

Mundt Warns Of Threat to U. S. Survival

by the administration gives hope of a change in the U. S. toward socialism, the senator observed as he began an outline of national policies in the House today.

President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles sounded the battle note in the House today in an all-out effort if the communists should start the showing there again.

In view of this stand, he said, Russia and China do not want to start fresh hostilities.

Terminating the postwar foreign policy of appeasement, he said this nation gave the Balkans to the Reds and set out Poland for security of this nation.

When China was traded for further security in the U. S., it was the most disgraceful page in the history of the nation, he declared.

The Communist survival of containment which followed was an improvement but came too late because the communists already were too strong, the senator noted.

Cites Failure
He termed the postwar failure because it resulted in the Korean war. Any policy which results in war is a failure, he stated.

The policy advocated by this administration, he said, is one of liberation, a long slow process by which the nations sold out by earlier policies, it is purpose is to succeed, not merely to contain, he pointed out.

Purpose of the new policy, Mundt said, is to "stop" enough of the U. S. to set up its own defense and keep peace for several years. This road cannot stand peace, he said.

He went on to describe allied defenses in the Atlantic, Pacific, and Arctic and missile and radar developments.

Atms Area Noted
Warning of what could happen in the event of a nuclear attack on this nation, he said the answer to the whole problem was to reduce the strength of the Communist threat to the point where it could not cause another war. And that, he continued, is the purpose of the present foreign policy.

He then launched into a description of three investigations conducted by the congressional committee headed by Sen. Joseph McCarthy.

The senator advised his audience to watch the news for developments in the Ft. Monmouth, N. J., radar probe.

The audience applauded when he lauded President Eisenhower for ordering government employees to testify in hearings or lose their jobs.

Relates Case
Touching on the Henry Dexter White case, he said White was named as a communist spy by two former members of the House.

Concluding, he pleaded for a re-examination of the spy case out of the hands of the revolutionary war era.

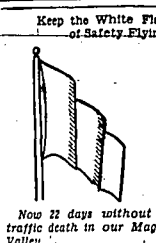

Touching on government aid for schools because of home-education families on government land, Warner said the student will receive about 200 per cent of certain requirements are met.

Secondly, building funds from the state are not forthcoming unless the local districts are doing all they can toward building.

Government aid for building a central high school east of Paul at an extra cost of \$100,000, he said, is the purpose of the present foreign policy.

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Kidnap Funds Hunt Spurred By Testimony

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 19 (AP)—Spurred by disclosures at the Greenwald kidnap trial, top St. Louis police authorities are renewing their inquiry into the big mystery of the security detail case: What happened to the missing \$102,700 in ransom money?

New questions were raised by the confession of kidnap-killer Carl Austin Hill, given to FBI agents and made public for the first time in the trial at Kansas City.

Hill said he had \$527,000 of the \$600,000 ransom in the room at the town house apartment complex when he was arrested here Oct. 6. He had just completed an inventory of the money at the time, Hill said.

The confessed killer also said he was positive the two suitcases and a brief case containing the ransom were not taken with him to the Newstead avenue district police station immediately after his arrest.

These and other portions of his confession were in direct conflict with previous statements by resigned Police Lieut. Louis Shoulters, who made the arrest.

U. N. Council Studies Blast Against Raid

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 19 (AP)—The United Nations security council today studied a resolution by the United States, Britain and France expressing "the strongest condemnation" of Israel for last month's raid on the Jordanian village of Sidon.

The resolution, introduced last night, called the raid in which 43 persons were killed a "retaliatory act" which can only "reduce the chance of peace."

Israel immediately denounced the measure as "unfair, one-sided and discriminatory," and one which was "bound to increase tension" in the Holy Land.

Dr. Charles Malik, Lebanon, the only Arab state represented in the security council, reserved comment on the resolution. But he said he still planned to introduce a resolution of his own. It would call on Israel to punish those responsible for the Sidon raid and demand compensation for the victims.

The security council will take up the bid three resolutions Friday.

Watkins, here on his way home from a middle eastern tour, said the White case should make it clear to Europeans that there is considerable foundation for reports of "communist espionage and infiltration of the U. S. government."

The purchase brings to 222,281,111 pounds the total amount bought by the department since March. This is the equivalent of 80,000 head of cattle.

Boosts for Fruit Exports Planned

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Benson has set up a long-range program to develop export markets for fruits and fruit products.

He said the program, the result of recent conferences with fruit industry leaders, will emphasize development of continuous long-range markets abroad to cut down surpluses.

He said the department will work "actively" to remove trade barriers on American fruit and encourage special programs to assist in foreign marketing of apples, pears, oranges, lemons, grapefruit, plums, grapes and dried fruits.

