## Water Panel Urges Cloud Seeding Ban

RATON, N.M., July 17 (UP)—A county water resources planning board today called on officials in 10 western states to work for a federal law banning artificial rainmaking.

"Until such time as fair and effective regulations can be worked out."

The Colfax county group charged that during the five years of cloud-seeding experiments in California, Utah and Washington, there has been a greatly reduced snowfall in the mountains of Arizona, Utah, Idaho, Colorado and New Mexico.

An almost total absence of wet weather in the winter months in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

Moisture Normal

During the same period, the group charged, summer moisture, which is normal in the Gulf of Mexico and doesn't pass through a cloud-seeding area, has remained normal.

E. E. Harrison, secretary of the county's water planning board, said cloud-seeding in the western states has left farmers and ranchers who live in the south and east "in the same fix" as an irrigation farmer whose irrigation water is drained off before it reaches him.

"If clouds can be milked of their moisture, we don't want them milked before they get to us," Harrison said.

Ban Sought

He said a resolution calling for federal laws against cloud-seeding was being sent to the governors of Utah, Wyoming, Nevada, Nebraska, Colorado, Arizona, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico urging their support in the matter.

Congressional delegates, chamber members, senators, congressmen and other agricultural organizations also are being contacted, he said.

## Memorial on Russ Victory To Be Moved

BERLIN, July 17 (UP)—A controversial Soviet memorial—the first tank to blast its way into Nazi Berlin back in 1945—may soon be pulled back behind the Iron Curtain. The Russians apparently feel the defaced, wire-braided tank has outlived its usefulness as a symbol in the American sector of Berlin.

Soviet army headquarters asked the Americans today for permission to haul the tank memorial out of the city sector where it has stood as a constant reminder of the red conquest. Negotiations will be conducted here to effect the removal.

Austrian willingness to discard the symbol came as a surprise to allied quarters. West Berliners were pleased.

The tank, atop a marble base, has been an eyesore since late Germans defaced it during the Soviet blockade of 1948-49. To protest its removal, the Americans surrounded it with a chicken wire cage two years ago. Work on rebuilding the memorial was interrupted by the June 17, 1953, workers' rebellion in East Germany. Thereafter, U. S. authorities forbade further work on a tank which represented the same armored forces used to quell the anti-communist uprising.
