

Independence Pledged for Puerto Ricans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (UP)—Puerto Rico can have independence in 1945, it was declared today by President Roosevelt in a message to Congress. The president's pledge was delivered through Henry C. Lodge, a delegate to the United Nations. He said independence would be granted to Puerto Rico if the people there want it. The president also said that the United States will support Puerto Rico's full independence whenever its legislature asks for it.

Prefer Union
Sen. Luis Munoz Marin promptly replied: "The position of the majority of our people and also mine is in favor of continued association with the union, within a 45-year period."

Lodge made his statement in the U. S. assembly after a debate as to whether Puerto Rico is now self-governing. Some delegates contended that it really is not but the assembly adopted a resolution which effect recognizes that Puerto Rico has self government.

Freedom Costly
Under a new constitution Puerto Rico is a "free commonwealth" with the United States in charge of its foreign and defense affairs. Continued independence would cost it \$100 million in benefits. Other economic benefits from Washington will also go by the board.

Change in Puerto Rico's status would have to be approved by Congress. Rep. John M. Vorys, a Republican and a power on the Senate affairs committee, said that the people of Puerto Rico want independence, but he is willing to let them try the constitutional process.

In mile-high Denver, says Billings Davis, millionaire theatrical impresario, Broadway producer and currently president of New York's ballet theater.
"The finest theater of its kind in the United States," said Davis as he attended the gala opening this month of the \$100,000 Jewel Box Bonifils Memorial theater.

Still another of Denver's major cultural attractions is Central City with its opera house in one of the famous old mining camps, in the mountains 25 miles to the west.
Here, every summer, are heard stars of the Metropolitan in two major operas. In addition, the season presents a current Broadway dramatic production.
On the lighter side is the summer open-air opera in Cheeseman park, sponsored by the Post.
The Denver Civic theater was organized in 1929 as the University Civic theater. It began with 700 members. Its auditorium was the gift of Mrs. Verner Z. Reed whose husband built much of his fortune with Wyoming oil.

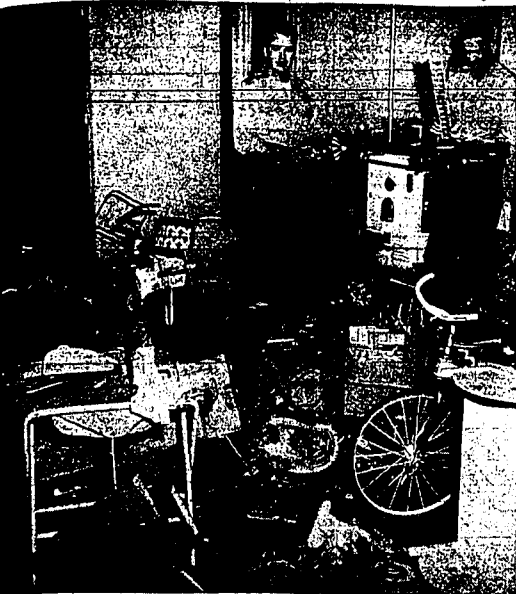

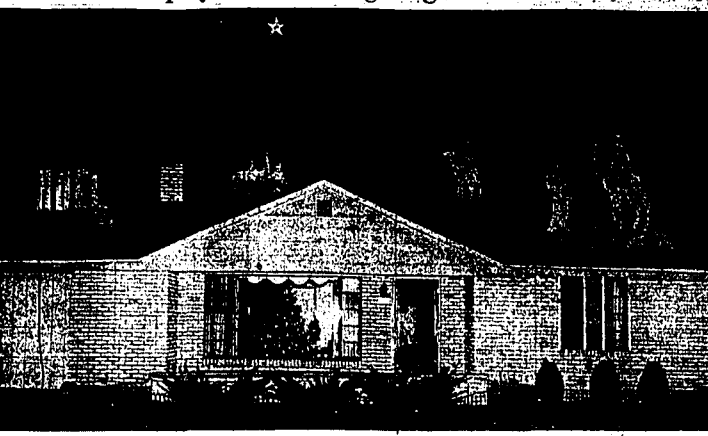
Yule Lighting Contest Rules Are Reported

