

General to Direct Check into Secret Intelligence Panel

It Hurts

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—Gen. Mark W. Clark will direct a government examination of the top secret intelligence agency later this year, with authority to make recommendations as to its "structure and administration."

Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy told the army-McCarthy hearings last month he was checking last year was blocked by the agency's director, Allen W. Dulles.

Clark, former commander of U. S. far eastern forces, was appointed yesterday to head a CIA task force of former President Herbert Hoover's committee on intelligence organization. Clark told the United Press "he did not think the commission inquiry was a move by McCarthy to the punch."

Dulles said he welcomed the Hoover announcement which gave him insight into the nature of the study and of the reasons behind it. CIA is the government's top intelligence source of intelligence from all over the world.

Clark said the work would not be done until the end of the year in Washington in about two months. He said the task force will be made up of 10 members.

Employee With Longest Continuous Run Of Service Starts First Use of New Press

The Times-News employee with the longest continuous service—nearly 26 years—pressed the button that started the first press run of the new 24-page Dek-A-Tube press installed in the basement of the Times-News building.
 He is Al Westergren, who first came to work for the Idaho Evening Times on Oct. 29, 1908. He had been graduated from the University of Oregon in the spring of that year. Westergren has served as circulation manager ever since. When the Times purchased the Twin Falls Daily News, he became circulation manager of both papers.
 About two years ago he assumed the added duties of business office manager. Westergren has done newspaper work almost his entire life. At the age of 10, he was selling papers in his home town of Astoria, Ore. He sold the Astoria Budget and the three Portland papers, Oregonian, Journal and Telegram.
 At the University of Oregon, he was a star of the basketball team and is still ranked as one of the all-time greats in the Pacific Coast conference.
 His interest in sports has continued here. Presently, he is secretary of the Twin Falls recreation board. Westergren and Robert Warner originated softball leagues in Twin Falls in the 1920s. Both were active players. He also helped form an association of tennis players that was active for several years.
 Westergren was a charter member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Twin Falls. He is a member of Twin Falls lodge 1183, BPOE. The veteran circulation manager said the Golden Jubilee edition of the Times-News to be published July 25 will be the largest paper, by far, ever published in Twin Falls. Doctors' New "Physiograph" Offers Hope to Polio Patients

HOUSTON, Tex., July 5.—The young man may critically ill with polio. Any new handling or operation might cost him his life. And a new threat was in the making. His throat was becoming affected, not closing properly. Soon any food or drink would spill over into his windpipe and choke him. But this danger was spotted in advance. Before the doctor's eye could detect it by a new machine at work here. The machine is a gentle, fast-tapping device which can tell nearly dozen things simultaneously about a patient's condition.

In one of its jobs, it looked into the patient's throat with a fluoroscope, and showed that his throat was not closing fully when he swallowed.

The young man was fed by tube and rarely kept from choking. The machine, with its fluoroscope eye showed when it was safe to resume feeding him normally.

The machine, the physiograph, is a new aid for polio patients here and in the Southern Polio Respiratory center supported by a grant-in-aid from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. It is stated by Baylor University College of Medicine at Jefferson Davis Hospital. It does all its work without use of needles, catheters or tubes, with no stress or discomfort for even the most seriously ill patient.

It keeps a continuous record of blood pressure and pulse beat. It measures the amount of oxygen in the circulating blood. It analyzes the amount of oxygen, nitrogen and carbon dioxide in each breath of air. It measures the velocity of air taken into and blown out of the lungs. It records the electrical impulses from the heart. On an oscilloscope or TV-like screen, it shows the pattern of air flow, telling how free or clogged air passages of the throat or lungs may be.

If the patient is in a respirator, it keeps check on the air pressure in the iron lung.

The fluoroscope eye can help spell out how involved muscles may be with paralysis. It can "show" a patient in or out of a respirator, show how much of his lungs are receiving fresh air.

The physiograph was developed by Leslie A. Geddes, biophysicist at the center and director of the Baylor laboratory at Baylor; Dr. William A. Spencer, director of the center; and Dr. H. E. Hoff, professor of physiology at Baylor. Funds to build it came from the Harris County Polio Association and civil groups.

"With it, we can make more observation more quickly to learn what the patient needs most, what problems or complications he's facing," the physicians explained. "Often it helps assess some changes in his condition before there are obvious clinical signs. We can learn what the critical issue is at any given time, and make treatment more rapidly to offset some critical changes."

At a research for the physiograph is helping improve the treatment of polio, from the findings and the use of the "physiograph," about human reactions to polio.







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

U. S. Plans to Attack Soviet In Word War

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—The U. S. information agency announced yesterday a new cultural program to attack Soviet communism around the world.

The Kremlin, the announcement said, is trying to depict the United States as a nation of "barbarians" and "materialistic primitives" in mass production of goods and services. It is to be treated with "political leadership."

To counter this kind of propaganda and develop appreciation in foreign lands of American achievements, Theodore C. Strlebert, USA chief, is creating a new section in the agency.

Strlebert announced that he had appointed Dr. Jacob Canter, U. S. public affairs officer at Havana, to be in charge of the new section at the agency's headquarters here. He also named as a consultant for this program Dr. Guy S. Smith, USA chief, executive director of the Association of American Colleges.

Greater understanding abroad of the long and worthy cultural heritage of the American people is essential to our efforts to gain support overseas in the summing fight against international communism, Strlebert said.

He said the job of the USA hereafter will be to carry on an enlarged campaign to expose communism in mass production of goods and tell the world what United States cultural achievements add up to.




