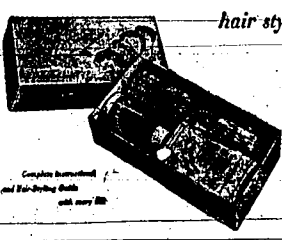

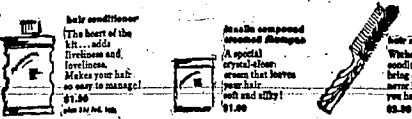

INOCULATION SIDLIGHTS
Mass inoculation of dogs to avoid a possible statewide epidemic of rabies has produced a number of interesting sidelights.

Most likely, the usual hysteria that accompanies such development with respect to dogs and cats that "are acting funny." And for those who dislike dogs it will provide an opportunity for undue alarm and false rumors. In some instances, certain individuals may attempt to take unfair advantage of the situation, that is, the more reason why dog owners should exercise every care in conforming to the present emergency regulations.

Naturally, the health authorities are well within their rights in recommending the drastic steps being taken, and they are commended for their prompt and thorough action.

The only other thought to be added in that connection is that everyone remain level-headed and offer his whole-hearted cooperation. To become unduly alarmed or to complain about the restrictions will only complicate and prolong the quarantine.

One of the most interesting sidelights brought out by the mass inoculations of household pets is the profound relationship existing between children and their dogs and cats.

The writer could not help being impressed by two cases he happened to observe at one of the local veterinary offices while the inoculations were going on.

A boy, approximately 10 years old, had his large mongrel shepherd dog well in tow with an extra heavy rope which he grasped firmly with both hands.

"How much does it cost to have your dog given the shot?" he asked the woman attendant.

When advised that it would cost him \$2, the boy, evidently regarding that amount as a small fortune, remained resolute nevertheless. His dog, it was obvious, was one of his greatest possessions.

Another youngster, considerably smaller and not too widely dressed, presented the very young puppy to his breast as he also inquired as to the cost of the inoculation. But he was determined beyond any doubt to give his puppy first consideration regardless of any cost.

Those who do not like dogs should view some of these demonstrations of the deep affection youngsters have for their pets. Such companionship provides one of the finest and most wholesome influences anyone could hope to develop in a youngster's mind.

MUNDT'S OBSERVATIONS
During his visit in Twin Falls, Sen. Karl E. Mundt of South Dakota expressed several opinions which bring the issue of Communism into sharper focus from a different point of view.

Wedding Communists out of the U. S. government, he said, is not a matter of partisanship or patriotism, but a matter of survival. The progress of the world Communist menace, which he traced from 1917 when the Reds came into power in Russia by revolution, was outlined in detail as it affects this country.

He described Communism briefly as "purely and simply a political racket which puts a few politicians in absolute power over a nation."

Just how serious is the menace of Communism, how many in this country, even in high government departments, are inclined to minimize? According to Senator Mundt, there are three things that are being done in the world, Americanism and Communism, and the decision as to which will predominate in the world must come in the next five years.

The new foreign policy advocated by the present national administration, he believes, gives hope of a change in the trend toward socialism and communism. He contrasted that policy with the postwar foreign strategy which he described as one of appeasement and dilution.

The most frightening of his remarks was a warning of what might happen to this country in the event of a "no-no" election.

"The answer to the whole problem," he said, "is to reduce the strength of the Communist menace to the point where it could be crushed by a strong, united front. That is the purpose of the present foreign policy."

The senator did not share the opinion held by some that the White House should have been more forthcoming. Instead, he expressed the opinion that a complete check of the record should be made.

"It is a serious thing that is being foisted with," he said, "and should make a clean breast of the whole affair."

Inasmuch as the detailed facts in the White case, as set forth by Senator Mundt, that too many well known Communists were uncovered in connection with Communist activities in this country, for the matter to be whitewashed, he said, is a "red herring."

Respective of the politics underlying and confusing the entire scene, the American people and their members in congress are entitled to know the truth. That's the only way they can be sure that Communism isn't destroying our way of life.

