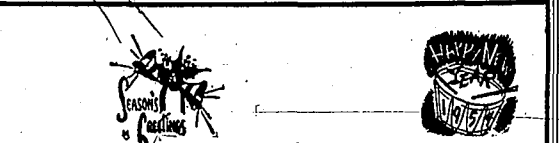

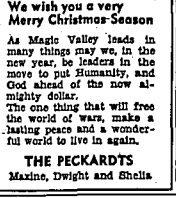

The horses break away from the gate in the first race. A five-furlong sprint, with Nearerfield the favorite, Adam Shoemaker in the irons.
The favorite loses. A 12-10-1 stily takes it all.
The 50-million-year-ago people talk just as we do today.
"Ever see a word I'd be asking you. Got bumped at the gate. And never had running room. One more jump and he takes it all."

U. S. Must Trust Blindly in Military Wisdom of Leaders

By JAMES MARLOW
WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—Never before in the history of the country have the people had to depend so blindly on the military wisdom of its leaders.
The Russians have atom bombs, they may have hydrogen bombs, and the number of their troops under arms is impressive.
Nevertheless the Eisenhower administration is planning to reduce the manpower of U. S. armed forces—with the exception of the air force—this year and further next year.
The administration has two motives:
1. A desire to keep campaign promises by reducing expenses.
2. More reliance on new weapons and the special teams and planes to deliver them.
Since the wisdom of these decisions may not be known for years, it has to be assumed meanwhile that the military planners know what they are doing.
We are told that scientific development of new weapons since World War II has been astonishing, changing the old concept of fighting a war. What the new developments are, what can be expected of them necessarily is known only to the military people, the President, his close advisers and the atomic experts.
In the atomic field, the size and power of the bombs are not known by the public. They can't even be imagined. Laymen know only that they are many times more powerful than those dropped on Japan.
Some idea of their power, although still beyond the ability of the lay mind to comprehend, was given by President Eisenhower in his Dec. 9 speech to the United Nations.
He said the United States stockpile of atomic weapons today "exceeds by many times the explosive

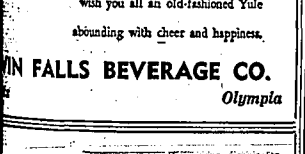

North Idaho Loss of Slots To Be Costly

COEUR D'ALENE, Dec. 23 (AP)—A newspaper survey shows Kootenai county and the towns within its borders will lose \$200,000 in tax revenue next year if slot machines go out in Idaho.

The Coeur d'Alene Press said the county will lose \$140,000 and the towns \$140,000.

The machines here generally averaged the minimum of \$100 a year with the revenue split 50-50 between the county and the towns.

The city of Coeur d'Alene received about \$50,000 last year. The little town of Post Falls, with many slot machines, will lose \$20,000 and Spirit Lake \$3,000, about half its annual budget, the Press said. The \$140,000 loss at Rathbun is about one third of its budget.

Officials generally agree the only way to replace the lost revenue will be to economize or increase property taxes, the paper said.

Kootenai county already has topped the tax levy in order to take up some of the slack by doubling from three to six mills the levy for its current expense fund. Six mills is the maximum that may be levied for the fund under the law and in the first time the county has levied the limit, the paper said.

Coeur d'Alene and every municipality in the county except Worley are faced with a more difficult problem because they already have levied the maximum of 20 mills for the general expense fund, the Press said.

Idaho Solon Flays Dumping on Road

WEIBER, Dec. 23 (AP)—State Sen. Clark Hamilton, D., Washington, charged Tuesday that Idaho's north and south highway, which would be a wonder of the world back in the Ozarks, is being used for a "dumping ground."

He wrote the state highway department asking it to stop the dumping of trash and junk beside the highways between Higgins and Whitebird.

In Boise, State Highway Engineer Earl W. Miller said the department would check if trash is being dumped on the right-of-way.

"If it's off the right-of-way, I don't know whether to have any jurisdiction over the use of private property," Miller said.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—The little world of Tin Pan alley has been shaken badly this yuletide season and Howie Richmond, perennial boy wonder of the music business, fears even worse is yet to come.

