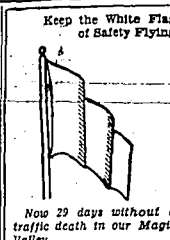

### Valley Potato Men Discuss Spud Festival

BURLEY, Nov. 20.—Approximately 125 Valley potato growers met at Burley Tuesday to discuss the national potato festival. They agreed to increase the consumption of potatoes in the United States.

William Case, Grand Forks, Minn., executive director of the national potato council, told the growers they must "push their way back into the national stomach." He said the consumption of potatoes in this country has dropped from 174 pounds per person 30 years ago to 64 pounds per person last year.

Case said potatoes are one of the most healthful foods and are the only food for which there are no allergies. He said there was a 10 percent oversupply of potatoes last year. The extra production would be dumped into a shortage if people were eating potatoes like they did 30 years ago, he added.

Case introduced by Winlow Whitaker, Oakley, who also reported on a meeting in Washington, D. C., with George of Agriculture, Benton on the potato situation.

The Burley meeting was preceded by a special meeting in Idaho Falls Monday and followed by another meeting Wednesday in Nysa, Ore.

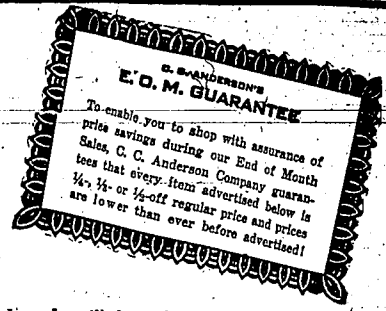

### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—An uncountable number of Americans are far more anxiously concerned over the prospect of a new round of economic, security, and than they are over the Brownell-Hoover's revelations of reds in government during the Hoover's flooding capitol hill, the White House and newspaper correspondents.

With inflation of specific industries, farm and other products, the government has been admitted to the Randall commission on foreign economic policy.

### ILLUMINATING NEWS

But the most illuminating news of the creeping slowdown to reach this writer comes from a qualified observer on the road. He is a well-known economist and has been on his new audits accounts for a variety of firms in a thriving section of New York state, referring to my "handing" of the Brownell-Hoover's revelations. He thinks "the people are fed up with the red issue."

"I am on the road six days a week. I cover no less than 15 accounts a day. I handle accounts in the public, Democratic, Socialist, and people with no particular party. Here is their reaction:

"What is this stuff? When is that mob going to get up and do something about it? Some of them are getting better inventories cleaned out. Who cares if there are 900 reds? How is that helping the nation? The reds at the bank, the mortgage and bills paid due? Eisenhower promised us the world, and gave us Wilson and General Motors. If they think this will sweep us up, they are dumber than we thought!"

### READ SIGNS

In New York state, since Jan. 1, 1943, business has gone out of business. Last month, 16 of my stores, in business over 10 years, closed up. I have sold my stores, and people with no money have not sold a new radio or TV set in five months. My department stores are averaging \$50 a day less than a year ago. One suit store was bankrupted last week, with only \$4,000 assets, the bank taking a bait on this one.

In a small town on a main highway with a \$200,000 store, the store closed overnight. Hundreds of marriages had taken apartments, bought houses, got married because the plant looked good for the future. Picture what it means to wipe out a pay roll of that magnitude.

### FEDDLING CARS

In a good-sized city, a car dealer traveled the city streets with an overland trailer loaded with cars and crying from a lack of "pick-ups" all day long today. The dealer said: "Pick up any New York paper and read the car ads. Read the TV ads in which they offer \$29 cars. Read the ads in the office of the car dealers. Check the prices of milk, bread and gasoline in New York. The red expense are now \$10 a month more than they were six months ago. The car dealers are \$40 a month more. And I am buying less."