The old Teapot dome scandal is a prevarication from a political standpoint, even though the embarrassment fell upon the Teapot dome. But it was a good thing to have it cleared up, so that the people could become aware of the possibility of such cover-ups.

We're still hearing about Teapot dome now and then. And from time to time, it won't hurt us a bit to be reminded that the Teapot dome was a success in working their way into our highest government offices, and stealing top military secrets, right out from under our noses. And that's the kind of thing that is describing the whole thing.

There was never time in our history when the American people had better reasons for wanting the truth about what's going on behind the scenes in Washington.

WASHINGTON—Why all the excitement and reaction over naming a subcommittee to investigate Truman, Justice Clark and cabinet members to testify before the Senate? Is it a constitutional committee? Inquires Mrs. L. S. Springfield, Mass. "Preserving their dignity and prestige is no important as finding out how Russian spies can climb high in our government, even after their disloyalty has been reported by the FBI."

Answer: It is difficult to discuss this question clearly in the absence of a complete list of the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives. General Brown's charges have provoked an order of inquiry to obtain the facts about an extremely important matter. It is a matter of race for headline-hungry Republicans on Capitol Hill, both individuals and committees, and a generally low-down performance. What should have been high drama has been degraded into political buffoonery.

QUESTIONING SHOULD BE AUTHORIZED—Nevertheless, congressional bodies should have the authority to question, publicly and sensibly, members of the executive branch. This is a constitutional amendment is necessary to give them that power.

Otherwise, a President or supreme court justice can avoid a complete examination of their official conduct simply by citing the provision for the tripartite separation and independence of the executive, legislative and judicial branches.

It is true that the founding fathers, mindful of British monarch's domination of Parliament, did make the three branches separate and equal, and intended that they should be noncooperative and hostile toward each other.

EVIDENCE WAS NECESSARY—I covered the Senate investigation of the Teapot dome scandal and the investigation of the Rosenberg case. In both cases, in which former cabinet members Paul, Daugherty and Denby testified, their evidence was necessary to prove that fraud and bribery had figured in the giveaway of valuable oil lands. They did not refuse to appear under a protest that it was an invasion of their constitutional rights.

Justice Clark has resorted to this excuse on several occasions when his actions as attorney-general were under scrutiny. He bowed out with regard to his own prosecution because Chief Justice Brandeis failed to prosecute internal revenue violators, and the other day in the Harry Dexter White matter.

Now, although the query makes no sense to the Truman-Clark relationship, what is to prevent a President, knowing or suspecting that his chief law officer has been involved in shady or partisan operations, from asking the White House to investigate and punish by naming him to the supreme court of the United States?

Think that one over!

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

NEW YORK—Hearing in mind the revelation of Harry Truman's intellectual and political shortcomings by Max Lowenthal, published by Jonathan Daniels in "Man of Independence" we are inclined to say we better understand Truman's political shortcomings by reading some of the records of congress and the great.

"Man of Independence" is a friendly biography of a man who was the editor of the Raleigh News and Observer and who seems not to have had an ordinary cut of our society about the meaning of facts and figures. He was a man of experience. He served Truman as a press secretary. He was the first selected Truman to be vice president and that Truman, with the aid of Lowenthal, made a familiar citizen's guide to describe the poverty which deterred Truman from considering the proposition.

Truman then was a senator doing much of the work of a subcommittee investigating Daniels' plainly reported as a lesser and subordinate personality who was clearly taken over.

With this background, let us read excerpts from George Sokoloff's column of last May 8, as follows: "I have known Max Lowenthal for many years. He has established a methodical surveillance system to make certain that no one in the Congressional Record and his official record because of Mr. Lowenthal's political shenanigans."

Cong. George Dondero, Michigan, as reported in the Congressional Record of Sept. 1, 1935, puts it as follows:

"I want to discuss a man of mystery and for the first time take off the mask behind which he has been hiding for years. . . . He works through others. He has reached positions of great power. Today I wish to reveal to you the man behind the scenes. . . ."

