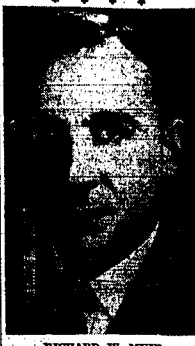

JOB CUTS AND SECURITY

President Eisenhower campaigned for office on an economy-in-government plank, among others. A year after he assumed office, it is fair to see how he is doing on this score.

Twelve months ago there were 2,970,000 civil service workers on the federal payroll. Today there are some 2,700,000.

In other words, the Eisenhower administration has reduced the total by some 200,000. Most of this reduction has not been achieved through firings, but simply through not filling job vacancies as they occur.

Predictions are that Mr. Eisenhower will be able to eliminate possibly another 40,000 civil service jobs by the end of the year.

Secretary of Defense Wilson has said that if the Eisenhower resume could slash "operating expenses" by 10 per cent that would be an achievement of no note.

Some citizens, and some politicians, may have imagined that reduction in the number of government workers would be a point beyond which it cannot go without serious impairment of services viewed by citizens themselves as essential to their welfare.

And, of course, to cut heavily into the 75 cents of the tax dollar which goes for defense and related costs would be to endanger, sooner or later, the national security.

Mr. Eisenhower's whittling on the regular services has been steady and will continue. But there obviously is a point beyond which it cannot go without serious impairment of services viewed by citizens themselves as essential to their welfare.

Big government is something that makes many Americans unhappy, for it stands in their minds for unnecessary regulation, wasteful expense, bureaucratic rigidity. The President is dedicated to preventing government from getting any bigger, and to making it a little smaller where he can. But he is under no illusion that it can be made really small again.

ONE TOAST TOO MANY

From Berlin, a note regarding Foreign Minister Molotov of the Soviet Union as the top diplomat of all he has met in the past 30 years.

Obviously, Dulles is speaking here of Molotov's admitted great technical skill as a diplomatic negotiator. When he pays high tribute, it is the same sort of tribute that an American general might pay to a rival general like Remond during a great war. It is the admiration of one professional for another's professional talents.

This does not mean that Dulles approves of the things Molotov says or does or represents. Molotov speaks for a government which has caused the death of millions of innocent people around the globe, is still causing such deaths and deliberately promotes misery and physical suffering to achieve its political ends of world domination.

That being so, the men of the free world who are combating this giant effort at enslavement hardly expect Dulles to smile across the table at Molotov and say: "Good shoot, old man."

PUBLICITY RHUBARB

There was a big publicity build-up a couple of years ago when TV and radio star Arthur Godfrey was checked out to fly navy jet planes. Godfrey is a lieutenant-commander in the naval reserve and has taken an active part in many campaigns to promote navy recruiting.

For this boost for navy aviation, a great many newspapers were made showing Lieutenant-Commander Godfrey sitting in navy jet fighters, wearing the pilot's full gear.

All the current rhubarb over charges that Godfrey buzzed a control tower while flying his private plane has now brought an admission from the navy that Lieutenant-Commander Godfrey never did make a solo flight in a jet plane.

Question-Answer Session With Benson Gives Reasons Behind New Farm Plan

WASHINGTON (NEA)—In the following question-and-answer session with Peter Benson and the Washington bureau of NEA service, Agriculture Secretary T. H. Benson presents his views on some of the controversial issues surrounding the administration farm program.

Q. What prospect does the new farm program hold for the consumer, who is mainly interested in lower food prices?—

A. It is designed to provide an abundance of food for the table at reasonable prices. And in the long run it will cost him less in taxes. These improvements will come about, largely, through the use of flexible price supports. Such supports allow farm prices to move up or down according to the supplies of commodities on the market. Not immediately, it is difficult to predict the trend of food prices.

Q. Do you see any prospect that the food cost of living will be reduced in the foreseeable future?—

A. Not immediately. It is difficult to predict the trend of food prices.

What Is Parity?

