The American negotiator Arthur Dean told a news conference in Seoul today "if absolutely nothing has happened by the end of the week, the time will have come for a definite decision." Dean would go no further, but apparently meant a decision for continuing the preliminary talks was to be made.

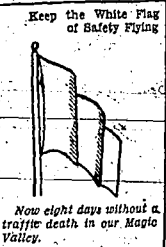

"I don't contemplate any major changes in policies. In my opinion we will come out with something everybody will be able to support," the American Farm Bureau federation said today.

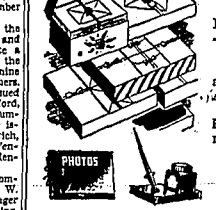

## Five-Point Plan for Aberdeen Grass Station Work Reported

Following is the five-point plan outlined by Dr. Kraus:

1. Emphasis will be placed on the breeding and improvement of species or strains of forage crops most important in Idaho. Principal ones will include the lucerne grasses, alfalfa, timothy and wheat grasses.
2. New species of forage crops will be evaluated for adaptability to Idaho and as possible parent material in breeding and improvement.
3. Continue work being done by the SCS on establishment, maintenance and evaluation of grasses and legumes on dry land, including range and abandoned farm land. This will involve plantings established some time ago on the Aberdeen airport and adjacent dry land areas.
4. Insofar as funds and personnel available will permit, the branch station will study cultural methods with various grasses, as related to establishment of stands, fertilizer responses, seed production and harvesting methods.
5. The branch station will continue to produce limited stocks of foundation grass seed of the principal varieties used in Idaho. These stocks will be distributed to registered seed growers through regular channels in cooperation with the Idaho Crop Improvement association.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12 (AP)—High-altitude officials of the LDS church laid the cornerstone Friday for its Los Angeles temple, a four-million-dollar edifice whose tower will soar 165 feet heavenward.

## Added Supply Of Yule Seals In Stock Here

Anyone desiring additional Christmas seals may obtain them from "Bunnings," the book store, or by telephoning 1839, says Mrs. J. C. Bunnings, county chairman of seal sales.

The seals are sold annually for the benefit of the National Tuberculosis association and the local subsidaries. The disease claimed 24 lives in Idaho in 1933 and 230 cases were reported. On June 30, the state department of public health listed 383 cases.

The 90-bed hospital at Gooding cares for Idaho residents without charge. Funds to maintain the hospital are appropriated by the state legislature from tax funds.

A new building with a 50-bed ward will be completed in 1935.

The mobile chest X-ray unit, purchased by state and county tuberculosis associations from Christmas seal funds, has finished the first four of the state with the exception of Ada county. The survey in that county is expected to end early next year.

In all, 181,349 films were taken during the first two and one-half years of operation and 1,978 suspicious cases of tuberculosis were found. In addition, 1,278 chest abnormalities and 130 cases of other chest pathology have been found.

Free follow-up X-ray films have been provided for the 1,278 suspected cases through the local associations. Private physicians have diagnosed 140 tuberculosis cases through follow-up studies.

The only source of revenue for the state and county associations are Christmas seals. A display has been arranged in the Idaho Power building window.

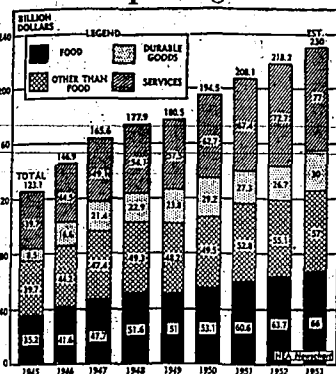

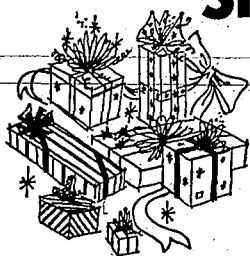

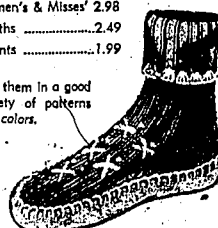

## Life in MAGIC VALLEY

When supervisors of the Wood River soil conservation district held their reorganization meeting at EROHONIA after the first of the year as a result of the election Friday—the memory of Sam Danner will be shared in the minds of those who attended.

Mr. Danner, who died several weeks ago, was one of Lincoln county's most ardent conservationists. At the time of his death he had been a supervisor in soil conservation work longer than any other supervisor in southeastern Idaho. He had served constantly on the Wood River soil conservation district board since July, 1934.

Mr. Danner served as chairman of the committee when the district was organized. During his 10 years on the board at least 15 other supervisors served with him. Danner's place on the board was not filled. The election Friday was to fill the expired terms of most Johnson, RICHFIELD. The vacancy created by Danner's death will be filled by appointment until his term would have expired.

The interest in conservation stemmed from his own farm. He developed his homestead on the desert north of Shoshone into 200 acres of fertile land. After 1934, 160 acres are irrigated. He planted windbreaks, revised irrigation methods so as to use all "waste" water to advantage. His farm has been used as a trial farm for extension work in the area.

Just prior to the sickness that eventually took his life, Mr. Danner started building a new home. In memory of his conservation work in the area, both as a soil conservationist and as a member of the Wood River Center Grants, the Morris and Center school board, a group of friends spent a day working on the house this fall so the building would be protected from the weather and carpenter could continue their work inside despite winter weather.

