State Will Uphold Ex Prisoner Calls Russ 'Brutes and Barbarians,' Governor Pledges

NAMPA, Dec. 10 (UP)—Gov. Len Jordan assured the Idaho today the state will take positive action to rid Idaho of machines should the supreme court rule that the game machines are illegal.

The court agrees that the 1953 legislation repealed the machine law or holds that the 1947 licensing act is illegal, will move to get rid of them," the governor promised.

It was the last major speaker to address the Grange at its annual convention here. The session was to conclude later after consideration of resolutions and reports from committees.

Demo Pair on Claims Board Fired by 'Ike'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—President Eisenhower fired the two remaining Democratic members of the Claims Board today after they refused to resign from the \$140,000-a-year job.

The board is a three-man commission—two Republicans and one Democrat—to replace the two discredited Democrats and Chairman Daniel F. Clavin, who was fired by the president.

The president named as new commissioners Daniel F. Clavin, 57, former member of the Kentucky Republican state committee, and William E. Demott, 54, a Democrat, who died recently.

Mr. Eisenhower notified Mrs. Clavin and Mr. Demott that they are being removed from office as of tomorrow. Both had refused to resign their positions as requested last August.

Woman Included

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Jurors Convict Man Of Drunken Driving

John Keegan, Kimberly, was convicted of drunken driving Wednesday afternoon in Twin Falls police court. A jury of six women took only 12 minutes to select a foreman and return a unanimous verdict of guilty. Judge J. O. Humphrey asked W. L. Dunn, defense attorney, if he had reason for wishing judgment deferred. Dunn said, "Well naturally I wish the case." The court scheduled passing of sentence for 3 p.m. Thursday. Keegan is awaiting trial also on another charge of drunken driving.

Most Decline Comment

The juror declined comment for publication, but Henry Ford 12 U. S. delegate to the U. N. general assembly, gave a quick answer to the initial questions on Mr. Eisenhower's plan.

"They're right," Ford said.

Other observers regarded the Russian remark as only a preliminary maneuver.

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White House Stays 'Hopeful' on Soviet Okay of Atom Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The White House said today the United States still is "very hopeful" Soviet leaders will recognize President Eisenhower's international atomic pool proposal "for what it is—a serious and feasible first step toward atomic peace."

James C. Hagerty, presidential press secretary, made the statement in reply to requests for comment on Moscow's adverse reaction to Eisenhower's plan.

Radio Moscow accused the President Wednesday night of threatening atomic war.

The proposal by Mr. Eisenhower called for the creation of an international pool of atomic materials and know-how for peaceful purposes.

Reads statement to newsmen:

"We do not believe that immediate reaction to President Eisenhower's atomic proposal necessarily represents the considered decision of the Soviet government."

"After all, the President has suggested that the Soviet Union would require thousands of tons of atomic materials."

"Therefore, any 24-hour reaction by Soviet officials or by Soviet propaganda cannot be accepted as anything more than a stoppage, interim statement."

"We are still very hopeful that the Soviet leader will recognize the President's proposal for what it is—a serious and feasible first step toward atomic peace."

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19, Held for Holdup Theft of Car

19-year-old Buhl man with a criminal record is being held in the county jail pending arraignment in Twin Falls court on a charge of robbery. Clinton Martindale was held by Twin Falls officers Thursday morning with a 1952 Buick convertible he is alleged to have taken at gunpoint Wednesday night from Howard Hickman, about 21, while service station attendant.

Shannon identified Martindale as the holdup man and the complaint. Sheriff Jesse Carlton said Martindale claims he purchased the car from a man named "Spike" but another man whom he didn't know delivered the car to him about 8 p.m. Wednesday in Buhl.

Martindale offered no resistance when arrested, but had a loaded .22 caliber revolver in his possession, the sheriff said. The Buick convertible car had been placed over the plates on the Hickman residence.

Mrs. Katherine Tilly, 16, Buhl, told officers the car around with Martindale all night. She said he was taken to the jail.

Other family members found him only in unbecoming, bending over the girl, and with his good arm holding a knife. Officers tried to protect her against attack. One arm hurt, the other bled from laceration he received in breaking the window.

When finally placed under a physical care, he, too, lapsed into unconsciousness. He was taken to the hospital.

