## S. Hoping Russia Will Talk Seriously On Ike's Atom Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said today the United States will talk seriously about the world's atomic problems, and that the country may see a "recession of the horror of atomic warfare."

Dulles, speaking at the National Press Club, Dulles referred briefly to Russia's preparedness to talk confidentially with other atomic powers.

## Dulles Sees Reduced Threat of Aggression

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said today the ministers of the 14 North Atlantic treaty allies believe the danger of "open military aggression from Soviet Russia" is less than it was a year or two ago.

Yet "the danger is immense and persistent," Dulles said, adding: "This is no time for the free world to relax."

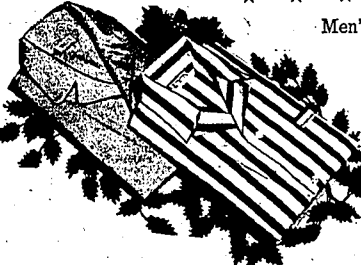

# 1 to 2 Billion Slash in U. S. Aid Is Slated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22—The administration's foreign aid request for next year may be slashed by as much as 1 to 2 billion dollars below current levels.

Foreign Operations Administrator Harold E. Blazen indicated this yesterday when he told a news conference the request would be "sharply" less than the 4 1/2 billion dollars approved by congress for the present 15 months.

He said, however, that actual foreign aid spending will run at an annual rate of about five billion dollars for the next 18 months. The administration will draw on funds previously voted by congress to make up the difference.

**Must in Europe**  
Blazen made clear that the brunt of the aid cutback will be borne by European countries.

He made the statements in discussing a year-end report by his agency. It showed the free world's economic strength is at an all-time high. He said industrial production in western Europe averaged four per cent higher in 1933 than in any previous year.

Blazen also called on the free world to raise wages and improve the living standards of their workers in 1934. He said their attentions to Berlin and Indo-China as "special situations" requiring U. S. help.

**80 Per Cent Military**  
Blazen said that next year 80 per cent of his agency's spending will go for direct military aid to this country's allies. 15 per cent for economic aid and 5 per cent for technical assistance.

He said the European countries except Greece and Turkey are slated for economic aid in the 1934 budget now being prepared. He referred to Berlin and Indo-China as "special situations" requiring U. S. help.

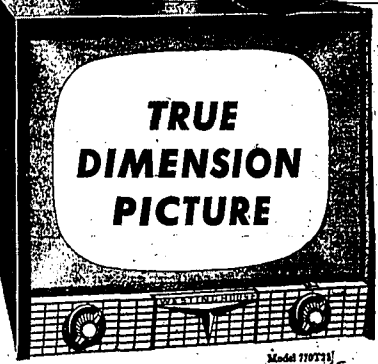

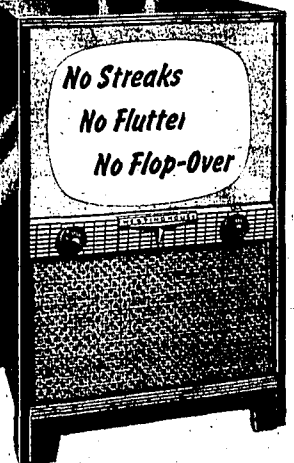

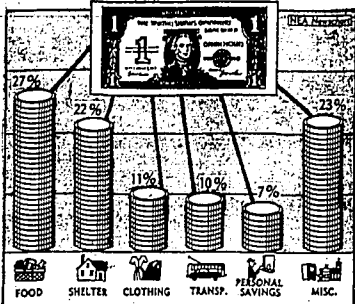

### Two Salt Lake City Men Held As Suspects in Bank Holdups

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 22 (AP)—Two Salt Lake City men were under arrest today in connection with two bank robberies, one in Idaho, the other in Utah.
