# Nation's Worst Drought Gets Tougher Each Day

The worst drought in U. S. history soaked upscattered Texas rains like a blotter last week and appeared to be getting tougher day by day throughout the states of the southern great plains. The only section of the vast drought area that got real relief was the Rio Grande valley of Texas—a 100-mile sliver of fertile land along the Mexican border. Rains up to 11 nches poured down there. Meanwhile, the big dry spell won the official title of "dust bowl" for two huge sections of the plains. This came from the soil conservation agency that awarded the drought its "worst in history" title back in 1953 but at that time shrugged off the term "dust bowl" as scare talk. 



#### H-BOMB MAY FORCE PEACE

The whole world is deeply stirred by the crushing facts of America's newest H-bomb explosions. People are beginning to understand everywhere that the "hydrogen age" has really dawned, and that it could be an age of awesome destructiveness ruinous to all mankind.

Even the Russians appear to be impressed by the totality of devastation an H-bomb war would bring. A Russian observer at Bikini said "not much" when he witnessed an early postwar A-bomb blast at our invitation.

Of course he was deliberately minimizing the bomb's importance for propaganda effect. The Kremlin is no longer belittling the dangers of nuclear warfare.

A month ago Premier Malenkov, for the first time, told the Soviet people world civiligation might be destroyed by nuclear weapons. With the passing weeks, the warnings from Moscow have grown more forceful.

Recently, in the Russian army newspaper, Red Star, the H-bomb blast in the Pacific was fully described, and compared with that of a famous million-ton-meteorite-which devastated-thousands of square-miles in Siberia in

In the newest Russian note to the western powers, suggesting Russian entry into NATO, Foreign Minister Molotov included a gloomy paragraph speculating on the grim results to the world of a war fought with atomic and hydrogen weapons.

Some western diplomats in Moscow believe despite the evident absurdity of the latest Soviet proposal, Russia now sincerely desires to find a way out of the cold war. The presumption is that this wish is founded on recognition that it might become hot, and that such a conflict simply cannot be contemplated.

The west has decided to give Moscow another opportunity to demonstrate whether it truly does desire to reach a settlement that could promise avoidance of total war. It has called for new United Nations talks on disarmament. Russia's response to this call will furnish a strong clue to its present attitude.

Meantime, a good deal of irresponsible comment is being heard from two great headquarters of irresponsibility, the Bevanite-faction of the British Labor party and the Indian government of Prime Minister Nehru.

The Laborites call for an end to further tests (regardless of whether they can be shown to have done any damage to ocean food resources). Nehru asks the same. Some of his high officials go further and call Americans "barbarians" for even conducting the

This latter comment, of course, reflects ignorance, of which Indian officials have a substantial quota in matters beyond their own borders

Implicit in both the Nehru and the Bevanite complaints is the notion that somehow America is less concerned for the peace of the world than they are. These are men of limited outlook, plying a narrow-political-trade whichthey think can be made to fatten on anti-Americanism-

The truth is that these H-bomb tests may do more for peace—by showing the utter horror of another war—than a carload of Nehrus or a whole countryful of Bevanites shouting demagogic-imprecations at the top-of their -lungs:

## PEACE-LOVING GENERALS

Americans have been incredibly lucky in the character and quality of their top military leaders.

A democracy whose military men do not have the proper respect for civilian authority could be a democracy in trouble. It is a cardinal principle of our system that the armed forces be subject, finally, to the civilian will.

That is why the President himself is designated commander-in-chief, and why he appoints a civilian secretary to head the defense establishment. One needs only to look about to appreciate what can happen to freedom in nations where the army becomes the voice of authority

But pick out some of America's leading generals and note the difference. George Marshall, Dwight D. Eisenhower, Omar Bradley, Alfred Gruenther, these men are just examples. They show complete regard for the civilian authority. They do not wish the military to intrude at the highest levels of decision.

Moreover, though they have waged war successfully, they are men who really abhor war and would make this country militarily strong so it will not have to fight again. No nation ever had so many genuine peace-loving generals.

## HARD TO DO

Of the 21 American prisoners of war who went over to the communists in Korea, only one was a drafted man. That speaks pretty well for the loyalty of the draftees. Defense Secretary Wilson has ordered an investigation of the 20 to see if they were left-wingers before they joined the army.

Wilson says he does not believe anyone should be able to dodge the draft by claims he's a communist. But it's hard to find a place for communists in the armed services. He is doubtful if the "labor camps" suggested by Senators McCarthy and Everett Dirkson of Illinois are the answer.

In view of the awful devastation of these weapons, don't you think that Eisenhower and Dulles ought to give more thought to this proposal?"

#### VIEWS OF OTHERS 'SOCIALIZED MEDICINE' BINGE

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce, represented by a leader in health insurance trade associations, has warned a committee of congress that President Elsenhower's health reinsurance program is a "first step in the direction of socialised medicine." We'll be (and

you should pardon the expression) damned!

Ike has proposed that the government put up 25 million dollars for five years to induce private health insurance organizations to write policies covering heavier medical and hospital bills than most of them do at present. The government would soon begin to recover its money in premiums not unlike those paid by members of the federal deposit insurance corpora-

San. H. Alexander Smith, New Jersey Republican, specifically pointed out when introducing the legislaon that it "rejects the concept of socialized medicine." And President Eisenhower himself has turned thumbs down on socialized medicine as emphatically

But the chamber's representative insisted that the felmbursement feature "would add nothing to the present rapidly expanding and successful-system" of private poluntary health insurance plans, "The entry of the federal government into this field," he said,
"would result in controls and regulations which would
inhibit the keen competition among private firms which has resulted in experimentation and new

policies very beneficial to the public."
Well, has government reinsurance programs in other fields such as banking or housing hamstrung those industries? The dissent is filed and the U.S. chamber Is put on record against the proposition even before we know for sure to what extent the government will insure private health organizations against loss, and upon what terms.

Private voluntary medical and hospital insurance plans HAVE been growing in coverage and sufficiency; participation in them has been remarkable, and beneficial to millions of people. But it seems to us the height of folly to assume either that (1) they provide all of the health insurance that the nation's popula-tion needs or can pay for at this time, or (2) that the degree of their coverage protects the average policy holder against the extremes of catastrophe which too often occur, and which not infrequently wreck the financial stability of families everywhere. The issue of "socialized medicine" became a passion-

ate and not wholly relevant debate during the Tru-man administration. When Ike submitted a modest and moderate insurance plan, it was hoped that the extremists would restrain themselves, and that something sansible could be worked out within the general pattern of our free medical and hospital system. But apparently we're in for another tussle, the loss of which will be the people's loss if it occup.—Denver

The first improvement was a 72 mile tolpehone line from Shoshone south to Shoshone falls, Blus. Aug. 19. 1905-Hotel-Perrine south to Shoshone falls, Blue Lakes, Twin Falls City and east

The first building was built by the Twin Falls Investment Co., occupied on July 27th. Per-rine & Burton's store was nex-built but was first to be opened on July 23td. 



# Wheat Yields **Cut by USDA** Crop Report

WASHINGTON, April 10 Wh-The nation's winter wheat crop was estimated Friday by the agriculture department at 677,281,000 bushels, well 1852. partment at 677,881,000 busness, well under last year's figure as well as the 10-year (1943-52) average. The department has given no forecast for the spring wheat crop.

After several such courtains, the male stands guard, fanning the eggs to keep them free of fungus and to acrate them. The half-inch fry hatch in two or three weeks, depending upon the temperature of the water.