Later he told his mother this account of his mishaps.

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Jordan Adds to Blast Against Power Plans

BOISE, Dec. 10 (UP)—Gov. Len Jordan took another look at an initiative proposal to establish an Idaho Power and Commission today, saying, "I don't know what it all means, but it doesn't look good."

The governor had said earlier yesterday he would "voluntarily oppose" any attempt to put Idaho in the power business. He grew even more alarmed when he discovered the section dealing with communications.

"It looks like an attempt to socialize the state, and I don't want any part of it," the governor declared.

Jordan said the real situation to communications escaped his notice when he signed the initiative. He said the proposal has more far-reaching implications "than first met the eye."

Not Qualified

The communications section is not qualified by definition, he said, but it could be taken to mean telegraph, radio, telephone, and other means of delivering information. Jordan pointed to one section saying "any property falling in the communications category and which is not a public utility, shall be owned and operated by the state."

"I have no idea what its actual meaning is," the governor said, "but I don't want any part of it."

He said he would ask for interpretation of the section by the courts. He also wants to know what the act would cover, and what would be granted to such a commission if it were legislated into existence.

The proposal was filed with the secretary of state Tuesday by the Idaho Citizens Legislative committee, headed by E. M. Humphrey, who is also a member of the committee. Earlier Tuesday the committee had filed articles of incorporation with the state. B. Wilson, Twin Falls, was one of the incorporators.

Dividends on NSLI Policies Slated in 1954

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—All holders of National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policies will receive a regular dividend of \$100 million dollars next year, the War Relocation Authority announced today.

VA offices will handle the bulk of the payments, with the checks going out about 60 days after the 1954 anniversary date of the policies.

Top About \$60 million of term policies who are 40 years old, the biggest group in the government insurance plan, will get 80 cents per month, or \$9.60 of insurance for each year ending on the anniversary date. The top individual dividend will be about \$50.

VA spokesman said policies have been in force three years or longer except for veterans on active duty during the Korean war who have now returned to civil life.

Some Exempted Dividends will go to veterans who returned to active service with a permanent disability, or to those who were required to pay premiums for their policies. Korean veterans will be eligible to participate, if they have paid a premium for one or more months after service.

The 1954 dividend will raise dividends to the holders of NSLI service policies to the \$100 million mark. VA officials urged veterans to inquire to a minimum permit fast distribution of the money. Veterans who filed requests for payment of their 1952 and 1953 dividends in cash, they said, need not wait.

Reds Dead Set Against Korea Peace Conclave, U. S. Thinks

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The communists, with Moscow's blessing, apparently are dead set against calling a Korean peace conference, American officials said today.

Barring a surprise shift in North Korean and Chinese communist tactics at Panmunjom, Korea, officials said the long-winded preliminary efforts to set up a peace conference seem headed for an early breakdown. They said the outlook had suddenly taken a "very bad" turn at Panmunjom.

Deep pessimism over attaining a peace conference was reported to have been reflected in official dispatches to the state department by U. S. Special Ambassador Arthur H.

Dean, representing the 17 Korean war allies at the peace talks.

In spite of the gloomy outlook, however, Dean reported from Panmunjom that he had received new instructions from Secretary of State John Foster Dulles to do "everything conceivable" to get a conference on the basis of the allied 17-point "final offer."

It was the communists' flat rejection of this plan that provided experts here with a tipoff on red unwillingness to agree to a meeting on anything but their own terms.

Experts searching for the motives behind the communist stalling tactics speculated that:

1. The Kremlin had ordered a halt to negotiations in order to hold

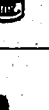
a Korean settlement out as "bait" for a big fire party between Russia, the United States, British, France and red China. Soviet Foreign Minister M. V. Molotov may reject the Korean problem and red China's "right" to discuss it at the proposed Jan. 4 big four foreign ministers' meeting in Berlin.

2. The communists had hoped to get the Korean peace problem into the United Nations general assembly debates again to weaken the allied stand against further action on Korea, the communists will continue to stall a peace conference.