Parity is designed as a measure of a satisfactory relationship between the prices of the things the farmer sells—his crops and stock—and the things he buys—his machinery, clothes, household goods. If this price ratio is right, the farmer is getting a fair share of the products put out by the rest of the economy.

Under present law, it is figured by setting the average price of the products he sells against the average price of what he buys—crops and stock—during the previous 10 years. A "parity price" is one set to assure the farmer a "parity income."

Crackdown Hits Church in Italy

ROME, Feb. 10 (AP)—Police chiefed the name of the Church of Christ off its building in Rome today. A church spokesman denounced the action as a "violation of the law of the state" and said the Protestant religious group would take the matter to court.

It was the second crackdown in about 12 hours by Italian authorities on the largely Texas-financed Protestant Evangelical group, which has been having trouble with the authorities in Rome since its arrival in the city last week.

Friday night police forced Italian worshippers from the small rented hall of the church in the seaport city of Leghorn. The church in Rome and another in the city of Genoa were placed under Italian police custody, but later released. American worshippers refused to leave and continued with the service.

This morning police appeared with leaders at the three-story building corner of Via Veneto and "chased out" the 10-orchestra orchestra "Chiesa di Cristo." They picked up an Associated Press photographer for snapping pictures of their activities, but later released him.

The President last Tuesday accepted an invitation to speak that day before the annual dinner of the American Newspaper Publishers Association in New York.

There have been rumors for several days that Eisenhower might visit Palm Springs, Calif., soon, perhaps as early as the latter part of next week. Asked about these rumors at the Eisenhower vacation headquarters in Thomaston, Ga., Press Secretary James O. Hagerty replied:

"We will have no comment on that before returning to Washington."

Pope Will Speak to Sick People Today

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Pope Pius XII will make a brief address by radio Sunday to sick and ailing throughout the world. It will be the pope's first broadcast since he was stricken by a severe gastric ailment Jan. 25.

The announcement, indicating further the 77-year-old pontiff's health, is definitely on the mend—said the 10-minute address will be broadcast by the Vatican radio, hooked up with the Italian radio system and that of several other countries.

The Vatican paper L'Osservatore Romano said the pontiff will speak the first few words of the address from his Vatican apartment where he has been confined since his illness. The rest of the address will be delivered by a Vatican radio speaker.

Stock and Poultry Holdings Decline

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The agriculture department reported today that livestock and poultry on farms on Jan. 1 were down one per cent from a year earlier and declined in value slightly more than 20 per cent.

This is the first time since 1929 the number has shown a decrease.

Livestock holdings on Jan. 1 were valued at \$1,870,523,000, compared with \$1,648,800,000 a year earlier and \$10,058,933,000 two years ago.

Cattle numbers increased about one per cent. It was during 1933 that cattle prices, reflecting the record numbers on farms, declined about 30 per cent in value.

Hike in Northwest Building Reported

BOISE, Feb. 10 (AP)—Private building construction in the Pacific Northwest rose 28 per cent in January from the same month last year, despite a severe decline in Idaho, the Seattle business journal reported Saturday.

The Construction News Bulletin reported construction dropped from \$1,032,638 in January, 1933 to \$1,285 in Idaho last month, because of harsh winter weather.

But in 100 building cities and counties in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Wyoming the total rose from \$10,809,000 to \$28,448,000 in the same period, the journal reported.

The Construction News Bulletin reported construction dropped from \$1,032,638 in January, 1933 to \$1,285 in Idaho last month, because of harsh winter weather.

But in 100 building cities and counties in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Wyoming the total rose from \$10,809,000 to \$28,448,000 in the same period, the journal reported.

