8th Straight New High Reported in U.S. Living Costs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—The cost-of-living index, pushed along by higher prices for such things as beer and admission to 3-D movies, hit a new all-time peak in mid-October, the government reported today.

Commerce Minister Ewan Clague of the bureau of labor statistics said the long series of index gains—this was the eighth straight monthly increase—probably is ending. He predicted the index should remain fairly stable for several months.

The increase was enough to assure two cent hourly wage increases for some one million auto workers whose pay scales were tied to the mid-October index.

The mid-October index level of 115.4 per cent of 1947-49 prices, which represent a two-month average, was up 0.2 per cent above mid-September.

Overall food prices declined two tenths of one cent for mid-September to mid-October but housing, apparel, goods and services, tobacco, alcohol, recreation costs were higher.

Beer and cigarette prices gained one percent, and recreation and tobacco costs were up seven-tenths of one per cent. BLS said a major reason for the increase was higher admission prices for three-dimension movies.

The index's increase will help to explain why the cost of living in major cities, including 385,000 hourly-paid employees of General Motors, and 105,000 salaried Civil Service employees will receive a 2.0 per cent increase in their pay rates over the past three months.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—Experts on juvenile delinquency seem to agree on at least two things: It widespread and its roots are in the home.

Beyond these common denials, a score of specialists testifying during four days of hearings before a subcommittee offered a wide variety of diagnoses and cures.

U. S. Will Be Less Than Eight Hours Wide With Air Service

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 (AP)—America becomes less than eight hours wide for air travelers starting Sunday and New York and Los Angeles will be looking on each other more than ever as "suburb."

An American Airlines DC-7 landed at International airport Monday night in the first non-stop east-west trans-continental passenger flight in history.

As it wound up its 2,474-mile jaunt and descended to New York, it struck a top of 415 miles per hour. It came within a few minutes of the all-time high speed for the course, set by Eastern Air lines on a Super-Constellation airplane delivery flight in February, 1948. Eastern averaged 392 miles per hour, crossing a top of 415 miles per hour. It took 6 hours 11 minutes 39.4 seconds.

No further details were given.

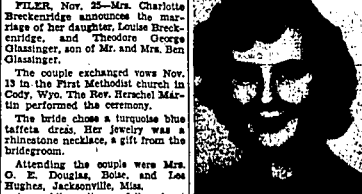

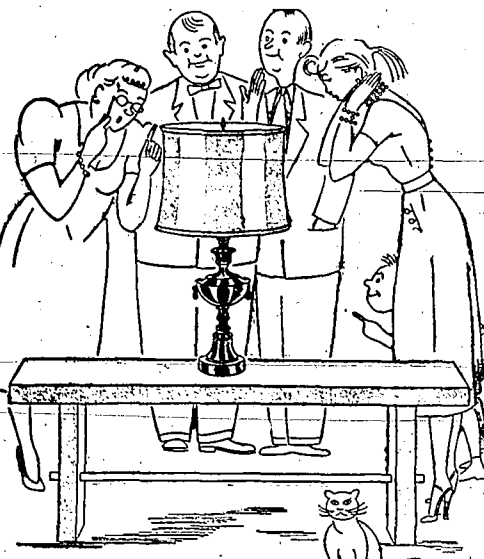
