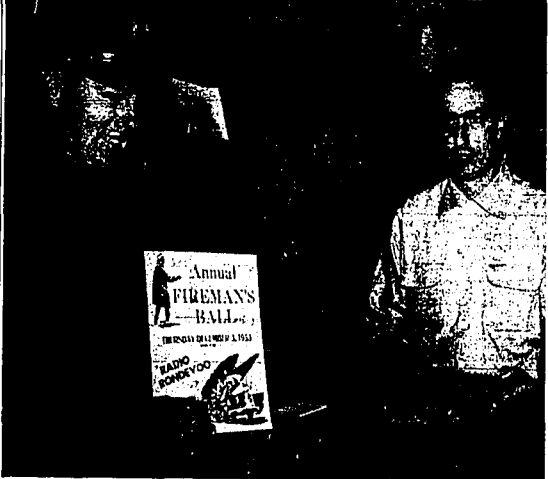


### Soviets Told U. S., British Links Strong

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 23.—Soviet, U. S., and British officials Monday said British-American relations are strong and solid. The British minister of state also said the Soviet delegate Andrei Y. Gromyko said that the Bernuda conference will be a friendly party of friends and nothing more. In a speech before the U. ### Revise in GI School Help Is Predicted

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Representative Tague, D-Tex., said today "dollars and cents pressure" on schools may force congress next year to change the education provisions of the GI benefit law.

"I am convinced the taxpayer is getting a better break under the present law," Tague said in an interview, "but pressure for a change is building up."

The pressure, he said, is coming from private colleges and universities whose veterans enrollment is lagging and who feel an economic pinch.

He said Representative Springer, R-Ill., stands a good chance of winning sufficient support for passage of his bill to separate tuition fees from subsistence payments to Korea veterans eligible for college training.

Under a benefit law passed in 1924, veterans of the Korean war are paid lump sums to cover their subsistence and tuition fees. Previously, World War I veterans were paid subsistence funds, but tuition fees went directly to the school.

### Flood District for Weiser Area OK'd

BOISE, Nov. 24 (AP)—A flood control district covering the Weiser and Little Weiser rivers was approved today after the approval of State Reclamation Engineer Mark Kulp.

It was the third such district to be formed in Idaho. The other two cover the Snake river in Madison and Jefferson counties, and the Big and Little Wood rivers in Blaine county.

Kulp said the new district sets up a bargaining agency to cooperate with the army engineers for flood control.

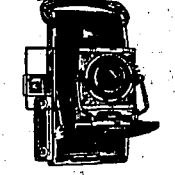

Russel Rock, Idaho Falls, state commander of the Disabled American Veterans, got a surprise award here Monday night in connection with his work in the employment of physically handicapped persons. Rock, who was making his official visit to the local DAV chapter, was presented with the certificate of outstanding service by George A. Reid, U. S. civil service commissioner, Seattle. Reid made a special trip to Twin Falls to make the presentation on behalf of President Eisenhower and Gov. Len Jordan's national and state committees for promotion of employment of physically handicapped persons. The presentation was made at a joint DAV and auxiliary dinner meeting held at the local organization's hall. In making the presentation, Reid briefly reviewed the history of national employment of the handicapped work and praised Rock for his work in that field. A brief address before the award was announced, Reid warned the veterans the next session of congress would result in more cuts in their benefits unless they take action to stop such a move. Later in the meeting, past commanders of the chapter were presented by Rock. They are Frank Horjic, immediate past commander; C. O. (Buddy) Cox, 1940-51; Earl Peterson, 1942-49; Jack Yeller, 1941-42; William Stone, 1940-41; Vern Lawson, 1936-37, and T. M. Knight, who is state senior vice commander, acted as toastmaster. Other state officers attending were Vern Martin, Idaho Falls, state chaplain, and Cox, state sergeant-at-arms. ### Woman Given Full Term for Mishap-Death

COEUR D'ALENE, Nov. 24.—Mrs. Jean Weise, first woman ever convicted of involuntary manslaughter in Kootenai county, was given the maximum sentence Monday of not more than 10 years in prison at hard labor and a \$1,000 fine. District Judge Clay V. Spear passed the sentence on the 26-year-old Rathdrum woman for the May 3 traffic death of Charles Stewart, 41, Spokane, the father of two children. The charge against Mrs. Weise claimed she was under the influence of alcohol when the car and one driven by Stewart collided seven miles east of here. Spear said that mortality rates indicate Stewart had another 27 years of life ahead of him. "By your unlawful act, you have deprived him of that much of his life, and his wife and children of these many years of care and affection," he told Mrs. Weise, who was found guilty Saturday. The woman, pale but composed as sentence was passed, was married after the accident. If she does not pay the fine, it must be served out at the rate of \$2 a day.

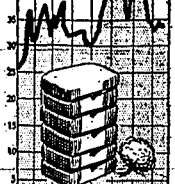

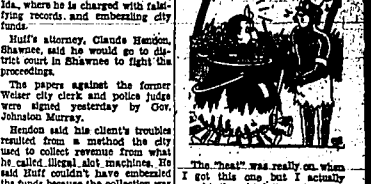
### Return Is Asked For Weiser Clerk
