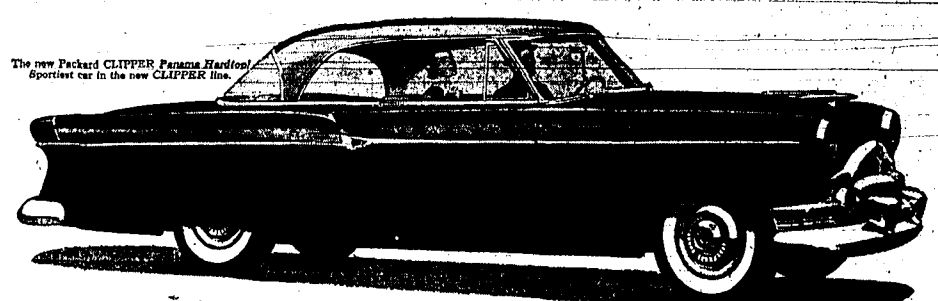

Senator Asks Crop Help or Imports Trim

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Sen. Clark Hamilton, D., Washington, called upon the government last night to either cut down on agricultural imports or support crop prices at a living level.

"It is impossible for the Idaho farmer to get a living price for his products as long as the government in Washington insists on importing surplus of farm products into the United States to drive the American market down," Hamilton declared in an address to the Payette-Washington county Grange.

No Justification
"There can be no justification of criticism against the farmers about government support," he added, "as long as tens of billions of dollars are spent each year to subsidize our business."

He said "it would have been difficult for the President to make a more inaccurate statement" than that "the problems of agriculture have come to the fore at this time because of large exports of agricultural products."

Hamilton declared farm exports had declined during 1945, while there were "two billion dollars worth of excess imports" which would have "per cent drop in farm income."

Hamilton charged that "the international bankers are in charge of the state department" and singled out Samuel O. Waugh, assistant secretary of state for economic affairs.

He quoted Waugh as a Lincoln, Neb., bank president on leave, as recommending "that the United States have regard to the harmful effect . . . on international trade of restrictions on import of dairy products."

"Our international bankers have thrown enough broken glass and sand in the channels of commerce to slow the sale of agricultural products abroad, while at the same time they have pressed the aids, making it easier to sell man-made products abroad," the state senator declared.

Panel Report Advises U. S. Army Revises

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—An advisory committee set up by President Eisenhower's suggestion has proposed long-to-be-long revision of the army to overcome costly weaknesses and prepare it for the demands of modern war.

The five-man group outlined measures for strengthening overall civilian control, tightening army purse strings, making military more responsible for actual operations and modernizing continental army commands and supply services.

Headed by Paul H. Davies, president of the Food Machinery and Chemical Corporation, San Jose, Calif., the committee was set up by Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens last August after Mr. Eisenhower had called for "broadly needed" improvements in the army, navy and air force.

Stevens, making public the 60-page report said it would be "most valuable" to the army in the quest for "every reasonable economy in defense without endangering the security of the nation."

The committee comprised three other businessmen and Lieut. Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, army deputy chief of staff for plans and research. It made these major recommendations:

War Renewal Is Doubtful by U. S. General

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The army's chief of staff predicted Thursday that although the communists have expanded their airbases in North Korea the Pentagon sees no signs that they intend to renew hostilities.

If there are any remaining changes in the situation, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway said the senate foreign relations committee, the decision to withdraw two American divisions from Korea will be "at once reviewed."

Pact Okay Urged
Ridgway formerly commanded the 8th army in Korea and later was supreme commander of the United States and United Nations forces in the far east.

In reply to a question by Chairman Wiley P. Wise, he said there have been "no signs of withdrawal" of Chinese units from North Korea since the armistice but that red forces there still is "not far from one million" men.

Ridgway added there is verified evidence that the communists have rebuilt war-torn airfields since the truce began and have constructed some new fields.

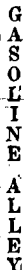

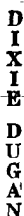

Farm Co-Ops In State Rank High in Tally

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (Special)—Idaho stood third among the mountain states in number of farm co-ops operating in the state and second in number of members and funds for 1953-54, the USDA reports. Idaho had 125 associations doing business, in third place behind Montana's 198 and Colorado's 181. With 61,449 co-op members, the state was second only to Colorado's estimated 75,048.

Net business after adjusting for duplication of branch and central reports, etc., was \$142,742,000 in Idaho. Colorado topped the list with \$189,274,000 but Montana co-ops trailed far behind Idaho with a turnover of \$99,548,000. Utah co-ops were fourth with \$88,588,000.

Nationally, farm co-op membership hit a record high with 74 million members enrolled in 10,143 co-ops—an increase of four per cent over 1950-51 membership. Net business of the nation's co-ops for the year was \$4.4 billion dollars. Dairy products were the top item; livestock and livestock products, second; and grain, soybeans and soybean products third in value of items marketed through co-ops. Feed, petroleum products and fertilizer were the top three items purchased by farmers.

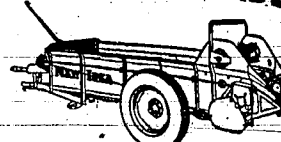