The official rules are:
1. The contest is open to any householder in the city limits; for the business division, the contest is open to any store in the business district.
2. Home division prizes are \$25 for first prize; \$15 second prize; \$5 third prize, and five awards of \$1 each; in business displays, \$10, first prize and \$5 second.
3. Lights must be exterior, or interior lighted decorations clearly visible from the street. Merchants may decorate windows or light the exterior of the building.
4. Types of decorations—any type desired by the individual householder or merchant, whether carrying the Christmas theme, religious motif or abandoning central themes for varied effects.
5. Judging basis—general effect is most important. Elaborate nature of displays will not be the decisive factor. A small but ingenious decoration may win over others more elaborate.

U. N. Envoys Hear Reports On Atrocities

U. N. envoys who are hearing reports on atrocities committed by communists in North Korea, were told that the "prisoners were shot down in the blood, were ordered to live in prison buildings, were beaten to death—all in total disregard of the rights and customs of the civilized world."

The reports were given to an elementary sense of common decency. In still other instances evidence was given of deliberate attempts by the communists to dispose of prisoners by forced marches in inclement weather under conditions in which they would either die of malnutrition and disease, or be beaten to death, or be shot.

It was said that they could be easily disposed of by open murder. The reports were given in a committee of the United Nations, which is in session in New York.

The story to be told, U. N. envoys, "won't be pleasant, but it is something that should be known by all Americans."

Several former prisoners of war testified to their eyewitness to red atrocities, which were on hand when they were taken to the front lines. Actual photographs of the slaughter also will be produced, the committee said. The mission made possible a number of such photos recently.

Envoys, who lost both legs fighting in world war II, is conducting the probe as a representative of the senate investigating committee headed by Senator McCarthy, R., Wis.

He said he agreed with McCarthy's statement to a nationwide television and radio audience last Tuesday night that the report of the party must act to effect the release of hundreds of American airmen and soldiers still unaccounted for in the Korean casualty lists.

McCarthy put the number at 800, but the defense department said Wednesday it has been unable to account for about 600 by further investigation.

McCarthy said he is aware that failure to recover the missing men was one of the cases in which the Eisenhower administration's "balancing averages" is seen.

He urged that the United States should act to bring the missing men home by cutting off American economic aid to any country which traded with the Asian communists.

Yugoslav Seize 20 Italian Boats

BALE, Italy, Nov. 23.—Italian maritime authorities reported tonight Yugoslav gunboats seized at least 20 Italian fishing vessels in the Adriatic sea on Friday. They said they heard one boat captured in a fog.

Yugoslavia has captured numerous Italian fishing boats in the past on claims they had invaded Yugoslav waters. Usual procedure is to take boats and crews to Yugoslav ports, fine them and return the boats.

Lead, Zinc Aid Is Cut Off by Purchases of Scarce Metals

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (Special)—Oleum is laying out such big dough for scarce materials he has none left to subsidize lead and zinc.
 This is the conclusion reached from a complete list of subsidy contracts made since 1950 by the government services administration. After weeks of protest the "confidential" mask was removed from the list.
 OSA has spent about 400 million dollars to date on price props for metals, exclusive of uranium, which is handled separately by the atomic energy commission. Of this amount, about 10 per cent has gone to foreign producers, primarily in Canada and South America.
 The 400 million dollars is part of a gigantic \$1 billion dollar effort on the part of the taxpayer to shore up raw materials of all sorts against the day of war. Only after the outbreak in Korea in 1950 did Uncle Sam really take the rubber bands off his wallet.
 The stockpiling program has many advocates in congress and virtually no opponents. Truth is, the board probably has a current market value well above world levels should liquidation orders suddenly be given.
 But the good uncle will lay out only so much for minerals. And he's becoming heavily committed of late to garner precious uranium, columbium, tungsten, manganese, mica and quartz.
 One odd factor shows up on the list, however. Copper prices are just about as soft as lead and zinc. Yet OSA will pay premium prices for the next six years for the red metal while it's virtually sworn off supporting lead and zinc.
 One OSA source explains: "These subsidy contracts were entered into for copper, lead and zinc about the same time. The trouble with copper is that it is a tougher product to refine and thus must be scheduled many years further along than the other two."

