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

Plan Offered to Fight Floods In Upper Snake River Valley

Editor, Times-News: An up-to-date plan for mauling the flood waters of the upper Snake river valley and turning them later into flood production, is being presented for immediate consideration following two congressional appropriations, one for \$100,000 to study the problem and the other for \$100,000 for the actual work. The plan is being prepared by the army engineers, the best way to store Snake river flood waters to stop damage and to turn them into crop production and industry use.

It is generally believed that starting in 1937 the Snake river valley will come down under valley floods but it will only affect the one arm of the Snake river valley. It will be relief from the most damaging floods, on Blackfoot river. Willows and the tributaries of the North fork, Reservoir sites are needed so that the waters will be held back until the waters will be needed for crops.

After the storage waters have been controlled there will still be an estimated million acre feet of excess water which will be sent away to the sea doing some damage in Idaho, Oregon and Washington. A proposed plan will allow the excess waters into the lavada. The Market Lake basin at Roberts is being built. It is proposed to build a main canal, extend it to the highway and north five miles. It is a gravity grade and will lift six large pumps (well down)
