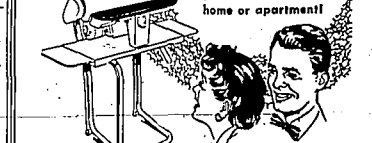

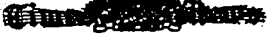

'Escalator' for Pay Is Ousted By Trainmen

CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP)—The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen today became the first major union to discard the "escalator" clause labor contract after a trial of almost three years.

The brotherhood representing 135,000 employees of the nation's railroads announced last night it had accepted a five-year, 10 percent wage increase and agreed to drop the cost-of-living escalator clause.

The agreement with the carriers represented a drastic reduction in the trainmen's original demand for a 37-cent-an-hour increase.

Other "operating" or service brotherhoods have made almost identical demands, and negotiations between them and the railroads were still under way.

The trainmen had worked under the cost-of-living clause since April, 1951, and had received a total of 13 cents an hour in increases as the government cost index spiraled upward.

W. F. Kennedy, president of the brotherhood, and representative of the railroads were pleased with the fact that the wage agreement, reached after only seven days of conferences, was the first since 1948 to be negotiated without invoking government bargaining assistance.

He called the specially arranged contract "an important step away from the obnoxious trend toward government-dominated settlements."

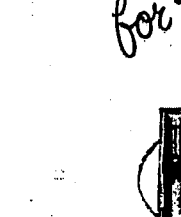

Care of Your Children
By ANGELO PATRI

A great deal of education is gained outside the school, mostly in the home. The children learn their first important lessons. They are taught cleanliness, good habits and the habit of consideration for other people, manners and morals. The youngsters learn in school what their mothers and fathers have learned at home and had become important to the teacher.

Home may not be as well endowed with educational chances as it was in the days of our grandparents, but it still offers more than it used to be the best advantage. The child's upbringing. There is no place like home for such instruction and the process is simple. As soon as a child learns to do something for himself, let it be his responsibility from then on.

Even in the cramped quarters of modern apartments and in 11 houses, there are, of course, opportunities for a child to learn. The youngster can do his bit in the housework, help by going on errands, which not only relieves his mother, but also gives him or her a chance to learn that which will eventually be of value to the boy or girl.

A child who has gone shopping with his mother has learned how to select the right things, for his mother has shown him. The youngster eventually will be trusted to pay the bill and see that he receives the correct change. This responsibility gives the child good little satisfaction.

Performing a household chore teaches a little boy or girl the fundamentals of hygiene. The garbage can must be emptied and thoroughly cleaned. Any sturdy boy of about 9 years old can undertake this task and when he understands the reason why it is done his work takes on a certain importance. He is doing his share to protect the family's health.

Also, taking part in family discussions on certain matters helps his education. He learns about money, the prices of some items, and gets an idea of the importance of thrift. He grasps the value of saving money. Shouldering responsibility gives a child an interest in a chore that he might otherwise dislike.

Home is a school and mothers and fathers are the youngsters' first teachers. Let's hope they do a good job of it.

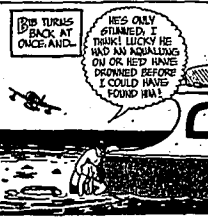

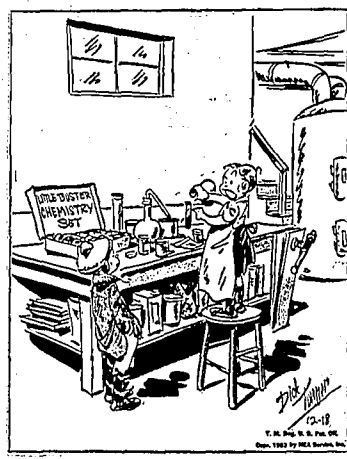

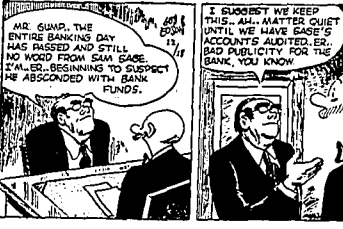

What Kind of Men Are "Red" POWs Refusing Repatriation?

TOKYO, Dec. 18 (AP)—What kind of men are the 22 Americans sitting in a cold and dreary hut at Panmunjom refusing to return to their homeland?
Why have they renounced their country and chosen instead a life under communism? Why did these 22, out of the thousands taken captive by the Reds in the Korean war, make that decision?
Of the 22 men, informed sources say five now wish to return home but are held back by fear of death at the hands of their captors. Twelve are believed to be hard-core communists. Six are wanted for the murders of fellow POWs while in Red stockades.
Why these 22?
It could have been their youth. Their average age is just under 22. The oldest is 31. The two youngest are 20.
It could have been their schooling. Many of them left school at an early age as young as 17, to join the army.
Only two of the men had any college education. One didn't even finish eighth grade, while two finished the eighth before entering service. Three finished high school, while seven did not. One worked his way through a vocational training school. Information was not