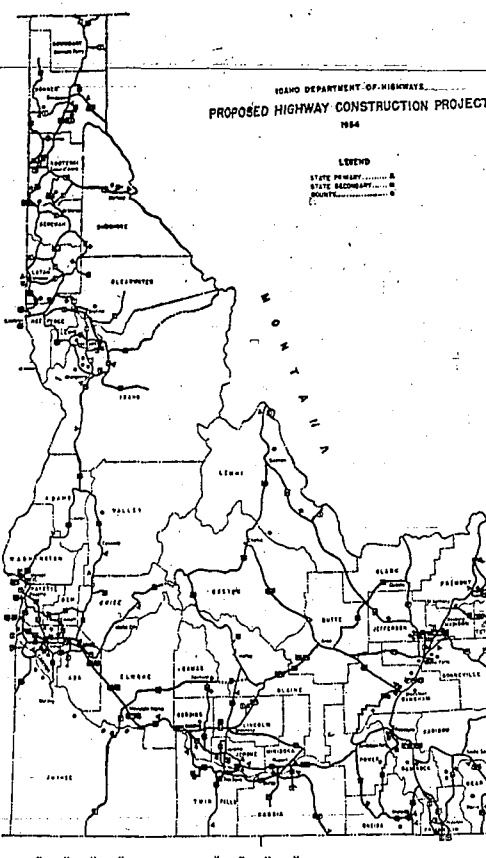

Northwest Is Urged to Use Steam Power

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Use of steam to generate electricity in the Pacific northwest was urged today as a more practical method than construction of huge hydroelectric projects, such as that proposed at Hells canyon dam on Snake river along the Oregon-Idaho border.

The suggestion was contained in a summary of testimony which will be given the federal power commission by Holland M. Houston, power adviser to Gov. Arthur E. Langley of Washington.

The state of Washington has been given permission to intervene in the PFC hearing on Idaho Power company's request to build three power dams in the Snake. One would be in Hells canyon where the best federal project has been proposed.

In Washington's intervention petition, the PFC was asked to consider a plan which would substitute steam power for hydro-electricity generated from expensive federal reservoirs that could not be filled each year.

Steam Use Urged Houston said that his summary indicates between 600,000 and 800,000 kilowatts of electricity generated energy could be substituted in low water years for power from 10 million acres of water held over in hard-to-fill reservoirs in the Columbia basin by 1975.

He said a "balanced" steam and hydro-electric system in the northwest would produce the most efficient operation of reservoirs.

Washington's petition contended such construction of the Hells canyon dam as a federal project would boost the power rate base in the northwest.

The PFC hearing continues Monday after a week-end recess.

Can a severe bump on the head or a crippling disease in infancy prevent a boy from a normal life? The answer for two Jerome boys is a resounding "no."

They participate in family, church and school life like any other boys. They play games, attend classes, do chores, speak at church functions and take part in other activities.

Of course they are handicapped. Both walk with crutches. But they don't sit on the sidelines and fret. They're "regular fellows."

Both were with their Explorer Scout post—on the vocational exploration trip in Twin Falls Saturday. They were on others and undoubtedly will go on any places in the future.

They are Deloy Giles, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry E. Giles, and Honny Thores, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Thores.

He was struck on the head by a falling log. For months he was bedfast and his life was in balance. Then he was confined to a wheelchair for more long months.

At 16 he is a sophomore at Jerome high school. Concrete evidence of his ability to adjust to the results of his accident is his attendance in Scouting. He is a winner of the Scout recognition award, LDS equivalent of the "God and country" honor given in Protestant churches.

He is one of three boys still at home in a family of five boys and one girl. Ronnie has had a longer struggle. He never has known the feeling of walking without crutches. He was stricken by polio when only 13 months old and learned to walk with a brace on one leg and crutches to help.