Anti-Red Underground Men Keep Fire Of Rebellion Alive in Soviet Satellites

BERLIN, Feb. 15 (AP)—The spindly little fellow blew a big smoke ring on a cheap cigar.
"There are thousands like me," he said quietly. "Not only German, but Poles and Czechs and others. They're all waiting for the day the Russians step back just one little bit."
"Yes, the Soviets call me and others like me underground agents. We're a little more than that. We are an army without guns. But we are an army just the same."
How many are there like this from Berlin to Moscow? There is no firm estimate anywhere except perhaps by the files of the late Lavrenty Beria's secret police.
Is there a genuine resistance movement? Reliable reports from this crossroads city, from Vienna, gateway to the Balkans, from Prague, from Warsaw and Belgrade indicate the fires of rebellion flare up constantly behind the iron curtain, never connected, never organized, but there just the same.
From diplomats, refugees, intelligence agents, personal contacts and from Soviet admissions themselves, Associated Press correspondents in Berlin, Vienna and Belgrade conclude:
1. There is a simmering hatred everywhere the Russians impose by their rule of might.
2. Sabotage is rare but sometimes highly dramatic.
The amount of active revolt de-

crosses as one moves east toward the core of the Kremlin's power.
East Germany appears more loaded with a potential explosion than any other area, as evidenced in the bloody uprisings last June, which probably would have blown the communist out of power had the government not availed itself of Russian tanks and the breach.
Red police still are on constant alert and communist courts have piled up this winter a record of 73 trials, six death sentences, 22 life sentences and various terms against 1,857 additional men and women.
The charges were always the same: Sabotage, resistance, espionage. Ties to blow up bridges and to dynamite rail lines used by Soviet repatriation trains were admitted. A 21,000-ton Soviet ship was scuttled off the Baltic coast. Communist youth headquarters in Wismar were burned on the wall with a torch.
The red press itself published stories of an attempt to blow up a huge conveyor at a soft coal mine, a plot to poison party leaders in Saxony.
In East Berlin, little rockets exploded almost daily over rooftops, scattering anti-communist leaflets. Through the East some resistance bands tie the pamphlets to weather vans when they expect windy weather.
Across the Oder river in Poland, there are persistent reports of sabotage gangs making lightning strikes out of the forests to attack the Russian rail lifelines. The famed Blue Express has been derailed three times in the last four years. Passive resistance to high work quotas and unwhimsical participation in state functions is the underground order of the day.
To the south, the Czechs and Slovaks are in an equally tight vise but the red army has not found it necessary to provide troops. Nevertheless, the tension is constantly high. Outraged Czech workers multiplied in Filsen last June. The toll exacted by gun-wielding communists never has let up.
Over the Ukraine, the famed Bandershots are said to be still operating against the regime. Moscow recognized this old trouble spot in a pointed manner several months ago. Premier Georgi Malenkov visited the Transylvania Alps, making life miserable for any communist who gets in their way. Incendiary fires in the Ploesti oil fields have been reported frequently. The hills of Bulgaria are said to harbor thousands of partisans.
Far-off Albania contributes its share. A ship's crew escaped some time ago by drugging the skipper and the guards and delivering a 26-ton cargo, loaded with military supplies, to the Greeks at Port Shkerr. Almost daily, Albanians sneak through the mountain passes to Yugoslavia, reporting and organizing. Anti-communist underground work in Berlin conceals the support of open resistance against the reds in the so-called "new countries" controlled by Premier Malenkov to provide a better standard of living for the man in the street.
The "new course" has been proclaimed throughout the satellite areas, including East Germany. In some instances it has produced a better way of life. The question is whether the Russians can afford to keep it up economically. Anti-Soviet circles say it may be that the Russians can't afford to stop it, politically.