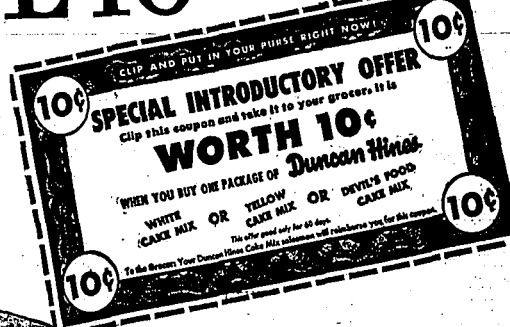
3. The communists want to delay action in order to split the allies. One prime possibility of this center on South Korean President Syngman Rhee's repeated threats to start the war again. This would cause a serious crisis in the allied camp.

Russ Release Of Prisoners Is Demanded

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The United States has demanded for the second time that Russia free all Americans held in Soviet prison camps.

The step was reported today to have been taken late last month because the Russians had failed to give a speedy reply to an earlier U.S. note.

Nov. 2 Note First

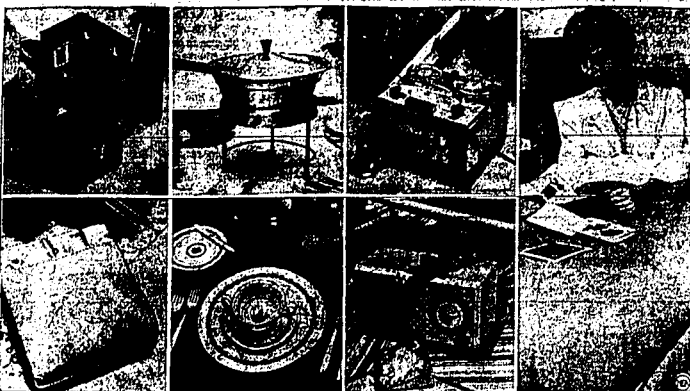
The original note demanding freedom of all Americans was delivered to the Kremlin Nov. 2 by Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen. The demand was based on reports of Austrian World War II prisoners returning from Russia who they saw Americans in a Soviet prison camp.

Officials said the American embassy followed up the original note with a second one Nov. 23. In it the United States restated its position that all Americans in Russian prisons should be freed and again asked for a reply.

Only 2 Certain

So far, the only two Americans the department feels sure are in Soviet hands are Pvt. Homer J. Cox, 31, Oklahoma City, and Leland Myers, 26, San Francisco. Both were reported in Soviet hands by the Russians in late November. The note was broadened to include other Americans because there have been vague reports from time to time that other U.S. citizens are being held by the Soviets.

Two Senators Firm in Views On Debt Curb

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—A Democratic and Republican senator who helped shape President Roosevelt's request for a hike in the national debt limit last August said today they are standing firm.

Senators Malone, D-Mo., and Johnson, D-Colo., said in separate interviews they are still against any increase in the limit.

Both are on the finance committee, which voted 11-4 to table the debt limit boost despite strong pleas from Treasury Secretary Humphrey and Budget Director Joseph M. Dodge.

There have been strong hints from the treasury that a renewed request for an increase from \$75 to \$200 billion dollars will be made to the senate soon after congress comes back Jan. 6. The house already passed such a hike last summer and, if the amount were not changed, would not have to be passed again.

The issue could become one of the first to embroil the senate in 1943. The treasury has argued it will be difficult and perhaps impossible to finance operations of the government next year without raising the debt ceiling. Indications are the administration still faces an uphill fight in the senate finance committee.

Malone said today he felt the present debt limit was a safeguard against further tax boosts.

Johnson said he remains "unalterably opposed" to the boost. He said he regards the ceiling as the last opportunity for congress to keep some control of federal spending.

"I've surrendered on this issue," he said, "we have lost control of the purse strings."

