"Ike" Sets up Board in Rail Strike Threat

AUGUSTA, Ga., Dec. 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower set up a special emergency board today in an effort to avert a threatened strike of more than one million non-operating employees against the nation's railroads.

The chief executive put aside the laborious task of preparing speeches and messages to congress and the public to sign an executive order aimed at halting, or at least delaying, a threatened work stoppage by the 15 non-operating AFL railroad unions.

No Date Set
The unions have voted to strike in a dispute over operating rules changes but set no date for the walkout.

In his executive order today, the President said the unsettled argument "in the judgment of the national mediation board, threatens substantially to interrupt interstate commerce to a degree such as to deprive the country of essential transportation services."

Mr. Eisenhower provided in his order for a three-man board but did not name the members. The board will report back to the President in 30 days with recommendations on how best to settle the dispute which could tie up American rail transportation if the non-operating unions strike.

Dulles Claims Russians Put On Defensive

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles believes the world has put the rulers of Russia "on a diplomatic defensive" and that "we are ready to talk" to the Soviet leaders about any "unpleasant point of difference, where it is easy to do."

While negotiations for a four-year meeting of foreign ministers, including the Soviet, apparently are entering a decisive phase, Dulles called the nine other members of President Eisenhower's cabinet in reporting on achievements of the new administration's first year.

Each contributed a signed article to the U. S. Chamber of Commerce magazine, "Nation's Business."

In his report on the state department, Dulles said, "Our policies are proving successful." He wrote: "We have, you might say, chased Europe and Asia in our efforts to get the rulers to negotiate. Now we are beginning to look as if we have caught them."

But he said the United States does not accept as conditions for peace the abandonment of the Atlantic alliance, the European defense community or overseas bases. He said the United Nations is not a condition.

He cautioned against a "policy that might bring a Russian to the point where he would not invite a word to words to obscure the part that faces our world."

Defense Secretary Wilson said he believes we have the most powerful and effective force in the world, including naval aviation in his estimate.

Agriculture Secretary Benson said the administration is seeking a redirection of old farm programs and institutions of new ones.

"The old ways," he said, "are too restrictive, too difficult to serve the needs of the American people."

Interior Secretary McKay said state, local communities and individuals are regaining a voice in development and management of resources after 20 years of centralized federal monopoly.

He said he said there was a place "for both public and private power."

Her attorneys, appealing for a suspended sentence, said Mrs. Doughty had a mother complex and she had a baby of her own. Psychiatrists ruled her sane.

After her arrest at her Rockford, Ill., home the young kidnaper said she would take the child again if given the chance. The boy was recovered unharmed.

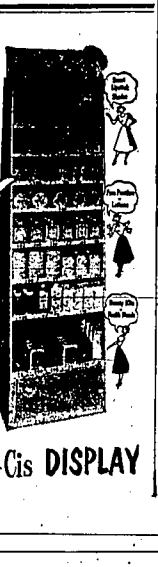

peaceful uses.
This put the heat on the Russians.

about the idea, which was all Mr.
Eisenhower asked, because the re-
sult of the rest of the world was
too enthusiastic.
Eventually they talked as if they
might discuss the atom. But that
isn't certain yet. Neither is the
foreign ministers' talk.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 29 (AP)—Philadelphia and Los Angeles were behaving today like teenagers who had been told the same story as they quarreled over the census is the country's third largest city.

Traction of Cars on Ice Poorest Near Freezing, Greater as Mercury Drops

CHICAGO, Dec. 29—Does temperature affect an auto's ability to stop on ice?

Yes. And that answer comes with authoritative emphasis from a group of engineers and automotive experts who braved chill winds on a frozen Wisconsin lake to find answers for the National Safety Council's committee on winter driving hazards.

When the temperature was zero, the average stopping distance on glare ice at 30 m.p.h. was 110 feet. But at 25 degrees below the melting point—it took 250 feet to stop at the same speed—a difference of 140 feet.

"The driver who starts out on an icy road early in the morning while it's still cold finds traction and stopping ability fairly good," said Ralph A. Meyer, traffic research engineer for the University of California.

Reinforced tire chains, so-called because cross chains are reinforced with projecting teeth or cleats, are recommended because of their power to resist side skids as well as to provide stop-and-go traction.

The committee also tested 25 different specialized tires of the snow-tug or winter type. The conclusion was that while some of the

ties had advantages under certain conditions, their overall improvement was not great enough to warrant loss cars or precaution when driving on slippery surfaces and their performance was far below that of chains.

Unit chains—sometimes called emergency chains—were tested by the committee. Consisting of three or four units strapped individually to a tire, the chains gave better traction than bare tires but were greatly inferior to full chains.

The committee even warned that kidding is "likely to be caused by the frictional forces developed when one unit chain on one tire is in contact with the ice and on the other side of the vehicle only the unprotected tire area between the unit chains is in contact with the ice."

The booklets offer advice on how to use the brakes when stopping on ice, how to start in second gear and with automatic transmissions, how to avoid skids due to oversteering, and other safe winter driving tips.
