

Cabinet Quits In Fight With Vietnam King

SATON, Indo-China, Dec. 17.—President Nguyen Van Thuan and his government resigned today after a showdown conference with Vietnam emperor Bao Dai, who urged no solution of their differences.

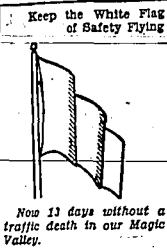
A communiqué telegraphed from the emperor's residence at Dai Lai said Bao Dai accepted the resignation immediately and "thanked the prime minister and his cabinet for the work they have accomplished in the past year."

Prime Minister Thuan demanded that the emperor be deposed and that the emperor's resignation be accepted. Bao Dai's decision was influenced by a foreign official (presumably French), but did not explain. Informal sources said Prince Bao Dai, now high command "headquarters" in France, has been recalled to take Nguyen's place as premier. Bao Dai is expected here within the next few days.

Wide Support
The price is paid by five big nationalist groups, each of which controls its own semi-independent feudal state within Indo-China.

Bao Dai's differences with the Nguyen regime have been the cause of the "peace" offers in Indo-China.

The outgoing premier favored immediate examination of the 17th parallel, even though he realized they might be a French "cover" to delay until a new French government is formed next year.

The five are Gilbert Green, Henry Winfield, Fred Morris Finn, John E. Jackson, Jr., and William N. Morrow.

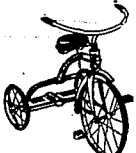

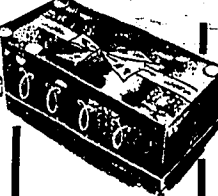

Beef, Chicken Are Top Buys Of Week-End

By The Associated Press
Lamb, beef and chicken will be the best buys in the meat department of food stores across the country this week-end.

Food men, taking off their special, named such cuts as pot roast, prime rib, sirloin steak and shoulder of lamb as extra good values. Price reductions will range up to 6 cents a pound.

Chicken Lower

Chicken prices, which have dipped in recent weeks, apparently are headed lower still. The national poultry and egg board says the reason is "a tremendous supply" of the birds.

In the last week or 10 days, so many chickens have come on the wholesale market that prices are down sharply. At wholesale, broilers are 4 to 7 cents a pound below prices prevailing at this time last year. Roasting chickens are 14 to 18 cents a pound lower. These lower prices should be reflected in local markets shortly.

Pork Is High

An exception to the downtrend in meat prices is pork. With wholesale prices holding at high levels, pork costs will be common in food markets this week-end. Center cut pork chops will be up 6 cents a pound in New York outlets of one big chain; up 2 cents in Pittsburgh and a dime in Jacksonville and Los Angeles.

Egg prices will be down 2 to 4 cents a dozen in some areas this week-end and unchanged in others. Butter will cost about the same as a week ago.

Best Vegetables

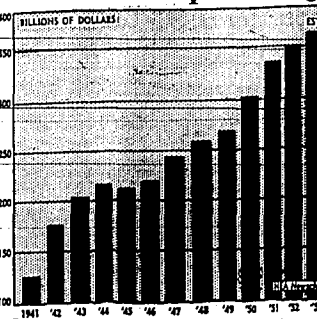
The best buys in vegetables include those old favorites, potatoes and onions, plus cabbage and Brussels sprouts. Produce men place these among the good buys:

Escarole, lettuce, endives, cauliflower, sweet potatoes, spinach and various other greens.

Among vegetables, going higher this week at the wholesale level are beans, peas, carrots and peppers. On the declining side were cucumbers, eggplant, broccoli, celery and tomatoes.

Pears and apples head the list of fruit buys.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17 (AP)—Douglas fir sawmills of the west coast produced, sold and shipped more lumber in the first 11 months of this year than in the same period last year, the West Coast Lumberman's association reported today.

Production was estimated at 53,000,000 board feet, about 180 million feet ahead of the same period in 1952. Orders were 187,727,000 feet behind output, but 180 million ahead of 1952. Shipments were within 53 million feet of output.