"This is the first time in years the public has not made a hit out of at least one Christmas song," he said. "Not one, if you can imagine such a thing. I don't know, but if Christmas songs fade what's to keep the public from forsaking its allegiance to horns and mother songs and I-love-only-you-baby?"

"And then what would happen to us?"

Other music publishers echoed Richmond's foreboding.

Several hundred thousand dollars were tied up in promoting Christmas songs, about as glib-side an investment as anything can be in a business which has always been pretty much of a gamble.

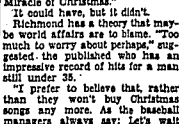
The glittering prize was to duplicate such a hit as "Baby, It's Cold Outside," "Merry-Kindling Santa Claus" which sold more than three million records, or "White Christmas" or the hardy "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer."

Nylon Useful For Surgery, Doctors Find

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—Nylon is even more useful than a student of feminine legs on a windy street corner knows. Scientists report it makes a dandy blowout patch on abdominal walls and is an essential part of "artificial heartings" in major surgery.

Dr. Benedict B. Landry, chief surgeon at St. Francis hospital, Hartford, Conn., says he has now patched up 11 abdomens with nylon mesh and it was much better than a mesh made of metal, tantalum or any other surgical blowout patch.

In surgery the conditions requiring a patch are called "abdominal wall defects." These defects are caused by wounds, by hernias, by complications of surgery. The result is that the body's own tissues no longer are strong enough to support the wall. A patch of some other substance is needed.

Dr. Landry says fibrous tissue grows in through, around and over the sterile nylon mesh once it had been put in place, and without breaking the mesh. New surgery performed through such an implanted patch reveals an abdominal wall almost as strong as a normal one, he reported.

Metal Unsatisfactory

Tantalum and stainless steel mesh are subject to "metal fatigue." That is, as the patient stretches, there is "work hardening" followed by "strain hardening," and the material which remains in one piece would be preferable, if the same fibrous tissue reaction occurs in each case.

It did in his 11 cases to date, he added in his report in "Post-Graduate Medicine."

Aids Heart Surgery

The report on the artificial heart-lung machine's essential part originated with the Schlegel Manufacturing Company, Rochester, N. Y., which runs up nylon tubing for industrial uses and was suggested when the machine was being done with its product by the surgical scientists at the veterans administration hospital in Nashville, Tenn.

"Artificial heart-lung" machines are considered experimental, although one was used last year to permit surgeons to repair the heart defect of a patient while the heart was "beating"—that is, while the machine pumped his blood through his body, as his heart would have, and also put oxygen in the blood and took carbon dioxide out of it, as his lungs would have.

Gem State Leads In New Building

BOISE, Dec. 23 (AP)—Idaho leads the northwest in urban construction increases for the first six months of this year, the Northwest Research council reported. The figures, compared with a similar period for 1957, show Idaho with a 20.7 per cent jump, the council said. The city of Boise, with \$2,628,434 in contracts, was responsible for most of the Gem state building boom, the report showed.

Montana was second with 21.8 per cent increase, and Oregon was third with a 11.2 per cent jump.

West, Soviet Woo Yugoslavs For Favor in Hot, Cold Wars

No more favors being sought with more determination by both sides in the hot and cold wars than that of Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito. And with good reason. For Yugoslavia is the key to Mediterranean defenses, really no less by Russia than by the West.

On her southern flank so long as she adheres to the west, she forms with Greece and Turkey a mighty link in the defense of southern Europe and the eastern Mediterranean.

Equally, she weakens the chain of defense so long as she quarrels with Italy over the future of Trieste.

Thus, the painful efforts of the United States and Britain to settle the dispute to the satisfaction of both, continue.

With her tough army of 600,000 men, Yugoslavia is perhaps even more powerful than Russia.

With both Yugoslavia and Russian-dominated Albania on her side, Russia would have an unbroken land route to the Mediterranean, by-passing the Dardanelles, and isolating Greece.

Further, if Yugoslavia were to restore her ties with the Kremlin, she automatically would restore the 1,700-mile Danube as a communist artery extending from the Black sea to Germany.