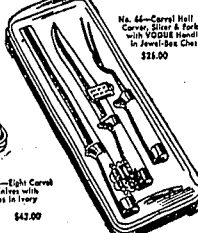
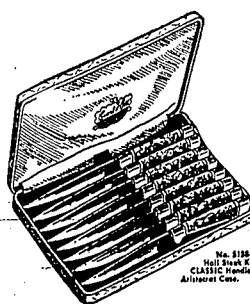

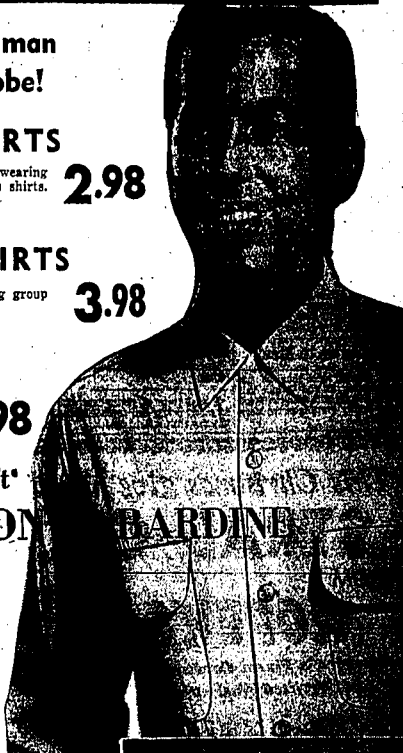

Support Rate For '54 Wool Is Announced

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The agriculture department announced Wednesday that producer prices of 1954 crop wool will be supported at an average of 52.1 cents a pound, gross basis. That is one per cent below this year's support average.

The new rate is designed to reflect 50 per cent of the parity price of wool at the start of the wool marketing year next April 1.

The department said that should the wool parity price be higher next April than now estimated, the support rate would be increased accordingly. But in no event will it be less than the 52.1 cents announced Wednesday.

The department said operating details of the 1954 support program will be announced in April. There has been speculation in farm quarters that Agriculture Secretary Benson will propose use of production payments as a means of supporting wool and mohair prices.

At present, these products are being supported by means of loans to producers on wool withheld from the market. Nearly 50 million pounds of wool is stored under support programs.

Under a production payment plan, all wool would be allowed to move to market. If grower prices were less than the support rate, the government would pay producers the difference in the form of a subsidy.

Chemical Firm Official Blasts AEC Delay in A-Development

Dr. Powers also said that the failure to plan for production of one, such as bomb, is a waste of the situation in the world with the war now in progress. He said the government is able to use only one of the atomic energy at a time in peacetime.

NEW STATIONS

Since the new channels in this area will be VHF your present receiver will be able to receive it without any change. It may be necessary in some cases to have an adjustment made in the antenna system for best performance, as new stations come on the air.

COLOR TV

At this time experiments are in progress to perfect a color system which will not make present black and white television sets obsolete. While notable progress has been made toward achieving this objective, perfection of such a system will require additional time.

GENERAL POINTS

Now for some varied matters that will interest you. If you want to do your own installing, or if you want to buy a set but don't want to sign up for a service contract, ask your retailer if he will sell you a set under those conditions.

If you think you're an expert, maybe you can install the set yourself. If not, you can call in a television serviceman and pay him for the job.

If you don't want to buy a service contract, it's up to you to call in a service or repairman when needed, and to pay for each service job on a time and material basis. Your serviceman, if he is to be competent at all, must be a highly-trained specialist and, as such, he is entitled to be paid for his time. Any profit made on necessary parts supplied is usually not sufficient to compensate a servicing dealer for such wages, as well as for overhead, maintenance of trucks and repair equipment, insurance, etc. Avoid service offers which imply you will get something for nothing. One way of determining the responsibility of a repairman is whether he will give you a written estimate of costs before doing the job and a breakdown of his charges afterwards. Another is evidence of satisfactory servicing he has done in your neighborhood.

Although some set owners may have the mechanical skill to make minor replacements, or adjustments, it is generally not advisable to go beyond the recommendations of the manufacturer to the set owner in this connection. The sensible procedure for you to follow when something goes wrong with your set is first to go to your service company

or the retailer. If they can't or won't help you with your problem, you may obtain advice from the manufacturer's local distributor.

BEFORE YOU CALL YOUR SERVICEMAN

Check the following list of suggestions:

1. If the set is completely dead, is the line cord plugged into the electric outlet? If the cord is plugged in, unplug it and try a lamp in the same outlet. If the lamp lights try the set when plugged in again.
2. Look at the antenna wire on the back of the set. Make sure the leads are firmly connected to the terminals on the set and that the bare leads are not touching each other.
3. If the sound is normal, but you have no picture, turn the brightness control full on and also try another channel.
4. If the picture is normal, but you have no sound, adjust the "fine-tuning" control with the volume control turned full on. Also try another channel.
5. In suggestions 3 and 4, if only one channel is affected, allow the station time to announce any technical difficulty which might have occurred.
6. If sound is normal and picture tube has light with the brightness control full on, but the picture is rolling, tearing out or no picture on all channels, adjust the "horizontal hold" or "vertical hold" controls. Try reducing and increasing the contrast (picture control).