### AUTO PLANT SHUT DOWN

In another medium-sized city, a large automobile plant shut down last week ostensibly for retooling. That is only half the story. About six months ago this firm put on a campaign to get help for a third shift. They drew hundreds of people from other jobs, from all capacities. Now the third shift is being shut down. "The people really meant it when they said: 'This is a mess. Kick it up!' But remember! This is the last time the GOP if they handle this time, it will be the last time. . . . And Thomas E. From now on the problem is in the lap of the legislature—though of course it should not be forgotten that motorists who drive this highway actually have the greatest responsibility.

The last legislature tapped off funds for both the department of law enforcement and the highway department. The state highway patrol was cut back slightly in manpower as a result. For example there is only one full-time patrolman to police from here to American Falls, Downey, Lava Hot Springs and Pocatello.

The short-sightedness of the last legislature is paying off in death.

If highway 101 is to be made safe—as far as engineering and enforcement are concerned—Bannock and Blaine county legislators in the next term MUST take the leadership in restoring—in fact, expanding—funds for both law enforcement and highway department—Idaho State Journal.

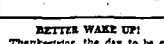

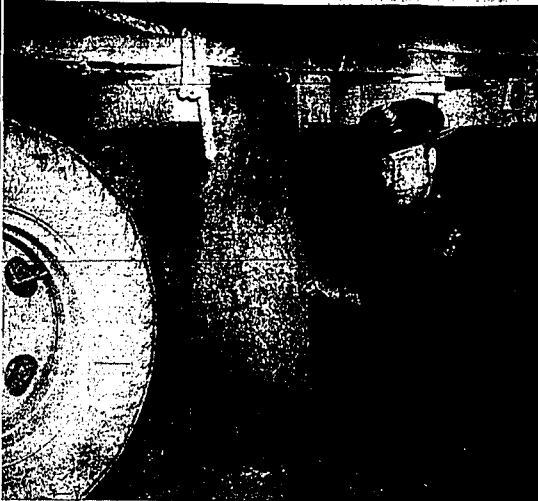

### New Traffic Code to Require Fenders Or Flaps for Trucks, Buses, Trailers

Idaho's new traffic code, which goes into effect Jan. 1, includes requirements for fenders or flaps covering wheels on trucks, buses, trailers and semi-trailers. Clark Hand, state police lieutenant, noted that he was included in previous Idaho laws governing motor vehicles.

Citing the section of the code on wheel covering, he said the rear wheel of every motor truck equipped with a body which covers the rear wheels must have fenders or flaps which extend not more than 10 inches above the road surface when the truck is empty.

Violators of this section of the code, he said, will be guilty of a misdemeanor and the fine will be not less than \$5 or more than \$100 or a county jail term of not more than 30 days or both the fine and jail term.

### U.S. Lacks Data On Fate of POWs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—The defense department said Wednesday it has no further information about 600 Americans once believed to be communist captives but unaccounted for by the Reds.

Senator McCarthy, R., Wis., said on a TV radio broadcast Tuesday night that the army had announced in September that some 600 Americans known to have been prisoners had not been acknowledged or exchanged by the communists.

The defense department did make such an announcement in September. Information received since then, largely from returned American prisoners, has cut the number to about 600, a Pentagon spokesman said.

### Study Shows Lady Drivers Fast in Stops

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 23 (AP)—A series of tests in 3,000 high schools and colleges reveals some good things about lady drivers, an expert said today.

### U. S. Leaders Doubt Korea War Renewal

TOKYO, Nov. 26 (AP)—Top American officials in the Orient are confident there will be no more fighting in Korea unless something touches off World War III.

All this means, however, they see little chance now for peaceful unification of Korea, since the treaty signed this week between China and North Korea in effect moved China's border southward almost to parallel 38.

South Korea's threatened by-gone man has withdrawn his forces and the United States is expected to withdraw his forces northward unless a peace conference makes progress toward uniting this country by Jan. 27—six months after the Korean armistice was signed.

But generals and diplomats who have visited Korea the past month say they will not repeat the war. They cite these reasons for their belief:

1. Rhee has been told the United States will withdraw his forces from Korea if he renounces the war. ROK forces have only enough ammunition for six days if the semiautonomous supply falters.