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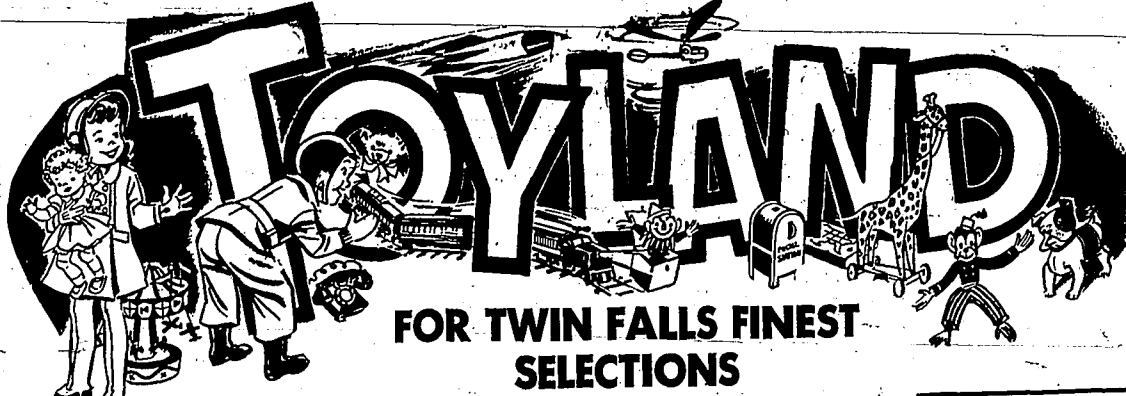

Risky, Profitable Japan Black Market Is Raising Hob With Nation's Economy

Japan has a rigid embargo on yen leaving the country or the exchange of yen for dollars for export. If a Japanese needs dollars for import, goods not authorized for export, he has to get them on the black market. Currently he pays 400 yen per dollar—better than a 10 per cent premium over the legal 360 to 1 exchange rate.

How many of these dollars filter into communist hands through the China has military authorities bothered.

One American, who went into the black market to buy yen for living expenses, dropped the practice like a hot potato after one of his checks on a U. S. bank cleared through Hong Kong.

"With living costs what they are in Japan," he told a friend, "I wasn't against a bit of profit. But after that check cleared through Hong Kong, I was all for it."

Not everyone is that concerned, however. Besides liquor, cigarettes and money, there is also a brisk demand for American drugs, medical supplies, electrical appliances, radios, long-playing records and hundreds of other goods. What does it all add up to?

One American in Tokyo who has dealt in the black market—on both sides—says the annual gross exceeds \$50 million dollars. If anything, his estimate seems low.

There are dozens of "black market alleys" in crowded Tokyo. Some are several blocks long and crowded with stalls after stall and small stores dealing mostly in American name brand golf clubs.

The first price asked for a set of six matched irons was 40,000 yen (\$111.11). Perfectly crased on the box was the marking \$35, which a check showed was the Tokyo post office exchange price for that particular set.

The second stall offered an identical set for \$5,000. The third made it \$3,000. Going around an second time, the drops were smaller. The final price was \$2,000—\$59.84, or double the FX price.

In other stalls were radios, electronic devices, long-playing records, foodstuffs, electrical household appliances, and one table model radio-phonograph—all American name brand products.

American coffee, cosmetics and liquor ranged from 2 1/2 to 3 times post exchange prices. Reserve stocks in case lots were visible.

In one alley wires of American servicemen reportedly sell coffee and other food purchased from services commissaries. In "farmers" in the service wife, however, it should be reported that tours of that alley on two successive afternoons turned up only a scant dozen American women, and they appeared to be sightseers. None was seen carrying packages into the alley entrance and none was buying.

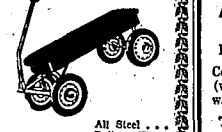

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Nov. 28.—An "accidental" Negro threw a queen into the air during the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II Friday when she spread his coat on the ground and stepped on it.

A policeman grabbed the fellow, humped back. She then walked to one side to avoid stepping on the coat.

This occurred just before the queen embarked at Port Royal, outside Kingston, for Panama. Wally Davis, photographer for the Miami Daily News, witnessed it from a balcony just above the queen.

"The guy was doing a Sir Walter Raleigh as the queen walked along and approached a slightly wet spot on the pavement of the military drill ground," Davis said.

