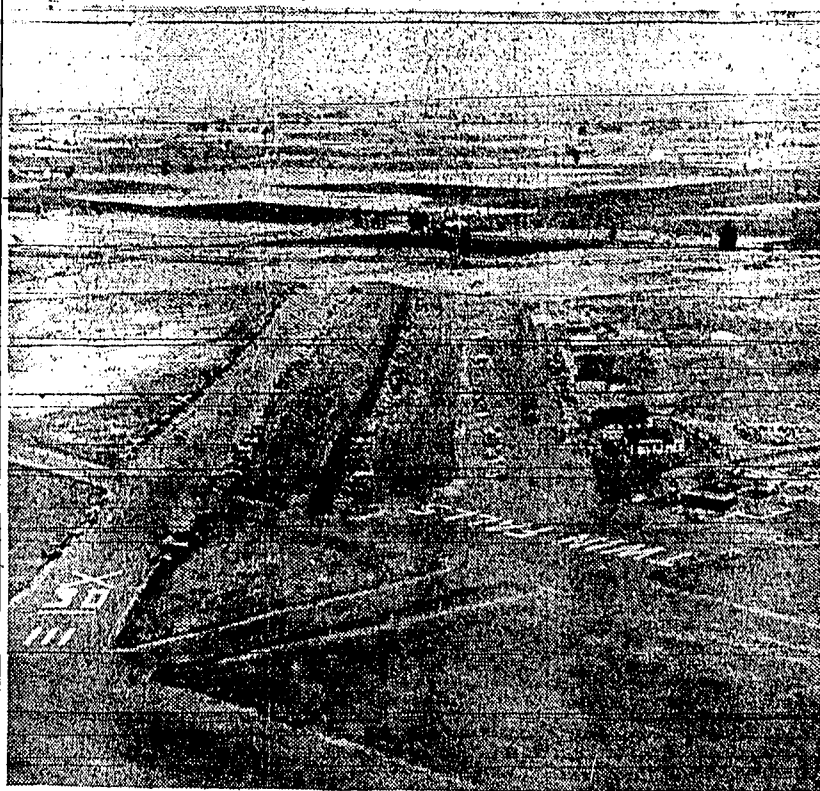

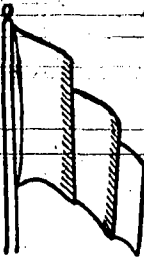

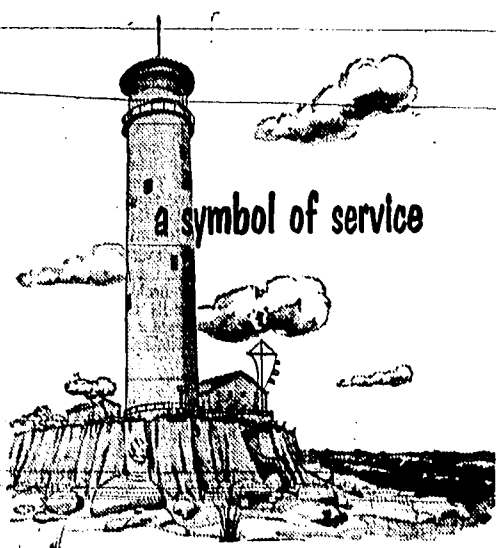

Body of Lost Man Located By Sheepman

POCATELLO, May 24 (AP)—The body of Dene Earl Sutton, 22, Pocatello, who had been the object of a search since April 28, was found yesterday in Arbon valley.

The body was discovered by Domingo Solodo, a shepherd. Solodo notified rancher Ted Norton, who in turn called the Bannock county sheriff's office.

Theft Suggested
Sheriff Alma Marley said Sutton had gone to Lava Hot Springs with two other Pocatello youths March 17. His companions later reported that they had car trouble during the trip, and Sutton had suggested stealing another auto for the return to Pocatello.

The youths said they declined such a plan and returned to the Gate City in their own auto.

A 1950 pickup truck was stolen in Lava Hot Springs the same day, and was found March 20 at Arbon valley. The keys to the stolen pickup were found in Sutton's clothing.

House Is Looled
It was also discovered that a ranch house about a half mile from where Sutton's body was found had been broken into and several cans of spoiled fruit were opened and eaten.