Dondero recorded the many influential Lowenthal had held, dates from 1917, and said:

"By pulling strings he acquired the list of advisers on disposal of Jewish property in Germany. He had as an assistant, George Elmer Wheeler, the American Jew, the president and manager who denounced the land of his birth and asked communist-controlled Congressional floor. . . ."

"The usually accurate 'Human Events' for Sept. 25, 1946, reported: 'It may be coincidental—but Lowenthal's appointment, General Clay has permitted leaders of the Soviet-sponsored Socialist Workers party to address meetings in the American zone.'

"David R. Wahl was a protégé of Lowenthal's for the foreign economic administration. The files of the civil service commission and the committee on un-American activities reveal him as one whose loyalty has been questioned and one with powerful forces who owe to his aid."

In his own appearance before the house committee, Lowenthal said:

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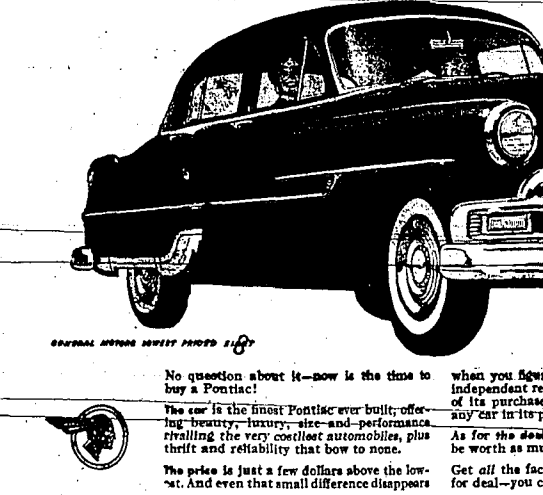

Mass inoculation of dogs to avoid a possible statewide epidemic of rabies has produced a number of interesting sidelights.

Most likely, the usual hysteria that accompanies such development with respect to dogs and cats that "are acting funny." And for those who dislike dogs it will provide an opportunity for undue alarm and false rumors. In some instances, certain individuals may attempt to take unfair advantage of the situation, that is, the more reason why dog owners should exercise every care in conforming to the present emergency regulations.

Naturally, the health authorities are well within their rights in recommending the drastic steps being taken, and they are commended for their prompt and thorough action.

The only other thought to be added in that connection is that everyone remain level-headed and offer his whole-hearted cooperation. To become unduly alarmed or to complain about the restrictions will only complicate and prolong the quarantine.

One of the most interesting sidelights brought out by the mass inoculations of household pets is the profound relationship existing between children and their dogs and cats.

The writer could not help being impressed by two cases he happened to observe at one of the local veterinary offices while the inoculations were going on.

A boy, approximately 10 years old, had his large mongrel shepherd dog well in tow with an extra heavy rope which he grasped firmly with both hands.

When advised that it would cost him \$2, the boy, evidently regarding that amount as a small fortune, remained resolute nevertheless. His dog, it was obvious, was one of his greatest possessions.

Another youngster, considerably smaller and not too widely dressed, presented the very young puppy to his breast as he also inquired as to the cost of the inoculation. But he was determined beyond any doubt to give his puppy first consideration regardless of any cost.

Groups Okay Proposal for Dam Projects

OROPINO, Nov. 21 (U.)—A proposal by the army engineers for three dams on the Clearwater and Snake rivers was almost unanimously approved here Friday, although some wildlife representatives said fish and game would be hurt by the projects.

More than 400 persons attended a meeting at which Col. F. B. Tracy of the Walla Walla army engineers outlined a projected revision of the group's 1930 report.

It calls for a dam at the Mountain Sheep site on the Clearwater and two smaller dams on the Clearwater at Bruce's covey and Tenny covey.

The Idaho-Cregon-Washington Hells Canyon association qualified its approval, saying it would depend on whether the dam would be built at the site previously outlined dam project.

The Mountain Sheep site, above the mouth of the Salmon, is 80 miles below the controversial Hells Canyon site, where the association favors putting a high federal dam.

Bureau Project

Mountain Sheep would be built by the bureau of reclamation while the two Clearwater dams would be projects of the reclamation.