2. Rhee would not be using almost a billion dollars in U. S. aid. It is generally understood in higher circles here that requests for such large sums of money have made it plain to Rhee that Uncle Sam is not interested in fighting a war in Korea, especially a war of containment.

Therefore, it is understood, Rhee has been told if he renounces the Korean conflict, which was stopped on July 27, the U. S. would get out. The only thing that would make U. S. troops go into action in Korea again would be for the communists to start shooting in the American doughboys, sailors and airmen would fight again.

But the fighting was not restricted to Korea, top officials say.

### Utah, Wyoming Get Drought Aid

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower issued an order last night that would make Utah and Wyoming eligible for federal financial aid.

Announcing the decision at the President's vacation headquarters, Murray Snyder, assistant White House secretary, said the amount of aid will be fixed later.

Snyder also said he had no information here on the specific Wyoming and Utah counties made eligible for federal grants. He said the agriculture department would supply that information later in Washington.

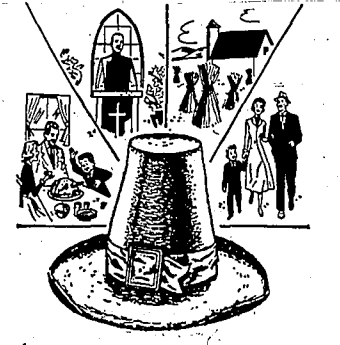

### Busy Boise Physician Sparks Idaho's Cancer Society Work

By DALE NELSON  
BOISE, Nov. 24 (U.S. Associated Press)—Alfred Popma, newly elected president of the American Cancer Society, sometimes wonders how he finds time to practice medicine.

The energetic lowland radiologist recently estimated he spends 80 days a year on cancer society work. As president, he probably will spend more.

In addition, he serves as an adviser of the First Presbyterian church and chairman of Idaho's committee formulating an interstate educational compact.

Once an Idaho country doctor, Popma took to radiology because he had "always had a hankering for it." In case you don't know what radiology is, the doctor explains:

"It's the use of X-ray for diagnosis and X-ray and radium for treatment."

A good share of the doctor's patients are cancer sufferers but he doesn't like being called a cancer specialist. He treats other people, too.

Taking note of a recent prediction that a cure for cancer would be known within 10 years, Popma said, "Some of us are a little less optimistic."

"It may take a long time," he added. "Then again it might come

### People's Wish on Red Spy Story Colliding With Aims of Many

by LILE C. WILSON  
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower's wish that communist spy stories soon would end history's colliding trends in a widely shared Republican opinion to keep the fires of the Cold War burning brightly.

Washington grapevine is carrying reports that the Democrats are annoyed with FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and plan to tell him roughly if they can.

Sen. Dan Rostenkowski, senior member of the house intelligence committee, put it this way: "The American people haven't yet realized the extent of bitter-

ness generated among a large segment of the Democratic party by this attack on former President Truman and by FBI Director Hoover's entrance into a purely political forum.

"I don't think there's been any appreciation by the American people generally how bitter the Democrats are about it. They're sore to the bottom of their feet."

The United Press was informed that Hoover rejected his first invitation to testify before the senate internal security subcommittee on the Harry Dexter White case. He accepted a second invitation in the belief that the relation of the FBI to the decision to keep White in federal office had been presented erroneously to the American people.

But Democrats are in no mood

to forgive anyone. A house leader told the United Press last week that fellow Democrats may drag their feet next session on Eisenhower administration projects in an effort to even the spy exposé score. This leader cited the occasions when Democratic votes supported the administration last session.

"But," he said, "next year it is going to be a different story."

### Korea Stands As Symbol of Globe's Strife

**By FRANK NEWCOMB**

The tragedy of Korea is that it could stand as a monument to peace. If it must stand as a continuing symbol of frustration and strife.

A particular irony for Americans is the season of the year. Special Envoy Arthur H. Dean asked the communists for a Thanksgiving day recess in the diplomatic discussions to arrange a Korean political conference.

