## West Europe Papers 'Splash' Ike's Talk; Editors Cautious

LONDON, Dec. 9.—President Eisenhower's proposal for an atomic pool for peace was splashed over front pages today but most editors cautiously refrained from comment until they could give it further study. There was no immediate official comment either from European chancelleries although the President's plan was welcomed in unofficial quarters. Most editorial reaction was concentrated in Britain—where papers hailed the speech—and in France. French anti-communist papers were mainly favorable. The afternoon Paris Presse thought the speech needed more clarification. "A more precise plan was awaited," it said, "and clarity was not the dominant quality of Eisenhower's speech. He posed a certain number of general principles which require more ample explanation." The two right-wing newspapers, Le Figaro and L'Aurore said the next move is up to the Russians. "The plan is presented in very generous terms, and its efficacy depends on the good faith and sincerity of the nations taking part in it," said Le Figaro. "It will be interesting to see the reaction of the Soviets." L'Aurore commented: "The next move now, naturally, is up to the Russians. The evolution of international relations depends on their reply and on the good or bad will they show." The left-wing, non-communist France Libre called the speech a "bold, dramatic call to reason," and added: "There is no doubt the stand of a statesman in great part responsible for the destiny of civilization, in the logical consequence of the race to the death between the two great powers since Russia began making atom and hydrogen bombs." Tribune, a communist newspaper, said the President's speech "wasn't at all what people had hoped for." "Russia has often made concrete proposals for banning atomic weapons," it said. Eisenhower's speech in no way constitutes an acceptance of these," it said. In the Netherlands, the Labor party organ Vrije Volk said: "The question now is what Moscow will do. If Moscow also feels its responsibility, then it is not yet too late. Humanity awaits its reaction with great tension." London's Independent Times said the speech "suggested the final practical step which could be taken without a full-scale disarmament plan." The liberal News Chronicle said Eisenhower's plan would "replace complete deadlock with a form of action," and the Laborite Daily Herald said the gesture "may at least be a lifting of the burden of fear that weighs so heavily on men's hearts." ## Woolgrower Meet Panel Sees Duty Hike as Possible Threat

LONG BEACH, Calif., Dec. 9.—Although the wool industry needs assurance, a higher tariff may not be the answer. This view came from panel discussions at the annual convention of the National Wool Growers Association, most of whose members oppose import duties on wool. Some panel speakers Tuesday expressed fear that increasing the cost of imported wools—as by boosting import duties—might induce American clothing manufacturers to turn to synthetic fabrics. Agriculture Secretary Benson today disputes that source of subsidy or unusual aid to growers probably is needed to insure survival of the domestic industry. "This is accepted generally as fact by the growers, who agree things are not good in their industry," Sen. Frank A. Barrett, R. Wyo., told the panel that, if it were up to him, he'd raise the tariffs. Other countries might not like it but he doubts if we have as many friends abroad now as we had 30 years ago anyway." The economy of 200 counties in the West is dependent upon sheep growers, said Barrett. "If something isn't done to help them soon, in 25 years we'll need a statue of sheep in the Smithsonian Institution to let people know what one looked like." "You can talk about free trade all you want to, but nations act in their own interest. By shipping all the money out of the United States we want bring other nations up to the United States standard of living; we'll bring ourselves down to their standard." Ernest Bentley, president of the Boston Wool Trade Association, said the growers' only customers are the manufacturers, and if tariffs on wool imports are increased the probability is that the clothing makers will turn to synthetics to avoid paying higher prices for materials like wool. In agreement with Bentley was Everett L. Kent, president of the United Association of Wool Manufacturers. Kent added that some of the new synthetic fibres are nearly the same as the old wools, and lend themselves more effectively to blending. He doesn't think the industry would benefit by higher tariffs on foreign wool. Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R. N. D., said he doesn't think tariffs are relevant.

## Student Kills High School Coach in Tiff

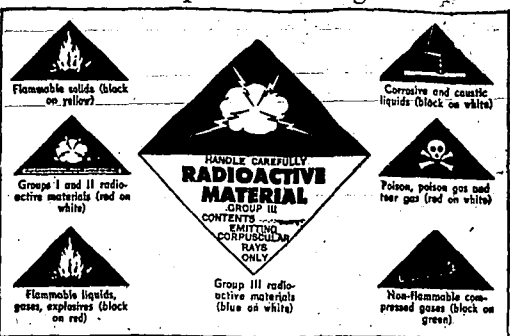

## Power Policy Inquiry Studies In Northwest Urged by Morse

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse said today the senate anti-monopoly subcommittee should look into the interior department's power policies in the northwest.