Now, with western eyes focused primarily on Korea and on hopes for some kind of accord with Russia on Germany and Austria, perhaps not enough attention is being paid to Russia's own efforts to bring Yugoslavia and Tito back into the fold.

Here are some recent developments: For years Yugoslavia has been a minority of one on the Danubian conurbation, with her every proposal being vetoed down by Russia and her satellite. Suddenly the situation changed. At the session which ended last week, practically every Yugoslav suggestion for controlling traffic on the great waterway was accepted.

Culprit Returns Nativity Figure

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 23 (AP)—A figure of the Christ child was stolen from Trans-World airlines' nativity scene at Logan airport last year: It came back yesterday by mail with an unsigned letter that said:

"If we hadn't been caught we might have gotten into trouble," he said.

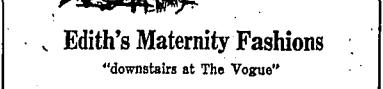

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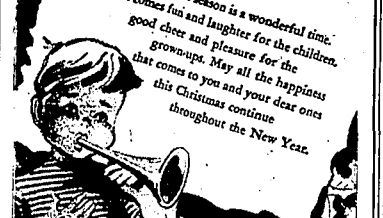

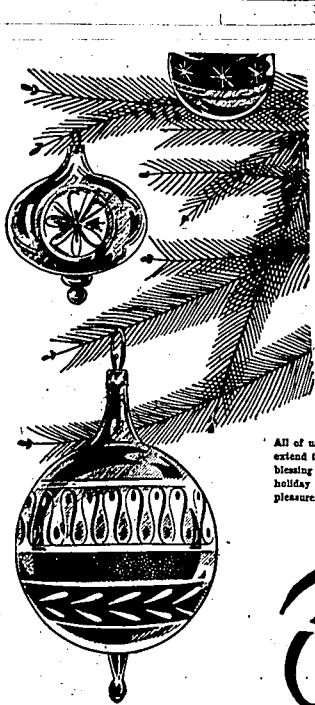

The stump landed in the rear seat where the youngsters were riding. The front seat occupants were not injured.

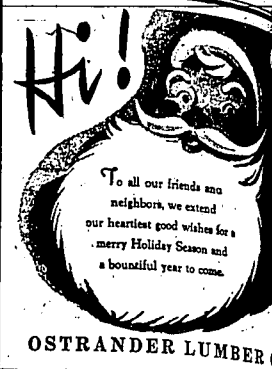

U. S. Economy Ending Super-Colossal Year; 1954 May Be Merely "Colossal"

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (U. S. — The American economy has ended a 1953 record year.

As they say in the movies, 1954 may be only colossal.

The year's long boom scaled the heights in 1953. Outpouring of goods and services topped all records. So did national income, 80 per cent.

So, what do the legion of business keen, professional and amateur seers predict for the next year?

"Leveling off" is a pet expression of many. They see a return to more normal business conditions, a possible drop in production, maybe five per cent.

Here are some of the reasons why a gentle decline is seen:

Production has caught up with demand.

Government spending has topped and is declining.

Layoffs are cropping up in many industries.

It's getting much tougher to sell things.

Rate of production of the nation's basic industry, steel, is declining.

Why are there no abrupt falls predicted? Here are a few reasons:

Individual income taxes will be cut 10 per cent in January. That means more money for many people to spend. In some brackets, however, the proposed increase in social security taxes will cancel out the saving. The excess profits tax expires.

Consumers are well heeled. They have the money to spend. It's up to business by better salesmanship and the development of more attractive products to go out and get it. The public has \$24 billion in mutual funds, the highest in history, two billion more than a year ago. Business will continue to spend

of a period of considerable readjustment are clearly discernible. There is a tough economic campaign ahead — 12-day for the business world.

The unions seem to be apprehensive. The CIO at its Cleveland meeting earlier this year said business is confronted with a major change in direction and it called that change downward. The big union called for counter-measures including tax relief to the low and middle-income groups, expanded social security and benefits, a balanced program of public works and other government steps.