Wish to Worship  
 "We wish," he said, "to worship with the people of Korea and to give thanks to almighty God for our manifold blessings and to pray for guidance in these talks."

And, he might have added, to ask forgiveness for man's shortcomings.

Almost obscured now in the daily communist name-calling, the stalling and the propaganda bias are the purposes of the conference which Dean went to Korea to arrange.

The conference was to arrange a permanent peace for Korea, including withdrawal of foreign troops and a free and united Korean nation.

Originally it was to have started Oct. 28. Now, if it ever is to start, it will be in the dim, unpredictable future.

**New Problems**  
 Meanwhile, new problems arise from an unworkable timetable and each day makes more acute the dream of a united Korea.

A highlight of the situation was this week's announcement of a 10-year economic assistance pact signed between red China and the North Korean communist government.

The Chinese said they had written off North Korea's war debt and in addition would advance North Korea some 317 million dollars in the next four years, illustrating the permanent nature of the agreement. It was a corollary plan to operate an airline linking North Korea, China and the Soviet Union.

**Announced**  
 About two months ago the Russians announced a similar aid program for North Korea. The Russians said they would advance about 250 million dollars in aid and would reduce, but not forgive, the North Korean war debt.

That red China probably cannot carry out its promises of machinery, communications equipment and other supplies in which she herself is in desperate need is, in this case, beside the point.

The aid point is the unfolding nature of communist plans for the Korea of the future which in their eyes must be totally communist or forever divided.

Thus by necessity the United States must go ahead with its own plan to spend nearly one billion dollars in the next four years for the rehabilitation of South Korea.

### Her Son Is Dead

**Wife Reports Former Spy Is In Red Region**

**MONTREAL, Nov. 26**—Fred Rose, communist member of parliament who lost his seat and freedom for spying for Russia, has gone behind the iron curtain for "health and business" reasons, his wife said today.

He now is in Czechoslovakia "on business venture," Mrs. Rose said. Rose, longtime chief of the Communist party's "central control commission" assigned to weed out "traitors, spies and fascists" from red ranks in Canada, was freed from the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary near here in August, 1951, after serving most of a six-year term for espionage. He was one of several key members of a Soviet spy ring revealed by former Russian cipher clerk, Igor Gouzenko who fled the Soviet embassy in Ottawa in 1945 with details of a Soviet spy network in Canada.

Mrs. Rose said he left her and their 17-year-old daughter here in mid-October and traveled by ship to Europe.

"He has gone to Czechoslovakia for his health and for business reasons," Mrs. Rose told a reporter. "He has had a chronic rheumatic and nervous condition for seven years and couldn't get relief in Canada so he went where he thought he could get it."

"Also he'll try, maybe, to get a certain product that he might be able to market in Canada."

Some scientists believe that emigration never has slowed down the population growth of a large country.

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### Chief for Tax Probes Quits; 'Errors' Cited

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—The chief tax fraud investigator of the internal revenue service has resigned after "discrepancies" were found in his own income tax returns.

Charles H. Williams submitted his resignation to the director of the intelligence division after the reported discrepancies were discovered in the revenue bureau last December, but it is understood he has been on sick leave since his return.

Andrews ruled that the reported discrepancies were "not consistent with Williams' important position as an enforcement officer." The alleged discrepancies occurred during a period prior to the time Williams took the revenue service job.

James C. Rivers, internal revenue information officer, confirmed Williams' resignation. Williams said John Latham has served as acting head of the intelligence division since Williams' resignation.

Rivers said in "all cases like this, there's a lot of things that we just did not know if the internal revenue service had closed the study of the case."

Williams could not be located for comment.

Now that the year is drawing to a close, once again it is fitting that we incline our thoughts to His mercies and offer to Him our prayers of gratitude.

For the courage and vision of our forebears who settled a wilderness and founded a nation; for the framers of our constitution sought to secure for themselves and for their posterity, and which are so abundantly realized in our land today; for the unity of spirit which has made our country strong; and for the continuing faith under his guidance that has kept us a religious people with freedom of worship for all, we should kneel in humble thanksgiving.