Gov. Len Jordan told the group he had long been interested in up-river work in Idaho and that the Clearwater Sheep site, Jordan opposes the Hells Canyon project.

South Idaho sportsmen said benefits of the dams would outweigh damage to the game.

They said the reservoir pools would flood less than 1 per cent of the deer and elk range and that the Clearwater water is not an important spawning stream for salmon.

Game Laws Feared

The Idaho fish and game department and representatives of Nezperce Indians said they would cut into the big game population and the salmon runs.

They said dams at the two Clearwater dams would make it feasible to build two additional dams on the Snake between Lewiston and the Columbia river. He said present water rights would be lost only of Joe Harbor dam.

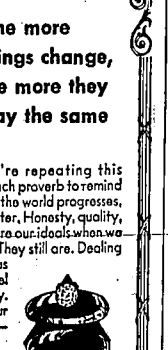

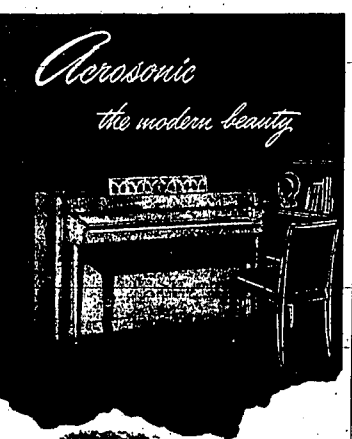

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IDAHO VANDALS CLOSE '53 SEASON BY DROPPING EIGHTH GAME

Lindley, Campbell Power Utah State To 19-7 Victory

Cougars End Season With 25-20 Upset

BOISE, Nov. 21 (AP)—Earl Lindley and DelRay Campbell powered Utah State to a 19-7 victory over University of Idaho Saturday for the Aggies' eighth win of the season and the Vandals' eighth loss. Except for a 63-yard, scoring-pass from quarterback John Karwick to Lindley, the Aggies played almost exclusively on power plays.

Lindley, the nation's second-leading scorer before the game, made two touchdowns to boost his season total to 81 points. His first clinaxed a 30-yard drive after Tom Lorenz intercepted a Vandal pass.

The Vandals gave the 6,000 chollared partisans their only reason to cheer when Larry Correll intercepted a Utah State pass on the 35 and galloped untouched to Idaho's only score. However, the underdog Vandals remained in striking distance when Lorenz circled the end for six yards and Utah State's final score.

Idaho held the Aggies even statistically the first half, but weakened in the second to wrap up with a net of 89 yards to Utah State 20-19.

The victory made the Aggies the first team in the school's history to win eight games in a season. Idaho wound up a dismal season with only one victory to its credit.

The Vandals took a fourth-down gamble after receiving the opening kickoff, and Carroll Walker made the inches needed for a first down on Idaho's 45. Four plays later they gambled again, but lost when George Eldam's pass was intercepted.

In the end, Utah State punted to the end-zone, and started toward its first touchdown on the next play when DelRay Campbell's pass out of the air, Campbell and Lindley alternated at hitting the line, with Lindley going over from the side.

Idaho had a similar chance in the second when Del Ray intercepted a pass on his 48. The Vandals moved to the Utah State 30 before the ball was intercepted by Utah State.

Utah State had three other punts in the first half, and the Vandals were caught flat-footed on the second play after halftime when Kermit Fickel back and passed 21 yards to Lindley, who ran 14 yards to score. Campbell followed with his only conversion of the game.

Correll's score put the Vandals within six points of the favored Aggies, and Utah State struck back with a march that carried to Idaho 24 before the Vandals took the ball on downs. Neither team could score until late in the game when Ted Randall recovered a fumble by DelRay on Utah State's 47. With Campbell ripping off runs of 10 and 13 yards, and Kamick one for 16, the Aggies pushed to the six to set the stage for Lorenz's scoring run.

Last-Ditch Pass Gives Notre Dame 14-14 Tie

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 21 (AP)—Iowa's hard-hitting young Hawkeyes rocked Notre Dame's national prestige Saturday, holding the country's premier football team to a 14-14 tie and missing what would have been the season's greatest upset by a matter of seconds.