Dr. E. B. Webb, Pocatello pathologist, said Sutton's body was too decomposed to permit an autopsy, but it was surmised that he was the one who ate the spoiled fruit, which resulted in his death.

Long Illness Fatal To Buhl Resident

BUHL, May 24—Mrs. Flora Roberts Grove, 66, died at 10 p. m. Sunday after having been bedfast for 28 years.

Mrs. Grove was born at Tabor City, Ia., on Dec. 27, 1867. She was married to M. Grove at Tabor on Dec. 31, 1876. He died in 1934. They came to Idaho in 1921 from Sidney, Ia.

Valley units participating in the air alert were Buhl, Hansen and Hazelton and Twin Falls. About 30 valley members took part in the drill.

Joseph Shinn, supervisor, and David Proctor, chief observer, termed the local practice alert a complete success. Its purpose was to familiarize members with telephone reporting and aircraft identification procedures.

The drill was conducted from 7 to 10 a. m. Sunday. Members used the top of the county courthouse for the observation post.

The sheriff's office and the Mountain State telephone company cooperated to make the drill a success, says Shinn. Additional telephone operators were used to handle reports from the four observation posts.

Twin Falls corps members made 80 telephone calls to headquarters in Boise to report aircraft. Numerous flights of four and five airplanes were reported.

FORT ATKINSON, Wis., May 24 (AP)—Senator McCarthy, R., Wis., outlining his side of the row with the army in an address Saturday night, declared he wanted to "establish" President Eisenhower of precedents established in the teapot dome investigation.

McCarthy said he was going to call to the President's attention "what happened back in 1924. You will remember that in 1924 we had a Republican President then also. The attorney-general in the teapot dome scandal refused the congressional committee's access to files for grand corruption."

Files Refused

"The committee wanted to question the attorney-general. The attorney-general refused. After his refusal President Coolidge demanded his resignation and ordered that if any of his cabinet members knew anything about this, to freely testify and give all the facts."

McCarthy, speaking in shirt-sleeves, declared, "This is no attack on the President."

Reminds of Code

Wisconsin's junior senator told a Chamber of Commerce banquet, "but I am going to remind him about his statement he made at Abilene, Kans., some time ago. He said, 'Now that town had a code and it was raised from a boy on the code that we should meet any one face to face with whom you disagree—not to come up behind him.'"

"If you took the same risk and met him face to face you could get away with almost anything."

McCarthy said he hoped that before today the President would go over these words and recall the charges made against two members of McCarthy's staff—Francis Carr and Roy Cohn.

"And here not only are they denied the right to meet face to face those who made the charges," McCarthy said, "But they are denied the right to know who they are."

Block Sought for Guatemala Arms

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—Representative Hillings, R., Calif., says the United States is trying to stop at least two more arms shipments believed bound for Guatemala from behind the iron curtain.

He also said a special house committee on communism may investigate alleged red inroads into the Central American republic which received a 2,000-ton shipment of arms this week from Stalin in red-dominated Poland.

The state department has called this an "important arms shipment" and President Eisenhower has termed the news very disturbing.

Hillings, a member of the special committee, said he has been told that two and perhaps more vessels are bound for Guatemala with communist-produced arms. He said the United States has asked officials of friendly ports to intercept the ships if they put in from sea.

The congressman did not say on what legal basis the ships might be stopped. State department officials said they have received reports that additional arms shipments are on the way to Guatemala, but did not say whether the reports are true or whether preventive measures are being taken.

Newsman Hurt

RENO, May 24 (AP)—Ed Olsen, Associated Press correspondent in Reno, was injured seriously and his wife was killed in a traffic accident Saturday night on U.S. highway 40 near Reno.

Two other women also were killed in the two-car collision.


Before being transferred to Reno several years ago, Olsen was an Associated Press staff member in Boise.

Jumpy

ANGELS CAMP, Calif., May 24 (AP)—Lucky Lager, with three prodigious leaps totaling 16 feet 10 inches, set a new frog jumping record and won owner Roy Weiner \$1,000 yesterday in the 27th annual contest based on Mark Twain's famous story.

Lucky Lager bettered by 8 inches the mark set in 1944 by Maggie.