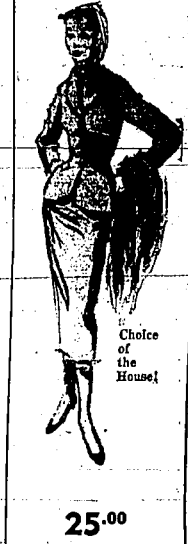

Polish Stand Blocks POW Parley Plans

PARMOUTH, Ore., Nov. 10 (AP)—The Indian chairman of the commission handling unrepatriated prisoners called off today's meeting and reports that Polish members plan to wreck the five-nation "neutral" organization.

Lt.-Gen. K. Talmayra also canceled the meeting set for Friday to gain time to try to end the most serious crisis he has had since his committee took charge of prisoners returning to go home.

Reliable sources said the Poles were angry at the Indians for calling off prisoner interviews indefinitely. The Indians have told the committee they must hold interviews compound by compound.

Communist propagandists precipitated the Indian action by recently getting through only half a compound daily, demanding that rest of the compound be brought back each following day.

The Poles have drawn up a resolution criticizing the Indians for their handling of the situation. They submitted the resolution at Wednesday's meeting.

Walked Out Before—The delegation previously walked out on the commission when the Indians refused to force anti-communist North Koreans to hear "come home" talks by red persuaders.

But they returned a few days later, however, when the North Koreans left their compounds voluntarily only after a ultimatum on an overwhelming basis.

A permanent committee of one of the member nations possibly could wreck the commission.

Arraignment Set For Polygamists

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 10 (AP)—Arraignment of 96 defendants in the Short Creek polygamy case is scheduled in Kingman Nov. 15, Ariz. Gov. Ross P. Jones said today.

Jones said the defendants have abandoned efforts to obtain a change of venue from Mohave county to Maricopa county after court at Phoenix. The state had not opposed such a change, since trial of cases would be more convenient in Phoenix.

At the request of Mohave county Judge J. W. Packer, the records pertaining to the investigation and arrests have been returned to Kingman, in preparation for arraignment.

The members of the united effort cut from Short Creek face charges of conspiring to violate state laws against open and notorious cohabitation, statutory rape and contributing to the delinquency of minors.

Jordan Sees Shift On Flood Control

BOZEMAN, Mont., Nov. 10 (AP)—Jordan predicted Wednesday the army corps of engineers hearing in Corvallis Friday will show a shift in attacking the problem of flood control along the Snake river and its tributaries.

He explained that such a change would be evident in that the engineers are turning their attention to exploring headwater storage sites rather than those along the main stem—the Snake river.

The Clearwater river, for instance, is noted for its extremely high flood levels. There are no dams now on this wild, uncontrolled stream, the governor said.

Jordan plans to attend the hearing, primarily as a spectator. "I may have something to say after I have listened for awhile," he added.

Indians Angered As Man Is Killed

TOWAOC, Colo., Nov. 10 (AP)—An uneasy truce existed today between police-officers and 1,000 Indians angered by the fatal shooting of a young tribe member by a policeman.

Wendell Spearman, Ute tribal manager on this southwestern Colorado Indian reservation, said the Indians "deeply resented" the shooting of 23-year-old Clarence Hight by Towao Indian policeman Jack Hammond, 33, yesterday.

Sheriff A. W. Anderson of nearby Corvallis, Colo., sent three Arizona county deputies here to protect the policeman. He said Hammond shot Hight in self defense while questioning the Indian concerning an earlier shooting of his father, Julian Hight, 42.

"Reliable Source"—He said he got his information from "reliable sources" he did not identify.

McCormack's contention follows a number of published estimates, ranging up to 20 billion dollars or more, on what it would cost to lighten substantially the existing air screen around most of the United States and Canada.

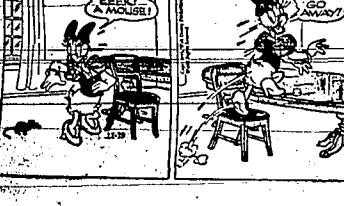

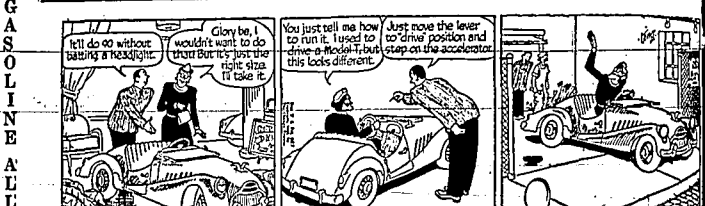

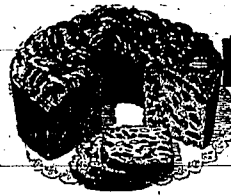