"He peddled off his coat, threw it on the ground and said something, but I was too far away to hear what was said."

"As the man threw his coat, the queen was within six or eight feet and she stepped, looked startled, humped back."

"A man in military uniform stuck one end of the fellow's belly and the other three both his hands into the air."

"A policeman grabbed the fellow, humped him back into the crowd and the queen walked on as if nothing had happened."

"As the policeman led the man away, he said to a girl accompanying him, 'Let them know I meant no harm. I have done nothing to hurt the queen.'"

The girl was wearing a sash bearing the queen's portrait. The Negro seemed to be wearing a lapel emblem inscribed, "God save the Queen."

New Seizure Law of 1953 Is Challenged

WALLACE, Nov. 28 (AP)—A 1953 law on condemnation of Idaho property was challenged in district court Friday on the grounds it violates both the Idaho and United States constitutions.

The challenge was made through a demurrer to condemnation suits filed by the Yellowstone Pipe Line company, which is building an oil line from Billings, Mont., to Spokane.

The defendants in the suit, Mr. and Mrs. A. Stumpf, Einstein Boyin and Mrs. A. Victor Eason, obtained an injunction preventing the company from taking immediate possession of their property, as allowed under the 1953 law.

Attorneys for the defendants argued that the law not only was unconstitutional, but improperly invoked in this case, because the pipeline is not for public use in Idaho, but does not develop any material or natural resources of the state or preserve the health of Idaho residents.

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Army Prefers New Location For Big Dam

SEATTLE, Nov. 28 (AP)—The army corps of engineers announced Friday it now favors a point four miles farther upstream than previously suggested for the multi-purpose Libby dam project on the Kootenai River.

This point is 15 miles north of Libby, Mont. The engineers will back a project there if the matter is resubmitted to the international joint commission.

Approval by Colonel The announcement was made here by Col. N. A. Mathias, Seattle district engineer of the corps, for Maj. Gen. Samuel D. Stewart, chief of engineers.

Libby dam was authorized by congress in the flood-control act of May 11, 1936, as an element in the engineers' master control plan for the Columbia river basin. The dam also suggested in this report, however, was at a point 11 miles upstream from Libby.

New Site OK'd Further investigation, Colonel Mathias said, led to adoption of the site 15 miles upstream on what is known as river mile 217. The engineers decided this point was the most feasible from the construction-economy standpoint because it avoided heavier railroad and highway relocations and eliminated any possibility of an adverse effect upon import industries, the colonel said.

The project is a now proposed contemplated expenditure of \$263,321,000 for a 400-foot high dam. The powerhouse installation would include six 140,000 horsepower turbines with 100,000 kilowatt generators, with provisions for future installation of two more units providing a total of 200,000 kilowatts.

This is usually given as around 10,000 degrees Fahrenheit. This heat would evaporate a man instantly.

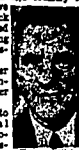

SCIENCE, Nov. 22 (AP)—Public health officials plan to submit statistics on all Idaho counties with populations over 20,000 as possible sites for experimental use of a new polio vaccine, Director L. J. Peterson said Friday.

Peterson released a letter from Dr. Hart E. Van Piper, former health officer and director of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, outlining plans for experimental use of the vaccine.

Van Piper said the foundation planned to inoculate between 500,000 and one million children between the months of February and June.

He said areas would be selected upon the basis of:

- 1. High polio incidence during the past five years.
- 2. High epidemic rate between June and September for the past five years.
- 3. High rate of incidence in a specific age group.
- 4. Adequate full-time local health departments to assist in administration and to follow up the experimental inoculations.

T. F. Cooney included Peterson said preliminary checks showed that Ada, Blaine, Canyon and Twin Falls counties appeared most likely to fill the conditions.

The administration of this vaccine would be submitted for the years 1948-53 by single year of age and including the number of elementary schools in each county.

He explained that administration would probably be easier in counties with large schools.

The foundation said it preferred counties with more than 50,000 people—which would rule out all in the Gem state except Ada and Canyon—but would accept smaller ones if other conditions were right.