The association said unfilled orders totaled 117 million feet on Oct. 31. While gross stocks totaled 115 million feet.

Soviet Affairs Expert Thinks Beria Case Sparks New Purge

Editor's note: W. A. Ryder, United Press analyst of Soviet affairs, views the trial of Lavrenti P. Beria as the beginning of a new purge in Soviet secret police system. In this dispatch he sets forth his views.

By W. A. RYDER
MUNICH, Germany, Dec. 17 (AP)—The announcement that Lavrenti P. Beria will be tried for treason reveals that the big show trials can be expected.

Western observers considered the Moscow statement as a clear indication of the red army's victory over the secret police in a struggle for power following the death of Premier Joseph Stalin.

More purge in the secret police system would result in destruction of the once-feared organization's life and death hold on the Soviet Union.

It was the secret police which filled Siberia's slave labor camps, conducted prewar purges and enforced party discipline on day-to-day life in all of Russia.

The decision to try Beria and his associates in the secret police was understood to be a move enforced on Premier Joseph Stalin by the same group which toppled Beria from power, the red army.

Beria's trial, expected to begin early next year, will shatter the prestige and power of the secret police and intensify Moscow's attack against "bourgeois nationalists."

An analysis of the official communique issued by the supreme court of the Soviet Union showed that

only part of the high Soviet dignitaries were arrested as a result of Beria's fall from power. The charges appeared to be only a rephrasing of the condemnations and denunciations heaped upon Beria by the Soviet press following his arrest last summer.

Thus the most sensational development dealt with the arrest of V. M. Molotov, a stalwart in the secret police who rose to power under Beria.

Molotov's arrest, announced only today, must have occurred several months ago. It indicates the purge of the Soviet secret police organization was much more widespread than it appeared to be.

Court Decree Backs 'Ike' on Ouster Action

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration won a court-ordered Wednesday decision right to put its own supporters in policy-making and other positions, despite civil service rules.

U. S. District Judge Richmond B. Keach ruled that the President has the power to remove a position from civil service classification, and to fire the man holding the job despite his claim to protection.

Whether that is good or bad, Judge Keach said, "is not a matter for the court." But he said "the court is aware that under its decision the statutory safeguard from summary removal relied on by a large number of government employees is held not to exist."

The judge did not—and the civil service commission said it could not—say how many government employees might be affected by the decision. It applied specifically to Leo A. Roth, fired last July from a \$10,000-a-year job as a justice department attorney.

The court's opinion that "there is no express limitation on the power of the President to add or remove positions from civil service could make it broad enough to apply generally throughout the government. But President Eisenhower has said repeatedly he has no plan for wholesale firings among the two million or more workers protected by civil service."

Cattlemen's Group Sees More Stability of Prices Next Year

DENVER, Dec. 17 (AP)—The American National Cattlemen's association expects more stability in cattle prices next year.

"We are moderately optimistic," F. E. Mollin, executive secretary of the association, declared in an interview today.

"We don't expect the price picture to be too rosy, but it should be a little better than 1953. We can't anticipate any sharp increase in prices."

James O. Patton, president of the National Farmers union, said his opinion is that "prospects of the whole agriculture industry, including cattle raising, revives around whether we have a recession" next year.

"If we have a recession in our general economy the cattle industry will be adversely affected," he said. While not forecasting a business slump, Patton asserted "there is concern the administration will not move rapidly enough in the overall economy and we may have a substantial recession."

The Farmers union sponsored a cattlemen's "carnival" to Washington last October to ask Agricultural Secretary Benson to put a floor under cattle prices. The request was rejected by Benson.

Cattle prices began skidding in the fall of 1953 and reached their lowest level last June, Mollin said. In 1950 there were 78 million cattle in the nation. This number jumped to 88 million by 1953 and stood at 93,500,000 on Jan. 1, 1953—six times high. The total last January was approximately 15,500,000 more than the postwar low census of 1942.

