Paper Claims Ballots Favor Strike Action

PORTLAND, May 21 (AP)—AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers of the west coast are voting in favor of a strike to get contract demands, their newspaper, the Union Register, said yesterday.

"Substantial" votes favoring a strike, if necessary to get a 12 1/2-cent hourly pay increase were reported from the north Idaho-Eastern Washington, Walla Walla valley, Puget Sound, Everett and Coos bay districts.

**Vote Favors Strike**  
Employees of the plywood and door division of Simpson Logging company, McLeary, Wash., voted 9-1 for a strike, their business agent P. H. Moir, reported yesterday.

A number of locals still are to vote. Among these are large locals at Tacoma and Roseburg, which have set their balloting for Saturday and Sunday.

Earl Hartley, president of the Puget Sound council, said the vote there was running 5-1 for a strike.

**Strike Approved**  
The OIO International Woodworkers already have approved a strike in support of the same wage demand but they postponed a May 3 strike and went back to negotiations which thus far have been fruitless.

Employers have offered only to renew existing contracts.



Interest Light Over Primary

PORTLAND, May 21 (AP)—Only two contests—both involving Republicans—were expected to draw interest today in the Oregon primary election.

One is for the GOP gubernatorial nomination. The other is the race for nomination as U. S. representative in the metropolitan Portland area.

Unopposed in the primary is Joseph K. Carson, the Democratic candidate for governor. Three of the state's four representatives, all Republicans, are without opposition. Sen. Guy Cordon, the incumbent Republican, also is unopposed, as is his fall opponent, Democrat Richard L. Neugebauer, author and former state senator.

In the contest for the GOP gubernatorial nomination, Earl Newberry, secretary of state, is challenging the incumbent, Paul Patterson, who took office 17 months ago when Douglas McKay resigned to become secretary of the interior.

Demands for Steel Union Called High

PITTSBURGH, May 21 (AP)—The OIO United Steelworkers have handed the nation's steel producers demands which industry sources estimate could cost as much as 50 cents an hour, it was learned today.

Negotiations between the 1,200,000-member union and the U. S. Steel corporation, pact-setter for the industry, were recessed yesterday after three days of talks to permit both sides to "do their homework." The homework was considered the broadest set of proposals in the 18-year history of the union.

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"Crash" Plan Is Sought for Atomic Power

LA CROSSE, Wis., May 21 (AP)—The Pentagon's atomic coordinator proposed last night immediate formation of an agency to push a "crash" program for peacetime nuclear power development.

Robert Lebaron, chairman of the military liaison committee to the atomic energy commission, urged creation of something like the "Manhattan Engineer district," the World War II organization which produced the first atomic bomb within three years.

**Speedup Seen**  
In an address for the dedication of a new research laboratory by the Trans company, Lebaron said, "If we could only re-create the Manhattan engineer district philosophy and its unique devotion for the military atom in a campaign for the peaceful atom, we could move into this great new era in five years instead of ten."

He said 10 years is the time schedule "if we go at the rate now being considered." He added:

**Not Wasteful**  
"I am not advocating a 'crash' program which will waste the taxpayers' money. I am emphasizing the point that there is much more that can be done... I will not attempt to give you the details of this (the current) program. It has been five years in the making and has represented some \$80 million of your tax dollars—plus a large segment of the engineering industry's best brains."

Lebaron, whose job has been to coordinate the requirements of the military for atomic weapons—with the design and production efforts of the AEC, said that "until now we have looked only at the atom of darkness, the military atom which carries possible evil forebodings for the future" but the time has come to turn attention to peaceful use.

**President Eisenhower and AEC**  
Chairman Lewis Strauss, said Lebaron, are convinced that "our future is bound up with our ability to exploit this peaceful atom."

Continuous Heat May Bring Snake Near Flood Stage

IDAHO FALLS, May 21 (AP)—Continued unseasonably hot weather in the upper Snake river valley could result in a near flood stage in the Snake river flow, but there is no great danger, Lynn Randall, district 36 watermaster, said yesterday.

"We usually have these early warm spells and think the river will flood, but then the weather turns cooler with some rain and checks the snow melt."

"When the river flow at Hells gets above 28,000 feet, we can expect to have difficulty," Randall said.

Flow of the Snake river at Hells yesterday reached 28,000 feet, but due to diversions for irrigation canals, it was lower at points on down the river.

The flow at Idaho Falls was about 15,700 second feet.

Rhee Has Control Of Korean House

SEOUL, May 21 (AP)—President Syngman Rhee's Liberal party clinched control of the South Korean national assembly by winning 102 of 203 seats in the one-house legislature today.

Officials said returns from all districts in yesterday's election showed independent candidates won in 74 districts, Democratic Nationalist society in 2.

The victory was at least partly a personal one for Rhee. His party did not control the last assembly and he appealed to the people for a working majority in the next house.

**RED BUILDUP NOTED**  
WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Red China's air command is reported to have concentrated a substantial force of jet fighters and light bombers along the mainland coast opposite Formosa, seat of Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government.

caused perspiration beads to show on his forehead.

"Your reply will be given not only to my wife but to millions of others now fighting to live under the dictates of their own conscience and the laws of God," Khokhlov said.

Subcommittee Chairman William E. Jenner, R., Ind., called Khokhlov's story "one of the power of faith and the love of a good woman."

As the hearing recessed for lunch, two uniformed policemen took Khokhlov in the room and escorted him out of the room. Two other officers stood guard to keep spectators from following them.