Especially are we grateful this year for the brave and noble men and women who have sacrificed their lives to construct a shining world from the hope that there may be an enduring peace.

Now, therefore, I, Dwight D. Eisenhower, President of the United States of America, in conformance with the joint resolution approved Dec. 25, 1943, do hereby call upon our people to observe Thursday, the 25th of November, 1954, as a day of prayer, fasting, and thanksgiving. On that day let us pause to thank God for His bountiful gifts of food and clothing for His people. Let us pause to thank God for His mercies and offer to Him our prayers of gratitude.

# Iron Curtain" Not Mere Phase; It's Real Barrier of Barbed Wire, Terror

The "iron curtain" is a phase, a hooded flashlight. Ahead, stripped bare of trees and brush, lay 200 yards of no man's land barricaded by eight parallel strands of barbed wire. Between the barbed wire fences, the two sides were criss-crossed trip-lines, attached to rocket flares.

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 28 (CP)—A recent moonlight night two criss-crossed trip-lines were strung across a fence on the Hun- dman frontier, crawled onto Aus- tralian soil and collapsed from pain of exhaustion.

They were Lazo Marochy, 29, and his pretty wife, Elizabeth, 28. They had made up their minds that death was preferable to life in communist Hungary.

The terror they experienced in minutes that night will leave a mental scar for the rest of their lives. They are deeply shocked. Lazo lost a part of one ear. Mrs. Marochy's arms and legs were lacerated by flying steel.

They moved at a lurch at a time, Lazo's outstretched fingers, feel- ing for the thin trip-lines, toward the final barbed-wire fence barrier.

As her husband stood and groped for the fence, there was an explosion. Through a spray of dirt and flying steel, Elizabeth saw his dim-silhouette-jolted-backward.

"Then his voice came softly: 'I'm all right . . . shall we go on?'" "If we have to die," she replied, "I'd rather die in Austria."

She could feel the warmth of her own blood-welling out of her limbs. The last of the fence was too low to crawl under. It was about five feet high, spiked with two crowning strands of barbed wire.

# Real American Treasure Has Not Been Changed Since First Thanksgiving Day

By GEORGE W. CORNELL

NEW YORK, Nov. 26—It's an old American treasure. Fundamentally it hasn't changed a bit. Not since that first Thanksgiving day. But sometimes you forget, and on the special day of giving thanks many will ask:

"What have we got to be especially thankful for?"

That question was asked of several ministers about the country, and it is a strange thing, they all gave about the same answer.

They said:

"Opportunity."

A vague, rhetorical word, you say. That can mean anything or nothing. Besides, you can't eat it or wear it or deposit it in a bank. It's just a fancy word.

"But if you stop and consider," said the Rev. Rodney Shaw of the Occanowoc, Wis., Methodist church, "I think you'll see that opportunity is our rarest gift. This is more so now than ever before."

Neither he, nor the other ministers, meant the "Horatio Alger

kind of opportunity—the storied path from want to wealth—but a more profound, vital opportunity for each American and his country.

It had its roots in the "opportunity" that fired the hearts of the Pilgrims 300 years ago—but fame, luxury or an easy chair—but the hard, raw challenge of work and the right to do it.

"Seldom do people think now of opportunity as in the world and as at present," said the Rev. Henry C. Koch, Concordia Evangelical and Reformed church, Washington, D. C.

"It is not only the opportunity to do, but to be something of your own making, to grow, free to develop concepts and ideas, to build an individual life."

Well, you say, you're heard that before, that this is a free country. That a man can do, or not do, progress or slide backward, labor or loaf. But it's old stuff, you say, it's old as the pilgrim. It's nice. But

why the flag waving? Why special thanksgiving?

"There's a deeply mischievous reason," said the Rev. Harry B. Taylor of Cleveland's Presbyterian Church of the Covenant. "It is that our forefathers has reflected God's power of growth—and produced even greater, new opportunities today."