Mollin looks for the cattle inventory next Jan. 1 to be thus changed from a year earlier. The supply of fed beef probably will be smaller than in 1953 with grass beef correspondingly high, he said.

The cattlemen's group, which represents some 80,000 farmers and ranchers in 17 states, has been plugging this year for heavy marketing of cows and heifers to bring numbers in balance with demand. A continuation of this program will be advocated in 1954, Mollin said, and should liquidate the surplus.

"We can't expect any big advance in prices until we get our house in order," he declared.

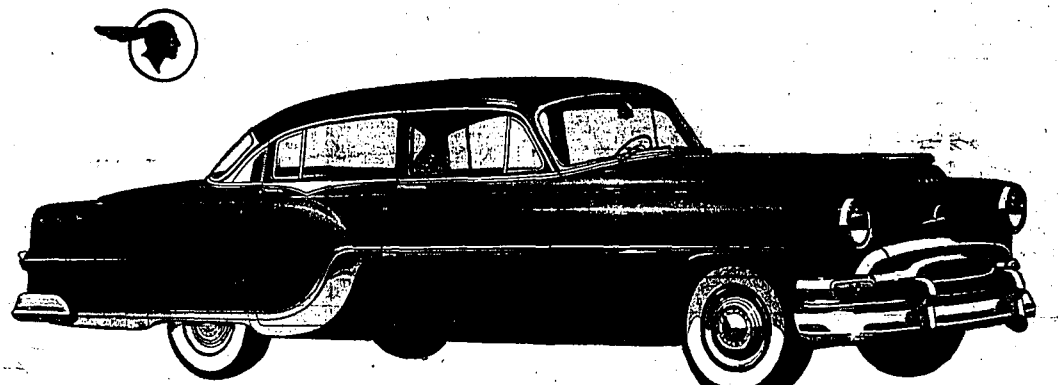

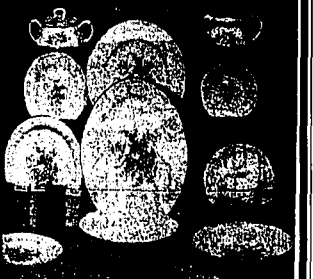

Hope Is Dim For Genuine Korea Peace

The Korean truce agreement, held together with string and beavewax, is falling apart just as so many gloomy predictions said it would.

Not that either side seems to expect a renewal of the fighting.

But any hopes for the orderly procedure which was to advance the military armistice to a permanent peace and a unified Korea now are all but abandoned.

Parley Doubled
Washington doubts that a Korea peace conference ever will be held. Meanwhile, pressing deadlines foretell new crises.

Most pressing is the disposition of war prisoners from both sides now held by the neutral nations repatriation commission.

"Come home" talks to prisoners of both sides end Dec. 23, two days before Christmas.

And as of now, on Jan. 27, all prisoners officially revert to civilian status, free to go to any nation of their choice willing to receive them.

Included are more than 22,000 anti-communist prisoners taken from the reds, and some 350 pro-communists who originally fought for the United Nations but who now have rejected the free world.

Return refused
It seems now that all "explanations" won't even get a chance to talk to 22 Americans whose commitment say they have refused to return home, and that on Jan. 22 the Americans and the others will vanish behind the iron curtain to whatever fate awaits them.

If a crisis is to arise between the two powerful armies poised at either side of the Panmunjom neutral zone, it could come on that date.

The United Nations already have decided they will make no great effort to hold men who have gone over to communism.

Reds Protest
But the reds, whose own stalling tactics brought on the present situation, already are protesting.

They base their claims on the original terms of the armistice which directed that at the end of the "explanation" period, the prisoners (said to be turned back to the political conference which would be given 30 days to reach a decision.

The communists claim that if no political conference is held, or until it is held, the United Nations cannot legally free the prisoners.

