

Attorney for Pilots Slates Court Action

LOS ANGELES, July 14 (AP)—The attorney for the "hunger striking" pilots has filed suit to appeal their plea for freedom to the United States supreme court.

The pilots have refused to admit they were jailed at "terminal point" 27,000 feet. It was reported the advanced stages of starvation had made them so weak they were confined to their beds.

Nevertheless, they voted to "fast to death" unless they are released on bail pending appeal of a year's sentence.

The U. S. circuit court of appeals has postponed the pilots' plea for release until today.

Their attorney, HARVEY COHEN, said if the circuit court fails to act then "I will file in Washington tomorrow to present" their petition for bail to the supreme court.

GUATEMALAN TRIUMPH The crushing of communist and pro-communist governments in Guatemala represents a smashing triumph for freedom in the Western Hemisphere.

For days, the rebel forces led by Col. Carlos Castillo Armas seemed to be fighting a desperate battle. Information was scanty, and outsiders concluded after a while that the revolt probably would collapse.

Later it was realized there had been more fighting than could be reported. And when Colonel Castillo's small air force swung in to fuller action and was unopposed, the war was completely ended.

Suddenly, the impact of this gathering storm was felt at the palace. The pro-red regime of President Jacobo Arben Guzman resigned, and was replaced by a military junta headed by Col. Carlos Enrique Diaz.

Distasteful observers were skeptical of the move, fearing a trick by Arben. Even the junta's outlawing of the communist party failed to convince. Colonel Castillo said the war would go on until the government met the demands for the complete crushing of the country's communist elements.

There followed another palace coup, with another junta headed by tough Col. Efraim J. Morazan moving in to replace Colonel Diaz. This time the rebels were given the axe.

The action satisfied rebel leaders. And under the auspices of the Organization of American States, a cease-fire was arranged.

Thus, though the rebels never put a ground force in the capital and never took more than a fair portion of the country, their persistence, their tiny but damming air force, and the moral backing of the United States produced the dramatic ouster of the reds and their sympathizers.

How much material assistance, how much strategic guidance this country might have given the rebels may not be known for some time. The indications are it was not much.

What did count heavily was the presence of American Ambassador John Peurifoy, symbol of the great power to the north. Quietly but forcefully, he lent moral strength to the men who were emboldened to overturn Arben and oust the communists.



Stevenson Backs Dulles' Paris Trip

SEATTLE, July 14 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson gave his unqualified approval to Secretary of State Dean Rusk's trip to Paris to confer with French leaders over the crucial Geneva conference.

Stevenson, radiating confidence of Democratic victory at the polls in November, made the comment at a news conference. He arrived here last night, winding up a tour of the Pacific northwest before heading for Alaska.

The Democratic presidential nominee in 1952 said he was glad that Dulles had decided to confer with the French. He added:

"It is imperative that we participate in decisions of this kind and make our views known, so that it never can be said that we contributed to the disintegration of the grand alliance."

"After Japan, India and Indonesia this is a paradise for Americans," a recent visitor said. "I've been here a week and haven't heard the United States insulted once. That's an unusual thing in Asia today."

The reason is that Formosa is about the most "un-neutralist" spot in the world.

The Nationalists want war. They are ready to fight any time, any where in any circumstances so long as the enemy is communist China.

They see in the United States their chief hope that they will get the means and the opportunity to fight their way back to the mainland.

American foreign policy is sometimes puzzling to the Nationalists. As, for instance, when Secretary of State John Foster Dulles hinted last year at the possibility of a change in policy toward red China.

But—the government is alarmed at the cooperation with the United States. It got a big lift out of the way in which Dulles snubbed

America's Production Hit 365 Billions In 1935 for New Record, Report Says

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The commerce department says the nation produced nearly 365 billion dollars worth of goods and services last year.

It figured out at about a billion dollars a day and it was the fourth year in a row that the nation's production had climbed to a new peak.

The department's report also showed that the nation's production fell off sharply in the first quarter of this year, but not as much as in the first quarter of last year.

Personal income in the first five months of this year, 1936, ran slightly higher than a year before, despite the drop in total production. The department estimated that during the first five months of this year, personal income was at an annual rate of 283 billion dollars, approximately 600 million dollars higher than the annual rate in the first five months of 1935.

The report was one of a series of complete revisions of the first six years of the department's records of total production and the various segments of it, such as national income and personal income.

was nearly all its actual output, not in price increases.

Despite the revision, however, the commerce department said total production in 1935, 1931, 1932 and 1933 set successive new records over the previous high, achieved at the peak of wartime production in 1934 when the gross national product reached 258 billion.

On the old basis, it had previously been estimated that the gross national product, the total dollar value of all production of goods and services—last year came to \$357,100,000,000.

On the new basis, this was lowered to \$354,000,000,000, a decrease of \$2,200,000,000, or about six-tenths of 1 per cent.

The revision lowered the estimate for the summer of 1935 from \$348,000,000,000 to \$346,000,000,000. On the new basis, therefore, total production rose about 5 1/2 per cent in 1935. The report said the gain