However, adding up the bad with the good predictions any way you want to, you will find the general thought is that 1954 will not hit the levels of 1953, but will be a very good year.

In effect, it now is up to business to take the ball. Government expenditures are tapering off and that immense stimulus to the economy must be countered.

Business is going to have to sell harder than it has since the war. The lull days are over. The sellers' market has ended. New and better products are going to have to come to market.

When 1953 started, some people thought the boom would not continue as it had. But it did. And topped all records.

1954 May See End of Puzzle Over Divorce Law Variances

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (U. S. —) There is a strong possibility that 1954 might clear the air about one of the nation's most perplexing social problems: divorce.

There are two reasons:

1. A house committee will take up a bill passed by the senate earlier this year, that would require each state to honor a divorce obtained in another state if certain requirements are met.

2. The supreme court will be asked to decide whether a person must be a domiciliary of the state in which he secures a divorce. Being a domiciliary of a state implies an intention to remain in that state for an indefinite period.

These two questions are at the very heart of the divorce problem, which has bewildered lawyers and judges ever since the United States came into being.

Senator McCarran, D., Nev., author of the bill now before the senate, says many of the problems are confronted with becoming awkward if they get married again.

This, McCarran said, is because divorce secured in one state may not be honored in another and the parties to the divorce may be accused of bigamy if they remarry, which a thing has happened.

McCarran's bill says that, when your specific requirements are met, a divorce granted legally in one state must be given full faith and credit in every state as a dissolution of such marriage.

These, he said, are the requirements:

1. The divorce decree must be final.
2. It must be valid in the state in which rendered.
3. It must meet the jurisdictional requirements of the state granting the divorce, and
4. Both parties to the divorce must appear personally or be represented by counsel at the court proceedings.

The McCarran bill would "imple-

ment" the full faith and credit clause of the constitution, which says:

"Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may, but not much, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved and the effect thereof."

The McCarran bill faces an uncertain future in the house. A similar bill passed the senate in the 1951 congress, but the house took no action on it.

The constitution says nothing whatever about divorce. McCarran and others long have maintained that a constitutional amendment would be required before the nation could have a uniform divorce law.

McCarran is opposed to a uniform divorce law. Every effort to enact one over the years has met with failure.

The senator's home state of Nevada for a long time has been regarded as the nation's unofficial divorce center. Recent tabulations by the national office of vital statistics show why:

In 1950, the national average for divorces was 24 for each 1,000 persons. In Nevada, the average was 63.7. Florida was in second place with an average of 6.5.

Aluminum Aids in Shipping of Fruit

LOUISVILLE, Ky. EP—A metal company here has announced perfection of a technique for shipping certain citrus fruits without refrigeration or ventilation.

By using aluminum foil-lined containers, weight, quality, appearance and flavor of the fruit are maintained during shipment and storage at ordinary temperatures for 60 days or more. Ventilation of the foil-lined container is not necessary under usual conditions.

Real Peace Both Remote for '54, Western Experts Say at NATO Parley

BY LEON DENNEY
SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 23 (AP)—Western experts here today said the chances of peace in Europe are remote for 1954.

Culture, has now been admitted by Premier Georgi Malenkov and Nikita Khrushchev, secretary of the Russian communist party.

More important—according to qualified U. S. sources—are the internal political problems facing the Kremlin's ruling group due to the transfer of power after Stalin's death.

The stability of Malenkov's rule rests on the absolute loyalty not only of the top leaders and army marshals but also of the lesser jobholders throughout the vast state and party bureaucracy.

Stalin required nearly 10 years to "liquidate" Leon Trotsky, Gregory Zinoviev, Nikolai Bukharin and other rivals or potential rivals. It was not until he crushed all opposition that he believed he wielded absolute control.

Such control has not yet been achieved by Premier Malenkov. This is clearly shown, among other things, by the continued widespread purges of red officials in Leningrad, Armenia, Georgia, the Ukraine, the Baltic states and elsewhere throughout the country.

To purge about 10 million entrenched bureaucrats is a more difficult process than the elimination of even as powerful a figure as Lavrenti Beria, deposed chief of the secret police.