In a way, it's like the parable of the talents, he said, in that talents, well used, grow.

And so, despite our shortcomings, as Americans have used their opportunities in accordance with God's order, he said, so those opportunities have been blessed and magnified.

"Opportunities do not stand still, but grow or decline," said Mrs. Olympia C. Dineen of New York's Roman Catholic Church of St. Bl. Agnes.

"In a very unique way, our idea of liberty—for self and everyone else—has been magnificently blessed by Almighty God," he said. "And this has brought larger opportunit-

ies than before—for each individual and the whole nation."

But wait, you say, just what are these great, new prospects? And how do you get them? And distribute them? Now first, about this nation. You realize you've become a strong, stable country, unscathed by modern wars. And that's fine. But what are the bright new national horizons?

"We have moved forward," said Rabbi Joseph Hager of New York's Wall Street synagogue, "until our opportunities extend to all humanity. The oppressed of the world look to us, and our freedom, for guidance."

But through its faith in the dignity of each person, as founded in God's law, the nation has risen to a place of world leadership, the Rev. Mr. Shaw said, with "greater opportunities than any generation in the history of the world."

"As never before, with our resources, know-how and passionate convictions of freedom, we are in a position to go into the world to help others shake off the shackles of hunger, disease and chaos."

"For the first time, the world is literally close-fisted that here, it is the chance to establish control of arms of war, thereby ending it, and

to bring the world closer to God's law. That is our opportunity."

All right, you say, that's something to appreciate. But what about the individual guy? Everybody is always talking about how we've become a healthy, prosperous people loaded with TV sets and electric polo mowers. And you can appreciate that, up to a point.

But some people are sick, or poor or troubled. What are the gratifying opportunities—the high promises—for us all?

"It is in learning, and we are learning more and more about the orderly cosmos in which we live," said the Rev. Mr. Taylor.

Gradually, slowly, old ideas are being replaced, hardheadedness, prejudice, wrongs are challenged. We hunt truth, God's answers. We do not always succeed. But we try. And succeed some.

"As we discover and learn to cooperate with God's sovereign laws, so His blessings come," he said.

And as in the past, said the Rev. Mr. Koch, our system provides the chance for improvement.

"We may be far from our goals under democracy," he said, "but in the like static European governments, our very constitution had written

ed planting, some plants were damaged by late frost. When July turned so hot farmers had trouble keeping enough water on the plants. The poor quality crop. However, the weather moderated, and it stayed warm long enough for the crop to mature. The last forecast boosted the estimated yield 10 bushels an acre to 29 bushels.  
 The story was virtually the same for sugar beets. The late fall had put more tonnage on the late-harvested crop. The July 1 forecast of 17.5 tons per acre was boosted to 18 on Nov. 1, and the crop is now set at 1,287,000 tons.  
 The dry bean crop was first pegged at 1,800 pounds per acre. Then, when it appeared the late planting would not allow the crop to mature, it was revised downward to 1,750. Now it's up to 1,850 pounds for an estimated yield of 2,715,000 bags of good quality beans.  
 Alfalfa, which makes up the bulk of the hay crop, isn't quite up to last year, but has been damaged little by the weather and is expected to total 2,190,000 tons. Pastures and ranges went down rapidly during the summer but still are better than last year, and there have been no "drought shipments" of cattle from the state.  
 Fruit crops very unable to overcome the handicap of the cold spring. There was some frost damage, and all are below normal. Dry peas—both seed and commercial—as well as alfalfa seed and Austrian peas are below normal. Spruce of the seed crop was reduced after price supports were removed.