The Oregon independent said he will ask subcommittee Chairman William Langer, R., N. D., to expand its current inquiry to include northwest problems, particularly the development of Hells canyon on the Snake river.

Langer's subcommittee, an arm of the senate judiciary committee, has been holding hearings on the interior department's new power marketing policies in the Missouri basin. Langer told a witness yesterday he would not be adverse to broadening the inquiry into a nationwide investigation.

The chairman's statement came after Fred G. Aandahl, assistant secretary of interior, testified that the administration's policy and changes in the Missouri basin marketing plan, are designed to check a trend toward "federal monopoly."

Aandahl ran into some sharp questioning by Sen. James E. Murray, D., Idaho, who defended the policies of the previous Democratic administration and asked whether the new policy would not cut off farmers from cheap power and foster a different monopoly.

Another Democrat, Sen. Edwin G. Johnson, Colo., joined in criticism of the new Missouri basin policy. Johnson said he believes congress will not go along with the policy but will junk it as soon as it has a chance.

The new policy requires that "preference" customers for government-produced power must make firm, long term estimates of their needs by Jan. 1. Thereafter the interior department will be free to tie up its excess power in irrevocable long-term contracts with non-preference users.

The old system gives the preference users—like farm cooperatives and municipally-owned power companies—first call on government power without the restrictions.

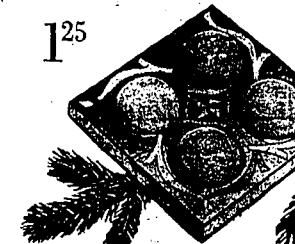
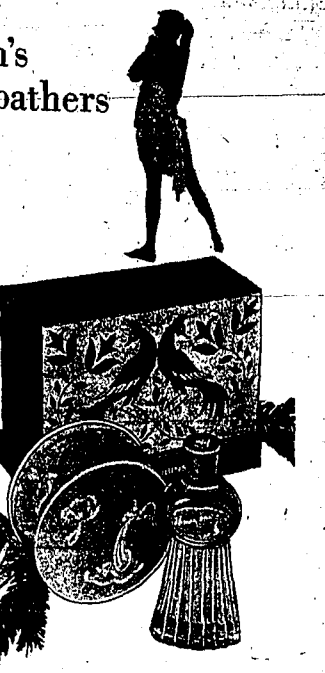

Sixteen tree farms at Kamiah were brought into the program this year.

George Beardmore, secretary, reported on the group's stand on lands condemned by the federal government.

He said the association takes the position payment for such lands is not adequate, and that it should be replaced by land in federal ownership.

**No Reluctance**

"With federal ownership in the state of Idaho at about 20 per cent of the land area, there should be no reluctance on the part of the government to replace lands taken with lands of comparable value," he said.

Idaho State Forester Roger Guernsey, Boise, suggested at a morning session that Idaho fire districts be zoned for tax purposes. Rates for zones with merchantable trees could be increased from three to four cents, he said, while rates for woodland, brush and grass zones would remain at three cents.

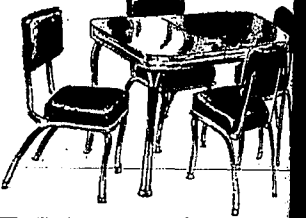

## Key Sentence in Eisenhower Talk Tells Of Great Gains in U. S. H-Bomb Work

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (U.P.)—The U. S. atomic stockpile now possesses a family of hydrogen superatoms with the heaviest member packing more violence than one million tons of TNT.

That, a high atomic source said today, is "the plain English" of one revelation-filled sentence in President Eisenhower's address to the United Nations general assembly Tuesday afternoon.

"Atomic bombs today are more than 25 times as powerful as the weapons with which the atomists are dawning, while hydrogen weapons are in the ranges of millions of tons of TNT equivalent."

In subsequent paragraphs the President gave the world, for the first time, an order-of-magnitude statement on the size of America's atomic arsenal, revealed that this country has enough material to lay waste an entire aggressor nation, and confirmed that all branches of the U. S. military can now wage atomic war.