Hershey Opposes Shift of Draftee Mental Standard

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Lewis S. Hershey said Friday he is opposed to any raise in the mental requirements for draftees, noting that for 10 or 12 years he has contended the existing level is too high.

"In my training time is a consideration of the armed forces in their reported study of a plan to raise the mental standards," the director of selective service told a reporter.

"For the armed forces to say they will never use men who cannot pass a mental examination is undemocratic. To say they will not use them until we are in a war is illogical."

"You do not have as much time to train such men—and we are all agreed it takes more time to train such men—in time of war as in peace."

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

By RICHARD DEVLINER (Pastor, First Christian Church) Even though Thanksgiving day is past, the spirit of thankfulness knows no season. Today the world is full of modern Columbus who think they are somewhere other than where they are.

When Christopher Columbus sailed he was trying to find a new route to the East Indies. After a long, tedious voyage he finally came to a land which he thought was the one he sought.

Not until about a decade had passed did a navigator named Amerigo Vesputi make the startling discovery that Columbus had never reached the East Indies, but that his trip had been permanently stopped by a long continent that stretched broadly from pole to pole far out in the Atlantic—a continent that he named "America" for himself.

This incident is recounted to point out the fact there are a great many people like Columbus who do not know to give thanks. They never really get as far as they think they do. Instead of setting all the way to their ultimate objective, their ships of thanksgiving are washed up onto the beaches of habit and custom.

Like Columbus, such people think they have reached their goal when they actually have traveled less than half the distance. The undiscovered country of thanksgiving is still far beyond them.

We must realize that true thanksgiving goes beyond a mere "thank you" for the gift received to a sincere appreciation of that gift on the part of the recipient. It will be necessary for us to cultivate an appreciation for us to cultivate an appreciation of the gift.

But rather upon the giver of these gifts—God. There is another vital discovery in this unknown country of thanksgiving—the importance of sharing with others the things we have received.

The prophet Amos saw selfishness and frowned upon it with disgust. He warned the people that simply because they had the privilege and blessing of the Lord, they were not safe for all time. They were expected to use this privilege and blessing to help others.

Thanksgiving is our distinctive American holiday. It celebrates not battle, no fall of the Bastille, no birth of a nation, no anniversary of statesmen or conquerors, no writing of a document or inauguration of a ruler—but it can represent the great principle—the exploration of a land of undiscovered gratitude.

We can find the true meaning of Thanksgiving by developing an appreciation of the gift, a love for the giver, and a willingness to share with others.

In our discovery and exploration of this cooperatively unknown country of thanksgiving, we must learn that it is necessary to go beyond an appreciation for the gift to a love for the giver. The gift is comparatively meaningless unless the giver is appreciated.

In the early days of our country, the emphasis was not upon the gift, but rather upon the giver of these gifts—God.

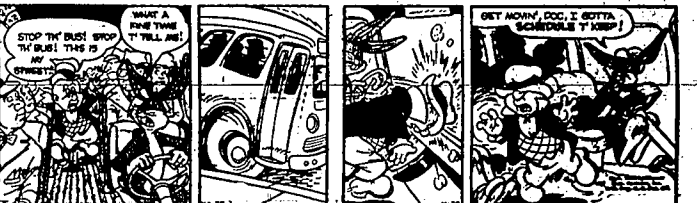

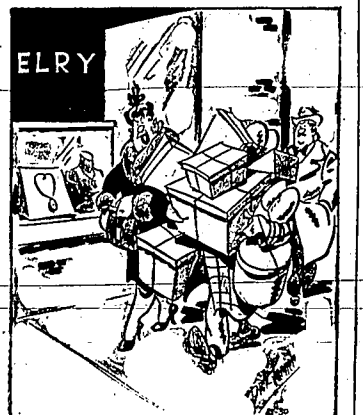

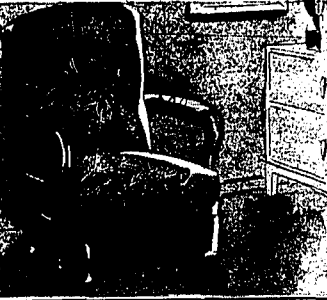
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