Notwithstanding, Notre Dame, rated by the America's top 100 as the best team in the country, suffered the first pick in a season that through seven previous games had been all-victories.

Gophers Tie Badgers 21-21

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 21 (AP)—Unpredictable Minnesota shattered Wisconsin's dream of a second straight Big Ten title share Saturday by banging a 21-21 tie on the Badgers, and narrowly missed the winning touchdown in the final minute.

The Irish overcame the first deficit mostly because of the quick-thinking of their big tackle, Frank Varrichione.

The huge Notre Dame lineman screamed and staggered as the final seconds of the second period ticked away and an umpire called an "injured player" timeout with just one second remaining in the half.

Notre Dame, at this point, was on the Iowa 22. Quarterback Guglielmino passed having accounted for 58 yards in a drive that started on the Irish 47.

With time for only one play, and with Varrichione duly replaced, Guglielmino spotted and Dan Shannon untended at the Hawk goal line and threw to him for a touchdown. Quarterback Schneider kicked the point that gave the Irish a 7-7 deadlock.

Then, after Iowa went ahead 14-7 on Bob Becker's four-yard pass to Frank Gilliam with two minutes left in the game, Guglielmino again capped a return Notre Dame march—this one for 48 yards—in the final nine minutes, and the Irish trailed 14-14.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21 (AP)—UCLA hammered out a 13-0 victory over the University of Southern California Saturday to all intents captured the Rose bowl bid for the Pacific Coast conference. The triumph, coupled with the 21-21 tie between Stanford and California at Palo Alto ostensibly sent the Bruins rolling into the New Year's day clash at Pasadena.

The score here gave UCLA a 6-1 conference record, against Stanford's record of five victories, one defeat and one tie.

UCLA, performing before 63,356 fans, plus a national television audience of 10 million, wrapped up the game with a touchdown in the second quarter and clinched it with a field goal in the fourth quarter.

With this game in the Bruins' laps, attention of the roaring crowd turned to radio and loud speaker reports from the game at Palo Alto.

Anyone can picture the wild hysteria among the Bruins thousands when California tied the Uclans and then when that game ended.

Official vote of the conference must be taken, but it appeared certain that UCLA would get the bowl bid.

The UCLA triumph was hardly an easy one. Above all, the Trojans fought his way inside the right side of the field. The Bruins scored their first touchdown on a one-yard drive over a heap of cardinal and gold jerseys.

Big Paul Larson, held to a minus two yards in the first half, fought his way inside the right side of his line from six yards out to bring up the final touchdown.

The drama in what was really a rout was the final drive. Larson stole a game on a brilliant punt return by a fourth string UCLA halfback, Bill Davis. He rammed 21 yards to the Trojan 10 to set up the all important first score.

Ernie Williams, Cameron's alternate, picked up two yards, Davey Moore, Willmarth six around high end, and Tom Henson Davenport smashed over.

Pete Dallas, who was later to miss two first down contributions the extra point.

Oregon State Upsets Ducks In 7-0 Game

EDMONTE, Ore., Nov. 21 (AP)—Coach Rip Taylor, Oregon State, continued his mastery over Oregon as his team again upset the favored Ducks Saturday 7-0.

It was Sikes' only losing season in his 11 years at Kansas. But his three-year contract was due to expire March 1, and there were reports from reliable sources that it would not be renewed.

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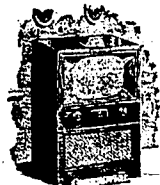
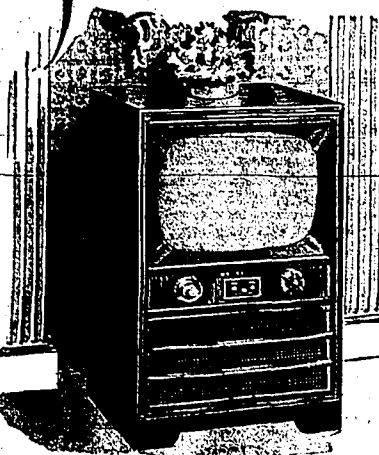
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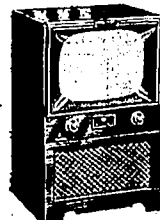

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

To bridge the distance between the sands of the Sahara and the snow-covered slopes of SUN VALLEY, although a third of the globe is involved, is a matter of only a few hours by modern transportation. But to bridge the gap between the customs of the Arabs and those of the people in the western world is another matter.