Since United Nations and communist negotiators have not even been able to agree on a time and place for the political conference, the United States has announced it will free the prisoners on Jan. 22.

Negro Arrests in Washington Gain

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—The police department's annual report shows that more than three times as many Negroes as whites were arrested here for serious offenses in the fiscal year ended last June 30.

The report said 76 per cent of those arrested for serious crimes were Negro and 24 per cent white. The ratio in the preceding year was 78 to 22.

According to the last census, taken three years ago, Negroes comprise about 35 per cent of Washington's population.

The current interest in conquering space will be reflected in rocket guns, space helmets and space ports. Space ship designs are even influencing toddlers' push and pull toys.

For the would-be housewife there will be a miniature shopping cart stocked with dozens of tiny replicas of famous food packages. New in-household cleaning cabinets is one that features a roll of linoleum in addition to mop, scrubbing brush and detergent.

Cowboys and girls' accessories will continue popular, of course, as will dolls, which also will reflect this year's how-to trend.

Christmas trees will shelter dolls that encourage good grooming in little misses. One doll will come with a kit of real make-up and beauty care instructions. The vinyl plastic skin can be cleaned easily, so that it is always ready for repeated experiments. Another doll is a miniature bathing beauty in fashionable suit, handbag, beach robe and shoes. Doll wardrobes will encourage neat storage of handbags, shoes, and jewelry as well as clothes.

Games also will help parents interest their youngsters in acquiring good habits. Toys are now available that feature making a game of tooth brushing, careful eating and going to bed. One new puzzle is designed to give toddlers a release of aggressive impulses.

Crafts enthusiasts will be interested in a new weaver that has a yarn dispenser for each color so that the balls won't get into bothersome tangles.

Each piece of mail is stamped with a special cachet designed by Mrs. Tucker which reads: "Glory to God in the highest. Christmas, Orange county, Florida, 1953." The stamp bears a Christmas tree, just like the new tree kept decorated here throughout the year. The first tree last year was killed by the heat of the colored lights. The new tree, a massive red cedar, is lighted only by a floodlight and bears a sign reading:

"The permanent Christmas tree at Christmas, Florida, is the symbol of love and goodwill. The Christmas spirit every day in the year."

Mrs. Tucker believes it "will become America's most photographed tree, since someone is always taking pictures of it." She hopes the tree will help to promote love and goodwill in the world.

This season's deluge of mail started last July. And every week during the December rush, visitors will drive as far as 200 miles to be sure their letters get here in time. Mrs. Tucker said some of the letters are scribbled by children or in the way lines of old and feeble hands.

The experiments start this month, the commission said.

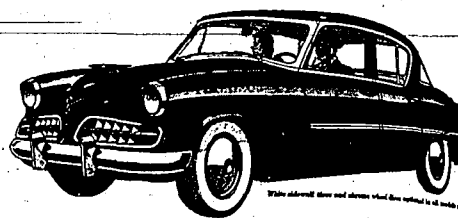

I always have wanted a motorcycle, and for 1,000 bucks I can have one, equipped with everything, including a sidecar to hold my sideburns.