In Mark Twain's famous story, "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County," a villain loaded the favorite with buckshot and said favorite never got off the ground. There were no reports of such shenanigans this year.

satellites to field 400 divisions by mobilization day plus 30.

6. Numerical superiority of Soviet air forces in recent years has been constant—having been stabilized at about 20,000 aircraft. But the rapid changeover to jet aircraft has increased that potential and today Russia has, for all practical purposes, an "all-jet" air force.

7. Russia has concentrated in the development of jet bombers and new types of jet fighters and a comprehensive Soviet aviation training program.

8. Numerical strength of satellite air forces has been doubled since 1947 with nearly all equipped with jet fighters.

9. Russia and the satellites have developed an elaborate system of airfields and aircraft control and warning systems, anti-aircraft artillery and other defensive installations.

10. Russia and the satellites have increased their potential in the use of airborne troops and weapons.

11. The Soviet navy has more than 300 submarines in service; half of them large or medium ocean-going types and production is continuing of large ocean-going types.

12. The Soviets have developed a strong capability in the special fields of atomic, chemical and biological warfare and in guided missiles.

13. The Soviet economy has maintained a level of military production sufficient to provide equipment and supplies for Soviet and satellite forces and still pursue a stockpiling program.

Hospital attendants said the child, Rickie Clifford Young, suffered internal injuries and that his condition today remained dangerous.

Mrs. Alena Young, 25, his mother, said she took Rickie and a six-months-old son to the hotel to rest between trains. Rickie, she said, fell out of the sixth-floor window when he reached for a bouncing ball, with which he was playing. He landed on the roof of a two-story building adjacent to the hotel.

Quint Is Novice

QUEBEC, May 24 (AP)—Marie Dionne, 19, one of the quintuplets from Callander, Ont., was given the name Sister Marie Rachel today as she became a novice in the Roman Catholic Order of the Servants of the Blessed Sacrament.

At a solemn ceremony in the order's new chapel here, Marie received the white wool tunic and white cotton scapular of a novice in the religious congregation.

Call From 'Killer' Proves Harmless

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24 (AP)—Ruth W. Grossman, Los Angeles, answered the telephone at 4 a. m. yesterday. What she heard shook her into a panic.

"I'm Charlie Case, the killer," a man's voice told her.

With shaking hands, she dialed police and reported the call.

The telephone company traced the call to the Mark Hopkins hotel in San Francisco. Inspector William Stantoni rushed there to catch the caller.

He found a man who said his name was Kays, not Case. He said the Ruth Grossman was trying to reach lived in Beverly Hills. He guessed he got the wrong number.

As for calling himself the killer, he said:

"Everybody at home in Eureka (Calif.) calls me Charlie Kays, the killer, because own the Eureka Termite Exterminator company."

Stantoni let it go at that.

Utah Man Named By Chiefs of CAP

ODGEN, May 24 (AP)—Col. Ralph B. Ottenheimer, Salt Lake City, commander of the Utah wing of the civil air patrol, was named yesterday as temporary director of a regional CAP organization.

He will direct efforts toward appointment of a permanent regional director. Ottenheimer was chosen by CAP commanders from four other states—Idaho, Wyoming, Montana and Colorado.

His selection featured a regional conference here attended by CAP fliers from the five states. Principal speaker was Maj.-Gen. Lucas V. Beau, national CAP commander. He said CAP search and rescue operations were particularly important in the Rocky mountain region.

Besides Ottenheimer, wing commanders attending were Lieut.-Col. Clifford L. Suhm, Boise.

Teacher Courses On 'Dopes' Asked

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—Rep. Charles S. Gubser, R., Calif., today introduced a bill aimed at providing grade and high school teachers qualified to instruct students in "the menace of narcotics addiction."

The bill would authorize federal grants to teachers colleges which provide courses in the causes and effects of narcotics addiction.

There is sharp controversy over the instruction of youths in the narcotics problem. Some educators favor it. But top bureau of narcotics officials oppose it on grounds that it sometimes defeats its own purpose by arousing curiosity and stimulating experimentation.

Luxury Plane Making Quick Hawaii Flight

NEW YORK, May 24 (AP)—The latest in luxury airlines left here today on the first "dawn-to-dusk" flight between New York and Honolulu in commercial aviation history.

