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## High Cost of Korea Campaign Pays Off in Battle Experience

TOKYO, Feb. 8 (AP)—Korea, a bomb-blasted peninsula sticking down into the Yellow and Japan seas, has cost the United States dearly.

But Gen. Otto P. Weyland believes air superiority crippled the communists in Korea by knocking out their planes, supplies, equipment and manpower, while our infantry held the forward defense line and the navy protected the sea lines of communication.

"Although the minds of some men, too many millions of U. S. dollars have been pumped into the Korean hillside, the lessons learned in the four-star commanding general of our air forces said in an interview.

"We are pretty sure now that the communists wanted peace, not the ground, but to get air power off their back.

"We know U. S. air force jets, once criticized as too fast for the Korean conflict, proved a superior weapon on the deck or at 50,000 feet—destroying factories or knocking MIGs from the sky 110 to 9 as in the last two months of the fight.

"We know that the jet fighter has come into its own: Forty-eight rockets, all capable of knocking down an enemy bomber or fighter, can be fired in a few seconds. Two 3,000-pound bombs or a weapon of mass destruction can be carried by jet fighters and pinpointed to destruction, a factory, or wipe out a military communications center, or an enemy airbase stocked with planes, which could strike a score of American cities."

So says a quiet man, blond, over 40, tall, America's foremost tactician and top combat leader, with 19 months' command experience in Europe and 38 in the far East.

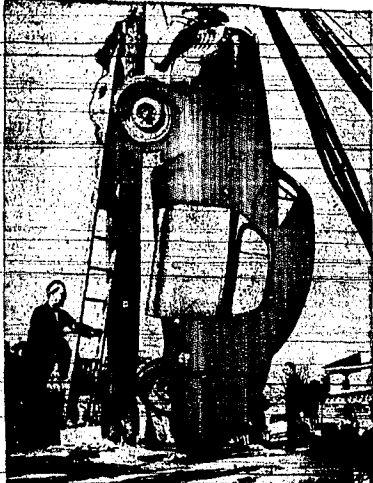

# Tax Problem Pondered by Idaho Group

BOISE, Feb. 3 (U-P)—State legislators conferred with city and county representatives Tuesday in a step toward solving some of Idaho's local tax-raising problems.

State Sen. Carl D. Irwin, R. Twin Falls, said a move was made toward charting a work program during a meeting of the subcommittee on state and local relationships of the state legislative interim committee on taxation. He is chairman of the group.

Two fields

He said the subcommittee, which has been asked to prepare a report for the 1935 legislature, decided to concentrate on two fields:

1. The removing of restrictions hampering municipalities in raising revenue and preventing them from financing themselves, and
2. The lifting of similar restrictions on county governments.

"Our main problem is to narrow down the field and come up with some specific proposals," Irwin said. "We don't expect to have a very big report, but we'll have something."

Other Power

Irwin said the group will study the question of providing cities and towns with some other revenue power besides the ad valorem tax. But he pointed out that such a move, such as a city sales tax, would require a constitutional amendment.

Mayor L. L. Gardner, Councilman Albert, president of the Idaho Municipal League, who attended the meeting, is expected to communicate the group's views today to league members meeting here to plan for the league convention next June in McCall.

The meeting also was attended by Harold West, Idaho Falls, president of the state's county organization, the Idaho Association of Commissioners and Clerks.

# Recovery of Pay in Bean Case Sought

BOISE, Feb. 3 (U-P)—British insurance underwriters filed suit today in third district court here for reimbursement of funds required to pay growers of the Pile-Rupert area in the now infamous "Idaho bean case."

The action revived a case of the late 1920s in which growers complained that W. Andrew Jean, former Pile-Rupert warehouseman, failed to account to them for substantial quantities of produce they had stored in warehouses leased by William Banks Warehouse, Inc. and operated by Jean.

\$24,900 Judgment

An \$24,900 judgment was returned against the warehouse concern in federal district court here in 1931. The court contended that the licensee, the William Banks Warehouse firm, was responsible for the acts of the operator.

The judgment was upheld by the U. S. supreme court and the warehouse business, Lloyd of London, were required to pay the \$24,900. Brought by Fair

Tuesday's action was brought by John Alfred Hailford and John B. Lord, two of the British underwriters who are required to meet the judgment against Lloyd's, which operated as a broker.

The plaintiffs seek a \$119,000 judgment, the difference between that and the district court judgment representing attorney fees and other costs, according to local attorneys.

stockmen about the value of growing hay and livestock in maintaining soil fertility in the area. He pointed out alfalfa is the key crop in farm conservation in irrigated areas.

Looking at it from a financial standpoint, he said a good supply of feed, a great deal of experience and the right equipment are points financial backers look for in a feeder. He also noted that feeders could gain a lot by looking to the extension service and other sources for advice and help with problems.

First stop on the afternoon tour was made at the Arch T. Olinier farm, one mile west of Magic Valley Memorial hospital.

Olinier discussed the costs of various feeds, pointing out that he is using different feeding rations on three lots of cattle. He said the cost was running from 25 cents to 35 cents per day per animal for the program.

In a discussion on slage feeding, Olinier explained his system which includes about 20 to 25 pounds of potatoes each day.

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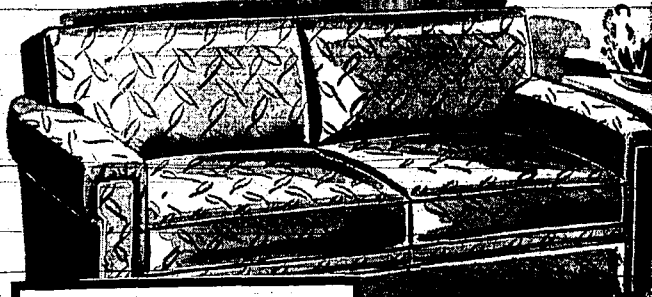

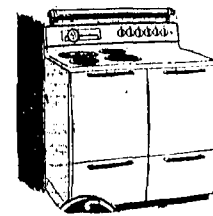