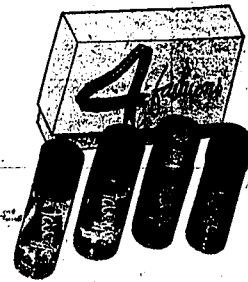

Diet Problem Solved by Using Canned Items, Boyle Reports

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (U.P.)—Portly Emanuel Ebin, a meat canner, was told a few years ago by his wife: "You are getting too heavy. You will have to take off some weight."
Since his wife was a physician, Ebin decided to follow her advice. But, like millions of other Americans, he found that sticking to a diet required not only will-power — it also took a lot of time and trouble.
It is the rare hostess or restaurant that considers the special dietary problems of guests. And people on diets who prepare their own dishes find it quite a nuisance. After brooding over his difficulties for some time, Ebin asked himself:
"Why not put a diet in a can—wouldn't that solve the diet problem for most people?"
Ebin found that putting a diet in a can was easier to say than do. Some 30 manufacturers were already packing sugar-free fruit or fat-free vegetables.
"But nobody was canning dietetic substance foods—such as soups and meat and poultry dishes," said Ebin.
He and his brother, Benjamin, with whom he founded Dorset Foods, Ltd., in 1929 after they came here from Poland, decided to pioneer in this new field.
"We thought it would take only a few weeks to solve the problem," Ebin recalled ruefully. "It took us two years finally. We had to make hundreds of tests and spend thousands of dollars before we could produce tasty dishes in which the caloric value and sodium content could be scientifically controlled."
A diet—low-in-fat and—other substance containing sodium is often recommended for heart patients as well as for those who merely want to lose weight. Ebin's new dietetic line consists of five kinds of soup and four meat and poultry dishes, most of which have been approved by the American Medical Association. The others are still undergoing tests.
The caloric value and sodium content of each dish are printed on the can, making it easier for a patient to follow specific directions by his physician.
"There are nine million people in this country on special diets for

specific diseases," he said. "There are also about 35 million Americans dying to lose an average of about 10 pounds each—or 600 million pounds."
"If only 200 million of these dietetic foods that will make a billion dollars a year industry. And by 1965 that figure will be conservative."
Ebin has an even bigger dream—that in time diet pack canned goods will replace present canning methods altogether.
"Why not?" he argued. "It will make it simpler for the housewife. All she will have to do is add salt

and sugar for members of the family who are not on diets."

Army Checks New 'Bobtail' Style for Jeep

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The army is taking a look at a new lightweight, bobtail Jeep. The designer says it has so much zip he calls it the "Bobcat".

Election Ordered For Port Unions

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The national labor relations board has ordered a bargaining election to determine the union to represent longshoremen for the ports of New York.

The election will be held on or before Dec. 23. The election—if held on Dec. 23—will come one day before expiration of the 80-day court injunction obtained by the government under the Taft-Hartley act to delay a threatened longshoremen's walkout during the holidays.

The strike threat grew out of the action of the American Federation of Labor when it expelled the International Longshoremen's association on racketeering charges.

In the election, approximately 25,000 longshoremen will be given a choice between the expelled union and another union newly created by the AFL to replace it.

Board Moves to Speed up Mails

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The civil aeronautics board has acted to speed mail delivery during the holidays through the use of smaller air lines.

It authorized 14 local service air lines, serving various areas, to carry ordinary first class letters, newspapers and special handling and special delivery parcel post. Such mail is now shipped by rail or truck.

The board set payment for the carriers at 20 cents a ton mile. A ton mile means carrying one ton a mile.

Air lines covered by the board's action include West Coast Air Lines.

Life Expectancy Of 20 Years for Battery Claimed

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (AP)—A new type of storage battery, half the size of standard batteries and with a life expectancy of 10 to 20 years, was placed on the commercial market yesterday by Sonolone corporation.

Irving I. Schachtel, president of Sonolone, said the company has produced the battery for the military for four years and is making it available to the public for the first time.

"Our new battery will do every-

thing that any of the old types could do—plus many additional things," he declared. He said the price had not been determined.

Idaho Solon Hits Cuts of Air Line's Services in State

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Senator Welker, R. Id., criticized West Coast Air Lines Wednesday for curtailing service in Idaho and Oregon and its "failure to avoid frequent and disruptive changes in schedules."

He said West Coast President Nick Tice told him certain schedules had been suspended because of a decline in traffic, but assured the senator the company intends to make every effort to improve its operations and stabilize existing schedules.

Welker said he was told that a complete survey of West Coast operations is in progress and improvement in all departments is expected.

"West Coast has a definite responsibility to provide adequate service to the northwest," Welker said, "and prove that its recent merger with Empire Air Lines was not a mistake."

"The people of Idaho need and want a sound air line service, and it is clearly up to West Coast to provide this without delay."