Indians Blast Plan to Trim U. S. Service

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 10.—The National Congress of American Indians voiced strong opposition today to proposed withdrawal of federal services for Indians because of fears they would be left stranded and without means of continued progress.

The resolution on federal Indian assistance was passed by the 300 delegates at last night's closing session.

Notice House Bill
Referring to house concurrent resolution 106, the resolution said it "gives sweeping indication of congressional intention to enact legislation to terminate federal services for Indians. This must not happen in any area or community where to do so would leave the Indians with inadequate services, or none at all."

The three-day convention passed 10 resolutions. Another measure asked that the federal government assert and prosecute prior and superior rights of Indians in use of Colorado river water.

Other Measures
Also voted were measures which would urge no passage of legislation affecting Indians without full consultation and discussion with tribes and states involved; urge the bureau of Indian affairs to recognize local tribal governing bodies before disposing of tribal funds; favor the return of mineral lands on reservations when land is condemned for reclamation development; and urge formation of a national advisory committee on Indian affairs.

Joe Garry, 45, a Coeur d'Alene Indian from Plummer, Ida., was elected the congress' new president. The group selected James, Nev., as the site for next year's convention.

Too Many too Small?

Number of 'too Small' Farms Seen as One Root of Trouble

BY DOUGLAS LARSEN
WASHINGTON, (NPA).—Too many American farms are too small.

This could be one of the roots of the administrator's farm troubles. Since 1920 the trend has been toward larger farms. But a recent study by the department of agriculture indicates that it probably has not been fast enough.

In 1920 the average size of the American farm was 148 acres. Today it's 216 acres. Average like this doesn't really tell the story, however, because farms vary greatly in most economic aspects depending upon what they produce.

The most revealing figure from the study shows one-half of all the country's farm manpower is employed on small, low-production farms. These farms have about one-fifth of the total land resources yet produce one-tenth of the farm products grown for sale.

The big, mechanized, scientifically-run farm is the one that makes the big money. The average of these has 265.5 acres actually producing \$2,045 worth of salable farm products per year.

The average commercial farm, including the big corporate type farms but excluding the residential farms, actually has 119 acres under cultivation which produce \$3,858 worth of salable crops per year.

This means that the typical very big farm gets \$20 worth of crops from each acre, while the average of all commercial farms is a little less than half of that, or \$40 worth from each acre.

The report furnishes this partial explanation for the great difference.

"Small, low-producing commercial farms are considerably less efficient in use of resources than large and medium commercial farms. The larger farms use greater amounts of capital per farm and per worker, but they use less labor and less capital per unit of output. In general, the larger farms are more up-to-date in adoption of recent technological innovations."

The big, scientifically-run farms mostly produce beef, wheat and fruits and vegetables. The farmer who runs one is actually a business executive who rarely gets his hands on a plow. He studies market reports, cost studies of his labor and keeps close watch on new developments in farm machinery.

"The farmer trying to eke out a living from his scant acres is actually caught in the vice of a double trap in American agriculture. On one side he's competing against the super-farmer. And on the other side he finds himself competing with the amateur who has little to lose."

Since 1920 there has been a 50 per cent increase in the number of part-time and residential farms. These lands are owned and run by persons who derive almost all of their income from some other source.

Products from these farms compete on the market with all other agriculture produce, yet it is not a matter of vital concern to the proprietors whether prices are high or low, or whether there happens to be a drought. "They keep on farming regardless."

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Extension of Security Aid To Be Asked

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—Rep. Daniel A. Reed, R. N. Y., predicted today that congress will extend old-age insurance coverage next year to perhaps 10 million more persons.

Reed, chairman of the house ways and means committee, handling social security legislation, also said he thought congress should "explore the possibility" of increasing old-age insurance benefits.