Lots of people think of a dog catcher as a hard-headed, tough-minded man who delights in making little boys and by stealing their unloved dogs.

William Dye has been dog catcher at TWIN FALLS for 12 years. He took the job not because he wanted it but because it was a job. His work in the hospital, he needed work and the dog catching job was the only one available.

Dye likes dogs. He seldom is without one trailing at his heels. And he has people who like dogs. Before disposing of a stray animal he tries to find homes for them, especially if the dogs seem to be good ones. In his 12 years as dog catcher he has placed many animals in homes, few returning to their straying ways.

Most of the persons who have received dogs from Dye have children but he has placed animals with adults who now "wouldn't take a thousand dollars."

## Pruett Gives Answers for New Queries

By J. HUGH PRUETT  
Astronomer, Extension Division Oregon State College  
These answers to questions of certain correspondents likely will be of interest to others.

1. "Are there places in the world where the sun does not cast a shadow?"

A leafy tree with the branches well above the ground will cast a shadow at any time, if by "shadow" we mean the darkened image seen on the ground. But a solid, narrow pole—

From the other side of the world, objects can be set so that at certain times of the day no shadow can be seen.

Let us consider a pole set vertically in the ground. The only time that an unobscured sun would cast a shadow would be when directly overhead. So the question resolves itself into this: "Are there any places on the earth where the sun is ever directly overhead at noon?"

Plenty of Places  
Yes, there are plenty of them, but who live in the temperate zones never observe the sun in the zenith. In our part of the world the sun is always south of overhead. In the southern temperate zones the sun is always north of this point. Its distance from the zenith varies with the time of year.

But in the torrid zone, that strip extending 23½ degrees both north and south of the equator, the sun at noon seems practically in the zenith for a few days each year. At the northern limit of this zone, the Tropics of Cancer, vertical posts will be shadowless at noon about June 22. The noon sun will be vertical over the equator at the time of the equinoxes, March 21 and September 23.

Frequent Question  
2. "Why isn't the hottest in January when the earth is nearest the sun?"

This is a very frequent question. If the axis of the earth stuck straight up from the plane of its path around the sun, then all parts of the earth would receive the same amount of heat in January as in July. The difference is that in January the 23½-degree tip

of the earth's axis makes our northern part of the earth inclined away from the sun so it does not get as direct heat as in July. But in the southern part of the earth is catching it, both because of inclination and because.

Tryant Inquiry  
32. "Did the transit of Mercury across the face of the sun take place Nov. 14 as predicted?"

"Yes," says the writer, "location we set up a telescope to project a 1½-inch image of the sun on a white paper screen. The transit lasted over 1½ hours but clouds interfered during the time exposing the 'clear' minutes around 9:30 a. m. Then we had a fine picture of the little round black spot on the solar face.

## Drought Aid Cost Is High, Tally Proves

—WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The agriculture department has reported it has spent \$31,662,000 for drought relief in 1931 counties in 18 states. The department said it lost \$28,985,500 selling government-owned wheat to drought-bitten livestock farmers at below-market prices. It spent another \$17,681,500 for freight and handling charges on the feed shipments. In addition, it has allotted \$5,700,000 to states carrying on a federal-state emergency day program.

At the same time, Secretary Ezra C. Benson said government supplies of cottonseed meal and oats are running out and are "not likely" to be leveled in the future under the low-cost feed program.

He said corn and wheat will continue to be available so far the department has approved requests for more than 1,200,000 tons of feed from commodity credit corporation.

DENVER, Dec. 11.—Incumbent officials of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (U. M. W.) were re-elected in a recent nationwide election, the union's canvassing committee announced.

Opponents of the incumbents had charged the leaders were followers of the Communist party line. The union was expelled from the CIO a few years ago on charges of following Communist influence, allegations officials have denied repeatedly.

Asbury Howard, Bessemer, Ala., held his post of eastern vice president by defeating Ernest Gussak of Buffalo, N. Y., 21,433 to 7,170 votes.

Re-elected to the executive board without opposition were Allen Lawrence, Bessemer; H. C. Powers, San Francisco; and Neil Thibault, Sudbury, Ont. Louis Wampler, Flint River, Mo., was elected without opposition to the board for his first term.

It was in the year 1922 that Justice Brandeis delivered a United States supreme court decision in which he spoke of the United States as a "Christian nation."

In a liberal sense this is true and is not contradicted by the fundamental religious beliefs of other non-Christian nations. Our nation is Christian to the extent that the people are Christian. The people are not necessarily Christian because the majority profess the Christian faith.

The word "Christian" was first applied to the followers of Jesus in Antioch several years after Christ's death. It was used in derision by the opponents of the early church. It was because the followers of Christ lived and talked so much like their Master that they were called by that name.

No one denounced more profusely the followers of Christ in the following words: "Wee unto you scribes and Pharisee, hypocrites for ye are like unto whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but are within ye full of dead men's bones, and of all uncleanness. Even so ye also outwardly appear righteous unto men, but within ye are full of hypocrisy and iniquity." (Matt. 23:27, 28)

Would this Scripture apply to many Americans both in and out of the church?

The following facts quoted in "These Times for August" are revealing: "In enlightened U. S. people spend 8 times more hours at movies than at Sunday school; only one out of 12 persons attends church; 7 out of 8 children quit church and Sunday school attendance before they reach 15; 18,000,000 'sex' magazines are printed monthly and
