**Mail rates**—The House postoffice committee today approved a bill to raise the rate for first-class mail from 10 to 12 cents a pound, or 100 million dollars a year by providing for a four-cent stamp on all non-local mail.

**Wages**—The House labor committee today approved a bill to increase the minimum wage for non-merchandising workers to 15 cents an hour. The bill also provides increases in minimum rates for newsprint, printing and certain types of merchandising.

**Defense**—Senate Democrats appeared ready to accept the administration's new look military program, but they are still opposed to the White House conference and armed services committee military briefings. They are also opposed to the administration's new strategy for the atomic age strategy.

**Destroyed**—House investigators today said the navy had destroyed a contract for 100 destroyers to the Quincy, Mass., construction company for \$544,000, higher than the low bid.

**NLRB**—Albert C. ## Hopes for Early Trim in High Butter Prices Fade

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Hopes for a carry-over in the high-price butter market were dashed today by word of a government support level for butter slated for April 1. The new level would be 66 cents a pound, or 10 cents below the current level, in April.

Despite the drop in price, the American Agriculture Secretary Benson has said he has decided to continue support for the dairy market for a year beginning April 1. This should mean an immediate rise in the price of butter as the government's support level is lowered.

Under the new Benson may not support anywhere between 75 and 80 per cent of the government's parity yardstick. Butter is supported now at 76 per cent and is retailing at 80 to 82 cents a pound. If the government's support level is the minimum, butter would sell in the stores for around 70 cents a pound.



## Watermaster Suggests New Plan for Dam

IDAHO FALLS, Feb. 5 (U-P)—The "boss of the Snake river" proposes a new approach to the controversial Hells canyon issue.

Lyndon Cranford, veteran watermaster of sprawling Snake river water district 36, made his proposal during a panel discussion at the Bonneville county farm and home institute in Idaho Falls on water resources.

He said:

**New Plan**

"Considering all the aspects of the Hells canyon matter it is possible that the best overall solution would have been let the government build the high dam under an arrangement whereby the Idaho Power company would get a firm long-time contract to purchase at wholesale rates, say 60 per cent of the output at the site."

"And," he continued, "the controversy had developed to such a point that it appears doubtful if any such agreement could be reached."

Cranford has been watermaster on the Snake for 24 years. He recently testified at the power commission hearings in Washington, D. C., on Idaho Power's applications to build three dams on the Snake river.

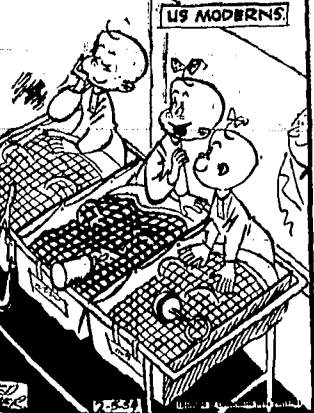

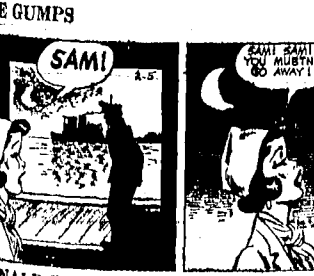

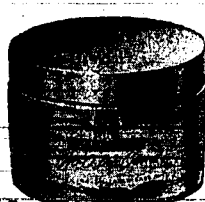