The United Air Lines plane, which departed from International airport with a group of newspaper, wire service, magazine, radio and television representatives aboard, will stop at San Francisco on the trip to Hawaii.

The UAL mainliner departed at 7:09 a. m. (EDT). It is scheduled to arrive at San Francisco at 12:15 p. m. (PDT) and at Honolulu at 6:45 p. m. (HST).

It will fly non-stop to the west coast on the first leg of the 5,000 mile, 17-hour flight. At San Francisco, west coast news representatives will join the newsmen from the Atlantic coast and midwest who boarded at New York.

The flight is designed to preview the speed and travel advantages the DC-7 plane will demonstrate when United places it in nonstop coast-to-coast service June 1.

Cuba Will Oppose Plottings by Reds

HAVANA, Cuba, May 24 (AP)—President Fulgencio Batista says his government plans an immediate crackdown "to prevent the resurgence of communist maneuvers" in Cuba.

Speaking to newsmen at his farm outside Havana last night the chief executive also said Cuba may take "precautions" when the Swedish ship Alfhelm arrives. The U. S. state department announced May 17 the Alfhelm had carried an important shipment of arms from communist-controlled Poland to leftist Guatemala. It is due here soon to pick up a sugar cargo.

LONDON, May 24 (AP)—Rehearsal of a new play "The Lovers" was canceled today by the deaths of two members of the cast. A cat ate two white mice which were to have appeared in one of the scenes.

Man Accused Of Extortion Kills Himself

LOS ANGELES, May 24 (AP)—A mild mannered extortion suspect who admitted writing a letter demanding \$5,000 from California Gov. Goodwin J. Knight on threat of bodily harm hanged himself last night in his jail cell.

The body of William B. Barrows, 42, was found during a routine check of cells. Police said the soft-spoken aircraft worker, who had blamed the extortion letter on his drinking, made a noose out of strips of his shirt and tied one end to a ventilator.

Suspect Arrested

Barrows was arrested Friday within 24 hours after the governor's office at Sacramento received a letter which read:

"Dear Governor: If you are enjoying good health and want to keep it you had better send me five thousand dollars by return mail. This is no hoax."

Barrows Traced

Authorities traced Barrows by comparing the signature on the letter with that on a driver's license application made by the aircraft worker. He surrendered quietly at his home here and later told police he "had been drinking" when the letter was written.

The letter was the second threat to Governor Knight within recent weeks. Knight shrugged off the first letter as the work of a crank. It had not demanded money.

Naval Man Sued Over Statements

MOSCOW, May 24 (AP)—A \$50,000 suit was on file in district court here today against Capt. T. C. Thomas, charging the naval officer with maliciously accusing the plaintiff, Murray Estes, Moscow, of "dishonesty, trickery, bribery and corruption."

Estes, an attorney, said the alleged statements were made by Thomas at a high school gathering in Moscow May 12, 1953.

"The statements are false and untrue," the complaint asserted.

The alleged statements were published later by two northern Idaho newspapers and a libel suit was filed in federal district court.

Charges against Thomas were dismissed and Federal Judge Chase A. Clark also directed a verdict in favor of the newspapers.

Godfrey Advised Against Surgery

NEW YORK, May 24 (AP)—Arthur Godfrey's doctors advised him yesterday that no further operation was needed "at this time" on his ailing right hip.

The red-haired television star was examined in Boston by Drs. Otto E. Aufranc and Joseph S. Barr.

Dr. Aufranc assisted in the operation last year in which Godfrey's right hip, injured in an automobile accident in 1931, was re-built with a plastic ball-and-socket mechanism.

Godfrey had complained recently that the hip had been giving him trouble and further surgery might be necessary. Since the operation he has been getting around with the aid of crutches.

State Notes Drop In Liver Ailment

BOISE, May 24 (AP)—Idaho's infectious-hepatitis rate, on the verge of an epidemic early this month, has dropped steadily for three weeks, Dr. Stanley J. Leland reports.

Leland, state director of preventive medicine, said the latest flare-up of the disease has occurred in the Arco and Preston areas.

The liver ailment—commonly known as yellow jaundice—showed signs of approaching dangerous proportions late last year.

It passed the 100-cases-per month stage in March and reached 135 in April. There have been 42 cases this month.