The Kremlin oligarchs must therefore first solve their own pressing problems before embarking on new Korea-like open acts of aggression.

Also, outside the red sphere—in the non-communist countries—the tide of the cold war turned against Moscow at the end of 1953. In the "battle of diplomatic notes" western strategy emerged on the top—at least for the present.

The Russians have been forced on the defensive by the growing American strength and resolution. They were maneuvered by President Eisenhower and State Secretary John Foster Dulles into a position where they had to agree, however reluctantly, to a four power meeting on Germany and Austria.

President Eisenhower's historic call at the U.N. assembly for an international atomic pool for once through the red propagandists and their nationalist " allies" completely off guard.

The proposed four power talks at Berlin will thus test Moscow's multi-protected desire to negotiate with the west.

1. Create the European defense community.

2. Give independence to West Germany.

3. Complete the strategic dispositions first laid down by President Eisenhower when he was supreme commander in Europe.

This is likely to be the Kremlin's objective for the early months of 1954. The red obviously hope that disagreements in the western camp and economic depression will eventually disintegrate the Atlantic alliance and leave a divided Germany at the mercy of Russia. They bank on France as the weakest link in the NATO structure.

Nevertheless, the three western chiefs, in an effort to preserve peace, could not but agree at Bermuda to sit down and talk with the Russians.

While rivalries and suspicion still poison the Kremlin ruling group and the red empire is shaking on an economic crisis, the prospect for relaxed international tension in 1954 looks brighter.

Past Year Shows Modern Farmer Still Has Money Problems Despite Supports

By OVID A. MARTIN
(AP Farm Editor)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The year 1952 showed that the modern farmer, like his brother of the past, still has his financial ups and downs despite government programs to hold things on an even keel.

Farmers produced abundantly, the total volume being up to the record set in 1952.

Yet farm prices declined nearly 50 per cent during the year. Farm income dropped seven per cent. The resulting reduction in farm buying power contributed directly to smaller purchases of farm machinery, equipment and other nonfarm products.

Likewise, farm land values declined and farm debts increased. These developments brought complaints from farmers and their lead-

ers and predictions in some quarters that a new agricultural depression was just around the corner.

All this happened despite the fact that the government had broad farm price support programs in operation.

A major cause of the agricultural setback, which had its beginning in 1952, was a sharp reduction in exports of agricultural commodities. Foreign sales, which reached a record peak directly after World War II, declined nearly 30 per cent. As a consequence, supplies which otherwise would have moved overseas became surpluses that depressed prices. Most of these extra supplies were stored under government price support programs. By the end of the year the government had around four billion dollars invested in these supplies and the

amount promised to climb past the five-billion mark before the 1954 crops were harvested.

The farm situation was complicated also by a severe drought that plagued farmers in parts of the Midwest, southwest, south and far west. Because of poor pastures and feed grain crops, many farmers in these areas were forced to dump beef animals on the market. The result was a further depression of cattle prices.

The year also brought in a change of national administrations and a new secretary of agriculture.

Sen. Traft Benson, the new farm chief, started out by telling farmers that existing federal farm programs were not good enough to keep them prosperous. He also said the programs eventually would put producers under complete control of government.

Benson, a leader in the LDS church, declared existing programs, particularly price support measures, tended to price farm products out of foreign and domestic markets, create surpluses and bring on undesirable production controls.

The secretary called upon farmers to develop "self-help" programs which would reduce government's role.

Benson's ideas ran into bitter criticism from some farm leaders and congressmen, including some members of his own Republican party. Some of his critics demanded that he resign.

The basic point of controversy was the level of farm price supports. Benson said they were too high. He

indicated favor for a flexible system under which supports would be high in times of shortages to encourage production and low in times of surpluses to discourage production.

With backing of President Eisenhower and with the help of an 18-member agricultural advisory commission of farm educators and leaders, Benson set to work drafting a new farm program for presentation to congress early in 1954.

Meanwhile, the house agriculture committee started doing some work of its own. It made what it called "grass-roots" tours through farming areas to get producers' views on farm programs.

