Arms Not Key To War Halt, 'Ike' Declares

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—President Eisenhower said Thursday true world peace can be won only through application of spiritual and moral values—and not by military weapons, including "the most terrifying instruments of destruction that science has produced."

The President spoke informally at a Catholic university of America convention marking the inauguration of Bishop Bryan J. McEntegart as the university's new rector.

Mr. Eisenhower was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree and was given a citation which declared he "has been fearless in opposing and condemning communism and the crimes committed in its name."

The President told an audience of about 3,500 persons in the university gymnasium:

"Those who seek peace in terms of military strength alone, I am certain, are doomed to fail in the agony of the battlefield."

"There is no peace only in tanks and in guns and in planes and in bombs—even with the most terrifying instruments of destruction that science has produced."

The group has been assigned to report on all phases of juvenile delinquency, including the use of narcotics by youngsters. It plans to hold hearings later in various parts of the country.

Dr. Eliot, a grey haired, kindly faced woman, testified there was a 20 per cent increase in juvenile delinquency from 1948 to 1953 and the prospect for the future is even more serious.

House Group May Scan Meat Grading Practice in Markets

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—Rep. William S. Hill, R., Colo., introduced today a house agriculture subcommittee he heads may consider legislation to make sure housewives get the grade of beef they pay for.

Leaving here today for a meeting of the U. N. food and agriculture organization in Rome, he said his subcommittee on livestock problems may "take a look at beef price spreads" when congress reconvenes in January.

The agriculture department already is investigating the spread between the price of cattle on the hoof and the price of beef at the market. After a preliminary check of grocery advertisements, Agriculture Secretary Benson said last week the spread seemed "reasonable" to him.

Hill, however, believes congress may want to go over the same ground and his subcommittee also may request funds for an investigation of beef "upgrading" between the slaughterhouse and the retail market.

"Maybe we should start something in legislation to make sure the roasts a housewife buys carries the same grade as the steer it came from," he said.

Any legislation of this kind might involve compulsory government grading of all beef, a highly controversial subject in the meat industry. Government grading is now voluntary, and some stores sell beef stamped with the familiar government grades of U. S. commercial, good, and choice, and prime, while others use their own brand names. The cattle market has "improved quite a bit" in recent weeks, Hill said. Heavy government buying of

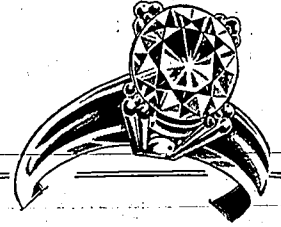
