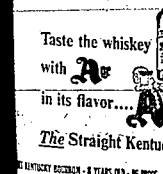

### FBI Chief Will Hew to Line If He Is Queried in Spy Case

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover will hew to the truth and let the chips fall where they may if he is summoned before congressional investigators of the Harry Dexter White case, the United Press was informed today.

As of now, there is no certainty that the FBI director will be called. Chairman William E. Jenner, R.-Ind., of the senate internal security subcommittee planned to discuss the matter with Atty.-Gen. Herbert Brownell, jr. today.

The nature of Brownell's testimony before Jenner's subcommittee could be the determining factor in whether direct testimony from Hoover will be sought. Some thought

Brownell would put in the record documentary evidence that the FBI director in no wise consented to any plan for keeping White in the government, but instead made plain his belief that White should go.

Up to the moment that former President Truman addressed the microphone in Kansas City last night, associated with Hoover felt that Hoover was being drawn closer to an appearance before the senate subcommittee.

The former President had indicated he would discuss Hoover's attendance at a conference on White just before he was transferred from the treasury to the international monetary fund in 1945.

Truman's defenders already were on record with statements that Hoover had agreed with Associate Justice Tom C. Clark and the late Fred M. Vinson (then attorney-general and treasury secretary, respectively) that White should be permitted to join the monetary fund so the FBI could continue to shadow him—perhaps turn up some of his associates in what was believed to be an espionage net.

Truman gave substantially that explanation in his broadcast with one important change—he did not mention Hoover. He said only that the decision to let White remain in the government resulted from a conference between Vinson, Clark, and other government officials.