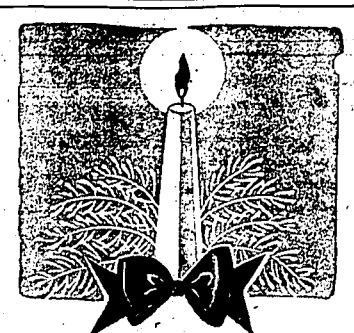
Committee members reported that farmers as a whole opposed Benson's ideas of lowering price supports.

Thus the year ended with prospects of a sharp debate over farm legislation during the 1954 session of congress.

The results may have been far-reaching influence on efforts of Republicans to win enough seats in the 1954 elections to continue its control of congress.

Meanwhile, Benson was required by law to impose broader production controls on farmers than ever invoked in any previous single year. The controls were designed to keep surpluses from getting any larger.

Another development was Benson's decision to abolish the department's soil conservation service, stirring up a controversy that was likely to be carried over into the 1954 session of congress.

Unsinkable Bathing Suit Find Related by 'Dreamless' Briton

"I'll have a late supper again," he said. "That's what made me dream the night I dreamed of the unsinkable bathing suit, your cradle on the waves."

For that is Shaw's contribution to the jet age—a bathing suit that will not sink even if the wearer is determined to commit suicide.

"I had that late supper," recalled the burly, beaming Briton. "Roast lamb with two veg (British for vegetables) and when I finally did fall asleep I began to dream. I never dream so I said to myself in my dream, 'Can I be dreaming?'"

"I was a textile merchant at the time and naturally I began to dream about textiles. I dreamed I saw a suit fall into the water in a bathing suit. She was thrashing around like she couldn't swim but instead of sinking, she floated."

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

"New" Ike Demonstrates Firm Leadership in Shaping Policy

BY LYLE C. WILSON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—Along with the so-called new look in national defense planning and the new firmness of recent administration foreign policy declarations, there is beginning to be talk here of the new Eisenhower.

The phrase has been coined or accepted by friendly critics of the President. It is intended to convey the idea of a President who finally has fused his administration's policies and principles into major objectives—and has undertaken the bare-knuckle job of leadership to reach them.

Mr. Eisenhower's series of day-long conferences with legislative leaders last week roughly outlined the share of things to come.

The White House conferences already are being counted a preliminary success. There were no bolts nor basis of controversy after the series of meetings. There was every indication that the visitors left the White House with a new regard for the head man of their party. Undoubtedly there are troubles and party disputes ahead, but it is believed Mr. Eisenhower is getting off to a good if somewhat late start.

One of the first hazards of politics discovered by the general became-President upon reaching the White House was that political parties frequently do not underwrite their leaders with discipline such as an army accords a general.

Party responsibility is the political substitute for discipline. Last week's White House conferences were designed to lay a foundation for party responsibility in the second session of the 83rd congress which meets here Jan. 6. Party responsibility is constructed in considerable part on compromise and the President has indicated he would give a little on that.

What he said was that the principles and policies of his legislative program had been fixed but that he would be willing to accept modifications. On that basis he asked congressional leaders to accept the administration's general objectives and to work toward them with such modification as practical politics may demand.

Mr. Eisenhower has been accused of putting himself above his party, or refusing to acknowledge his own position as a partisan political leader and, finally, of having a very real distaste for politics.

The burden of the statements issued during last week's talks was that the program being hammered out was for all the people of the United States. And so it was intended to be.

But the persons to whom the President appealed for organized support of his program were the political leaders of his own Republican party in congress. The White House huddles were as partisan as any ever summoned by former President Harry S. Truman to make the political machine which put him in office for a full term in 1948 that mightily few persons thought he could win.



Russian Agents Made Secrets of Atom Bomb Primary Target of Red Espionage

Editor's note: This dispatch is the third in a series of five on communist agents in the United States. It tells how they have been seen in action.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The No. 1 target of Red espionage in the world was it was this country's No. 1 secret—the atomic bomb.

Thanks in considerable part to the operations of their trained espionage agents, aided by some communist-scientist and technicians, the Kremlin's master leaved the innermost secrets of the bomb before the American people became aware of the weapon in 1945.

