





INDOCHINA HEADACHE

Vice President Nixon's remarks about the use of American ground troops in Indochina have apparently caused more stir thanis warranted by the present military realities.

His statement that troops probably would be used came in answer to a question which assumed that the French would fold or withdraw. Since no one believes the French are about to do either one, the question and answer are hypothetical.

The rebel communist campaign against the Viet Nam fortress of Dien Bien Phu should not be minimized. It is a major fight, the sort of combat the French have been hoping to lure the reds into for years. If the strong point falls, the French will have suffered embarrassing defeat—at the game they chose.

But it will not spell disaster for Indochina. Dien Bien Phu is not the key to the whole country. The French would still retain firm control of most of the important sectors, including all the big cities. They would not easily be dislodged from these.

No matter how Dien Bien Phu goes, in a short time the seasonal rains will begin, and the military stalemate that goes with drenching downpours will settle over Indochina again. Indeed, stalemate is the standard phrase of this war, as it became standard in Korea.

So there is no early prospect, really no prospect at all, of Indochina falling to the reds by force of arms. And it is only when that prospect is real and immediate that we shall have to consider the decision Nixon said he believed should be made—to send troops of our own in to prevent a communist victory.

The real crisis over Indochina is a politicalone, and it now centers on the Geneva conference. France wants a truce and evidently is willing to pay high to get it. Our government believes any sort of settlement the reds would offer would fatally compromise Indochina, bringing to communism by political means the triumph it could not gain in the

By his appeals for united action to forestall a red victory, by his trips to London and Paris, by his continual urgent emphasis on the need for holding Indochina, Secretary of State Dulles has sought to make clear that America will not accept an arrangement that gives away the key to southeast Asia.

Insofar as his comments stand as a measure of the lengths this country may be prepared to go to in a possible future extremity, Nixon has reinforced Dulles' position.

DULLES' PLEDGE-In return, Dulles has given an unwritten pledge. At Geneva, he will not agree to recognition of red China or its admission to the United Nations, He will denounce any attempt gotiate a cease-fire alrangement or peace that will give the communists a political, economic or military beachhead in southeast Asia.

Despite partisan differences over foreign policy, ocrats and Republicans are nearer together on defending Indochina than is generally realized. Both deplore the grim thought of fresh sacrifices of lives and treasure. But both concede that permanent loss of our Pacific bastions, China, Asia and possibly of western civilization.

This awful prospect sobers and shocks even the most partisan. Asia has supplanted Europe as the chief cause of national concern.

TO FORCE INDOCHINA PROGRAM-Certain political advantages, however, will accrue to the Democrats from the proposed pact. The "Bisenhower war" will offset the "Truman war," or, more realistically, it will eliminate both catcalls from the 1954-1956 elec-tions. Indeed, it will remove almost all Roosevelt-Truman foreign policy decisions, as well as the sourian's alleged tenderness toward commies at Washington, from American politics

The promised support will force the administration to formulate a definite Indochina program, which it does not have at present. The White House seeks to save this vital area from red control, but it has not devised any specific means to achieve that objective

RADFORD'S PROPOSAL—Adm. Arthur W. Rad-ford has proposed that American aircraft carriers re-inforce beleagured French and native forces imme-diately, and two have been dispatched to nearby waters. He points out that their planes could deliver more concentrated firepower than the land-based howhers available to the French. combers available to the French.

His three associates—Ridgway, Carney and Twining
—oppose this strategy, as does Secretary Dulies. They
argue that communist capture of a single plane crew forced to bail out, would commit us to ground They insist that there can be no part-time participation. It must be all or nothing.

OPPORTUNITY TO TEST NEW THEORY-Rad ford, a MacArthur disciple, maintains that he knows Oriental psychology, strategy and tactics more thoroughly than his aides, who have not had his experience in the far east. He insists that neither Peiping nor Moscow want or are prepared for all-out war. He believes that this is an excellent opportunity

war. He believes that this is an excellent opportunity to-test the new theory of "massive retalistion at a time and place of our own choosing."

Although Radford has great influence on "Ike" in military matters, bulles' view will probably prevail. He urges against a military offensive until after the close of the Geneva parley. He hopes that current signs of American determination on Indochina, especially the Nixon speech, may enable him to win an "honorable peace." It he fails, he will press his request for a bipartisan declaration of limited and re-gional war in southeast Asia.

Frankly, this one has us baffled. A knot, in case yeu're no old sait, is a unit of speed—one nautical mile per-hour. A nautical, or sea, mile is 6,089.20 feet, considerably longer than the 5280 feet which make a land, or statute, mile. In theory—and this isn't confusing you a bit more than it does us-a nautical mile equals the length of a minute of longitude, or 1/21,600 of a great circle of the earth. See?

In the final stages, goldbeaters take leaves of gold—the most malleable of all metals—and-beat a large number at once, separating them with tough skin membranes made of the outer coat of the blind intestines of cattle. The strength of this membrane withstands months of continuous nounding with hammers tinuous pounding with hammers weighing from 7 to 20 pounds.

An ounce of gold can be beaten out fine enough, it is said, to cover an acre. That's 43,500 square feet! an acre. That's 43,000 square reet! It has been pounded so fine that 368,000 leaves can be stacked to measure one inch. However, com-mercial gold leaf is somewhat thick-er-from 1/200,000 to 1/250,000ths of an inch.

Much of this work is done in Japan—and while craftsmen apply this fine golf leaf to lacquer boxes, say, they must train themselves to hold their breath. The slightest breath would blow the gold away!

2 Firms Accused Of Stock Frauds

DETROIT, April 28 W Two Canadian brokerage firms and it of their salesmen have been indicted by a U. S. grand jury on charges of defrauding American investors of \$300,000.

Four indictments embracing 42 counts were returned against T. M. Parker, Inc., and Laurentian Securities, Inc., both Montreal.

The companies and salesmen are charged with fraud in the sale of shares in six petroleum and uranium companies to 275 investors in 40 states and the District of Columbia.

Joseph A. Moynihan, assistant U. S. attorney, said the firms and saleamen had sold the stock to 275 persons between March and August of last year. He said the stock was sold at from 80 cents to \$1.50 a share when it could have been bought for 10 cents a share or less.

Cole, chairman of the senate-house atomic energy committee, add then it is "simply not correct" that the U. S. H-bombs tested recently in the Pacific "are copies of the Russian test of last August."

Cole almed his statement to guide their studies.

And Hosmer said he and Cole are agreed America is "out in front" in nuclear developments "because of

ports from former government offi-cials and other congressional sources that the Russians somehow had got the jump on American scientists in developing the hydrogen bomb.

One of the reports he had in mind vas a statement Hosmer made in Long Beach, Calif., April 19. Hosmer said then that the Russian test proved that a principle discarded by U. S. scientists was workable.

"We then proceeded immediately build our H-bombs along these new simplified lines and are now testing them in the Pacific." he said.

The statement created considerable interest because Hosmer is a former counsel of the atomic energy commission who once worked at the atomic laboratory at Los Alamos,

In his remarks yesterday Hosmer said his earlier statement "appar-ently was interpreted to mean we opled their bomb instead of that both nations were independently following the same nuclear theories."

Cole, in a letter to Hosmer dated yesterday, said "It is not difficult to understand how such false impressions can be created, especially in the minds of the public generally which is denied so much information concerning the development pro-grams of Russia and ourselves." 