He also implied that Russia may have exploded more than one test H-bomb. And he conceded frankly that there is no "absolute" defense against atomic aggression.

But with that one 23-word sentence he disclosed more hard information about U. S. atomic weapons development than had come from any other source since the war.

The two A-bombs which killed more than 100,000 Japanese in World war II were 20,000-tonners in terms of TNT. The only official statement on the modern A-bomb, until the President spoke, had been a cryptic remark by the atomic energy commission that atomic weapons were "several times more powerful" than the wartime model.

Scientific circles here had believed it would be difficult if not impossible to build an A-bomb equivalent to more than 200,000 tons of TNT. But Mr. Eisenhower's statement means the big A-bomb of 1953 packs the blast effect of more than 500,000 tons of TNT going off all at once.

It was the second half of his sentence, however, that startled his listeners in Washington. Last Nov. 1, the AEC at Richland tested a hydrogen device "highly qualified" for use as a weapon.

It was a five-megaton blast in the jargon of atomic weapons. But it was not a weapon. One person who saw it explode said the test device was as big as a beach-comber's shack. No airplane or missile could have carried it to a target.

Early last spring the AEC was reported pushing a "burry-up" crash program to whip together some deliverable H-device which could accurately be called weapons.

But not until the President spoke had there been any official confirmation that the H-bomb finally had moved into the stockpile.

An authoritative source told the United Press every sentence in the President's speech was fashioned with great care. And this source said there is only "one reasonable interpretation" of the words:

"... Hydrogen weapons are in the range of millions of tons of TNT equivalent."

The President's plain meaning, he said, is that this country now has hydrogen weapons — plural, not singular; and weapons, not devices — hanging upwards from more than one megaton.

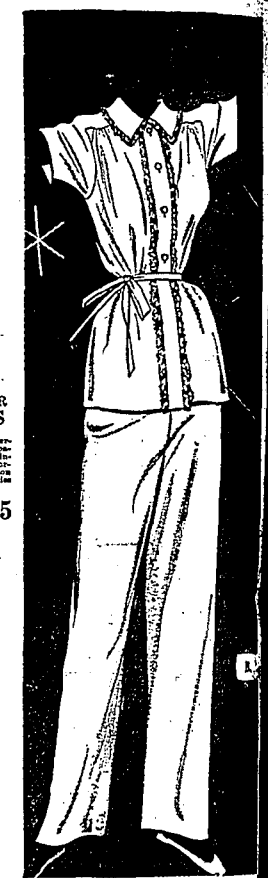

## USAF Working on Pilotless Bombers As It Pushes Guided Missile Research

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (UP)—The air force is working on at least two pilotless bomber models as it pushes research toward development of guided missiles that can accurately span an ocean.

But before true guided missiles of such range can be ready, manned long range rocket bombers of fantastic speeds may be in use as an interim weapon.

Least of these experimental weapons is the Northrop XB-45, called the "Shuttle" after the mythical creature in the tale by Lewis Carroll and officially designated as a "bomber missile."

The air force has declined to give additional details. But there is speculation that the XB-45 is a jet-powered craft with range designed as something beyond that of long-range missiles. It apparently carries its own navigational and "homing" systems, operating without a remote control "mother" plane.

"The air force for some time has been conducting extensive tests with another surface-to-surface weapon, the Martin 'Maldor,' jet-powered and launched from a ramp, these pilotless bombers are being fired over a 1,000-mile cross-water test range.

With newly developed fuels, guided missile experts believe that even now it might be possible to fire something like the V-2 at distances

equivalent to the span of the Atlantic ocean. But perfection of reliable long range guidance systems which could not be "confused" by enemy countermeasures remains to be attained.

Meanwhile, aircraft engine designers are telling to improve, and especially to provide better fuel economy, for the rocket motor in manned aircraft.

Lieut.-Gen. D. L. Pelt, chief of the air force research command, has said rocket motors will replace both conventional jet engines in

planes—including bombers.

With-in a recent address, said that when the rocket fuel problem is solved the only speed and altitude limitations will be a plane's structural strength and aerodynamic design.

A rocket-driven laboratory plane has hit a top speed of 1,277 miles an hour, more than twice the speed of sound.