The house-sense atomic energy committee has estimated that the flow of U. S. British, and Canadian secrets to Russia advanced the timetable of the Soviet atomic program by perhaps 18 months.

The names most prominent in this espionage apparatus have long been familiar to the American people: Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, David Greenglass, Harry Gold, Alan Nunn May, and the top figure of the whole operation—Britain's Dr. Klaus Emil Fuchs.

Others involved are not quite as well known. Among them were Arthur Szekulsky, a Canadian ally, Gouzenko, exposed the plot to the royal Canadian mounted police. More than a score of persons were held on charges of participating in the spy ring.

The most prominent were Allan Nunn May, a British scientist; Dr. Raymond Boyer, a chemistry professor at McGill University in Montreal; and Fred Rose, a member of the Canadian parliament.

Fuchs, who worked on the atom project in Canada from 1943 until 1945, was the most important of these spies. Following his arrest in England, it was established that he gave a Russian military officer a Montreal laboratory samples of atomic material shortly before the end of World War II.

He confessed that, inasmuch as he was also familiar with the U. S. atomic program, too, he wrote an encyclopedic report on atomic energy and passed it to the Russians.

May, who had been a communist since before the war was sentenced to serve 10 years in prison. His term expired earlier this year.

Fuchs worked on all Soviet espionage rings from an atomic standpoint was the one in which Fuchs and his fellow spy operated.

Fuchs was born in Germany in 1911. He was a brilliant student. As a youth, he joined the young communist league in Germany. He worked in the party underground until 1932 when the rise of the nazis forced him to take refuge in Britain.

He was interned at the outbreak of war between Britain and Germany but was released in 1942 to do atomic research. In 1944, he became a member of a British mission which was to study the development of the atom bomb in this country first hand.

Fuchs worked in New York City and in Los Alamos, N. M., where the atom bomb was designed and put together. He thus was privy to

the bomb's ultra-secret trigger mechanism.

Fuchs returned in 1946 to England where he worked in Britain's atomic secret at Harwell.

Some time later the exact time is still a secret—the FBI learned that Russia had been given U. S. atomic information.

The FBI tipped off British authorities who, after their own investigation, arrested Fuchs in London on Feb. 2, 1950. He freely confessed.

He told his British captors that, starting in 1952, he had given full information to the Russians through various Soviet espionage contacts.

He said that in this country he had contacts with Russian agents in New York, Boston and Los Alamos.

Fuchs said he once received 100 pounds (about \$200) of "symbolic" reward money from the Russians.

But he said he came to dislike Russian foreign policy and ceased to supply the reds with information in early 1949.

On March 1, 1950, Fuchs, then only 38 years old, was sentenced to 14 years in prison. The court described the crime of this naturalized British citizen as "only thinly differentiated from high treason."

The FBI was endeavoring, meanwhile, to round up American contacts of Fuchs. From Fuchs' FBI

agents learned that his principal American contact was a stocky man of around 40, obviously a chemist known to him only as 'G.'

The FBI searched its files for chemists of left-wing tendencies who answered Fuchs' description and had the opportunity for espionage.

Harry Gold, a Philadelphia chemist, was among the suspects. He already had come to the attention of the FBI as a possible espionage agent in its investigation of Jacob Golos, Elizabeth Bentley's contact.

Fuchs at first could not identify Golos as his contact. But once shown motion pictures of the Philadelphia man, he identified him with certain 1949-Gold, after first denying all charges, confessed.

The FBI in subsequent months rounded up other members of the ring in this country. Greenglass was arrested on June 16, 1950; Julius Rosenberg on July 17; Ethel Rosenberg on Aug. 11, and Morton Sobell on Aug. 18.

The Americans received the following penalties: The Rosenbergs' death—last summer—in Sing Sing's electric chair; Gold, 30 years in prison; Greenglass, 10 years; and Sobell, 30 years.

Unlike Greenglass and Gold, Sobell and the Rosenbergs did not confess. Sobell escaped the death penalty because the information he gave the Russians was about radar, not atomic bombs.