Leland said the state department of public health had given 7,983 inoculations and private physicians probably half that number in addition.

Osteopaths Urged To Conduct Battle

BOISE, May 24 (AP)—Idaho's osteopaths have been urged by Dr. Robert Sparks, past president of the American Osteopathic association to fight for the continuation of private medical schools in America.

"The thing that has made osteopathic medicine great in America," Sparks told the 49th annual meeting of the State Osteopathic association Saturday, "is freedom of heart, thinking and expansion."

Dr. J. H. Stroud, Caldwell, was installed as president. Other officers elected were: Dr. L. D. Anderson, Boise, vice president; Dr. E. J. Miller, Nampa, secretary-treasurer; and Dr. H. F. Senator Lists Ways to Fight Peril of Reds

ANACONDA, Mont., May 24 (AP)—Sen. James E. Murray, D., Mont., yesterday detailed three things which he said Americans must do "to expunge completely the threat of communism."

Security laws are essential, he said, "to enable us to ferret out and convict these agents of evil."

People should Help

Secondly, there should be "a realization that the primary responsibility for defeating communism lies not with the government but with the people themselves—with labor and management, farmers and professional men."

He called for them to conduct "their relations with one another as to minimize strife, protect one another's rights, and working together, remove from their communities any of the conditions upon which communism thrives."

Government Should Act

The third phase of the attack on communism, he said, should be positive action by the government.

He said the growth of communism from 1918-1932 was the result of the government's negative attitude, declining against it but ignoring those conditions upon which it fed.







Cattlemen Elect New Leaders

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—Rep. Melvin Price, D., Ill., charged today that the Eisenhower administration has failed to practice "the principles of bipartisanship in foreign policy" which John Foster Dulles preached before he became secretary of state.

Price, a member of the house armed services and house senate atomic committees, renewed the Democratic assault on administration handling of foreign affairs in a prepared house speech.

He called attention to Dulles' "rules" of bipartisanship in his 1950 book "War and Peace."

"I respectfully suggest that Mr. Dulles take a few hours off and re-read his book," Price said. "Perhaps it would also be well if the secretary of state would send a complimentary copy of this book to the President to read."

Price charged that President Eisenhower has failed to stop members of the Republican party from conducting a "campaign of slander against past Democratic administrations." This has set up a "fundamental roadblock of bipartisanship," he said.

Price's remarks were met by a "Gives Reminder" sign.

"If the President read Mr. Dulles' book, he will be reminded that—in Dulles' own words—the primary responsibility for bipartisanship rests with the party in power."

The Illinois Democrat said the "new look" military-foreign policy with its emphasis on "massive retaliation" was formulated and announced by the administration without consultations or discussions with any congressional committees.

Economist Blasts Government
For "Not Fighting" Recession

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WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—Harvard Economist Sumner H. Slichter today accused the Eisenhower administration of showing a "surprising lack of initiative and enterprise" in combating the current business recession.

"I believe that this recession will go down into history as one in which the people conclude that the administration failed to act with proper initiative and vigor in adopting anti-recession measures," the noted economist said.

In a speech prepared for a meeting of the Wine and Spirits Wholesalers of America, Slichter said there is a "strong possibility" the economy will start an upswing soon and that the bottom of the recession already has been reached.

But he gave the administration little credit.

"I believe that the next time a recession occurs, even though it be as mild and limited in scope as this one has been, the administration in power, whether Republican or Democratic, will act more promptly and more vigorously than the present administration has done," he said.

Slichter said he "suspects" the treasury was more interested in trying to balance the budget than in limiting the drop in production and unemployment.

"Certainly it is not easy to find evidence that a rise of 2,000,000 in unemployment has aroused as much concern in the administration as the possibility of a deficit in the cash budget," he said.

Slichter said unemployment represents "a kind of deficit" and that he would rather accept a deficit of two or three billion dollars in the budget than two million unnecessarily unemployed.

He said business prospects depend to a great extent on defense expenditures and he charged that cuts now planned seem to be based on "ill-conceived conceptions of strategy."

He said the "massive retaliation" policy fits only a few special situations and that the country needs a defense program aimed at effectively combating the "small-war" strategy of the communists.

"This necessarily may prevent large cuts in defense spending," he said.