Although born in Iowa, Mrs. Andre Lapeyre has found the gap in customs much greater than the distance between the two areas. She is living in KETCHICUM as her 12-year-old daughter, Anne Lapeyre, can go to school in this country. While her daughter attends school, Mrs. Lapeyre teaches at BELLEVUE high school.

Fifteen years ago Mrs. Lapeyre was married to M. Andre Lapeyre in France and since then has spent most of her time in Morocco and Algeria where her husband has been stationed.

Mrs. Lapeyre was graduated from Iowa State university and received her master's degree in history and education at Columbia university. To write her thesis she decided she needed to travel and work in Paris with the wife of one of her professors. While in France she met and was married to the major who is a graduate of Saint Gyr, France's West Point.

She lived in France throughout World War II and claims that living in a city of 500,000 with no heating, gas or lights and with

no one to permit her husbands to divorce them.

The Bellevue teacher said children in France consider it a privilege to attend school and compulsory attendance is not necessary. Morals and manners are taught at home and the problem of discipline never arises in school.

French children start school when 4 years old and the school day and year are longer than in this country. All French teachers are appointed in Paris and the schools are standardized as well as being centralized. Pupils must pass examinations to be promoted. There are no extracurricular activities and only a small amount of music and art.

Mrs. Lapeyre said she never saw a wooden building in France, Morocco or Algeria. A great respect is shown for property and an architect is responsible for all repairs needed on a building he has erected for 20 years after its completion. In turn, the contractor is responsible to the architect.

In French social life, Mrs. Lapeyre said the girls are chaperoned even after they are engaged to be married. She says she has known many Frenchmen but has never known one who was not a good family man.

For the most part, marriages are arranged by parents when the children are young. Frenchmen never marry out of their class. Mrs. Lapeyre said she has known of many instances in North Africa where Americans have married girls for whom they felt sorry. A Frenchman never piles, she added. A suitable dowry is taken into consideration when a Frenchman thinks of marriage.

Major Lapeyre studied in England. He fought in the Russian campaign with the French. He received a legion of honor, highest decoration bestowed by America on French soldiers. From France he has received the legion of honor. Between 1942 and 1945 he was in North Africa, France and Belgium. Major Lapeyre has been in America but he desired his daughter to be educated in this country.

Last year Anne won a trip to Boise for writing one of the best essays in a contest sponsored by the American Legion auxiliary. She also won first place in her class in ski races at Sun Valley last winter. She took part in the Ice Follies at Sun Valley last summer.

U. S. Maps Final Try to Lure Guam's Balky 'Prisoners'

AGANA, Guam, Nov. 21 (AP)—Military and civilian officials will begin a final attempt Monday to persuade Guam's balky "war prisoners" to accept repatriation to their Japanese homeland.

Police and military patrols will invade the island's dense jungles to leave packages in places where the holdouts will be most likely to find them.

The packages will contain letters from the Japanese government, making the Japanese to end their nine-year jungle existence and return to their homes. The packages will also contain white flags and surrender instructions.

The Japanese holdouts will be urged to leave their mountain caves and go to the nearest villages, where they will receive the best treatment.

Tuesday a navy plane will circle the island, dropping leaflets with similar instructions. The leaflets will tell the holdouts that World War II is over and will promise that no harm or loss of face will befall the stragglers.

"Operation straggler" is being carried out at the request of the Japanese government, which sent the packages this week to Guam.

A similar operation in the Philippines several months ago failed to "flush" out a single holdout there. Opinions on the chances for success here were mixed.