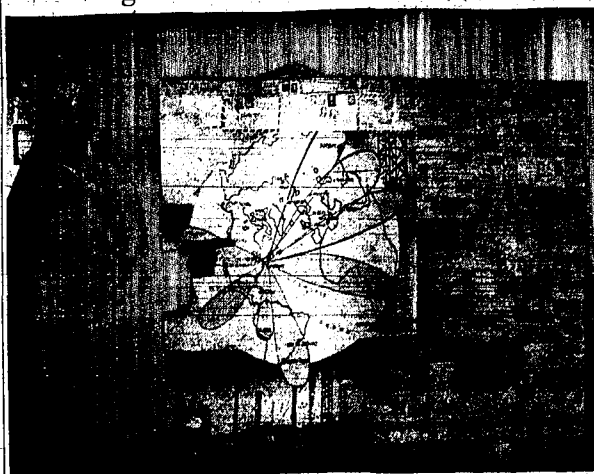

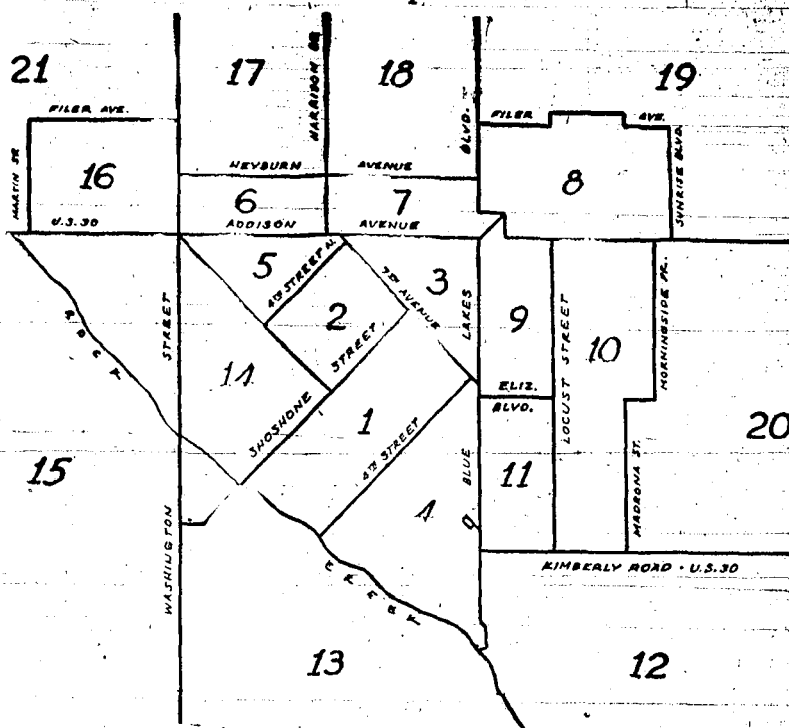
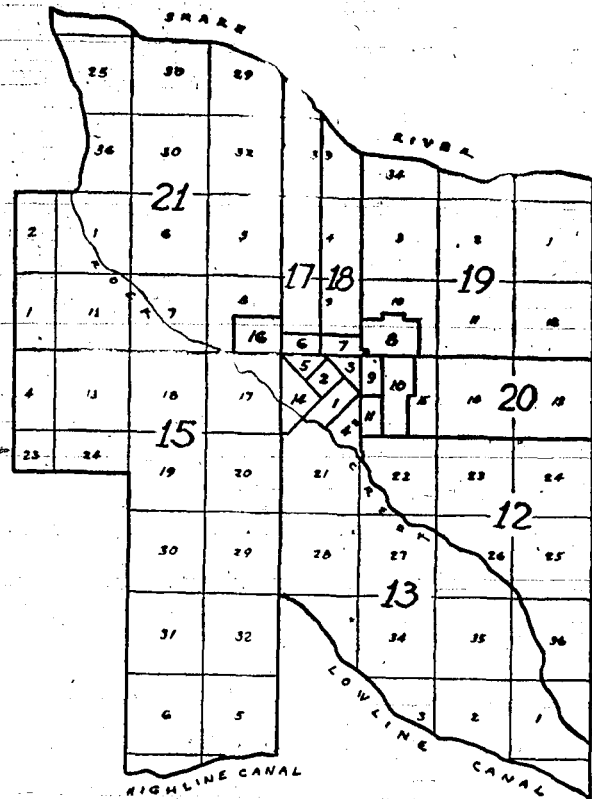

No. 14 is confined to the west residential section of the old townsite, formerly extended into the rural areas to the southwest.

