Packers Back Federal Crop Support Plan

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22 (AP)—Support for the administration's national agricultural program and for Secretary of Agriculture Benson's program of flexible price supports came today from the Western States Packers association.

The annual convention of this group of independent packers unanimously adopted a resolution favoring the program.

Program Endorsed

The declaration said the national program "assures that livestock and meat will remain free from government price supports and price controls."

It added that the association "actively favors Benson's flexible price supports for basic commodities rather than the present rigid price supports."

Later, the convention heard J. Earl Coker, assistant secretary of agriculture, explain the national program as proposed recently by President Eisenhower.

Confidence In U. S.

"It is a program of confidence in the skill and spirit and future of America," Coker said. "It is one for all people—producers and consumers alike." He spoke in place of Benson, who was forced to cancel the engagement because of illness.

Coker said that while farm surplus are the basic cause of the "bidding" that promises higher living standards for the future and a weapon in the fight for peace and world understanding. He added:

"Our challenge is to learn how to use our abundance so that all our people benefit. Our challenge is to use it in ways that will strengthen, not threaten, our farm prosperity."

Men Arrested For Burglary

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22 (AP)—Police and FBI agents arrested four men Sunday night in connection with a \$40,000 burglary at Boise two weeks ago.

Police inspectors Ray Mink and Joseph Killea said the money was taken from the home of Mrs. Katherine Sumner of Boise while she was visiting relatives.

They identified the men arrested as John Bonita Nicholas Rubenka, 40, and Lee R. Miller, 41, both Boise residents; William S. Wright, 33, St. Louis, Mo., bartender; and Marvin L. Dixon, 35, a former logger from Longview, Wash.

The inspectors said the four were booked on burglary charge en route to the U. S. marshal.

Mink and Killea said Rubenka was caught on a fugitive from law warrant signed by Boise police last Thursday. They said the four were arrested in a hotel and offered no resistance.

Hank Still Chuckling at Trade After Court's Rule on Baseball

I've mentioned this earlier,
but I have been laughing too hard
to write about the double play combina-
tion of the supreme court's ruling
that baseball is a sport, not a busi-
ness, and the decision of the
court to allow the sale of baseball
players to the New York Giants.
These two go together like milk
and sugar and half
a dozen other things.
If the justice
fates aren't red
after this de-
cision, then they
wouldn't be caught
playing leap frog
or drop the handkerchief during a
court recess.
In the light of Thomson's being
shipped to the Milwaukee Braves
for one, wouldn't it be surprising
if any future ruling of the court, it
might well decide that the auto-
mobile industry isn't a business at all
but should be classified as a sport
along with tennis, archery, rope
climbing, hop scotch and canoeing.
If baseball is a sport, untainted
by sordid commercialism and not
operated by men whose ears
tick at the sound of clinking turn-
stiles and the jingle-jangle of the
cash register bell, then Thomson
should have remained a New York
Giants until his head prevented his
chasing fly balls or beating out a
bunt. And after he was gone,
statues of him should have been
sprinkled in and around the Polo
grounds.
For Thomson, as you well remem-
ber, smacked the most dramatic
home run in 1951 that was ever
smacked. It was not only dramatic
—it was powerfully effective, too,
because it won the play-off between
the Giants and the Dodgers, and
sent the Giants into the world series.
No one who was in attendance
when that home run was hit, or saw
it on television, or read about it in
the newspaper, or heard it on radio,
or got it by word of mouth, will
ever forget it. It was a four-base
shot heard 'round the world, or at
least in all parts of the world where
so much as one American was in
residence.
When Thomson, rounded third
base, manager Leo Durocher, who
was coaching—there, still—hadn't
handed on the lead had to wait
when he saw the ball flying toward
the stands.
In the locker room Durocher, who,
I assume, had a major part in ship-
ping Thomson to the Braves, gave
him the prodigious son treatment,
doubled and redoubled in spirit,
and did everything but offer Bobby
his hand in marriage.
Horace Stoneham, the owner of
the Giants, was every bit as enthu-
siastic as his manager, and if anyone
had suggested at the moment that
he would ever part with Thomson,
he would have hustled him off to
Toots Shor's to have his head ex-
amined by the village psychiatrist.
Stoneham would have said—at the
moment—that for him ever to get
rid of Thomson would be the same
as if the parents of the little Dutch
boy who held his thumb in the dike
had punished him for getting his
hands dirty.
But that was 1951 and this is 1954.
Hornblau's stand at the bridge has
been forgotten. Paul Rivers is just
another jockey. John Paul Jones
is just another good business for
the sport that isn't a business to do
business this way.
I can't figure it out, and I don't
think any one can, or can line,
all wearing robes, apparently.

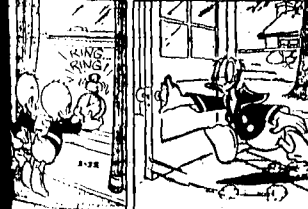