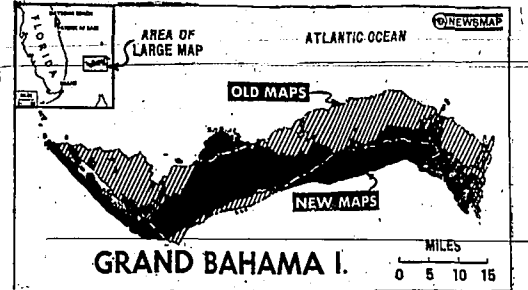

### New Monarch of Saudi Arabia To Continue Father's Policies

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 25 (AP)—King Saud bin Abdul Aziz hopes to strengthen the ties between his oil-rich desert kingdom of Saudi Arabia and all western nations.

The new ruler of the strategic land in which United States interests have vast oil holdings, outlined his foreign and domestic policies in an exclusive statement to the United Press in response to a series of questions.

He made it clear that foreign policy will be based on continuation of the policy of his father, King Ibn Saud, who died Nov. 9.

King Saud bin, now 47, said he never will tolerate communists or other subversive propaganda in his country.

He will, he said, retain the American military mission in Saudi Arabia until its mission is completed.

Further, the monarch said, his country will continue to give all legitimate facilities and protection to foreign oil companies in line with his desire to maintain lasting friendly relations with them. The nation's wealth in oil was largely developed by the Arabian-American Oil company.

His written interview with the United Press was the first with any foreign news agency since he assumed the throne.

### Boyle Wonders at Changes in Female Attitude Toward Men

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 (AP)—It is hard to make the difference between a "woman" and a "man."

I figured the poor fellow was either already under a temptation or he was really a man.

But lately—well, I just don't know. Women are saying so many nice things about men these days that I'm getting a little confused.

"It doesn't mean a thing except we're getting closer together," one gentleman once told me. "The average woman's disposition begins to improve just before Thanksgiving."

"By the first of December she is acting like a human being. By the middle of the month, as Santa Claus gets nearer and nearer, you can see a halo over her head in a dim room."

"But soon after she gets her Christmas loot, the sweetness and light vanishes, and the normal bark and bite come back into her voice again. Her feeling of gratitude fades faster than a snowflake in a bonfire."

But is this really so? Isn't this post-lumber merely living in the past? It is true, perhaps, that human nature never changes. But how about the nature of women? There are signs it is changing with revolutionary speed.

I choose to believe, for example, that old-fashioned chivalry and courtliness aren't dead. They merely have undergone a change of ownership.

Like everything else that used to be a symbol of masculine domination—such as moose, tobacco, pants and the dry martini—chivalry has been taken over by women. They are showing more and more gallantry in their attitude toward the weaker sex.

What else but pure gallantry explains the recent statement by Kathleen Walz, a British psychologist, that men are more intelligent than women?

She gave a series of questions and answers prepared by another lady—Dr. Alice Helm—to a mixed group of 700 British university students.

The results, she says, showed boys are smarter than girls, reason better and learn quicker through practice.

Maybe. It also could prove only that a kindhearted woman scientist is able to devise a test on which the lads could get a better grade than the ladies.

For certainly nobody seriously doubts that women can out-think and outgeneral men in any field that interests them. Intelligence is not a thing you can put your finger on. It can best be described as common sense in action.

Basically, the most intelligent organism is the one that can best adjust its environment to better its own way of life and improve its chances of survival, and here woman has no peer. Where man breaks and dies under strain, woman bends and waits for better weather.

All people are a mystery to each other. But a woman can solve a man at a glance, and he can't figure her out in a lifetime. Einstein may

plumb the secrets of the atom or the universe with an equation, but he is a formula to explain other pairs—or his own wife, or your wife, or my wife?

A lady psychologist who says boys are smarter than girls merely because they can work an arithmetical problem more easily is using a formula to explain other pairs—or his own wife, or your wife, or my wife?

Yet it is nice to know the ladies are now so sure of their strength they can afford to pamper men with a bit of feminine gallantry. It doesn't fool us a bit—these heads and compliments—and they may spoil us.

But men, as women have known since Eve ate only green apples. It is pleasant after all these centuries to see them savor the milk of human kindness with a little gallantry for the male animal.

Next thing you know women may never start doing their share of pushing a revolving door.
