Water Map of U.S. Termed Topsy Turvy

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The nation's water map is topsy-turvy. At this time of year the streams are running high, the storage reservoirs should be filled and the dormant winter crop should be coming to a harvest.

Key—Upset

The six months' drought reaching the Ohio valley to the Mississippi and spotted in various areas has upset the water map. A lot of it will be necessary to get it right.

There's plenty of water in the United States, but the distribution is faulty. There isn't enough for some big cities and little in some other places, there's too much in some other places.

Army engineers report that all water entering the Mississippi from the west are at their lowest stage in years. They should be at their annual high.

Streams Down

The geological survey says stream flow throughout the country is lower than it has been in more than a decade.

Lack of rain and snow in some areas has slowed the filling of reservoirs for power and municipal consumption.

The survey points out that the supply of water is relatively constant but fluctuates in dry and wet periods. There is no evidence that total supply has changed in 100 years.

It has provided a sort of artificial motion machine for handling water. The sun supplies the energy which moves the water in a circuit of moisture from the sea to the air as vapor, then to the earth as rain or snow, and out again. This process goes on and on.

The survey notes philosophically that man uses water too fast, he becomes short of water even though rainfall is far above normal.

Paulsen, chief hydraulic engineer of the survey, put it this way: "We have become water gluttons, demanding that the natural system provide vast quantities of water at localized sites of our own choosing."

The majority of the public water supplies of 1953 were not due primarily to drought or failure of the system, but to increase in municipal population, seasonal variation in demand, or industrial expansion.

Wheat Belt Hurt

The most critical area now, nationwide, is in the winter wheat belt. The weather bureau describes part of the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, western Kansas, southeastern Colorado. Some of Texas and Oklahoma were hard from the critical drought recently by heavy rains. But the bureau's 30-day outlook for April to mid-May said above normal rainfall is indicated over a large area comprising the gulf of Mississippi and Ohio valleys, the middle Atlantic states. A spokesman added: "That dust bowl sure needs it."

Lee told reporters it happened yesterday during a briefing of the governors by Orin O. Hobbs, secretary of the department of health, education and welfare, and some of her aides from the office of education.

Answers on Russia

"I told them if Russia was giving away money all over the world and subsidizing everyone like we are that perhaps they wouldn't be able to have such a fine educational record," Lee said.

"I further pointed out that the organized educators had a program for nationalization of the school system which is the very thing Mrs. Hobbs said she didn't want."

Suggests Action
"Then I said that if we expected to preserve this school system for our states and local governments we had better do something about the National Education association whose program is directly opposite. "Finally, I asked where we were going to get the money to do all this when the federal government was broke and the states had just about reached the limit of taxation."

ENTBEE, Uganda, April 28 (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II ignored a Mau Mau death threat and landed today at this port of Africa's Lake Victoria. LONDON, April 28 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill refused yesterday to commit British troops now to Indochina. He held out the hope that the Geneva conference will arrange a cease fire in that troubled land.

Waves of cheers echoed through the house of commons when Mr. Churchill—gripping the dispatch box before him—slowly and carefully said:

"Her Majesty's government are not prepared to give any undertaking about United Kingdom military action in Indochina in advance of the results of Geneva. We have not entered into any new political or military commitments."

Churchill gave his government plenty of maneuvering room both at the 19-nation Geneva conference on Asian problems and afterward. He said his cabinet has the fullest confidence in the course it has

agreed. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden "should follow in circumstances so largely governed by the unknown."

He did not elaborate on the further steps planned. Churchill declared the immediate military problems of the French union forces in Indochina should not color too much the thinking at Geneva. He said:

"The episode of the siege of the French fortress of Dien Bien Phu, the fate of which now hangs in the balance, creates a violent tension in the minds at a time when calm judgment is most needed."

"The timing of the climax of this assault with the opening of the Geneva conference is not without significance, but it must not be allowed to prejudice the sense of world proportion which should inspire the conference and be a guide to those who are watching its progress."

This remark was interpreted by some as indicating that the British do not regard the possible ultimate loss of Dien Bien Phu as seriously as do the French and possibly the Americans.

Churchill had talked earlier in the day with French Ambassador Rene Massigli. Informants said Massigli gave Churchill the latest information on the situation at Dien

Bien Phu and the views of the French government on working out a "cease fire" arrangement.

France reportedly has asked Hanoi and the U. S. either to join her in seeking a quick cease fire in Indochina followed by negotiations with the communists or to bolster the hard-pressed French union troops by throwing in British and American military units.

The American position is that a cease-fire should not be paid for by giving the communists domination of Indochina.

List of Billion-Dollar American Firms Reaches Record of 68, Survey Shows

NEW YORK, April 28 (AP) — The list of American companies with assets topping one billion dollars rose to a new record high of 68 last year, a United Press survey showed today. Their combined valuation of \$155,211,466,367 was equal to about two-thirds the total national debt, or nearly \$1,160 for each person now living in the nation. In 1953 these corporate billions had assets aggregating \$176,183,948,948. Two business giants joined the "billion-dollar club" for the first time in 1953, while one company dropped out. Membership in the club has more than doubled since the start of World War II, although 1953 showed signs of a leveling off in the tremendous growth of industry. In 1932 six companies joined the list.

Veterans Get Warning for Training Law

Veterans released from military service before Aug. 20, 1952, must begin training under the Korean GI bill by Aug. 20, 1954, or be ineligible for training, reminds Arnold Helwege, Twin Falls veterans administrator.

For many veterans, summer school terms that begin in about two months will be their last chance to start training under the Korean GI bill.

Once a veteran decides to enter training under the Korean GI bill, he must choose the school and course in which he wishes to enroll. However, the course and school must be acceptable to the VA.

The Aug. 20 deadline applies to veterans planning to enroll in on-the-job and on-the-farm training as well as those planning to attend school, notes Helwege.

The deadline applies only to veterans separated from military service on or before Aug. 20, 1952. Veterans discharged after that time have two years from the date of their separation to begin training.

The deadline does not pertain to veterans enrolled under the original World War II GI bill.

Solon Denies Implying Nation Copied H-Bomb From Soviets

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—Rep. Craig Hosmer, R., Calif., said yesterday that America is "out in front" in the world atomic race.

He denied implying in a recent statement that "we copied our H-bomb from the Russians." Rep. W. Sterling Cole, R., N. Y., took sharp exception to this idea in a statement Sunday night.

Cole, chairman of the senate-house atomic energy committee, said then it is "simply not correct" that the U. S. H-bombs tested recently in the Pacific "are copies of the Russian test of last August."

Cole aimed his statement at reports from former government officials and other congressional sources that the Russians somehow had got the jump on American scientists in developing the hydrogen bomb.

One of the reports he had in mind was a statement Hosmer made in Long Beach, Calif., April 19. Hosmer said then that the Russian test proved that a principle discarded by U. S. scientists was workable.

"We then proceeded immediately to build our H-bombs along these new simplified lines and are now testing them in the Pacific," he said.

The statement created considerable interest because Hosmer is a former counsel of the atomic energy commission who once worked at the atomic laboratory at Los Alamos, N. M.

In his remarks yesterday Hosmer said his earlier statement "apparently was interpreted to mean we copied their bomb instead of that both nations were independently following the same nuclear theories."

Cole, in a letter to Hosmer dated yesterday, said "It is not difficult to understand how such false impressions can be created, especially in the minds of the public generally which is denied so much information concerning the development programs of Russia and ourselves."

After the Russian hydrogen test last August, there were unofficial reports the communists had found a new material or triggering method which American scientists had not yet developed. These reports received new currency after the March U. S. test blast in which, according