Three changes have been made in Buhl. Precinct No. 6 has been changed to No. 5 with the same boundaries, while old No. 5 has been divided into No. 5 and No. 7, taking in the north section of Buhl.

Lincoln Panel Okays Budget Plans of Year

SHOSHONE, Feb. 13—Lincoln county's budget, with numerous changes from last year, has been approved by the Lincoln county commission at \$2,338,640.

The budget for the county assessor was cut \$300, \$50 of which came from the travel allowance to leave \$100 and \$250 from the capital outlay to leave \$1,050. The allowance for the assessor now stands at \$8,879.60.

The county fair fund was cut \$500 to \$2,400. In explaining the cut in the budget, F. O. Wentworth, chairman of the board, said the reduction still leaves the fair board with \$7,000 for the building program and \$1,400 for fair expenses.

Plans Changed
When the tentative budget for the county was approved it was thought that the grounds and buildings would be completed in time for the fair this fall. It has become apparent that the barn cannot be built before next fall and the additional money will not be needed this year.

Approximately \$5,000 has been spent for the irrigation system; the buildings and ground improvements, Wentworth said. The bureau of land management gave the buildings to the board and to the fair board. The canning kitchen later sold its building to the fair board for \$500.

Building Needs
The two buildings need to be wired for electricity and modern rest rooms must be installed. County Engineer Fred Kohl said. Rest room costs have been estimated at \$3,000. The sprinkler system is paid for, except for \$500 which will come out of this year's fair budget, Kohl said.

The county weed control budget has been set at \$15,000 but almost 100 per cent of this will be returned to the county. The farmers buy the chemicals and if they do not wish to do the work themselves the county weed supervisor uses county equipment for the jobs. Money raised through the program goes back to the county fund.

Health Plan
Under the southeastern Idaho health unit plan, Wentworth said, the cost of maintaining the eight-county unit is divided among the counties according to population. Lincoln county's share of the expense in 1963 was \$2,880 while in 1964 it will be \$2,240.

An increase of \$300 was allowed the sheriff for traveling expenses this year, making his budget \$11,076. Budgets for the county agent and physician remained the same and in 1959-64, \$48,000 for the former and \$20,000 for the latter.

The treasurer's budget was decreased \$272 for bonding expense, making his budget \$7,229.80 while the probate judge's budget was set at \$4,611.80. The prosecuting attorney took a cut of \$10.80 in his budget. His budget now stands at \$2,669.

Budget for the coroner is \$130 and district court expenses are set at \$7,355, \$10 more than last year.

Justic court budget is \$350, \$40 less than last year, and the commissioners' budget was set at \$2,550 this year as compared to \$2,585 last year. The courthouse and grounds budget was raised \$100, to \$8,400, allowing \$100 wages for the janitor's vacation help.

Budget for clerk, auditor and recorder was cut from \$7,694.25 last year to \$7,639 this year.

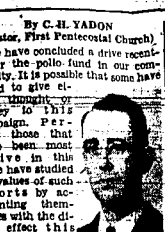
The commissioners' special account is set at \$13,250 this year, which includes \$2,000 election expense.

Last year \$800 was budgeted for a probation officer. No amount was budgeted this year.

Last year the county school fund was \$85,000 as compared with \$95,000 this year. The scalp and seat fund was doubled, set at \$1,800, and the hospital fund again was set at \$600. If this fund is not used, as is often the case, the money goes back into the general fund.

The memorial building fund, for maintenance of the Richfield and Shoshone memorial buildings, was set at \$500, \$100 less than last year. Of that amount, \$400 is for the Shoshone building and \$200 for the Richfield fund remains at
