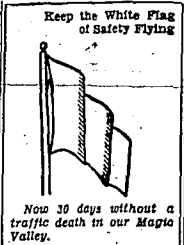

Safety Council Enlists Public Support For Plan to Cut Yule Season Accidents

CHICAGO, Nov. 27—To prevent the reckless spending of lives every Christmas, the National Safety Council today called on Americans to join in a nationwide plan to stop holiday accidents.

The council's yuletide ledger shows a loss of 740 lives from all accidents during the Christmas holidays last year—and the toll of 456 lives in traffic was the highest on record.

"It is time," said Ned H. Dearborn, council president, "for America to start saving—and stop squandering—lives. If every American will join this savings plan before the Christmas holidays, a real yuletide bonus—human life—will be paid."

Some 183 national organizations, city and state officials, safety councils and civic leaders have joined the council in the Christmas savings plan. They will unite in creating an awareness of the special holiday hazards, and will enlist voluntary cooperation from every American to hold accidents to a minimum.

The Christmas-New Year holiday season is the most hazardous single period of the year—according to council statistics. In traffic accidents alone, twice as many persons are killed during a Christmas holiday period as on the same days of the preceding two weeks.

Heavier travel and the festive spirit of the holiday season increase the normal winter hazards, such as bad weather, slippery roads and more hours of darkness.

The council suggests four safety measures for Christmas travelers:

1. Start automobile trips early and take it easy. Be extremely cautious in bad weather and darkness. Watch out for pedestrians.
2. Keep Christmas trees in water and away from fire. Be sure lights and electrical connections are in good condition.
3. Watch out for falls at home and away from home. Be wary of icy sidewalks. Falls are second only to traffic as accident killers.
4. Be moderate in drinking, and don't drive if you have been drinking. Tipsy pedestrians and drinking drivers are most common during the holidays.

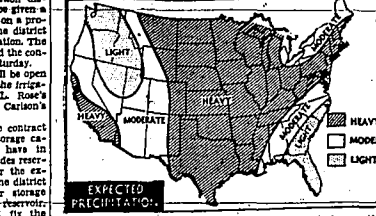

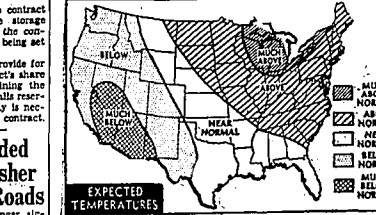

Man Dodges Questions on Future Plans

ORANGE, Tex., Nov. 17.—Thomas C. Buntin, who left his wife, three weeks ago and disappeared with his secretary, refused today to discuss the new life he fashioned for himself after he had been declared dead.

Buntin, a television salesman who took the name of Thomas D. Palmer, was unmasked yesterday as the Nashville, Tenn. playboy who dropped out of sight Dec. 24, 1951.

The 38-year-old secretary, Betty McCuddy, Russellville, Ky., now is Mrs. Palmer, 40, the mother of six children. Buntin, 32, was declared legally dead 11 years after he disappeared.

Wants Time

Buntin hung up the telephone on newsmen and was quoted as saying he and his wife wanted plenty of time to think it over before telling their story.

In Nashville, Tenn., relatives of the former "playboy" had refused comment on his return from the legally dead, but the woman's father was.

Robert F. McCuddy, 76, Russellville, Ky., "just couldn't believe it until I talked to her myself. Until I heard her voice. It's the first time since 1951 that I've known I have a living child. I had given up all hopes for her."

Legal Difficulties

But the Buntin family's disclosure raised a prospect of facing many legal difficulties, some of them believed to be without precedent.

Buntin presumably must be brought back to legal "life," his marriage here must be legally ended to clear his wife's remarriage, and his estate must be legally straightened out.

His three sons face the loss of a \$50,000 remainder of \$35,000 the New York Life Insurance company paid into a trust fund for them when Buntin was declared legally dead in 1942.