Jenner said "elaborate protection measures" had been taken for the safety of Khokhlov, who deserted to the west in February.

"Khokhlov was nervous, there was no sign of it until he began his plea in support of Yalina and the boy. His voice before had seemed emotionless, even when he recited the details of how he and his wife arranged in secret for the baptism of Aleksander."

"Within the limits of your possibilities you became a religious man after your marriage?" Crimes asked. "Fundamentally, yes," Khokhlov said, although he had to use "allegations" to attend church occasionally and go "when visibility would not be good."

The MVD, he said, would not have liked it if it had known he was under any religious influence.

Of Aleksander's baptism, Khokhlov told this story:

"We found a person on whom we could rely. She was an old woman. She found a church open where the priest knew us. On a certain date, in the morning, we went there and had our son baptized."

Jenner asked, "Why did you refuse to carry out an MVD assignment to commit murder?"

Through interpreter Eugene S. Sorebrennikov of the library of congress, Khokhlov answered "because I consider that murder—assassination—is a crime against religion and functions."

Khokhlov, a captain in the terrorist Russian secret police (MVD) until his defection in West Berlin in mid-February, said he was sent to Germany to "liquidate" Georgi S. Okolovich, a leader in the NTS, an anti-communist underground organization composed of Russian emigres.

Instead of assassinating Okolovich, Khokhlov sought him out and told of the plot. Okolovich then helped him find sanctuary in the west.

The NTS, Khokhlov said, is "dedicated to carry out a revolution in Russia and replace the present regime with one that would be more free."

Senator Attacks Voting Proposal

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Senator Russell D. Ga., today denounced as an invasion of state's rights President Eisenhower's proposal to lower the voting age from 21 years to 18.

Russell, unofficial spokesman for a bloc of southern Democrats in the senate, spoke out in an interview in advance of the state of senate debate on a proposed constitutional amendment to give the vote to 18-year-olds.

"It is the most inexcusable infringement on the rights of the states that I can think of," Russell said.

A. S. Syverson Passes Friday

## Senate Panel OK's Housing Law Changes

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—The senate banking committee voted yesterday to change national housing laws to allow buyers of low-cost homes to borrow down payments from third persons or groups who would act as co-signers on FHA-insured mortgages.

"This might prove to be very helpful to distressed and poor people and it should be a great thing in small towns," Senator Capewell, R. Ind., chairman of the committee, said.

The new provision would be confined to homes costing \$6,000 or less, for which the present required down payments are no more than \$300. Co-signers of mortgages would be responsible for the full amount of the debt in case of a default.

The banking committee is meeting behind closed doors to study President Eisenhower's housing program, and proposals made by federal housing officials to put an end to abuses of the present law.

Capewell gave this as an example of how the down payment relaxation would work:

An employer who wants good housing for his employees could act as co-signer on a mortgage insured by the federal housing administration and put up the down payment in cash, as a loan to the buyer.

## Sub Believed Lost in Brief British Scare

LONDON, May 21 (AP)—The British submarine Scorchier was reported lost for a short time in the English channel yesterday but came to the surface under its own power and signalled "all is well."

The scare occurred after surface vessels and other submarines lost contact with the Scorchier in the course of maneuvers off Portland Bill, a cape near Portsmouth.

The signal "sub smash," used when a submarine is in distress, was flashed to ships and naval stations.

Flashing the dreaded signal was a routine precaution, an Admiralty spokesman said.

"Radio contact with the Scorchier was lost while the vessel was submerged," an Admiralty officer said. "Apparently the Scorchier was unable to restore contact immediately. Thereupon, in accordance with prescribed routine, the submarine rose to the surface and reported as quick."

Scorchier, an 814-ton vessel, normally carries a crew of 41. An extremely maneuverable craft, it is capable of swift dives. It participated in the search for the submarine Affray, which sank off the Isle of Wight with the loss of 78 officers and men in April, 1951.

## Chief Ousted By Erin Vote

DUBLIN, May 21 (AP)—Silver-haired John A. Costello, Ireland's prime minister from 1948 to 1951, displaced aged, nearly blind Eamon de Valera again yesterday as the Irish republic's chief of government.

Voters in Tuesday's general election gave undisputed control of the dail (parliament) to a coalition formed and kept together by Costello, a leading Dublin attorney.

The voters rejected a bid by de Valera—only surviving commandant of the 1916 Easter uprising against the British—to obtain a majority for his Fianna Fail (men of destiny) party. Fianna Fail ran against the field.

It was beaten and the 71-year-old New York-born de Valera was headed out of the post he had held since 1937, except for 1948-51 when Costello was prime minister.

## Kootenai Dam Probably Will Be Army Task

SEATTLE, May 21 (AP)—The 263 million dollar Libby dam on the Kootenai river in western Montana probably will be the federal government's next major project in the Pacific northwest, the army engineers report.

Col. N. A. Matthias, Seattle district engineer, said the report came from the office of Maj. Gen. Samuel D. Sturgis Jr., the army's chief of engineers.

This apparently gives the Montana project precedence on the army's schedule over Los Harbor dam on the lower Snake river in Washington and John Day dam on the lower Columbia.

Libby dam is planned to impound nearly six million acre feet of water, eliminating the flood threat on the Kootenai river and sealing it on the Columbia.

The project will necessitate an international agreement with Canada, as the dam would back up the Kootenai (spelled Kootenay in Canada) for 42 miles north of the border. The reservoir would be 95 miles long, covering 30,200 acres in Montana and 17,800 acres in Canada.

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
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

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
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