Serves Notice
The New York Republican, frequently at odds with President Eisenhower in the last session over tax legislation, served notice he will resist any administration efforts to hold the social security tax rate at the present one and one-half per cent rate for employer and employee. The rate is scheduled to go to two per cent Jan. 1.

Mr. Eisenhower last year asked congress to delay the tax increase. There have been indications that the President would renew this request in the next session.

Concedes Cuts
Reed conceded some workers in the low income brackets will find their social security tax increase greater than their income tax cut because of the 10 per cent personal income tax reduction also scheduled to become effective Jan. 1.

"I believe that the American people want to pay for it," he said. "While strongly favoring reduction and believing that the people are entitled to a larger reduction than that now being offered, I believe that such a tax cut should be achieved at the expense of a sound social security system."

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP)—State Aeronautics Director Chester Moulton asked all Idaho fliers today to get an early start on listing their preferences for next year's "flying social events."

Despite the small farm owners' bleak outlook, a USDA expert does not think there will be any quick drastic change in the situation.

"Basic changes take place slowly in American agriculture," he says. "If a farmer doesn't make money one year he just takes in his belt a few notches."

Although the present trend toward lower farm prices is putting a special squeeze on the small fellow, the agriculture spokesman says, it doesn't mean that the big fellows are going to get bigger. Lower prices are hurting them, too.

There's no indication that big, collective farms are the answer, either. The average American farmer is considered too independent for that to happen. At worst the very few producers will be slowly squeezed out of their farms and the rather slow trend toward bigness will continue, slowly and over a long period.

Defense Boss Retains Rule On Size Cuts

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson has overruled service requests and ordered the army, navy and marine corps to take manpower cuts of about 10 per cent in fiscal 1937.

The service, the army foremost among them, had argued against the reductions, but Wilson is reported to have stood firm.

Huge Savings
His decision will mean a saving of one billion dollars or more in military pay for the 12-month fiscal period beginning next July 1. Informed sources said many millions more in secondary cuts—such as supplies, etc.—will be saved.

The air force will not be required to reduce its strength.

Overall, the Wilson decision will mean the United States will have about 2,200,000 officers and men in uniform by June 30, 1937, the end of fiscal 1938.

40,000 Drop
It also will mean, informed sources said, that between June 30, 1936, and June 30, 1937, the army will be forced to drop approximately 40,000 personnel, the marines about 20,000, and the navy about 70,000—a grand total of about 130,000.

It was learned that Wilson, Army Secretary Robert T. Ely, and Assistant Defense Secretary W. J. McNeil, the Pentagon's fiscal expert, settled the question at a long conference Saturday.

Hedrick said he has asked Sen. Arthur V. Watkins, R., Utah, to urge justice department officials to appeal.

"These Indians and their stock," Hedrick said, "were trespassing and in violation of a Utah court decree at the time the horses were picked up."

Cancer Claims Hit By Cigarette Firm

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—J. P. Lorillard company, a leading manufacturer of cigarettes, has assailed the scientific opinion alleging a connection between cigarette smoking and cancer of the lung.

It said it had "initiated a program of research which includes all facts thus far suggested that have a bearing on tobacco smoking and health." Its statement was signed by Harris S. Farnell, R. D. director of research.

Lorillard manufactures "Old Gold" and "Kent" cigarettes. It is the lead of Paul M. Hahn, president of the American Tobacco company ("Casper's" brand), who last month characterized the alleged connection as loose talk.

Cigarette Use Hikes Risk of Lung Cancers

NEW YORK, Dec. 10 (AP)—A science symposium has been told that cigarette smoking can cause cancer of the lung.

"Prolonged and heavy use of cigarettes increased up to 20 times the risk of developing cancer of the lung," declared Dr. Ernest L. Wynder of Memorial Cancer Research Institute for Cancer Research.

He said other medical men spoke on "the cigarette" before the greater New York dental meeting.

He reported that a survey of 1,000 men with lung cancer showed only 15 per cent were non-smokers. He added that studies of patients having other types of cancers disclosed 15 per cent were non-smokers.

A definite association between lung cancer and heavy smoking also was found in a survey of the smoking habits of more than 5,000 cancer patients in the United States, England, Germany, Switzerland, Denmark and Czechoslovakia, he said.

