But we rather from our university pipeline that maybe 5 per cent of the Sussex feathers are now being put to good use. Some of this high-protein material is going into fertilizers shipped largely to the tobacco-growing states and some to the bellers. It or not—is going into stock feed in Iowa easily assimilable. Even by chickens, we guess. —Wilmington Journal

PARKING LOTS

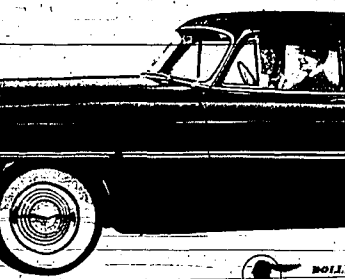
Following a pattern of the last few years, large cities continue to fall behind in the efforts to expand parking lots area to meet increased motor vehicle registration. Smaller cities are abounding some improvement.

A study of parking and traffic in the 1982 cities with more than 10,000 population recently completed by the International City Managers Association shows that cities with more than 10,000 population increased their parking lot areas during 1953 the increases were not proportional with the rise in car registrations.

On the other hand cities from 10,000 to 50,000 came up with a median of 45 spaces for every 1,000 cars compared to 49 spaces for every 1,000 in 1952. Holding the top spot in number of spaces available is Miami Beach, Fla., with \$89 for every 1,000 cars. In other words the chances are better than one to two that the motorist will find a place to park in Miami Beach.

Fund Hearing For Shoshone Is Set by Panel

SHOSHONE, July 10—City commission will hold a public hearing on the 1955-56 budget. The budget, set up in June, calls for a 10 percent increase in taxes. This is \$32,638.88 less than last year. In addition, the city has spent \$11,622.22 from cash on hand. The total to total 34 mills on property in the city compared with 27 mills for 1954-55.

Taxes in the new budget are scheduled to total 34 mills on property in the city compared with 27 mills for 1954-55. Taxes include 20 mills to raise \$18,622.22 for the general fund, three mills to raise \$1,862.22 for the library, two mills to raise \$1,250.00 for the fire department, three mills to raise \$1,862.22 for recreation, and six mills to raise \$3,766.88 for street lighting.

Biggest economy clash in the new budget is in the capital outlay which is only \$2,500 compared with \$15,210 last year. The city purchased a new fire truck and a garbage truck last year.

Another cut was made in the street, park and waterworks improvements. For the coming fiscal year this fund is estimated at \$30,315.63, the 1954-55 figure was \$32,121.11. Last year the city made considerable street widening, oiling and curbing. The new budget also calls for economy on extra labor, repairs and supplies, printing and waterworks power.

The mill levy will bring in an anticipated \$31,354. Other anticipated revenue will be water collection, \$20,000; dog tags, \$500; dog and bicycle licenses, \$400; beer licenses, \$500; liquor licenses, \$1,125; interest on bonds, \$300; highway maintenance, \$400; city hall, \$1,000; Oodine-Mott-Ditch, \$1,100; highway taxes, \$10,000; \$1,450, and miscellaneous, \$500.

Anticipated expenses include \$16,775.83 for general fund, \$1,000 for police, \$2,000 for fire, \$720 for treasurer, \$420 for garbage, \$2,500 for park, \$2,025 for engineer, \$180 for auditor, \$1,200 for city clerk, \$1,000 for extra labor, \$1,000 for council, \$180 for repairs and supplies, \$5,000 for gas and oil, \$2,500 for waterworks, \$1,000 for phone, \$200 for printing, \$1,000 for pension board, \$100 for freight and express, \$250 for office expense, \$500 for clerical, \$2,000 for children, \$100 for dues and donations, \$50 for insurance, \$1,800 for election, \$500 for recodifying ordinances, \$2,000 for street, park and waterworks improvement, \$30,315.63 for capital outlay, \$2,500 for water tax, \$1,500, and miscellaneous, \$2,500.

Other anticipated expenses besides general fund are library \$1,862.22; fire department \$1,250.00; recreation \$1,862.22; street lighting \$3,766.88, and street bond improvement \$1,144.

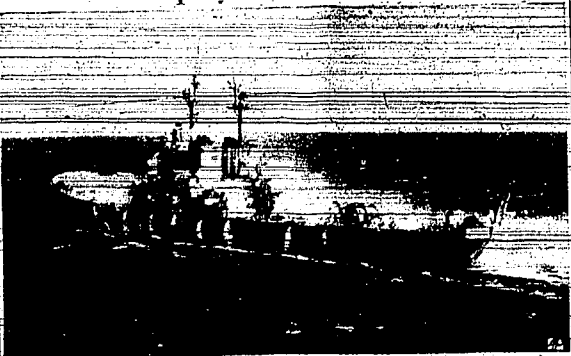