One object of research at present, he said, is to find the factors in cigarette smoke which may be causing lung cancer.

If found, he said, these factors could be removed from tobacco smoke.

Hero Necessary as Oxygen for Human Existence, Boyle Avers

NEW YORK, Dec. 10 (AP)—A hero is as necessary to a human being as oxygen.

Today a man is known not so much by the company he keeps as the heroes he admires.

There is a two-way relationship between any man and his hero. The hero helps him, and the man through "better" adds lustre to the hero's fame.

When you are young, your hero is old. But as you grow older, you choose your heroes more carefully. Usually they are people who have risen above problems that are a kind of Mr. Everett in your own life.

The nice thing about heroes is they never outgrow you. You outgrow and discard them.

For example, if you like football, you start with Frank Merriwell and his triumphs at Yale and go on to Coach Frank Leahy and his present problems at Notre Dame. Frank Merriwell always won the game, but to make a first down is Frank Leahy's only announced goal. "Our goal, like our heroes, grow smaller as we grow older."

Every man has to have a military hero. My first one was Alexander the Great. Most people think he died from trying to drink a gallon of wine in his early 30s while despairing there were no more worlds for him to conquer. I admired him not for his despair or his victories but because I had never met a man in his 30s who could afford a gallon of wine.

When I read later that Alexander the Great had died of brain fever, I lost interest in him. He became too remote.

It was the same way with Stonewall Jackson. He died at 36. After my 40th birthday, even reading of Stonewall Jackson disturbed me.

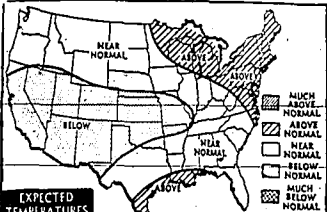

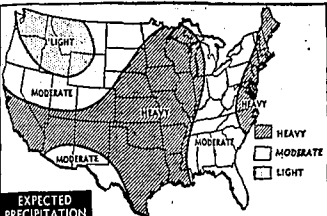

Cancer Symptoms Noticed by Worker; Saves Mother's Life

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP)—Mrs. John Boyd, Challis, offered living proof today that cancer, in many cases, need only be recognized to be cured. She is alive because her daughter, who used to doubt the value of such organizations as the Idaho Cancer society—winner of one of the training schools for volunteer workers.

The daughter, Mrs. Beulah Boyd Shoup, admitted she went to the school as a "doubting Thomas." But she completed the course "with enough knowledge of the malady to discover a suspicious symptom in her mother."

Mrs. Boyd said her story started in early 1952 when she tried to think of an excuse for declining an invitation to attend a cancer society training school in Pocatello.

She had solicited for two years for cancer fund-raising campaigns, because "I couldn't think of a plausible excuse to get out of it."

Besides, Mrs. Boyd said, "I had heard stories of how the training schools were working, but I was a doubting Thomas."

Mrs. Boyd said she decided to go anyway to see if the stories were true. They were.

She related how she arrived at the session and immediately was swept into a whirlwind of medical lectures, practice and advice, including what or what not to do in the many phases of cancer control.

"Incidentally," she said, "I learned that only a few cents of each dollar contributed went into training schools for workers and that it is a very small price to pay for the education and understanding the worker receives and carries back for the protection of his home territory."

"Well," said Mrs. Boyd, "if you are so smart, see what you can find wrong with me."

Mrs. Boyd, commenting that it was not her job to diagnose, started talking her mother about the seven danger signals she had learned.

It was then that the suspicious symptom was discovered.

A doctor at Salmon confirmed the suspicion of a tumor and Mrs. Boyd later went to Salt Lake City for a successful operation.

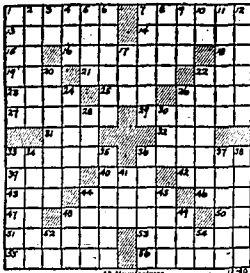

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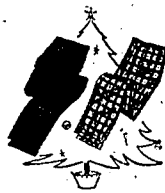

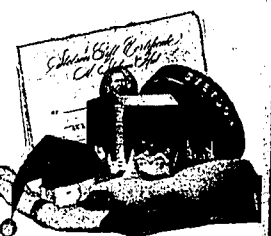
